

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

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

Thank you, Nell Parks, for being a friend and the kind of teacher that influ-

enced my life, and I'm sure, many others.



Steve Abbott, director of athletics at the University of Maine, began his Patterson Lecture Series talk speaking about the many amazing things that he was able to do while serving as the Chief of Staff for Senator Susan Collins. Continuing on, he spoke of his childhood, growing up in a great Maine community that well prepared him for life, stating, "This place can take you wherever you want to go."

Abbott told the audience that participating in athletics is one of many great ways to learn leadership, but cautioned that there are many types of leaders and that one has to find the best fit for himself or herself. He also remarked that a person doesn't have to be a "star" to be a leader and that people often confuse fame for leadership. He explained that leadership comes from one's integrity, work ethic, decision making and judgment. Leadership is also the ability to bounce back from failure.

Pastor Bill Johnson of the First Baptist Church in Pittsfield told the students that it is important to know what makes their own life meaningful as it gives one direction. "Leaders need to know where they are going," he said. "In order to do so, they must understand why their organization exists." Like people, institutions that lose their way start to decline. Leaders must prove their character so that people can trust in their abilities. Johnson went on to state that relationships hold the clue to the

purpose and meaning of life and that personal sacrifices are often necessary for true success. "Success at the cost of our most important relationships is really failure in disguise," he explained.


Elaine Patterson, organization and leadership advisor for BreitBurn Energy Partners and MCI Trustee, shared some of her personal mottos that she uses as life guidelines. "I never had a detailed plan for life, but I did have a direction," she said. Having a direction helped her accomplish goals and continue to become a more successful leader.

While Patterson admitted that she hates being told what to do, she stressed that it is important to recognize the value of advice and help from others. "Look carefully at the people you are spending time with," she cautioned. "Be more deliberate about whom you seek advice from." Patterson specifically mentioned three mentors who all saw potential in her before she was able to recognize it herself: her childhood next door neighbor, her high school guidance counselor and her college career development officer. She told the students that having a mentor can often help a person to get out of his or her comfort zone and take healthy risks.

Allison Sinclair '12 Receives 2012 Maine Principal's Association Award





Student Council reaches goal to raise \$2,000 for St. Jude Children's Research Hospital

For the past ten years, the MCI Student Council has chosen St. Jude Children's Research Hospital as the national charity they would support. St. Jude's, in addition to being a critically important research hospital, is a place where children eighteen years old or younger can go for treatment of cancer and other life-threatening illnesses. This year, three events culminated in a very successful fund drive. First, students and staff paid for the privilege of 'dressing down' on a designated Friday. Second, an extraordinarily generous man stepped forward and offered to help the fund drive while honoring his father. MCI Dean of Student Life John Dean had not shaved since the day of his father's death on March 16, 2011. The elder Mr. Dean was known for his great community spirit and for his flowing whiskers. MCI's John Dean, determined to shave his beard on the one-year anniversary of his father's death, decided to let the MCI community choose his new look. Students and staff "voted" by making a donation. In the end, it came down to the "Hulk Hogan look" or the "Muskeeter panache." He made his public appearance at a MCI pep rally on the 16th as Aramis. Lastly, MCI Student Council members and their advisor Tanya Kingsbury held a 24-hour fast, spending the time together in Parks Gym. Approximately 350 people participated in one way or another in these activities. The Student Council surpassed their goal of \$2,000, donating a total of \$2,011 to St. Jude's.





MCI Awarded 10-Year Accreditation by NEASC

In February 2012, MCI received its continuing 10-year reaccreditation from the New England Association of Schools and Colleges (NEASC). NEASC is the nation's oldest accrediting association, serving more than 2,000 public and independent schools, colleges and universities in Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and Vermont.

Accreditation by NEASC is "structured around carefully considered standards, self-evaluation, peer review and follow-up by the school." It assures that the school is "faithful to its mission, conducts its programs appropriately to meet its goals and fulfills the Standards of Accreditation established by the Commission on Independent Schools."^{*}

As part of the accreditation process, many MCI students, parents, trustees and community members, and most faculty and staff, participated in an intensive year-long self-study that covered 14 areas of the School including academic program, student experience, infrastructure and resources.

When the self-study was completed, a visiting committee, composed of specially trained faculty and staff from peer NEASC schools, visited campus for a three-day period. The visiting committee reviewed MCI's self-study and met with numerous school members. The committee then prepared a report for both MCI and NEASC that assessed compliance with NEASC standards, recommending that MCI receive reaccreditation. The report recognized MCI for excellence in several areas and also formulated recommendations for areas in which MCI could improve.

