## 2022-23 School Overview

Woodland Elementary School's vision is to provide students with a safe and nurturing school environment that enables all students to learn to their maximum potential.

Located on the east side of Costa Mesa in the Newport Mesa School District, this unique campus serves approximately 500 students in the primary grades. It is the only campus in NMUSD to exclusively serve primary students. Our transitional kindergarten through second students, with diverse ethnicities and socioeconomic levels, blend together to form one learning community. In addition to our general education classrooms, the campus houses two Applied Behavior Analysis classrooms for students with Autism Spectrum Disorder and moderate to severe needs. Valuing the school's diversity for the rich environment it provides, our dedicated teachers, involved parents, and members of the community work together to provide a challenging, well-balanced academic program that meets the needs of all WES students.

Each morning, students are greeted by staff as they enter the schoolyard, surrounded by colorful murals highlighting the building blocks of Coach Wooden's Pyramid of Success. In addition to weaving social-emotional learning onto our campuses and into the classrooms, school assemblies, celebrations, and spirit days serve to unite the school population. To help each student reach academic goals, teachers and support staff analyze data, discuss and share best practices, participate in professional development, and establish individual and school-wide goals. State-of-the-art technology is integrated throughout the curriculum, and all students have 1:1 technology devices to provide easy access to the internet and supportive software to support the curricula in all subjects. Students participate in music, library, and science programs. In addition to the district-provided resources, the Parent Faculty Organization (PFO) and the school foundation raise funds to support academic and enrichment opportunities aligned to STEM and the arts.

Community involvement is valued and WES provides a variety of opportunities for students and families to gather in and outside of the regular school day by engaging in flag decks, family fun nights, school carnivals, skate nights, and book fairs, to name a few. By learning and working together, we believe our students can become lifelong learners who have the ability to be thoughtful problem-solvers and responsible citizens.

Where the most viable option, LEAs were required to administer the statewide summative assessment in ELA and mathematics. Where a statewide summative assessment was not the most viable option for the LEA (or for one or more grade-level[s] within the LEA) due to the pandemic, LEAs were allowed to report results from a different assessment that met the criteria established by the State Board of Education (SBE) on March 16, 2021. The assessments were required to be:

#### 2022-23 Opportunities for Parental Involvement

Woodland Elementary is fortunate to have a tremendously involved parent and community support base. The Parent Faculty Organization (PFO) is an integral part of the overall school program. Many of our programs would not be in place if it were not for the tireless and faithful support of this organization. The PFO uses fundraisers and volunteer hours to positively impact the Woodland student body. In addition, Woodland is pleased to have the support of the Kaiser/Woodland Schools Foundation created in the 2010-2011 school year. Fundraising by this organization helps support the school's STEM academic program.

Parent volunteers provide classroom help, clerical and project support. All of our volunteers are cleared by the Department of Justice before working in classrooms. To volunteer at Woodland, a volunteer form is filled out and turned into the school office with personal photo identification. A clear TB report is needed to complete the form. In addition, parents need to follow district COVID-19 Safety protocols. Our campus volunteers must sign in the office and wear badges when on campus to show that they are cleared to work with our students. Both organizations provide multiple opportunities for parents and families to be involved both during the day and in after-school activities, often at little or no cost to the families.

Parents are encouraged to take leadership roles at Woodland. All parents have opportunities to serve in leadership capacities in the Parent Faculty Organization (PFO), School Site Council (SSC), and English Learner Advisory Committee (ELAC) at the school level and the DELAC at the District level. Additionally, we have parent representation on the District's Superintendent's Advisory Panel.

There are additional opportunities that bring parents and the community to campus. Beginning in January, parents will be invited to attend our school-wide flag decks celebrations. We have begun to bring back our PFO and Foundation family fun events, following COVID-19 Safety protocols, and will continue to expand these opportunities as it becomes safe to do so. In the meantime, we continue to offer parent engagement opportunities virtually.

## 2022-23 School Safety Plan

By following this cycle, schools open each August with a fully approved Comprehensive School Safety Plan in place for fall-winter and allows for training and adjustments through mid-year. Woodland Elementary School's staff is committed to providing a quality education for students of all backgrounds and abilities in a safe and orderly environment. The staff maintains a positive learning environment that enables students to acquire basic skills, think critically, and apply knowledge. Woodland students are guided in achieving their personal best with Coach John Wooden's Pyramid of Success. Expectations are shared with students and parents. All students are recognized for academic achievement and positive character traits at school. Our positive behavior plan focuses on being respectful, responsible, and safe. Students receive success awards for exhibiting the character traits in the pyramid. We highlight their awards in the classrooms, around campus, and as a community, during our school-wide flag deck celebrations. Woodland uses Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) and the Social-Emotional, evidence-based RULER curriculum.

Woodland's custodians, along with staff members, work hard to help keep the campus clean and safe. The campus is inspected regularly to ensure safe conditions. Woodland has a Disaster Preparedness Plan and materials on hand in case of an emergency; both are reviewed annually at the start of the school year. A safety shed is inventoried and stocked annually by the site safety coordinators. The school conducts regular emergency fire, earthquake, and intruder drills. The safety of our students at Woodland is our top priority. Our campus is secure during and after school hours. Staff at Woodland educate the parent and community to maintain safe procedures for Ingress and Egress to the school. Woodland staff maintains campus visitor and volunteer procedures to protect the safety of all students and staff.

The plan was reviewed at the January 5, 2022 staff safety meeting, approved by the SSC on January 18, 2022, and approved by the Local Board of Education on February 8, 2022.
