#### New FY24 Budget Documents

The following documents are being presented along with Version 2.0 of the FY24 Budget:

- Summary of Budget Adjustments
- Operating Expense Summary

There are only two adjustments being brought forward for review and they both reflect salary savings. One represents known retirements and the second one reflects the reduction of the shared floating nurse from a 1.0 FTE to an .8FTE (Dover's share of this reduction is .1FTE). We are watching the kindergarten enrollment as it is currently under 60 students and could fall below the class size policy with the budgeted four sections. As we have one classroom educator retiring, we have some flexibility if additional students do not register. In addition, we do not currently foresee the ongoing district-wide reviews (SPED and Human Resources) impacting Dover's FY24 budget.

We are planning to add a second integrated pre-school program due to the current numbers of students presenting for special education services. The staff for this classroom, one educator and one educational assistant, will be covered through the Pre-K Revolving Fund. This is consistent with our past practices and funds are available to cover the additional salary expenditures.

At this time, there are no changes to our OOD projections. The per mileage costs for transportation provided by ACCEPT did increase by 17.5% but we were able to offset that increase with reduced projected mileage due to the cohort of student's being transported.

Once the discussion on the V2.0 budget information has been completed, the Committee will hold their Annual Budget Hearing followed by the final vote on the FY24 Budget.

#### Timeline

With tonight's approval, the Committee's work is completed with the next steps being at the town level.

Dover's Warrant Hearing is scheduled for **March 13th** at **7:30pm**. An abbreviated budget presentation will be shared for the operating budget. Dover's Annual Town Meeting is scheduled for **May 1st** and the Town Election on **May 15th** (DSC's capital requests could be a ballot question).

#### Past Funding Impact

Grant dollars from state and federal governments have provided unprecedented flexibility to districts over the past three years. This flexilibility has allowed districts to support students and staff as they have navigated the unpredictability of COVID.

#### **Current School Reality**

Districts across the state continue to experience the impact of the pandemic. Student mental health needs are rising, gaps in learning must be addressed, and socialemotional health and well-being require additional supports.

For the past 10 years, OSD has instituted a 2% average annual increase. This unprecedented 14% increase is straining local budgets. **Consider "pothole" or other funding relief to mitigate impact.**

# Elementary Math Pilot-Background



- Pine Hill & Chickering have been using Everyday Math since the early 2000s, are currently using the 4th Edition (2015)
- Since this time, the 8 Practice Standards for Math have been adopted and MA DESE's CURATE has published a list of programs that meet its expectations
- Education has also continued to evolve, our learners have evolved, and we have focused on our Profile of a Graduate skills
- 2 Pilot programs this year: Eureka<sup>2</sup> and Illustrative Math (both 'approved' by DESE).

### **Tentative Timeline**




- Fall 2022: Teachers pilot one unit of Eureka<sup>2</sup>, gather feedback
- Spring 2023: Teachers pilot one unit of Illustrative Math, gather feedback
- Late Spring 2023: Compare rubrics, student feedback, teacher feedback, coach feedback, administrative feedback; select a program to pilot more in-depth 2023-2024
- 2023-2024: one teacher per grade level pilots the full curriculum
- Summer 2024: PD for teachers on new math curriculum
- Fall 2024: Rollout new math curriculum in stages (a few grades at a time-TBD)

## Eureka<sup>2</sup>



Eureka Squared is a research based program which focuses on accessibility, coherence, and engagement. The program's approach interweaves procedural fluency and conceptual knowledge. The scope and sequence are intentionally organized to leverage connections between concepts, and progress conceptual understanding to help students access new learning and problem-solving. Eureka Squared provides a focussed approach to encourage student discourse and to engage students by connecting lessons to real-world math. Lessons provide hands-on activities and are a gradual release model moving towards student independence.



### Illustrative Math



Illustrative Math is organized in a coherent progression where skills build upon each other. The scope and sequence of the program is designed to help students develop a deep understanding of mathematical concepts, build fluency, and solve mathematical problems that reflect their lived experiences. Units and lessons begin by inviting students to use their prior mathematical knowledge, funds of knowledge, language, and culture to make sense of new mathematical concepts. Activities offer LEARN MATH FOR LIFE collaborative learning opportunities and instructional routines that center student thinking and encourage students to bring their whole selves to math class. Grades K–5 courses (and coming soon to 6–12 courses) include problem-solving contexts that positively reflect ethnically diverse cultures and support the implementation of culturally relevant and responsive pedagogy.





#### **Principal's Reflections**

March Madness is underway! We began the book competition during COVID and have continued the tradition. Staff select eight books and set up a tournament style read aloud where students listen to books and vote. In the end, one book wins and with the generous funding of our PTO, we purchase a copy of the book for each classroom. This year we launched with a flash mob (here!), and the entire set of books and two books for last week can be found here.

"Chickering Cheer", a means to recognize students for success, perseverance and being a good citizen, was a big hit! We have put the program on hold and will bring it back later in the school year. During the first round, nearly 30 % of our students earned a Cheer!

The MCAS schedule for Pine Hill and Chickering has been posted. We anticipate fourteen testing days within the testing period of April to May. We ask that families refrain from travel during that time and hope that everyone arrives at school on time!

