

From the Headmaster

Dear Friends,

We all can recall that our high school years were not without challenges. In fact, for many they were some of the toughest of our lives. Physical changes, entrance into the world of young adulthood, the establishment of adolescent "pecking orders"... these and many other teen phenomena often made this four-year span in our lives full of little cruelties which fed our insecurities and challenged our ability to persevere. It was, and is, true at Maine Central Institute and every other high school public or private, boarding or day.

That's why I am so proud of the way the MCI community has responded to this year's theme: Kindness.

Many students and faculty who have attended or served at other schools before arriving at Maine Central Institute say that ours is a much kinder place than others. However, rather than leaving well enough alone, the community has embraced Kindness unlike any of the themes which have come before and is seeking to get even better. The most powerful manifestations of this goal are very simple in nature, and they happen on a daily basis—doors are held open for others; eye contact, smiles and salutations are more frequent; "Please," "Thank you" and "I'm sorry" are recognized for the power these simple statements hold; kind comments are replacing even well-intended, affectionate teasing that can cause accidental hurt.

Though Ben Franklin's *Poor Richard's Almanac* didn't include this as one of its many famous maxims, it seems sure that he would have agreed with the saying: "If you take care of the little things, the big things will take care of themselves." So it is with Kindness, and so the MCI community, and by this I mean more than ever the students themselves, are engaged in random acts which demonstrate care, selflessness, forgiveness and tolerance. In a nation which (except in times of crisis) seems increasingly to celebrate selfishness and the quest for personal gain at the expense of others (just watch any of the myriad "reality TV shows" for a few, painful minutes), I am once again proud that MCI is stubbornly holding on to the values you remember as central to the School's mission and identity. We are being counter-cultural by holding on to the core values and traditions present when the School was founded, while at the same time looking ahead to the future needs of our students and overall community.

I know that there is a long tradition of Kindness at MCI because I have met so many alumni here on campus or during my travels, and I've been the beneficiary. Thank you for your care for and kindness toward this great old school, and please enjoy this issue of the *Alumnus*.

"The Kindness Guy" Visits MCI

Michael J. Chase spoke at MCI on October 9 as part of the Patterson Lecture Series. Affectionately known as "The Kindness Guy," Chase is an author and inspirational speaker. Considered an expert on the subjects of kindness and positive behavior, he is one of today's most sought-after teachers in the field of personal and spiritual development.

In 2007, Chase founded The Kindness Center with the vision of creating a more peaceful and kindhearted world. He is a main presenter at Hay House's renowned "I Can Do It" conferences. He spoke at the HOBY Conference 2012 and speaks at schools and businesses throughout New England. His book, am I being kind: how asking one simple question can change your life and your world, is a guide to personal transformation.


Chase shared his background with students, telling them about abuse, depression, and acts of unkindness in his childhood. "Unkindness was like a disease in my family," said Chase. "I had to make a choice." After a life-changing revelation in his mid-20s, Chase became determined to improve his life and help other people. "Kindness is the secret to happiness.

I realized simple acts of kindness had taken me out of my head and into my heart," said Chase. "When you are thinking, speaking or acting in a kind way, you can't be depressed."

"Everyone deserves the same act of kindness. An act of kindness is straight from the heart, not because you want something in return."

Chase went on to talk about doing random acts of kindness, suggesting small things that can make a difference in people's lives. "Everybody deserves the same act of kindness. An act of kindness is straight from the heart, not because you want something in return."

He highlighted the dangers of bullying, especially online through Facebook, telling the audience to "really think about everything you put out there." Chase closed his talk with the importance of both giving forgiveness and being able to receive kindness from others.



MCI Inducts Four into Third Annual Athletic Hall of Fame




Paul Bertrand '59 was a contributing member to the MCI Football Boosters' inception and was pivotal in the successful campaign that raised money for the installation of lighting on MCI's football field. He has contributed numerous hours to MCI in various volunteer and leadership roles.



Rod Smith, who was inducted posthumously, held the positions of athletic director and biology teacher at MCI from 1945 until his retirement in 1972. He also coached MCI soccer, baseball, girls basketball, PG basketball and field hockey. Susan Smith England '73, Smith's daughter, accepted the award on his behalf.



Beth Staples '82 played field hockey, basketball and softball at MCI, earning MCI's Female Athlete of the Year award. Staples has coached at the University of Maine, Colby College and the Searsport District High School. She also won multiple Maine Press Association awards for sports writing.



Archie Tracy '60, who graduated from Bangor High School in 1959, was a postgraduate student at MCI. He was named to the All-New England Prep School Team and was inducted into the New England Basketball Hall of Fame as a result of his time at the School.



