- 4. Stay informed about your child's social contacts and the online interactions
- 5. Water is everywhere and recently, we saw a lot of it in the form of rain but did you know that our bodies contain a lot of water? Our bodies contain about 50 – 70% water by weight. The amount varies because of age, health, activity, weather, and even where we live can impact water levels.

Now that we know that we are at least half water, what else makes water important? Every cell in our bodies contain water. We use water to get rid of waste through urine, sweating and more. Water helps regulate body temperature. We have watery fluids in between joints and around our organs. Water also helps us express emotions when we crv.

But did you know that water affects the brain? Water helps brain cells exchange messages. It gets rid of waste and carries nutrients to the brain and helps with blood flow. These functions help our brain to stay healthy and can help students perform better in school or during physical activity. Some studies show that when students hydrate, they perform better when multi-tasking, and working memory improves when compared to dehydrated students.

Water impacts our immune system. It helps get rid of toxins and transports white blood cells throughout the body. These cells are important in the war of fighting against unwanted substances that can make us sick.

These are some of the functions of water. How much do we need? There are several answers but a minimum of 64 ounces for students eight years and older is recommended. Those less than eight years old, drink one eight-ounce cup for every year. For example, a child five years old drinks five cups of water.

In our schools, cafeterias provide water so that every student has access.

So, drink up; it makes a difference!


Fire Cadet Program

College Scholarship

College-bound seniors and transfer students in Newport Beach are encouraged to apply for up to \$700 in scholarships by Monday, May 1 at 5 p.m.

The City of Newport Beach Ackerman Scholarship Program assists qualified students in obtaining higher education. Funds for the program are provided through an endowment from the Ackerman Trust.

Scholarships may be used for tuition, books, laboratory and/or academic fees.

This year seven \$700 scholarships will be awarded. To be eligible, students must:

- 1. Must reside in Newport Beach, and
- 2. Graduate from a high school in 2023, and
- 3. Are accepted to an accredited two-year community college or four-year college/university, OR
- 4. Are transferring from a two-year community college to an accredited four- year college or university in Fall 2023 with cumulative G.P.A. of 3.0 or higher.

The criteria used for selection includes financial need, scholastic standing, school or community leadership, school and/or extracurricular activities, and career and life plans.

The deadline to submit an application is Monday, May 1, 2023, by 5 p.m. Apply at www.newportbeachca.gov/scholarship.

Carbon Monoxide (CO) Alarms

Carbon Monoxide, commonly referred to as "CO", is a colorless, odorless and tasteless gas that is poisonous to humans. It can be produced from heaters, fireplaces, furnaces and various other appliances and cooking devices, in addition to idling vehicles. In 2011, California passed Senate Bill 183, which sets minimum CO alarm requirements in various dwelling types. CO alarms detect

the poisonous gas and provide early warning, allowing you to get to fresh air. For maximum protection against CO, it is recommended that alarms are installed on every level and in every sleeping room. It is important to become familiar with the beep patterns for your particular CO alarm or device, but typically they are:

- 4 beeps and a pause EMERGENCY: leak detected.
- 1 beep every minute Batteries need replacing.
- 5 beeps every minute Unit has reached the end of its life / must be replaced.

Only purchase CO alarms, detectors or devices approved and listed by the State Fire Marshal. Lastly, always be sure to replace batteries or the alarms themselves per the manufacturer's recommendations.



A Fun, Multifaceted Program

Back Bay High School in Newport Beach, California is proud to announce its sailing program in partnership with the Orange Coast College School of Sailing & Seamanship. This program is funded in part by a grant from the California State Park Division of Boating and Waterways, and the OCC Foundation.

Designed for students who have never sailed before, or have just limited sailing experience, this class provides an exciting opportunity for our students to learn some basic sailing skills. They can also experience our local waterways, enjoy the great outdoors, and take a break from traditional academics, electronic devices, and social media.

Sailing is a great teacher of life skills, and while learning to sail, the students will also learn teamwork, gain leadership and problem-solving skills, and develop an appreciation for the natural world and the marine environment.

The course is taught by experienced sailing instructors at OCC who use a combination of dockside lectures and hands-on experience in Lido 14 dinghies to teach students the fundamentals of sailing. This includes sailing theory, points of sail, basic terminology, tacking, gybing, safety, knots, and docking.

Dinghy sailing requires agility, skill, teamwork, and concentration. At least 80 percent of class time is spent on the boat, which allows the students to put their newly acquired knowledge into practice while sailing on Newport

This elective course is also a valuable first step for those students who are interested in pursuing a maritime career. Upon completion, students earn five elective credits.

The Back Bay sailing program serves as a great motivator and reward for students who can improve in their attendance, citizenship, and academic performance.

CdM's Performance of the Mozart Requiem

On March 11, 2023, CdMHS's Instrumental and Vocal Music programs joined forces for their annual Master Work concert. This year, excerpts from Mozart's Requiem were performed by

members of the orchestra classes, professional musicians, and a combined choir of various members of the choir community, and a few faculty members. The concert was hosted in the small gym, which had been set up by the choir's Music Council.