The report included commendations for the faculty at MCI stating, "The program is delivered by a dedicated faculty who

are passionate about their fields, care deeply about their students and strive to raise the bar of achievement for every student." The committee also remarked upon MCI's high rate of post-secondary enrollment in continuing education or job training.

The report applauded MCI for the School's new extra-curricular activity requirement, and the wide range and growing number of activities available to students at a time when so many schools are cutting and decreasing opportunities. Yet the report also noted the need to continue long-range planning to enhance the funding of extra-curricular programs so that they may grow and become even better.

The visiting committee also praised MCI for the dedication of its faculty, staff and administration in recognizing and addressing the needs of all students regardless of gender, learning styles and ability, race, age, ethnicity, family background, socio-economic status, sexual orientation or religious practice. Furthermore, the committee highlighted the breadth and depth of MCI's student support resources in the forms of counseling, academic support and specially designed programs and applauded the School for embracing its diverse population and appreciating the potential that diversity brings to all aspects of the school community.

The committee's report recommended that the school continue its pursuit of

ongoing education for the community regarding social issues. The committee also suggested that the School create additional educational opportunities for faculty and students to learn about different cultures and learning differences. Finally, the visiting committee concurred with MCI's own evaluation that the School must increase the access to and use of technology in the classroom and also recommended that MCI engage in regular curriculum review to ensure that subject matter and teaching techniques are preparing students for success after graduation.

"I am pleased, but not surprised that the visiting committee saw evidence that MCI is carrying out our mission in everything that we do," stated MCI Headmaster Chris Hopkins. "We recognized that the accreditation process at its best provides an institution with the opportunity to be self-critical, and we were just that, openly identifying and sharing with the visiting committee the areas in which we want to, and will, I'm confident, improve."



With bright eyes and a contagious smile, Samuel Gachagua '12 is the type of person who is a pleasure to be around. Positive and upbeat, Gachagua's ultimate goal is to help people and positively impact their lives. "I want a good education because ultimately it will be better for me and the people I want to impact," Gachagua explained. "I want to change society. With the way I grew up, I wasn't really happy and I want to change things for future kids. I don't want them to go through what I did."

Gachagua grew up in Kenya. "Before MCI, my life was not as great as many of the students here," he said. "Growing up there were a lot of hardships, family hardships." One such hardship was that Gachagua was unable to attend school for a period of time as he was unable to pay the required fees. "Because I wanted to go to school," he explained, "I would go back [to the school] the next day and then they would tell me to go home and get money." Eventually Gachagua ended up in an orphanage where he lived for eight years before getting a scholarship to attend MCI through a program called Hope Runs (see sidebar). Though he attended school through the orphanage, it was very different from MCI.

In Kenya, there were fewer class choices. Gachagua learned the basics including math, English, Swahili, chemistry, physics and biology. When Gachagua was given MCI's course catalog at the beginning of his first year, he was amazed. "I was given the chance to actually explore

what I like and given opportunities to take classes I've never had," he said. Gachagua went on to explain that he has had some struggles with some class work because of his background, but he spoke enthusiastically about his teachers. "It's really great to have teachers like this at MCI who can interact with students one-on-one." In his school in Kenya, there were ten or eleven teachers for about 600 students. "We couldn't get one-on-one help."

In addition to academics, Gachagua has taken advantage of the many co-curricular activities at MCI. He has participated in drama, fencing, Key Club and the Science and Outing Club. He was the treasurer of the Dorm Council for two years, and vice president of the Residential Life Council his senior year. He has been part of the track and cross country teams all three of his years at MCI, becoming captain of cross country his senior year. An inexperienced runner when he arrived at MCI, Gachagua quickly improved, earning the Most Improved Award in both track and cross country in 2011. This year, Gachagua placed in the top 10 at every regular season cross country meet he competed in. He also qualified for the State Meet. He attributes his success to his coach, Jessica Cardenas. "I didn't have the drive," he said. "I didn't believe that I could do it. She told me that I could. She saw that I had the potential to do it when I didn't."

Gachagua is also well-liked and respected by his classmates. During Winter Carnival, he was voted

by his peers to receive the coveted Sno-ball King title. On winning his new title, Gachagua bashfully responded, "I felt a sense of accomplishment. I want to impact as many people as possible and if people don't think well of you, there is not as much that you can do." Because of his positive attitude and well-known interest in global issues, a group of students recently approached Gachagua about starting a new club on campus to deal with world issues. "We want to see what we as a small community at MCI can do because we are a part of the global community and proud of it," he said.

