# Letter From The Head of School

Dear Friends,

While the arrival of spring in Maine may look somewhat questionable given the amount of snow still on the ground in many places, a sure sign of spring here at Maine Central Institute is our annual Auction . This year's event is scheduled for Saturday, May 3<sup>rd,</sup> and you're all invited to "Catch A Wave With MCI" at the beach-themed dinner auction. For the first time the auction will be held in the new Donna Leavitt Furman'41 Student Center, and it promises to be one of the best auctions in recent years. In addition to the live auction, there will be a silent auction as well, and those items are featured on the inside cover of this magazine. So if you can't attend this year's Auction, you can still participate by bidding on one of the silent auction items.

The Annual Dinner Auction is one way that you can support two outstanding programs at MCI: athletics and music. Each year a portion of the auction proceeds goes to support these two programs, allowing us to purchase things like new musical instruments or necessary equipment for athletics. Every senior is assigned a senior project advisor and many seniors enlist the help of outside experts who are able to guide them as they problem solve their project from concept to final product.

Chris, Suzanne, Maggie and Lillian visited several classes, toured the Manson House, and met with teachers, staff, trustees parents and friends. With each visit, we are increasingly eager to have Chris join our MCI family.

We have been proud to serve MCI together as Interim Co-Heads of School these past months. The opportunity gave both of us great satisfaction. We thank the many people whose hard work and loyalty contributed to our enjoyment and the accomplishments of our tenure.

Linda Shorey '69 and Donna Shorey Young '64 have traveled different paths, but they share an MCI connection.

Linda Shorey '69 and Donna Shorey Young '64 are as close as two sisters can be yet they couldn't be more different.

"Linda knew from the day she was born exactly what she wanted to do with her life," said Donna. "I never knew what I wanted to do."

Both Shorey women seem to have figured their lives out just fine.

Linda Shorey went right to Penn State University after her graduation from MCI. She got her degree in medical technology, worked for Johns Hopkins for a year, then joined the Hematology Department at Allegheny Medical Hospital, eventually becoming supervisor. In the meantime, she was working on her master's degree in Allied Health through night classes.

A co-worker suggested to Linda that she might consider becoming a medical lawyer, so she took night classes at the Duquesne University School of Law and graduated cum laude in 1986. Today, Linda is an equity partner of the law firm K & L Gates, an international firm of 1,500 lawyers in offices throughout the world. She specializes in political litigation and internet

Linda said making the switch from the medical field to political law was a natural for her. She explained that she hit a ceiling as far as career advancement and wanted to go further, and practicing law has allowed her to do that. "What's exciting is the political aspect of my career," she said. "I've always enjoyed politics and I've learned that politics have actually not changed in the history of the United States."

Donna Shorey Young graduated from MCI and attended the University of Maine at Orono for three years, studying pre-med. Her free spirit and passion for adventure led her to spend several years on Lake Havasu in Arizona and California living on a reservation with the Chemehuevi Indians. She got married, moved back to Orono and together she and her husband owned and operated a mobile home park for a number of years. They moved back to California, she had two children, and finally found her life's passion — teaching.

Today, Donna is the lead educator for NASA's Chandra X-Ray Observatory. She develops all of its educational materials, presents workshops around the world, and writes astronomy and astrophysics educational materials for

other educators.

Donna said she was a huge science fiction fan as a child, so her career in the study of space is not so surprising. "Nothing has ever been more fascinating to me than the universe," she said.

Though they have traveled very different paths, the Shorey sisters both agree that their edudation at MCI was an important part of their lives and future plans. Though the years were tumultuous, they both look back on their time at MCI with gratitude.

"MCI was intellectually rigorous," said Linda Shorey. "We talked about controversial things." She remembers having a discussion about the Japanese internment camps during World War II – "I had never heard about them before, I was amazed," she recalled. "We did lots of independent thinking on so many levels," Linda said.

Donna Shorey Young said she always felt fortunate that she was able to have an MCI education. "It was absolutely excellent preparation," she said. "The education I got was amazing. The things I knew, the knowledge I had – it was amazing to have that education from such a rural background."

While Linda doesn't get back to Maine very often, Donna does. They both have chosen to stay connected to MCI over the years.

