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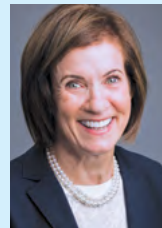

We had a wonderful start to the school year and as we focus on students' academic success, improved communication, and maintaining purposeful facilities, we do not waiver from also providing students with services, programs and support to help their overall social, emotional, behavioral and physical wellbeing.

Our schools provide welcoming, accepting and understanding environments where all students can feel safe physically and emotionally. These positive learning environments help students gain confidence, make friends, and connect with others... resulting in reduced stress and improved academic focus.

We recognize the importance of student mental health and wellness. In response, we have added trained staff to better support students in these areas. We have school psychologists; speech pathologists; counselors; health assistants; occupational therapists; social workers; nurses; and school community facilitators, who are essential in connecting students and families to resources and support.

Together with our teachers, classified support team, and school and district administrators, we work collaboratively

to address all students' needs in the areas of positive behavior, truancy prevention, social emotional learning, drug and alcohol prevention, and more.

Building relationships with students is key to their success. We help students learn that their emotions matter. We provide tools to work through difficult feelings and re-engage in learning. We are purposeful in facilitating classroom conversations, building a sense of community and positive school culture. We hold students accountable, while also providing high levels of support. We find learning opportunities with students and their families to help them understand the impact of their actions and find resolution to mitigate unwanted behavior in the future.

We are fortunate to have an incredible community, who has been instrumental in supporting our efforts to expand whole-child support. Our well-established community alliance includes community organizations that provide enhanced services for students and families. And we plan to grow these partnerships to expand before and after school programs and resources.

There is so much we do to support success within the classroom and beyond, and we have a lot to look forward to as we refine and enhance support for all students and their families.

Recognizing Nutrition Services Workers

What is an ordinary day like in the life of those who provide breakfast, snacks and lunch in our schools? It might go like this:

It starts early in the morning when darkness gives way to the light. And just when dawn covers the skies, Nutrition Services workers throughout the district

unlock cafeteria doors or district refrigerators to make mealtime happen on our campuses.

Their day includes making sure the environment around them is pristine. No matter the item being served, workers may busily unwrap, thaw, heat, and prepare the food for each student. They check the temperature to make sure that everything reaches the right degree, or they assemble trays and cutlery.

Then when the time is right, they step up to the serving line and in an almost graceful but noisy dance, hundreds of students waltz through the line at an incredible pace. In less than an hour or two, the whole school has had a chance to eat a nutrient-packed meal.

Then, the cleanup begins, and perhaps a little prepping for the next day's meal. What started as a quiet morning,



ends in a serene afternoon. They lock cafeteria doors or district refrigerators and go home, only to rise and start all over again.

This happens every full school day of the year. They persevere through changing weather conditions, various food shortages and even when the staff count is down,

Nutrition Service workers make mealtime happen every time. This past school year, cafeteria workers supplied over 1.7 million meals. That's a lot of dedication!

Joni Cagle, cafeteria manager at California Elementary School, has worked for the district for 20-plus years. She sums up her experience this way: "I love my job. I love working with the kids. It's a happy place to be!"

Assisting Those in Need

The concerns of today, including the high cost of living and post-pandemic adjustments are hard on families, and distracting for students.

With that in mind, The City of Costa Mesa is working to help local students and their families meet these challenges.

During the last fiscal year, we partnered with Project Hope Alliance and StandUp For Kids (both Costa Mesa non-profits) to serve 126 students across 21 Newport-Mesa Unified District campuses. We have also partnered with Save Our Youth (SOY), which provides tutoring, mentorship and enrichment for teenagers.