Living in the Honors Dorm at MCI has only served to strengthen his interest in world culture and global citizenship. "Basically I have lived in dorms my whole life, but I haven't lived with people from different cultures," he stated. "That is another part of MCI that I really like. I didn't know anything about American culture, about European culture or Asian culture, and suddenly I had to live with people that I didn't know anything about."

For his senior project, Gachagua is carrying on his mission of help-

ing others. He wants to engage the whole school and community to do "Five Days of Kindness." Gachagua is an intern for a non-profit called Think Kindness that "aims to inspire thousands from coast to coast to change the world through seemingly simple random acts of kindness" (www.thinkkindness.org). Gachagua feels that little acts of kindness can ultimately change others actions, even if the person performing the act doesn't see the results. "That's the best part," he said excitedly. "You don't have to know."

Gachagua is in the same position as many seniors at this time, deciding what he wants to do next year. He has applied at Stanford University, Macalester College, Gordon College and Marymount Manhattan College. He has also been accepted into a one-year program called the Global Citizen Year. The Global Citizen Year is a bridge year program that gives high school graduates time outside of the normal classroom environment before college to work in the developing world.

Whatever he decides for next year, with Gachagua's passion for world

issues and helping others, it is no surprise that his ultimate career goal is to get involved with philanthropy and possibly work for a non-profit that helps children. He especially would like to go back to Kenya and help there. "That's my home... The way I grew up and the way I was introduced to the world of helping people. If I didn't get help when I was a little kid, I wouldn't be sitting here... So I really want to give little kids the chance to come up in the world."

Hope Runs

Hope Runs is a non-profit organization that uses running to empower orphans in Kenya with the tools of personal health, social entrepreneurship and education.

Founders Claire Williams Diaz-Ortiz and Lara Vogel met Gachagua at his orphanage, the Tumaini Children's Home, on the last leg of a 20-country tour. Staying at the orphanage as a base for climbing Mt. Kenya, Diaz-Ortiz and Vogel were inspired by the orphanage to "find a way to contribute something that further strengthened this community, and that supported the commitment to health and well-being that the Tumaini Children's Center had so prioritized." Hope Runs partners with orphanages in Kenya and Tanzania to provide extracurricular programming that uses sports and athletics as a primary means of implementing health, technology and social entrepreneurship training for children. Hope Runs also provides service-learning opportunities for international volunteers, and draws on local hires to implement its computer training, health and fitness classes, marathon competitions, educational scholarships and more. The Timeline Project

Feb. 1, 1866

Under the act of incorporation, MCI's trustees were permitted to establish a "literary institution" to promote the cause of education in the Pittsfield area.

Aug. 30, 1866

The first classes begin.

The enrollment for the first term, which lasted from August 30 to November 7, 1866, consisted of eighty-three students: fifty-one "gentlemen" and thirty-two "ladies."

Aug. 1868

The cornerstone of MCI's first building, "The Institute Building" (later renamed Founders Hall) is laid.

June 1869

Miss Maris Simons, the first student to graduate from Maine Central Institute, receives her degree.

June 1871

Though the exact date is unknown, by June of 1871, John C. Manson, a trustee and the local doctor, has established the oldest and one of the most desired prizes at the school, the Manson Prize.

Aug. 1877

Henry W. Lancey of Petrolia, Ontario, originally of Pittsfield, gives MCI the bell for Founders Hall.

June 1888

The MCI, a publication by the students issued three times during each school year, is printed for the first time. The MCI continues to be printed until 1943.

Baseball and tennis take their place as the first sports on campus.


Most alumni know that MCI was founded in 1866, that Founders Hall was the first building on campus and that almost every student who completed his/her junior year at MCI has written a Manson Essay. Alumni might not know, however, that before both Parks and Wright gymnasiums were built, the "upper chapel" (Powers Hall) in Founders was used as a gymnasium. Or that MCI's first school band appeared on campus in 1908. Or maybe that the J.R. Cianchette Science Building, built in 1958, was designed by MCI teacher Paul Legge.

As MCI approaches its 150th anniversary in 2016, we look to embrace our rich history and (re)discover the things that make MCI so special. The Timeline Project is one tool to help us accomplish this goal. Beginning at the founding in 1866, the timeline highlights great moments in MCI's history. More than that, though, the timeline tells two important stories. First, from the charter and mission to the buildings and programs, it tells the history of a school that has impacted thousands of lives over almost 150 years. More importantly, it celebrates the lives of the people who have walked through Founder's halls, played sports in Wright or Parks and sweated through Manson Essay presentations.