"I remember my time at MCI with great fondness," said Linda. "It was a great place."

# Leading Into The Future

As Peter '65 and Andi '89 Vigue settle into new roles, the path for Cianbro has never been more clear.

These are proud days for Peter Vigue '65.

Vigue has been named Chairman of the Board of Cianbro, one of the largest heavy construction companies in the country. He is the first chairman who is not a member of the Cianchette family, which started the company in 1949. His son, Andi Vigue '89 has been named President and Chief Operating Officer of the company.

"This is a proud time in my life," said Peter Vigue. "I'm a proud guy for what we've been able to accomplish as a company, and I'm proud to be able to pass this on to my son."

Ival "Bud" Cianchette '44, Cianbro's outgoing chairman, will continue to be an active member of the board as Chairman Emeritus. Ken Cianchette '42 will also remain on the board.

Pete and Andi's commitment and dedication to the Cianbro team and its philosophy is outstanding," Bud Cianchette has said. "We are very proud of them and we are confident that the tremendous growth and success of our companies, under their leadership, will continue."

Peter Vigue joined Cianbro in 1970 as a laborer and worked his way up the ranks to his current position. Under his leadership, the company has grown to one of the largest contractors in the nation, with more than 2,000 employees. The company is headquartered in Pittsfield, and has offices in Portland, Connecticut and Maryland. He said his transition to Chairman of the Board does not mean he is retiring by any means. "I can now begin focusing on areas of opportunity for the company we've not encountered in the past," he said. "We'll continue to grow and create those opportunities. I'll have more time to work on the company instead of in the company."

Andi Vigue joined the company in 1990 as a laborer while he was in college at the University of Maine at Orono. With his appointment as President and COO, Andi Vigue knows he has his work cut out for him. "I'll have a lot more responsibility, but with that comes an expectation that I can deliver," he said. "I'm excited and proud."

While both Peter and Andi Vigue are busy today leading Cianbro into the future, neither man has forgotten how their time at MCI changed their lives.

Peter Vigue can remember a particular day as a student at MCI, when he was sitting in a Latin class taught by Hazel Earle. Earle called on another student to translate a word, and the student replied, "I can't". The room became completely quiet as Earle proceeded to scratch the word "NEVER" in large letters across the blackboard. "She turned around on her heels and said 'Never say can't!', then proceeded to give us a pep talk that would have put Vince Lombardi to shame about believing in yourself and never quitting," Peter Vigue explained. "That was a major turning point in my life and it had a significant impact on my behavior from then on. It had nothing to do with Latin but had everything to do with life." He keeps a photograph of Hazel Earle on his desk to this day and said he always will. "That lesson has been the foundation of who I am, and it's taken me through some of the most difficult and challenging times."

Like his father, Andi Vigue admits that he was not a stellar student while at MCI. He said he didn't apply himself the way he should have, but that his education at MCI gave him advantages other kids his

age didn't have. "MCI allowed me to be who I am and grow up in an environment that was controlled," he said. "I was encouraged to think, to be my own person, I was allowed freedoms that other kids didn't have." He said that his experience playing football for the Huskies taught him lessons that have followed him throughout his life. "That game taught me about working as a team," he ssaid. "I learned that everyone has to be successful for a team to win. You need to play the game to win."

Peter Vigue has passed important lessons on to his children, Andi, and Michelle Vigue Hodgins '91, and he's stayed true to what he believes throughout his life, whether it's business at Cianbro or supporting MCI. "You treat people the way you want to be treated, your word is your bond, and you give back from which you take," Peter Vigure explained. "Those are core values of this company. When you come to the table, you don't come complaining, you come with solutions."

### Alumni Recipe

From Mary Elkins Palmer '61

### **Black Bottom Banana Bars**

1/2 cup margarine, softened

- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 1 1/2 cup mashed bananas (3 bananas)
- 1 1/2 cups sifted flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp baking soda
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/4 cup baking cocoa



In mixing bowl, cream butter and sugar. Add egg and vanilla. Beat until thoroughly blended. Blend in bananas. Combine flour, baking powder, baking soda and salt. Place in creamed mixture and mix well. Divide batter in half. Add the cocoa to one of the bowls. Spread chocolate batter on bottom of greased 13 x 9 x 2" pan. Spoon remaining batter on top and swirl with a knife to blend together. Bake at 350° for 25-30 minutes. Cool and frost with a light butter frosting.