The city is always looking for ways to uplift those in need. To that end, we have also partnered with the nonprofit Families Forward currently to provide rental assistance and case management for low-income households with minor children. LETRS

In a cross-division collaboration and in support of our Board's priority of focusing on early literacy, Elementary Education Services and the Special Education Department have two cohorts of teachers participating in a rigorous two-year professional learning program called LETRS: Language Essentials for Teachers of Reading and Spelling. The cohorts consist of 28 special education

teachers across elementary and secondary schools, two special-education teachers on special assignment (TOSAs), 41 general-education full-time support teachers, and

English language arts/English language development TOSAs representing all 22 comprehensive elementary sites. The training provides teachers with a "deep knowledge to be literacy and language experts in the science of reading."

LETRS focuses on the science and then the application of the science to support educators in being highly knowledgeable in early literacy. The special education cohort began on Aug. 25 with the LETRS kickoff, and the general education cohort kicked off on Sept. 9. The kickoff began with an opening call to return to "our why," an overview of the two-year-long commitment, and an initial dive into the digital system. We are looking forward to our first year together!

A "Desired Results Developmental Profile" is used to assess children in all areas and set goals for their individual growth and development.

Our classrooms integrate the following research-based curriculum: World of Wonders PK (English language arts and math), Bridges PK (math), Hand Writing without Tears (fine motor), and Second Step (social emotional). Soon the librarian opens a new branch of the library in the zoo, and the animals are enthralled with their options at the “Zooibrary”!

To begin their read-aloud, the students participated in a scavenger hunt where they had three minutes to find stuffed animals, books about animals, animal costumes, or a live animal in their homes. The children excitedly shared their animal friends or discoveries on camera. Quickly, our Zoom screens were alive with animals of all types. Live birds, cats, dogs, and students wearing animal costumes joined in the fun. The students also held up examples of books about wild animals of all types.

After the scavenger hunt, I read the story and students listened intently as I shared the colorful pictures on screen along with the rhythmic rhyming verses of each page. To wrap up the experience, the children logged into Kahoot to compete in a quiz that recalled details from the story. By the end of the evening all of the students were able to log their minutes in the school's Read-A-Thon.

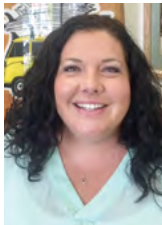
So far it has been an incredible success!

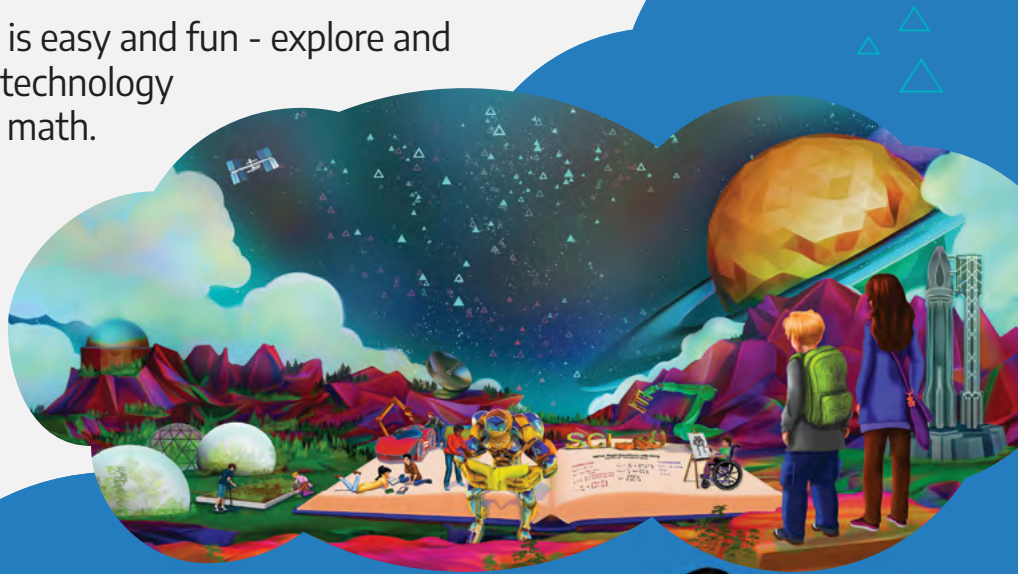

Our country has long likened its drug prevention efforts to a war, marshaling resources at the local, state and national levels to disrupt the production, distribution and consumption of illegal substances.