"I believe that leadership is action, not position," states Hannah Emery '14. "Taking on the roles that I have this year is about doing, not about status. It's not about recognition and titles, it's about what you do." Emery, a junior from Detroit, Maine, is a hard worker who highly values success. She is an honors student taking Advanced Placement classes and has a diverse range of interests. 
In addition, Emery is a co-founder and member of the Kindness Krew. The Krew began last year as Sammy Gachagua '12's senior project. "His passion for kindness was contagious," explained Emery. "It was something he cherished and was very personal for him. He was able to touch each and every one of us and it opened my eyes to what a difference kindness can make in someone's life." Through the senior project and the leadership of the Kindness Krew, Gachagua was able to collect over 3,000 pairs of shoes that he later delivered to an orphanage in Kenya. Primarily as a result of the impact of the project, students, faculty and staff chose kindness as the 2012-13 school theme.

Joining the Kindness Krew was a "perfect fit" for Emery. "I've gained a lot of confidence in myself and learned a lot in the past year." Before Gachagua graduated from MCI, he asked Emery to keep the Kindness Krew going and to make sure that it

Emery has assumed her new responsibility as a leader on campus. "Personally, it has been very difficult to build confidence to take charge," she said. "Last year I was behind the scenes. The challenge is to step up and keep kindness going through my Thus far Emery is doing a fantastic job. She led the planning of this year's opening of school activities, all designed around kindness. She was also instrumental in bringing this year's first Patterson Lecture Series speaker, Michael Chase, to campus (see page 6). "My goal is to create an environment where kindness is really cherished and promoted as an everyday act. I hope future students who attend MCI learn how important kindness is."

Already Emery has seen changes on campus. "People react differently. It's made them think about how they act towards each other," she said. "At the Clubs and Activities Fair, there was a huge sign-up for the Kindness Krew. People are enthusiastic and excited to see what we have to offer. It's a really diverse group of kids with a strong passion for kindness."

Today there are over fifty students in the Kindness Krew. The Krew has three areas of focus for the 2012-13 school year: the MCI community, the local community and the global community. Though the Kindness Krew has three faculty advisors, it is student-led and activities are student-initiated. There are many projects in the works, and they are hoping to continue the tradition of Gachagua's shoe drive or a similar

Recently the MCI Key Club partnered with the American Red Cross to hold a Blood Drive on campus. They also volunteered their time to do Halloween activities with area children. Several groups are in the process of collecting donations for food pantries and charities such as the Warm Winter Fund, Coats for Kids, and St. Jude's Hospital. In addition, the 9th biannual Community Service Day took place this fall with over 400 students, faculty and staff going out into the community to help area residents with fall clean-up, visit nursing homes, work with children in area schools, and other activities.

Kindness in Action

Through their work, volunteer, or day-to-day activities, MCI alumni are striving to make a difference in the lives of others.

In their own words, three alumni explain their passion as well as their inspiration to do acts of kindness.

PAUL RIECKHOFF '94

Paul Rieckhoff attended MCI as a Post-Graduate in the football program. Originally from New York, Rieckhoff came to MCI on the recommendation of his high school coach. "As a kid, I spent summers vacationing in Maine with my family and always loved it, so I thought it could be a great fit," explained Rieckhoff. Rieckhoff enjoyed his time at MCI, and fondly remembers the people, especially his host family, the Oliveiras. "They were kind, generous, and tremendous ambassadors for MCI and the entire state of Maine," said Rieckhoff. "They made me feel at home—and taught me how to snowmobile!"

After MCI, Rieckhoff attended Amherst College, graduating in 1998. That fall, Rieckhoff enlisted in the Army Reserves before beginning a career on Wall Street. After participating in the rescue efforts at ground zero after the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks, Rieckhoff volunteered to go to Iraq.

In 2004, after returning from Iraq, Rieckhoff founded the Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans of America (IAVA). The IAVA is the first and largest nonprofit, nonpartisan organization for new veterans, with over 200,000 Member Veterans and supporters nationwide. IAVA describes itself as a "21st Century veterans' organization dedicated to standing with the 2.4 million veterans of Iraq and Afghanistan from their first day home through the rest of their lives." The IAVA's mission is "to improve the lives of Iraq and Afghanistan veterans and their families."

Jennifer Williams and her four brothers grew up in Pittsfield. After MCI, Williams attended Dartmouth College, graduating in 1985. She worked in educational fundraising for almost 15 years, mostly with Dartmouth.

Since 2003, Williams has been a joint venture partner with Norwich Partners, which buys and builds hotels in New England and Florida. She is also the executive director of the Children's Fund of the Upper Valley, which benefits local children's charities.

The current focus of the Childrens' Fund is helping underprivileged children have experiences that they wouldn't have without the Fund's aid. Another initiative is combating childhood obesity and helping to get children outside. As part of the Fund's initiatives, Williams recently set up a cross country team at a school with limited athletic programs and lots of risky behavior among students. "I was a runner at MCI and at Dartmouth," said Williams. "Running taught me about a love of outdoors and how to push Through the Children's Fund, Williams was also able to establish a grant that allows students to get vouchers for free sneakers. The program increased the school's athletic participation by 50 percent.