The concert began at 7:30 with a note from Andrew Ball, the choral director, about the piece itself. Following the speech, the Madrigal Singers performed two pieces from their repertoire.

After that, the orchestra, led by senior violinist and concertmaster James "Jimmy" Eastmond, took their places. Following a few words of his own, the instrumental music director Val Jamora conducted two orchestral pieces.

The second movement, the *Kyrie*, described as one of the most difficult movements in the entire Requiem due to its speed and high use of melasma, was executed brilliantly by both the orchestra and choir.

The fourth movement featuring the *Tuba Mirum* was sung by soloists from each choral section: the bass solo from junior Ethan Wang, the alto solo from junior Milo Jenkins, the tenor solo from senior Alex Wood, and the soprano solo by senior Sabina Martin.

The final movement of the night was the *Lacrimosa*, arguably the most iconic part of the piece because of its prominent feature in many pieces of pop culture. Notable uses of the movement include the TV show *Peaky* Blinders and the 2011 anime adaptation of Hunter X Hunter.

The concert was received well by the audience members, getting a standing ovation. One parent remarked that the concert was "one of the best that they'd ever seen at CdM," and it reminded her of last year's performance of the Carmina Burana.

Parent To Parent

A Helicopter Parent

Q. I have been a helicopter parent for so long that my children, ages seven and nine, are extremely apprehensive of taking any risks in various activities or doing anything where they may get even slightly hurt or disappointed. What have I done and how do I correct it?

A. There have been overbearing and overprotective parents for years; don't beat

yourself up too badly. It's easy for parents to go overboard when it comes to their kids. However, this can continue into college years and beyond, but it doesn't have to. Let go of this habit, even if it takes a lot of time; it's necessary. Your parenting style and the way you view your children will need to change. You'll need to allow them to get used to the idea that they can actually try things on their own and whatever the outcome, it's all going to be okay in the end. Go ahead and sign them up for things that they are truly interested in and will most likely do well at. A few successes will build their self-confidence and they will perhaps want to do more things that are new and different. Just be sure that you stop yourself if you think about interfering unnecessarily, even if you know that they're heading for something rough. It's the mistakes and bumps in life that we all learn from that make us stronger individuals, better able to handle future situations. We have to be allowed to fail.

Activities Away from Technology

Q. My 10-year-old son only wants to stay indoors, play video games and eat chips and the like. He doesn't like sports. I'm trying to get him outdoors and moving but he complains about the heat. Any ideas on how to get him away from becoming a couch potato and away from the TV?

A. There are plenty of programs that your son might like such as swimming, drawing, painting, camping, making pottery, volunteering at a pet shelter, cooking, graphic design for kids, etc. The whole idea is to get him into a scheduled activity three to five days a week. Some of the facilities where the activities take place have lunch served to the kids. It's usually a pretty healthy one at that. They should give you a weekly copy of them. If not, ask for one. Some programs allow kids to bring their lunch. This means that he will be eating less of the bad things and more of the good. He might even decide that eating fruit is a good break from chips. If your son can find something he likes and can participate in it with a friend, he'll be more willing to stick with it, especially if there's no pressure to be a super star. This will also give him less time to play video games or to watch TV.

Getting a Driver's License

Q. What is the point in forcing a 16-year-old kid to get their driver's license if they don't want to drive? My husband and I do not agree on this topic. Our daughter doesn't want to drive and her dad is really trying to convince her to anyway. She has anxiety and the more he talks about it the more she backs away and gets upset.

A. While getting a license among teens was wildly popular just a few years ago, more and more are not so keen on the idea in today's society. A large percentage of teens are realizing that it's a big move to start driving and more responsibility than initially perceived. In fact, driving can be scary to many individuals regardless of their age, especially if they have anxiety. There are many reasons for the current trend of teens not wanting a license and a lot of parents are quite happy about it. Car insurance alone for a teen driver is expensive but other things like the cost of an additional car, gas and car repairs can be overwhelming. The constant worry and concerns about the safety of other drivers as well as that of the teen only adds to the challenges of the situation. Don't push your daughter to drive if she doesn't want to. It could actually make things much worse in the end. She's only 16, give her some time to come to terms with it instead of piling on extra anxiety. It's not worth it.

Internship at College

Q. Our 18-year-old son is supposed to have an internship this summer at the college he is going to be attending in the fall. However, he wants to live in a college apartment and this is where we have a problem. He's never been away and we are apprehensive of the environment he could be introduced to during the "summer" party group. Any rules that you could suggest?

A. Whether he is going early for an internship or moving into a dorm for the fall, this is a big step and most parents, as well as the kids themselves, are more than anxious about leaving home and entering college. If for some reason you feel like he really isn't ready to live on his own or not sure if he could easily be persuaded to party with the summer group, you might want to talk with the adult in charge of his internship and find out if there are other options for his housing. Oftentimes, there are families who take in college students just for the summer, especially if they are new to the area. It's more personalized because the people are doing it because they enjoy mentoring new kids and showing them around. You and your son can even meet them beforehand to get to know them a little bit better and you can ask about their rules and expectations. Either way, we have to let our kids go, let them make their own choices and hope for the best.
