Governors Visit Washington County

Ohio Governor DeWine and Former Governor Hollister attend area event

Marietta - April 28, 2020

Ohio Governor, Mike DeWine, and State Representative, Jay Edwards, visited Marietta during their whistle-stop style tour, prior to the May primary election. Area school superintendents and treasurers, as well as elected officials and area business owners, were among the crowd who welcomed the pair to the People's Bank Theater in downtown Marietta.

Along the way, Governor DeWine and Lieutenant Governor Husted made several appearances in Southeastern Ohio to announce their \$500 million proposal for Appalachian counties. This proposed initiative, currently in its planning phase, would help rural Ohio counties to stimulate economic growth, through a variety of possible areas, including education. Enhancing workforce development is emphasized in the education category of the proposal. Working together, high schools and career centers, together with area businesses, could better prepare students to enter the local job market after graduation.

Superintendent, Kyle Newton, and Treasurer, Melcie Wells, represented Warren Local Schools at the event. Mr. Newton said, "... after speaking with Governor DeWine, it is clear that he is willing to make a real investment in our

community. The district will work with other local

entities, school districts, and the community to target funds that will have the largest impact and greatest return based on the criteria of the Governor's investment."

Mrs. Wells said, "I was very pleased with the level of financial commitment that Governor DeWine is proposing to dedicate to our community. He was especially engaged in listening to the public school representatives in attendance and hearing their concerns and that is very encouraging for Warren Local and all the Districts in our region."

Former Ohio Governor, Nancy Hollister, the first, and only, female Governor of Ohio, also attended the event. Hollister later toured the new facilities at the Warren Local Schools campus.

Special shout out to the team who created the "Lazy Girl Recliner" for earning the most votes.

A Passion Cube was created to help students explore what they have skills in compared to what they like. They were directed to create a cube with 1 thing they were passionate about, 2 reasons Why? they were passionate about it, and 3 skills they possess. After folding into a cube, students will be able to use this cube as a springboard for further discussions when working with their Career Mentor.

Students comments about the

day included: "It was very entertaining." "It was fun and I really enjoyed it, and I wish we could do it again." "We all had to work together and create something." "Because it put my creativity to use." "I got to express my ideas and talk to a huge crowd without messing up."

Mentors added: I love that it helps the students identify their strengths and use strengths & passions to identify careers; I enjoyed watching the students work together to develop their pitch; It required quick thinking and team work; Both skills I feel are applicable to many careers; Students were driven to work together.

They enjoyed the work they were doing and the business they were building. That feeling of peace and contentment stayed throughout my time there.

Caroline started Little Muskingum Kettle Farm in 2020, shortly after the COVID pandemic hit. However, it wasn't her first career.

She earned a degree in aerospace engineering from the Naval Academy in 2011 and completed five years of military service as a Commissioned Officer in the U.S. Navy Civil Engineer Corps stationed in Mississippi, California, and Africa. She also completed a year of service through AmeriCorps in Montana, was a substitute teacher, and even volunteered on a farm in Israel. Ultimately, she decided to return to her first love- farming.

Tessa Haffner is a junior at Warren High School. She isn't sure what's next, although she knows that she would like to be a small business owner at some point. "I can see you being good at that." Caroline affirms as Tessa shares her thoughts on her future.

Tessa and Caroline were brought together by an environmental economic internship opportunity, offered through BB2C and Rural Action. The paid spring internships allow high school students to complete 50 hours of service over ten weeks with a business that works with the environment, agriculture, or ecotourism. While they were both new to internships, neither were



new to BB2C. Both Tessa and Caroline had participated in our Real World Problem Scenario program in the past, and both scenarios involved agriculture.

Agriculture was again the star in this spring's internship opportunity, which allowed Tessa and Caroline to weed, seed, package, and work on the backside of the business together. They tackled both spreadsheets and spring cleaning. Tessa shared that, often, the best part of her day was coming to her internship.

When I asked her about becoming an intern, Tessa thoughtfully replied, "There are so many opportunities out there. If you look for them and talk to people, you'll find ones that interest you." Reflecting on the experience so far, she added, "It gives you a taste of what you think you might like without the long-term commitment of a school or a job."