Why do you think that you are so passionate about what you do?

Working with kids is a great investment. Adults are important too, but if you can help kids to form really great life-long habits, it is a small investment with a potentially much bigger return. There is the possibility of making a really big change in kids' lives. It's hopeful. I find it really uplifting to work with kids in general. They are full of hopes and dreams and are generally very optimistic. Who inspires you / has inspired you to do acts of kindness? Was there anyone at MCI who inspired / influenced you?

My parents were very involved in the community and growing up there was a sense of always giving back. When I was 23 or 24, I started working in fundraising. I got to see really great examples of philanthropy, really pure philanthropy. In its purist form, a fundraiser IDs a need with a potential donor and matches that need to allow someone to do good.

The teachers at MCI, John Slagle in particular, influenced me. They really pushed me to do my best and had faith that I could accomplish things. They had high expectations for me that made me have high expectations for myself, a higher self-esteem.



The Class of 1992



In 1939, twelve year-old Donn Fendler '44 was hiking to the summit of Maine's Mt. Katahdin when he became separated from his family. Nine days, and hundreds of scratches and bug bites later, Fendler was successfully reunited with his family. What came of the adventure is one of Maine's most enduring and beloved books, *Lost on a Mountain in Maine*.

Two years later, on September 9, 1941, Fendler entered MCI as a residential student.

You came to MCI from New York. How did you end up in Maine? What ties does your family have here?

My family has been coming up to Maine since 1935. My twin brother, Ryan, and I went to Iona Prep in New York. Dad knew people in central Maine and sent us to MCI. We lived at MCI as boarding students. The Navy took over the dorms for their naval pilots and there was no room for us.* We returned to New York and ended up graduating from the New Hampton School in New Hampshire.

After your experience on Katahdin, there was a parade and you met President Franklin D. Roosevelt. That seems pretty overwhelming for a 12 year-old. What do you remember the most about the experience?

I tried to get out of as many things as I could. I was a 12 year-old boy. Seeing the President was quite an affair. I was presented [the Army / Navy Legion of Valor] medal in the Oval Office. The President was very cordial, very nice.

Did your MCI classmates recognize who you were? Did they ask you about your experience?

My classmates treated me like everyone else. They would ask questions, but it was no big deal.

What was your MCI experience like?

It was great. I loved it there. My favorite teacher was Sanger Cook. He was the English teacher and a coach. He was a great guy. My classmates were all terrific.

The Man and the Mountain Donn Fendler '44 and his life since Katahdin

What did you do after you finished high school? I went into the Navy for 2 years then went to college where I got my commission. After college I joined the Army and was in the Army for 28 years. So I was in the services for a total of 30 years.

You have your book, a graphic novel and now a movie in the works. The story has persevered for over 70 years. Why do you think people are still so passionate about your experience?

It took me a long time to figure it out. People in Maine can relate to my experience. They are rugged outdoor people — hikers, climbers — with nature in their backyard. In the 1970s, the book became required reading in Maine schools. It took off and never stopped. The second book was for a new generation of kids. It was for kids who don't like reading. We've tested it and it seems to have worked.

How did the original book come about?

My dad met the author and based on what my father wanted the book written on, we went to Joseph Egan's summer place on Cape Cod. He asked me a lot of questions and we talked about the experience. My father wanted the book written to teach kids about what determination and faith can do.

The graphic novel? I had known the author for a long time. We had toyed with the idea of a kids' illustrated book. It was not successful because it was too long. Down East then came up with the idea for a graphic novel.

The movie? It's being done by a couple of young men, Ryan Cook and Derek Desmond. Ryan is from Waterville. They just finished filming a trailer and are using that to raise funds. The trailer should be out by Thanksgiving or Christmas.

You are well-known for visiting schools and meeting with students. Why do you enjoy meeting with the students? Why do you continue doing it? I am trying to tell them what determination and faith can do. What I learned from it. It taught me to be responsible for my actions, strengthened my faith in God


and prayers and taught me about the love of my family. I have been going into schools for 22 years. I meet great kids and great teachers in schools big and small and get to see more of Maine.

What are your visits at schools like?

At the schools, I talk about myself and tell the story. I also run a 10 minute DVD that is actually an 8mm film from 1939. It shows the kids what it was like 73 years ago. I also sign a map or book and talk with each kid there.

What is the most common question that you receive from school children?

Were you scared?

Throughout the nearly 150 years since its founding, MCI has seen many great moments in history pass through its doors and halls. One such moment was the Civilian Pilot Training Program.