But the rise of fentanyl represents a dark and deadly new battlefield that is like nothing we've ever seen before, forcing us to rethink the rules of engagement.

Two factors make this synthetic opioid exceedingly dangerous. First, fentanyl is incredibly lethal at roughly 50 times stronger than heroin and about 100 times more powerful than morphine. Second, many of fentanyl's users don't even know they're taking the drug because it's often hidden in counterfeit pills made to look like common prescription opioids or other medications.

There is also little in the way of quality control in the manufacturing process, meaning doses can vary wildly. Fittingly, "One Pill Can Kill" is the name of the campaign launched by the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration to reduce America's fentanyl supply.

"The DEA confiscated over 20 million counterfeit pills in 2021," says Stephan Lambert, OCDE's coordinator of prevention education. "If you buy a pill from anywhere other than a pharmacy, you should assume that it's fentanyl. It's virtually impossible to tell what is counterfeit, and it's not worth the risk. When tested, 42 percent of those confiscated pills had a potentially lethal dose of fentanyl."

In Orange County alone, the number of fentanyl-related deaths skyrocketed to 717 in 2021 from 57 just four years earlier. That's an increase of over 1,100 percent, and fentanyl fatalities now account for more than three-quarters of all overdose deaths. At the same time, drug poisoning cases have emerged as the leading cause of

accidental death in Orange County, mirroring national rates.

These sobering statistics should command the attention of our entire county. To that end, the Orange County Department of Education is working closely with the Orange County Sheriff's Department to make sure educators and families have the tools and resources needed to help combat this crisis. On Nov. 4, both agencies will be joined by Orange County Superior Court Judge Maria D. Hernandez for a special Fentanyl Forum set to cover a range of topics, including fentanyl's impacts, how to talk to young people, and how to respond to drug overdoses and poisonings.

It's easy to feel overwhelmed and distracted by the countless challenges we face at any given moment. And there's a narrative that young people tune out well-intentioned warnings about drugs and peer pressure from adults. But our kids are listening. As we continue to model vigilance, I urge all Orange County families to look for teachable moments to talk to their children about fentanyl and the dangers of taking drugs from anyone other than a licensed medical professional.

These conversations will vary by age, but even young children can benefit from regular check-ins to dialogue about the pressures they're experiencing at school or what they're hearing from their peers. Regular chats can also serve as a baseline to track changes in a child's state of mind.

The fentanyl-related trends we're seeing are disturbing and disheartening, but they are not irreversible. When unified, millions of Orange County voices are powerful enough to communicate that we won't tolerate this poison in our communities and that one life lost is too many.

Teen Drinking

Q. Now that my husband and I have returned to the office, we think that our 16-year-old may be having friends over and engaging in drinking alcohol. We've noticed certain bottles of liquor are either missing or maybe diluted. It took us time to figure this out. We haven't approached our son yet because we wanted to see if you had some pointers to try and keep things from becoming an explosive situation.

A. Your son will probably try to dodge and avoid the discussion as well as deny drinking. To make the most of the conversation the two of you will need to take some time to think about the issues you want to discuss before you talk with your son. Consider how he might react and ways

you might respond to his questions. Be as prepared as you can for various scenarios. Avoid shaming him, especially since it may backfire, and be ready for him to claim that the two of you are setting an example by having alcohol in the house. Parents influence their teens, and sometimes even younger kids, when it comes to alcohol consumption. The old saying, "Do as I say and not as I do," will be exactly what he may bring up first. If it gets out of hand or doesn't give you the results you want, then a counselor may be able to help. Whatever you do, start this process as soon as possible and approach it with patience and love but also assertiveness.