By accessing MCI's website, MCI community members can submit timeline entries and/or photos to enhance the School's timeline and give a fuller picture of what the School is all about. Did your team go undefeated and win the state championships? Did your class win Winter Carnival all four years? In an 1833 work, Henry Wadsworth Longfellow wrote “music is the universal language of mankind.” As assistant professor of music at Bucknell University in Lewisburg, Pennsylvania, this is something that Dr. Bethany Collier, MCI Class of '96, has firmly embraced. Collier, an ethnomusicologist, studies social and cultural aspects of music in local and global contexts. Simply put, she examines “how and why people do what they do in their musical lives.”

Collier's area of specialization is Indonesia, specifically the role of gamelan in Indonesian life. Balinese gamelan is a type of Indonesian musical ensemble, often performed with both music and dance together. The instruments include metallophones (xylophones), kendang (drums) and gongs, bamboo flutes and bowed strings. Gamelan is often an integral part of sacred rituals or ceremonies and is also associated with theater.

Collier was first introduced to gamelan at the College of the Holy Cross, where she received her bachelor's degree in 2000. Gamelan had just arrived at the college and her music theory professor strongly encouraged her to attend a presentation. The first thing that struck Collier about gamelan was the lack of sheet music. “Music was always a literary experience for me,” Collier explained. “I always had a piece of paper. With gamelan, you learn by hearing it. It is very mathematical. You have to fit your pattern with others' patterns to make it work.”

Because gamelan music is memorized and played almost entirely without notation, it requires lengthy, rehearsal-intensive training, usually in a group setting. Part of the process of learning gamelan is coming to understand some of the philosophical differences between it and Western music. While in Western music, one instrument (a flute, for example) in an ensemble can be exchanged for another flute; gamelan instruments are built and tuned to stay together as a set and are generally not interchangeable. Also different from Western music is the emphasis on the group as a whole. Where in Western music the emphasis is often on the solo part - standing out as an individual within a group - gamelan is more about fitting in better with the ensemble to play better as a cohesive unit.

From Pittsfield to Bali ***An alumna's journey through world music***

After becoming interested in gamelan at Holy Cross, Collier received a music scholarship that allowed her to go to Bali. There, she fell in love with the history and culture. She also became more interested in the study of ethnomusicology. "Growing up in Central Maine, I didn't think about the different ways people make music, it was just something I did," said Collier. "However, there is great diversity in the ways of making music and the process is as important as the product."

Collier decided to attend Cornell University, earning both her master's and her doctorate in musicology.

In 2003, while Collier was still a graduate student at Cornell, she coordinated a conference about Balinese music at Holy Cross. There, she met members of the gamelan Dharma Swara, an ensemble based in New York. After graduating, Collier realized how much

she missed both Bali and gamelan. "I like being a scholar and teacher but wouldn't be a happy person without making music at a high level," she said. Collier joined Dharma Swara in the fall of 2007 and travels from Pennsylvania to New York to practice and perform with them.

In 2010, Collier traveled with Dharma Swara to Bali where they toured the island and played in several villages. "We played against a children's group and they smoked us," laughed Collier. They also performed as the first non-Balinese group to compete against professional Balinese ensembles in the annual "battle-of-the-bands" concerts at

the Bali Arts Festival. This competition between gamelan ensembles takes place in an open air arena that seats 6,000 to 8,000 people and is the central feature of the festival. Winners are chosen based on audience response. For Collier the trip was a wonderful experience that was "extremely humbling."

Collier credits the "amazing music education" she received in middle school and high school in Pittsfield for "preparing [her] really well to be a musician." Growing up three houses down from MCI's campus, she attributes her interest in world music to the strong international community at MCI. "The international education made me more open to ideas that I needed to understand to get where I am today," she explained. "That I could be living in Central Maine and have so many international faces around me was amazing. Having that international community around me made me want to understand more of the world."



argument and present it orally. This strong, meaningful tradition that has its roots in the beginning of the School is still very relevant today.

The Manson Essays in one form or another were a part of MCI at least as early as 1871. Originally held the week of graduation, students were awarded a “prize of ten dollars, with diploma.” This prize was not insignificant as the ten dollars would be roughly equivalent to \$200 today. The prize was originally funded by a Dr. Howe and MCI Trustee Dr. John C. Manson. In 1921, Dr. Manson’s son, John W. Manson, left an endowed gift to permanently fund the prize in the memory of his father.