#### Curriculum and Learning and Professional Development

As our teachers and students continue to implement the Teachers College Readers Workshop, we thought we would share a sampling of current work. At many grade-levels, students are engaged in nonfiction Reading Units of Study to develop their nonfiction reading and research skills!

- In first grade, students are working on studying all the information in nonfiction books (e.g., text, maps, captions, diagrams, photographs), to learn more about a specific animal. In the coming weeks, they will be using all they've learned to write informational books about their animals.
- Our third graders are learning the text structure and strategies for understanding narrative nonfiction texts. Students are digging into biographies and learning these texts have story elements similar to fiction

- stories (the main character is the important person, they face and overcome obstacles, have particular character traits, etc.).
- Meanwhile, fourth graders are launching research clubs to investigate extreme weather and
  natural disasters! Throughout this unit, students are learning nonfiction reading and research
  skills. They're learning about nonfiction text structures (cause/effect, problem/solution, etc),
  how to identify key main ideas and supporting details, and how to synthesize information
  from multiple sources.
- In fifth grade, teachers are beginning a *Reading History Unit*, during which students research the events leading up to the Revolutionary War. In the second part of the unit, they continue their research in preparation to debate the question of independence from Great Britain during a reenactment of the Second Continental Congress.

#### Personnel

Mr. Stephan Harte has announced his plans to retire at the end of this school year, and we welcomed Kelsey Albergo to Chickering as an Educational Assistant.

#### **Extracurricular**

The week of February 13th was Spirit Week at Chickering. Students and staff celebrated the days leading up to Read Your Heart out Day with costumes, crazy hair, DS or sports swag and finally comfy clothes and a full day of reading! On Read Your Heart out Day students had time to read independently, read with friends, with other classes, to do Readers Theater and any number of games.

We hosted an in-person Scripps Spelling Bee. Finalists were: Valerie Vinegoni - 4<sup>th</sup> place, Sophie Haydon and Mark Thampy-Abraham - tied for 3<sup>rd</sup> place, Saheli Koo - 2<sup>nd</sup> place, and Akshay Venkataraman - Chickering Spelling Bee Champion!

#### **Status of Appropriations**

#### Salaries

The majority of salaries have been encumbered for FY23. The Special Education Teachers line item reflects the conversion of two special educational assistants to an additional special educator to provide more direct instruction to students on IEPs as well as savings from post FY23 budget staffing changes. You will see corresponding savings in the Educational Assistants line item which also reflects one additional EA charged to the SPED 240 Grant, increasing that positive variance. There are also variances in the Teachers-Classroom, Guidance and Psychological line items due to several post-FY23 budget staffing changes as well as current year unpaid leaves. The net impact was a negative variance of approximately \$5,000 however has been reduced based on the leaves. You will note the Substitutes line is now over-budget representing the needed coverage. There is a positive variance in SPED Administration due to the allocation of responsibilities this year with an interim in this shared district position. Substitutes and Custodial overtime services are expensed as incurred. You will see those budget balances continue to decrease as the year progresses. We will continue to update the Committee on changes in staffing.

#### **Expenditures**

There are no material expenditure variances to report to date except for SPED Services/Supplies and utilities. Additional support services have been required for the current cohort of students on IEPs. The negative variance previously reported in textbooks for materials purchased for the Reader's Workshop implementation has been moved to utilize the available funding from the FY22 Pandemic-Related Enrollment Disruptions Impacting Chapter 70 Aid Dover received late in FY22 of \$7,884.69. As these expenses are one-time purchases and not annual operating expenses, this was an appropriate use of these funds. Initial projections have been encumbered for building maintenance contracts and most utilities. The encumbrance for Transportation costs has been increased to reflect fuel adjustment increases. The TEC oil bid price for FY23 is for the first time a floating rate due to the current volatility of the oil market. The fixed rate at the time of the bidding process was \$4.1425 (FY22 was \$2.1524). We have revised the negative variance in Utilities from \$30,000 to \$10,000 based on the mild winter. We have been paying between \$3.20 -\$3.80 per gallon for our deliveries to date which is below the placeholder of \$4/per gallon.

#### Out-of-District

Tuition encumbrances are reflected for all known out-of-district placements however we continue to see some fluctuations in placements and placement costs. With changes since the January report, OOD tuition costs are now approximately \$230,000 over budget. Transportation costs have been encumbered and reflect approximately \$30,000 of additional costs. This corresponds with the new placements (2 more than budgeted). Circuit Breaker reimbursement has been finalized. Dover will be receiving \$1,151,764 comprised of \$940,486 for tuition costs and \$211,278 in transportation costs. The State was able to fully fund tuition and transportation allowed costs at the mandated rate of 75%. This was great news for the transportation costs as the roll-out of reimbursement for these costs under the Student Opportunity Act had been accelerated.

Net Operating Results  At this point in the year, we are projecting a negative operating variance primarily related to the OOD activity. CB funds are available to cover this deficit. We will continue to monitor and provide financial updates at each School Committee meeting. We will be happy to answer any questions at Tuesday's meeting.
