

Registration is online at: www.pembrokek12.org

Some things you will have to do:

- create an account
- provide documents
- download & print a questionnaire
 - This should be passed in to Mrs. Rossini by April 28
- Once you have filled out all the paperwork, you will receive a link to sign up for screening
- click on link to schedule a screening date
- apply for transportation (buses)


A Note from the School Nurse

Is it time for Kindergarten?

This is usually the time of year a parent says, "Is my child ready for Kindergarten?"



Kindergarten students come to school with a variety of skills and experiences and your child's teacher will work with them and guide them through a successful school year. Below are some readiness skills to consider practicing with your child.

Independent Personal Needs	Social Skills	Academic Skills	

- Wash hands
- Use the bathroom
- Change clothes
- Put coat on and take off (zip, button, snap)
- Unpack and open lunch & snacks
- Boots, shoes

- Follow directions
- Sit for short periods of time
- Cooperate with peers and adults
- Advocate for help when needed

- Listen and engage with a story
- Hold a book and turn the pages
- Recognize first and last name
- Hold a writing instrument properly

Let's Get Ready for Kindergarten!

These are simple, everyday things you can do with your learner for just a few minutes at a time to help them get ready for school. Please remember, if your learner cannot do everything listed, it **does not** mean that they are not ready for Kindergarten.



Social/Emotional Development

- Encourage your child to persist in tasks when encountering a problem by giving tasks slightly above his current ability level. When your child cannot find a solution on his own, encourage him to ask for help.
- Play board games to practice taking turns.
- Set up playdates with friends of various ages.
- Allow your child to stay with other trusted adults for a few hours at a time prior to kindergarten (especially if s/he has rarely been in the care of someone other than caregiver).
- Encourage your child to clean up after playing or eating.

Language Development

- Verbally give your child specific one-step and two-step directions and encourage him to follow through.
- Read to your child everyday
- While reading, point out how to hold a book (right-side up with the spine on the left) and the orientation in which we read the words and look at the pictures (left to right).
- After reading, ask your child questions about the story (what did you like about the story? What happened at the end? Who was in the story?)
- Give your child plenty of opportunities to draw

Cognitive Development

- Have your child help you sort items according to color, size, and shape
- Talk about and identify patterns (red, blue, red, blue. Car, truck, car, truck).
- Teach your child numerals 1-10.
- Count objects in your home. Have your child point to each object as s/he counts.
- Go on a shape hunt. Point out circles, triangles, squares, and rectangles to your child.
- Talk about positional and directional concepts like up/down, over/under, in/out, behind/in front of, top/bottom, beside/between, off/on, stop/go.
- Talk about opposite words (big/little, empty/full, slow/fast).

Physical Development (Gross & Fine Motor)

- Give your child plenty of opportunities for outdoor play: running, jumping, and climbing.
- Practice skipping.
- Stack blocks together.
- Let your child use child-safe scissors to cut out a variety of shapes.
- Teach your child to write/recognize his name.
- Play with playdough regularly. Roll, squish, stamp, and even cut it!
- String large beads to make a necklace.
- Play with an interlocking puzzle together.



Fine Motor Development

<u>Pencil Grasp</u>: An efficient pencil grasp is one that allows the child to write neatly at a reasonable speed without tiring easily. Poor pencil grasps not only look awkward but they do not use the hand muscles efficiently. This may result in the child tiring easily and being unable to produce neat handwriting.

Have a look at this picture of a mature pencil grip and you can see how these tripod fingers (thumb, index and middle fingers) are working well together to control the pencil. Children need lots of opportunities to strengthen the hand muscles and practice the dexterity needed for pencil control.

<u>Scissors</u>: Learning how to use scissors correctly can help with developing pencil control skills. Cutting with a proper scissor grasp, will give the tripod fingers lots of practice in working together, and will help to strengthen your child's hand muscles. This will help to improve fine motor skills and will help to give your child the foundations needed to develop pencil control for good handwriting. Cutting on a line can also help to strengthen visual-motor skills, which may help improve handwriting.

<u>Visual Motor Integration</u>: VMI activities help your child by getting their eyes and handsworking together. This is beneficial for children as they perceive and copy shapes, numbers, and letters correctly to help with handwriting skills.

This list is subject to change and a complete list of supplies will be posted to the website over the summer.


- Glue sticks

- Reusable water (with straw top to prevent spills)
- Headphones (not earbuds) with a straight plug