In the 1930s, several European nations built up their air forces in anticipation of possible conflict in part by training civilians as pilots. In the United States a similar program, known as the Civilian Pilot Training Program (CPTP), began in 1938. As part of the program, the government paid for a 72-hour ground school course followed by 35 to 50 hours of flight instruction at facilities located near educational institutions.

After the attack on Pearl Harbor and the U.S. entrance into World War II, the CPTP changed to the War Training Service (WTS) and, from 1942 to 1944, served primarily as the screening program for potential pilot candidates. Students still attended classes at colleges and universities and flight training was still conducted by private flight schools, but all WTS graduates were required to sign a contract agreeing to enter the military following graduation. Though phased out in 1944, at the program's peak 1,132 educational institutions and 1,460 flight schools were participating in the CPTP/WTS.*

MCI began participating in the CPTP/WTS in 1942 as one of eleven locations in the State of Maine. The first class consisted of ten men, all in their early twenties, and all from Massachusetts. When Captain Lester Slate, a machinist from Chicopee, Mass., received his orders to go to Pittsfield, Maine, he thought that there was a mistake. "I thought it was Pittsfield, Massachusetts," said Slate. "I went to the office to see if there was a mistake, but there wasn't." The Navy had an agreement with MCI to house and

History in the Making

*National Museum of the U.S. Air Force Allied planes take to the sky. Photo from iStockphoto. feed the program participants. "We stayed in the girls' dorm," explained Slate. "They moved the girls out and moved us in."

There were six flight instructors and one ground school instructor utilizing one classroom at MCI and two at the Pittsfield Municipal Airport. As one of the only locations in Maine where the airport was in walking distance, the class would march from MCI to the airport in the mornings and march back in the evening. They were taught aerology (weather) and navigation in ground school with the remaining time taken up with flight training. "There were six planes – Aeronca TALs – one pilot would fly with one instructor," said Slate. "We would be with one instructor for several flights and then change to a different instructor for a check ride to test how we were doing."

The first class lasted ten weeks, running from September 10, 1942 to November 10, 1942. The CPTP paid for the lessons, room, board and uniforms, but the students didn't receive any pay. "We had to pay for our laundry. Before the program, I was a machinist," said Slate. "My last check was \$110, which was a lot of money then. I was always loaning money to the other guys, but every single one of them paid me back."

Of course not all the money was for laundry. "We were free in the evenings," Slate reminisced. "We had to be in the dorms by 10:00 p.m., weekends we had to be back by midnight. We would walk into town and visit stores on Main Street, the Lancey House." Though the CPTP students didn't take classes with MCI students, they still had the chance to interact with them. Slate met his wife, Maxine Pushor Slate '43, through the program. "I met my wife bowling. My wife's girlfriend's father owned the bowling alley [in Pittsfield] and I met her there."

Through his 40-year military career, Captain Slate logged over 9,000 hours in the air. He served in the US Navy in WWII and afterwards transferred to the Coast Guard where he was a rescue pilot during both the Korean War and Vietnam. Now 90 years-old, Slate believes he is the only remaining member of the first CPTP/WTS class at MCI.

Though Captain Slate no longer flies planes, he can't get them out of his blood. On his 90th birthday, Slate decided to treat himself by skydiving for the first time. He completed his jump on July 15, 2012 at the Pittsfield Municipal Airport. "We were trained [in the Navy], but we weren't allowed to make parachute jumps unless it was an emergency. I knew Pittsfield had a skydiving program and I wanted to come back to where it all started."

her daily job, Patel is a lawyer and lobbyist in the Boston area. Her philanthropic activities occur mainly outside of work.

Patel is a founding board member of the Boston Young Health Professionals. Community outreach is a requirement of membership in the organization. They organize monthly events with local organizations such as Big Sisters of Greater Boston, Cradles to Crayons and Boston Healthcare for the Homeless, covering all aspects of health care including nutrition and homelessness. "We are trying to use careers in healthcare to positively impact society," Patel explained.

Patel also recently raised over \$3,000 for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society. "It was a personal goal," she

said. "My dear friend died of leukemia. I knew that there was nothing to do directly to help her, but I wanted to make a difference."

Why do you think that you are so passionate about what you do?

I think that there is so much time in a day. People have very busy lives but I've realized that you can still do so much with your time. We have an obligation to help each other. If you are in a position to help someone, you should do it. There are so many ways you can help. It takes very little to touch people's lives – mentor a child, help the elderly, even spend time with someone. There is no better feeling than knowing that you have made a difference.

Who inspires you / has inspired you to do acts of kindness? Was there

anyone at MCI who inspired / influenced you?

I think in various areas of my life I have come across people, but much comes from within. I really think it's something in me. I wouldn't feel complete without doing something. If I can spend one hour everyday, it's really fulfilling. You do see benefits and see people change. I also think that people can inspire other people to volunteer.


