

Our favorite sculpture was the pufferfish. After learning about the sculptures we made our own sculptures out of modeling clay!




Before and After Osprey Wilds By: Lachlan Murray & Isaiah Davis, 5th Grade

Falcon Heights Elementary Construction

Have you been wondering what's been happening with the construction at school and why it's happening? Well, I've been wondering that too, which is why I interviewed Mrs. Behnke. What's happening is: "long term deferred maintenance" which means that we are getting new heating, cooling, plumbing, electrical, tiles/flooring, paint, LED lights, chalkboards, and new boilers because the old ones are from 1952 which was when the school was built. This is happening because of the "bond referendum" which means that taxpayers agreed to spend money to upgrade the district school buildings. The tiles were taken out because they may have asbestos. Asbestos can give you cancer, but the tiles that are in our school can NOT give you cancer. Asbestos is a really strong chemical and it's also really durable. Over time we've learned that it can be harmful to humans when we inhale it. Our school gets air quality checks every year before anyone is allowed back into the school. You may have also noticed that only some teachers are packing their stuff up. Their rooms were chosen to be worked on. We will be getting new tiles that are school colors with grayish pebble, blue, and maybe a yellowish color. I also learned that the upgrades will impact the whole school over time. The construction will be happening in phases. Phase one is the classroom hallways except the kindergarten room area. Phase two is everything else including the kindergarten area. 
