

Famous Black People

Martin Luther King Jr:

M.L.K. Jr. was a civil rights activist. He led many famous marches including the Selma to Montgomery March, and the March on Washington. His most famous speech was I Have A Dream. He made the speech in front of 200,000 people. M.L.K. married Coretta Scott King. M.L.K. Jr. had 4 kids with Coretta Scott who are named Martin Luther King the 3rd who is 65 years old and born Oct 23, 1957, Dexter King who is 62 years old and born Jan 30, 1961, Yolanda King who was 51 when she died of a heart attack in 2007, and Bernice King who is 59 and born in 1963. M.L.K. Jr. was assassinated by James Earl Ray. He was found in the U.K. He shot and killed him on April 4,1968 in Memphis, Tennessee.

Maya Angelou:

Maya Angelou was an American memoirist, famous poet and civil rights activist. She published seven autobiographies, three books of essays, several books of poetry, and is credited with a list of plays, movies, and television shows spanning over 50 years. She received dozens of awards and more than 50 honorary degrees. Angelou is best known for her series of seven autobiographies, which focus on her childhood and early adult experiences. The first, *I Know Why The Caged Birds Sing* (1969), tells of her life up to the age of 17 and brought her international recognition and acclaim. Maya Angelou died on May 28, 2014.

Bessie Coleman:

Bessie Coleman soared across the sky as the first woman of African American and Native American descent to earn her pilot's license in the U.S. Known for performing flying tricks. Coleman's nicknames were: "Brave Bessie," "Queen Bess," and "The Only Race Aviatrix in the World." Her goal was to encourage women and African Americans to reach their dreams and this became her legacy. Though her life and career were cut short in a tragic plane crash, her life and legacy continue to inspire people around the world.

Black history

African Americans are mostly the descendants of enslaved people who were brought from their African homelands by force to work in the New World. Their rights were severely limited and they were long denied a rightful share in the economic, social, and political progress of the United States. Nevertheless, African Americans have made basic and lasting contributions to American history and culture. fun fact:African american is one of the largest ethnic groups in america.
