

# Cardinals Basketball Wins Gold, Makes School History

*The Red Hat* was founded February 6, 1951 by Bishop John P. Treacy and the first class of Newman Catholic High School. Originally the name of the yearbook, *The Red Hat* became the name for Newman's newspaper. The newspaper was published every month.

*The Red Hat* ran on-and-off for 55 years but released its last edition in 2006 due to lack of interest. From 2010-2012 there was an attempt to restart a version of *The Red Hat* in an online "blog" form but proved unsustainable due to a lack of interest.

In September 2020, *The Red Hat* was reinstated as a digital newspaper, combining both the traditional newspaper and modern blog styles from the past and released nine editions during the school year. A dedicated student staff continued the paper during the 2021-2022 school year, publishing eight editions.

*The Red Hat* strives to revive the spirit of Newman Catholic High School, bringing school pride and tradition back to the student body.

## **Child Development Course Offers Unique Opportunities**

By: Ava Sukanen A new, hands-on child development course at Newman Catholic High School offers students the opportunity to work with younger students within the Newman system. The class is being taught by Heather Shaughnessy, Food And Consumer Education teacher, who has a minor in child development. It is a dual-credit course through Northcentral Technical College. The students receive both in class learning and experience at the Early Childhood Center: St. Michael.

Senior Natalie Brenner, a student in the course, touched on some of the many categories the course covers.

"We learn about how children develop socially, emotionally, intellectually, and physically," she said.

Natalie said she chose to take the course because of the unique opportunities it provided. "I kind of needed an elective, but it seemed like a lot of fun because I heard we'd get to work with the kids," she said.

Another senior in the course, Kari Severson, shared the same intrigue but also hoped it would be useful in her future endeavors.

"I'm hopefully going into a kid oriented field, like being a pediatric nurse or something like that, so knowing what stages of life they're in will be very helpful," she said.

The students will have worked with each age group at St. Michael's by the end of the course. The four age groups are: infants, 12-18 months, 2-3 years, and 4K children.

"We're starting with the youngest," Natalie said. "We spend one day observing them and then the next day we get to do hands on helping out."

Child development allows the students to put what they learn into practice while still having fun with it.

"We get to play with them and do different experiments," Kari said.

"They have different developmental levels, so we do little things like hiding a toy that they remember playing with

and seeing if they can find it." Mrs. Shaughnessy said she hopes this

course will be useful for her students and even prepare them for family life.

"I have a student who is going into education and I have students going into the medical field," she said. "Understanding child development, why it's important to study child development, and not only that but being future parents, it's a good thing to know how children work."

This course only allowed eight students so that they would be able to get a more enriching, hands-on experience at St. Michael. The students get to see the ideas in their textbooks off the page and in real life with one-on-one learning experiences with the younger students. Child development gives the students in the class the chance to have a more rounded and complete learning experience that will stick with them for the rest of their lives.


These three days - Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Holy Saturday, draw us into the Paschal the Liturgy of the Easter Triduum,

We saw the White House, toured the Capitol Building, and saw the founding documents of the country, including the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution at the National Archives. We also spent time at various memorials, including the Vietnam and World War II memorials, and we and saw monuments to Franklin Roosevelt, Thomas Jefferson, and of course the sight you can see from all of Washington, the Washington Monument.