Caroline also provided positive feedback on hosting an intern. "Interns are the next generation of thinkers. They'll have ideas you don't have. It helps to have a different perspective on what you should be doing as a business owner. Having the right intern is motivating and inspiring and reminds you why you do it. It keeps you from being in a bubble." Caroline added, "I'm so impressed that our community has a program like this. You hear about AmeriCorps opportunities for those 18 and over. But to have a structured experience that is paid and formalized for youth is amazing."

Nurse Notes



Summer Reminders

<u>Nurse ANotes</u>

Immunization needed for Senior year - Documentation of a meningococcal (MCV4) vaccine given on or after the student's 16th birthday must be on file at Warren High School before your child can enter the 12th grade in August of 2022. This also includes students who attend the Washington County Career Center and those who take college courses.

All 7th grade students must have an updated tetanus, diphtheria, and pertussis (Tdap) vaccine and a meningococcal (MCV4) vaccine before the first day of school in August.

All kindergarten students must have documentation of the following vaccines: DTap/DT-5 doses (Dose 5 only required if 4th dose was given prior to the 4th birthday); Polio- 4 doses (Dose 4 only required if 3rd dose was given prior to the 4th birthday); Hepatitis B- 3 doses (the final dose must be given after age 6 months); MMR- 2 doses; Varicella- 2 doses (or documentation of having the disease).



If your student needs to take prescription medication during school hours or have an emergency medication available, please have your child's healthcare provider complete a medication form over the summer. The form is available on Final Forms or by emailing your school nurse at melissa.kemper@warrenlocal.org.

"Tick Talk"

Summer break is here and it is time to enjoy the great outdoors! However, before you head outside you'll want to protect yourself and loved ones from ticks that often lurk in tall grass, wooded areas and thick brush. Ticks are small eight-legged arachnids that feed on blood through biting the person or animal they latch on and require blood meals to complete their life cycles. Ticks are transmitters of diseases to both humans and animals.

Tick-borne diseases tend to have similar symptoms that may develop days to weeks after a tick bite, such as fever, fatigue, headache, muscle or joint pain, rash, and decreased appetite. If you or a loved one notice any of these symptoms, please see a doctor promptly to be evaluated and treated accordingly. Tick bites are commonly treated with antibiotics.

The best way to avoid Lyme's disease and other tick-borne diseases is to prevent tick bites from occurring. To help keep ticks off your skin, avoid tall grass, walk in the center of trails, and wear long sleeves and pants. The Ohio Department of Health (ODH) suggests using insect repellents registered by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency labeled for use against ticks. Always follow the product label. Remember to always check your clothes and skin carefully for ticks after being outside. Removing ticks right

away can help prevent tick-borne disease.

ODH recommends that you promptly remove ticks to reduce the risk of tick-borne diseases and suggests you follow the following steps when removing a tick:

Use fine-tipped tweezers and grab the tick close to the skin and gently pull upward to remove the entire tick.

Don't use home remedies like petroleum jelly, nail polish or a lit match to try to detach ticks.

After removing the tick, clean the area and wash your hands thoroughly.

Watch for symptoms of tickborne illness and notify your doctor right away. Be aware of ticks and make a habit of tick prevention as you venture out into the great outdoors. Please do not forget to check your children and yourself thoroughly for ticks after playing outside. For more information, please visit the Ohio Department of Health website.

AP Research Students Present Final Projects

Junior AP Research students Clara Pettit and Emma Poulton recently presented and submitted their yearlong projects to the College Board. AP Research is the second course in the AP Capstone program offered at the high school, and in order to be eligible for college credit, students must design, conduct, analyze, and present a research project centered around a problem as defined by each student.

This year, Clara chose to examine the effectiveness of various materials in stopping the transmission of airborne water droplets. She collected data from multiple participants who breathed through masks made of different types of material. Emma's research centered on examining the reason why so many veterinarians in the Mid-Ohio Valley have chosen to leave the profession in recent years. She designed and admin-

istered a questionnaire and conducted interviews in order to collect data for her conclusions. After conducting and analyzing their research, both Clara and Emma each wrote twenty-page academic essays and delivered multimedia presentations defending their research. Both young women are to be commended on their accomplishments considering the fact that research at this level is typically not conducted until a student is in a master's level program of education.

To be eligible to offer AP Seminar and AP Research, a high school must first apply and be accepted by the College Board. Warren High School is one of only sixty-one schools in the state of Ohio approved to offer this program. 