As part of Reunion 2008, MCI's new Head of School Christopher Hopkins and his family

# Going Places

I find myself traveling more and more these days keeping you, our most valued alumni, connected to your alma mater. This is the part of my job that I enjoy the most - you all have a different and fascinating story to share, and it makes this work very rewarding.

I had the opportunity to spend some time recently with Jeffery P. Hazell '79. As you may remember from an Alumnus profile done on Jeff a few years ago, he is originally from Marblehead, Mass., the

son and grandson of two generations of lobstermen. He spent a year at MCI buckling down on academics and playing PG football, then went on to the University of New Haven to earn a B.S. degree in Hotel/Restaurant Management in 1983. After UNH, Jeff spent a few years

managing restaurants in one of the Hyatt Hotels, TGI Friday's and Disney World. Jeff soon realized that he longed for more autonomy, creativity and entrepreneurship, so he began selling fresh live New England lobsters out of several oversized salt-water tanks in his own garage to restaurants all over central Florida. Within a few months Jeff's concept exploded, evicting him from his garage into a small warehouse. Just two years later, a mammoth full-line wholesale seafood distribution center called Bar Harbor Seafood was hot and trying to keep up with demand. By 1991,

Bar Harbor Seafood had become central Florida's largest seafood distribution vendor boasting clients like Seaworld and the most exclusive restaurants in the state. Just one example of the wholesale inventory volume is the 5,000 plus pounds of lobsters shipped from Maine and Massachusetts daily. Housed in a 20,000 square-foot, state-of-the-art warehouse and executive office facility, the company today is supported by over

20 delivery trucks and nearly 100 employees.

In 1991, Jeff embarked on his next entrepreneurial adventure that capitalized on his wholesale distribution business. He opened an all-you-can-eat, seafood buffet restaurant tapping his highest quality and freshest excess seafood inventory that he alredy had in his warehouse. The first buffet masterpiece was extremely successful and soon expanded to two more buffet restaurants located strategically

in and around Orlando. The Boston Lobster Feast Restaurants now offer over 60 amazing choices in each establishment to thousands of customers annually.

In early 2007, Jeff decided it was time for his longtime dream of owning an exclusive, upscale restaurant and piano bar to come true. He opened Jeffery's Restaurant and Piano Bar in Orlando, (www.jefferysrestaurant.com) (located on Restaurant Row in Doctor Phillips by International Drive) the perfect place for a business deal, convention or corporate special event, to gather with friends or an intimate rendezvous. Having had the pleasure of dining at Jeffery's, I can

attest to the impeccable food, amazing selection of wines, exceptional service and the exquisite ambiance. The next time you make it to Orlando don't pass up the opportunity to experience superior dining at its best, and Jeff loves meeting fellow MCI alumni/ae.

With all of his success, Jeff has never forgotten his roots and those who helped set the stage for his accomplishments. Jeff credits MCI for part of his success. "Had it not been for MCI giving me the academic foundation and tools I needed to succeed in college, I wouldn't have made it," he said.

Examples of Jeff's tremendous generosity to both MCI and UNH include the completely renovated, stateof-the-art Hazell Kitchen in the new Donna Leavitt Furman '41 Student Center and Dining Commons that opened last fall; lead donor and founder of the Hazell Center for Hospitality Sales and Event Management at UNH. which features a functioning retail food operation completely staffed and managed by students called the Hazell Nut Café. Jeff has also recently joined the UNH Board of Trustees, and made a lead donation to revitalize UNH's football program.

Jeff's generosity and support is evidence of his steadfast commitment to supporting quality education to ensure that students have the same opportunity to succeed and pursue their dreams the way he did. We can't thank Jeff enough for all he has done and continues to do for MCI. We are very proud that Jeff is one of our own.

- Former MCI athletic coaches,
- Those who have given meritorious service or have been a loyal friend to the MCI athletic program.

# MCI Establishes Korean, Vietnamese Parent Groups



MCI Director of Admission Clint Williams '86 made trips to Korea and Vietnam in March to help form parent groups in those countries.