“My grandmother went up in her attic and at the bottom of her trunk she found her Manson Essay and she showed it to me this weekend. I thought you would like to see it,” MCI’s Humanities Department Chair Deb Rozeboom’s eyes sparkle as she relates the story. “It was my first year here and I was assigned a class of juniors. I, of course, had no idea what the Manson Essay was. The students came in virtually on the first day saying ‘I know what I am going to do my Manson Essay on. I know what I am going to do my Manson Essay on.’ When we got to that part of the year and we actually got to work on Manson Essays, one of my students brought in [her grandmother’s] Manson Essay that was tied together with string... that’s when I first began to get an inkling of the power of this tradition.”

Initially, the Manson Essays were not limited to the junior class. “All students who have been members of classes in this institution at any time during the proceeding year, and who have not subsequently become connected with any other institution as students, shall be allowed to compete... but in no case shall a successful competitor be eligible a second time.”

Now, 20 years later, Rozeboom, who oversees the program, is amazed by the lasting impact of the Manson Essays. Every fall she and other humanities faculty members receive emails from former students in their first semester of college saying that they are better prepared to write term papers than many of their new classmates. When asked, almost every alumnus/a, regardless of age, can immediately state what his or her Manson Essay topic was. Last year, when a question about Manson Essay topics was posted to

MCI’s facebook page, it received the most comments of any post since the page was created. For many, even if they didn’t realize it when they were students, Manson Essays were a pivotal event in their educational lives and still evoke a strong emotional response.

Year after year the Manson Essay continues to teach students to read and think critically, to gather supporting evidence, to write an effective and convincing paper and to organize an

Men received a prize for the “best original declamation” while women won for “the best original essay... to be read or recited by anyone of the female department.” Both the declamations and essays were on a given subject each year. Subjects found on archival programs were lofty topics that are strikingly relevant today: heroism, conservatism, taxes, legacies and ability versus circumstance. The presentations were made in Union Hall, Pittsfield’s municipal building, and later moved to Powers Hall; the

A Prized Tradition

The Evolution of the Manson Essays at MCI

Pittsfield Community Theatre; and their current location, the Ella Powell Room in the Powell Memorial Library. Award winners were chosen "strictly on intrinsic merits" (1878 *Catalogue of Maine Central Institute*).

Today, "there is no monetary prize, only glory," explained Rozeboom. Though prizes are awarded, the emphasis is on quality of research, writing and speech, not competition. "We want the experience to be one of scholarship," she said. "We want [students] to understand that scholarship is ongoing, a work in progress."

Students research and write a paper for both their history and English teachers and then present the results in front of their Humanities classes before being selected to participate before the public in the school-wide competition.

There are no given topics and a great deal of time is spent with students helping them choose a subject and compose a thesis. Technology is, of course, a huge part of the process. Faculty encourage students to "pre-search" for potential topics by looking at online databases such as MARVEL's *Points of View Reference Center* and ABC-Clio's *Issues: Understanding Controversy and Society*. The databases provide essays that present multiple viewpoints of current issues and help students to think critically about both sides of an issue while formulating their thesis. Topics this year ran the gamut from obesity and body image to income inequality, social networking, the history of the education system, economic development and the environment to the value of art.




Time is also spent with students instructing them on academic search-

ing in online databases and the web in general. Learning how to limit searches to certain, more reliable domains (like .org or .edu), how to look at online census data and how to use various search operators help to build a foundation that students will continue to use throughout their academic career.

Other tools like Google Documents allow for real-time editing among users. This year, when students were drafting their thesis statements, faculty members were able to comment on their progress in real-time. This allowed students to advance to the next step in the process much more quickly. As a result, the crafting of the thesis became a much more focused endeavor. Students also didn't

need to print out multiple copies of their drafts as faculty were able to log in and make any edits online.

For the first time, faculty did not require that students use a print book as a resource for their essay. They were still expected to use information

tion from print resources, however, they were able to access it electronically through online databases and Google Books.

While in the past, Manson Essays were read aloud or presented by rote memorization, students are now expected to give their papers in a lecture style. They are allowed to use one 3x5 note card for reference, but need to be able to convey their original research in a thoughtful, organized manner.

Judging for the school-wide competition winners is based on the written grades of both the English and history teachers and the student's oral performance. The final selection of the winner is based half on the written and half on the spoken version.

Although the process itself has changed, with juniors using new tools and methods, the pride in being a Manson Essay finalist has continued unabated.

Virtually every graduate of Maine Central Institute, for well over a century, has completed a Manson Essay. The tradition has continued, without interruption, through the Depression, two World Wars, political upheaval and through countless changes of prevailing educational philosophy.

It is clear that regardless of any changes, the Manson Essays will continue its tradition of molding young men and women into true academics into this century and beyond.