About 16 parents of current MCI Korean students met with Williams in their country discussing the school, their children, and the future. The same kind of gathering took place in Vietnam. "We all took turns talking about things here at MCI and all of the parents had questions, mostly about their children," said Williams. "After I answered all of their questions, I led them into a discussion about how we could serve their kids better in terms of getting them into college."

As a result of Williams' trips, four \$500 scholarships will be awarded to one male and one female Korean student and one male and one female Viet-manese student this spring. Collectively, the parents also contributed nearly \$20,000 to MCI's

Ensuring MCI's Future Capital Campaign.

According to Williams, the parent groups made plans to meet periodically to talk about MCI and their children. He will make another trip to Korea and Vietnam in the future, and hopes to establish such parent groups in other countries.

# Mongolia Mountaineer Speaks At MCI



Author and mountaineer Ed Webster visited the campus of Maine Central Institute recently to present a narrated lecture on his experiences of climbing in Mongolia and a daring mountain rescue. This was Webster's second visit to MCI, the first was a 2007 lecture on his 1998 experience scaling Mt. Everest. His lectures have been part of MCI's Gregg '69 and Elaine Patterson Lecture Series.

In 1992, Webster was the first American mountaineer to climb in Mongolia, and he was the only American climber on the British-led Mongolia Amarsanaa Expedition. Over 2 ½ months, Webster's expedition climbed a total of 20 mountains, establishing a new route on virtually every summit it reached, plus attained six previously unclimbed summits.

During the descent of one of his Mongolian climbs, a thousand-pound boulder shifted while one of Webster's climbing partners, Lindsay Griffin, was walking on top of it. Seconds later, the boulder landed on top of Griffin's leg, breaking the leg in two places and trapping him. Webster and another climbing partner, Julian Freeman-Atwood, used levers and pulleys to get the boulder off of Griffin, saving his life in a daring helicopter rescue. Readers Digest eventually purchased the story of Griffin's rescue, one of the most epic mountain rescues ever.

Webster is a resident of Topsham, and his articles and photographs have been published worldwide, in dozens of magazines and books. He has received the American Mountain Foundation's award for Outstanding Achievements in Mountaineering, and the American Alpine Club's Literary Award.

In the recent One-Act Play Festival, MCI's Drama Team placed as "alternates" to the State Class B. In addition, a number of MCI student actors earned other honors at the Festival.

MCI Drama teacher Deborah Susi said, "I had numerous parents/volunteers speak to me about how polite, respectful and courteous our students were. I was extremely proud of their work and the way they conducted themselves under such stressful competition conditions!"



# MCI Students Tackle Underage Drinking

A group of students from Maine Central Institute are tackling the issue of underage drinking in their community by working with local retailers.

MCI's Peer Leaders group is working with the Maine Youth Empowerment and Policy Project, which is sponsored by the Maine Office of Substance Abuse, Department of Health and Human Services and managed by AdCare Educational Institute of Maine. "The students have volunteered to visit local alcohol retailers and advocate for a decrease in advertising of alcohol to underage members of our community," said Jodi McGary, a personal counselor at MCI and Peer Leaders advisor. She said that through the program, retailers can take simple steps such as relocating the alcohol coolers in the stores and placing them away from items like candy, chips and toys and putting them in places less frequented by children.



According to MYEPP, out of 500 young people surveyed who were aged 13-18 across Maine, 65 percent said they believe the alcohol industry is trying to appeal to youth through alcohol advertising. More than 79 percent said they

clearly remember alcohol ads through point of sale advertising.

In addition to putting alcohol in places where children aren't as likely to go in a store, McGary said the Code of Conduct asks retailers to place alcohol advertising signage above eye level and to minimize displays featuring sports figures, blow up items and sex symbols. "If a retailer agrees to comply with this Code of Ethics, they are awarded an 'Our Town, Our Children' award, indicating they are working with the community to avoid underage drinking by protecting youth from the effects of alcohol marketing," said McGary.

Jenna Lorentsen and Emily Fowle are two MCI peer leaders who are involved in the project. The two were part of a group that recently visited four retailers in town to examine where their alcohol is located, and what kind of advertising they display. Of the four retailers the students visited, one agreed to support the project by making some of the changes suggested. One store was actually too small to make any changes, but they indicated they would support the project if they had other options.

"I don't know if (the project) will change anything," said Fowle. "Kids are still going to drink no matter where the alcohol is located in stores, but it's nice to see that stores are willing to make changes."

"I feel good about trying to make a difference in my community," said Lorentsen. "I like trying to help younger kids make good choices." She said that even if a retailer couldn't make any changes in marketing the alcohol they sell, the students were happy to know they still supported their project.

The students will present "Our Town, Our Children" awards to local retailers at a Town Council meeting in May. They also plan to write to alcohol companies who market alcoholic beverages in "family packs" and ask them to market the variety packages in another way.

At the 39th Annual Maine Junior 4-Position Championship held recently, MCI's Rifle Team earned numerous honors and awards.




The MCI Rifle Team also placed first in the Postal State League this year.

# Community Resource:

The Pittsfield Public Library, the town "living room", is looking to expand and renovate

To a small town like Pittsfield, a library serves as the heart of a community. It's the town living room, - a space to read, study, connect and learn. It's a place that opens new worlds to young and old alike.

The Pittsfield Public Library opened its doors in 1904 and has since served thousands of patrons. The facility is badly in need of repair and renovation, which is why the Pittsfield Public Library Restoration and Expansion Project has been working so hard for the past four years. So far, the campaign has raised more than \$1 million, with about \$300,000 more to go.

The Pittsfield library was designed by Albert R. Ross, a prominent 1900's architect. It has been listed on the National Register of Historic Places since 1982, and is regarded as Pittsfield's most valuable townowned building, both historically and architecturally. Plans for the renovation and expansion include a complete restoration of the facility, a 3,250 square foot expansion, an elevator and a 38-seat meeting room.

Gregg '69 and Elaine Patterson recently gave a gift of \$50,000 to the library's campaign. They also pledged to give an annual gift of \$2,500 to the library for the upkeep of the renovation and expansion. He said that the Pittsfield library was a familiar place for him, his parents and his two brothers as they were growing up in Pittsfield. The Pattersons have also been extremely generous to MCI, giving more than \$1 million over the years.

"When I was young, each visit to the library opened new worlds to me - travel, history, photography, places and things," Gregg Patterson said. "Browsing the stacks gave me a 'liberal



education', exposing me to every conceivable topic. Books became my constant companion, entertaining me wherever I happened to be, whatever I happened to be doing. The library was the catalyst for my education, for my explorations, for my joy in living."

Elaine Patterson said it was books that was one of the things that connected her to Gregg when they first met. "In those days, we didn't have much money for entertainment, so many of our first dates involved going out for coffee and a read – and then talking about what we had just read," she explained. "One of the things that connected us from the beginning was our love of books and we still have a house full of them."

According to Pittsfield Public Library Head Librarian Lyn Smith, the library served 23,563 patrons in 2007, circulating more than 45,000 items. One of those patrons is Gregg Patterson's mother, Alice '48.

"My mother, who's always been the rock of our family, wasn't able to read while we were growing up because she was working full time and taking care of us and the house when she wasn't on the job," said Gregg. "Once she retired, she began to explore the library and got the reading bug. Now she's a huge consumer of books and books on tape. Even beyond that,

the library staff and others who use the library are now part of her social network, and an important part of her life, enriching it as much as books do."

Organizers of the Pittsfield Public Library Restoration and Expansion Project hope to break ground on the new expansion soon. Work on the lower level of the facility needs to be done first to shore up the foundation, but everyone involved is excited about what the renovated facility will bring.

"When I walked into the rotunda, if felt like the history of Pittsfield was all around me," said Elaine Patterson. "I could see how busy the library is with people of all ages coming and going." She believes strongly in the importance of a good library. "A love of reading is a lifetime gift," Elaine said. "If we can give children that gift, they are bound to be better students, make the most of their education, and ultimately make the most of their lives. In a small town like Pittsfield, the library is the place where people who love to read can tap into the world of books and meet other people who share the same interest. I hope that anyone who lives in town, now or in the future, will do what Gregg did on my first trip to Pittsfield - stand in front of the library and say that the building, and the people in it, played an important part in their life."
