From The Head of School



t's hard to believe another school year is nearing an end here at Maine Central Institute, as we store away our memories of a fun-filled Winter Carnival and look to June when we'll say farewell to another class full of bright and promising seniors.

2006-07 has been a busy and successful year in various aspects of school life. For example, we're upgrading the speed of our Internet connection from 1.5 Mbps to 10 Mbps at a cost of zero, thanks to a combination of federal E-rate funding, cost savings from dormitory connections, and reimbursement from the PUC. The result of this will be connections on campus seven times faster than at present. Also, an SAT test-taking strategy will be included as part of the mathematics and humanities curriculum. Professional development was undertaken in March to help teachers with how to include SAT prep in their classes.

This school year saw the highest number of girls living in Alumni Hall in MCI's history, and the *Patterson Lecture Series*, sponsored by Gregg '69 and Elaine Patterson has proven to be a very positive new tradition for MCI and the local community, bringing such speakers as the poet Fern Davye and mountaineer Ed Webster to campus.

MCI is participating in the *Mitchell Institute* data project, which will assist us in tracking the progress of recent alumni/ae, their preparedness for college and other valuable information. The data received will help with curricular assessment and other school programs.

A state-of-the-art Instant Alert system by Honeywell will be in place very soon at MCI. This system will allow for instantaneous messages of several different types to be sent to parents and other constituents. Everything from daily announcements to emergency situations can be transmitted via the recipient's preferred mode of communication (cell phone, e-mail, text messages, etc.)

A new dress code has been initiated by the MCI administration with input and support from department heads, faculty, staff, students, parents and alumni. The goal is to implement a code for the next school year that more closely reflects the values of MCI, creates a more serious educational culture, reduces issues of socioeconomic status and clothing costs for parents, and showcases the direction of MCI toward higher standards in all areas of school life.

The renovation of the Nye/Hurd House is on schedule and much excitement is building for the new honors dormitory. We're currently taking applications from residential students for this 12-bed residence hall that will provide a more transitional living experience between high school and college.

An incredible amount of work continues to be done by the MCI staff, trustees, alumni/ae and friends of the school for the coordination, planning, and fund raising efforts thus far on the Dining Commons/Student Center project. Close to \$500,000 has been raised in cash and pledges since October of 2006!

If all of this wasn't exciting enough, MCI is also gearing up for the 13th Annual Dinner Auction on May 5, so mark your calendars and dust off your flapper dresses and zoot suits. The theme this year is "MCI - Roaring In The 20's", and the Auction Committee is promising an evening of much fun and a fantastic variety of items on which to bid. As always, Auction proceeds will benefit MCI's athletic and music programs.

Alumni Profile

Chris Crowley '73 The King of Beverages

Chris Crowley '73 looks back on his time at MCI with fondness these days. He remembers the snow in Pittsfield and he remembers a few really good friends, and he remembers leaving MCI a changed person. As Executive Vice President and Treasurer of Polar Beverages, the country's largest independent bottling company, Crowley has a lot to think about every day, but he has never forgotten the life lessons he learned at MCI.

Crowley was two years into high school in Worcester, Massachusetts and was admittedly nonchalant about his education there. After a visit to the MCI campus, Crowley's parents enrolled him. "I remember my time at MCI as a time of transition," he said, "a real time to grow up." The Vietnam War was raging and times were troubling,

Crowley recalled, "there was so much emotion, we had to filter it out later."

Crowley was active on the cross country team at MCI, and he played soccer and lacrosse. "We had a terrific lacrosse team," he said. "We would play the Bowdoin College freshman team from time to time. We had a very high level of sports even back then." He said he can trace his competitive ski career back to his days as a member of the MCI ski team, and he still ski races today, participating in a huge ski race league in Massachusetts.

The early 70's were tough years for MCI and for the Town of Pittsfield, Crowley recalled. "We had some classes that were as small as five or six students sometimes," he

said. Fitting in as a dorm student wasn't easy either, he said. "We had some difficult times dealing with peers rather than just parents," he explained. "We had to hold each other accountable. We had to learn how to interact with people and balance our responsibilities and treat people fairly."

Following his graduation from MCI, Crowley went on to earn his business degree from Nichols College, then

joined the family business, Polar. "I ran the night shift for my first 11 years," Crowley said. "I lived and breathed Polar, and even then I had a tremendous passion for this place." He worked 80-100 hours each week for a number of years until he met his wife Betsy and finally slowed down a bit as they raised their three daughters, Meredith, Lucy and Laura.

Today, with his brother Ralph, Crowley is still at the helm of Polar Beverages, which celebrates its 125th year in business in 2007. The company has grown considerably over the years, beginning with a very small operation back in 1882. In addition to the more than 100 flavors of regular and diet seltzers, sodas, mixers and spring water, Polar today also distributes for many national

brands including 7-Up, A&W, Cape Cod Dry, Squirt, Country Time, Nantucket Nectars, Sunkist and Moxie, among others. Polar can also boast that it is the City of Worcester's largest water customer.

The Crowley family also owns and operates Mt. Wachusett ski area.

Crowley said that it was at MCI where he first participated in team sports, and running Polar Beverages is much like playing on a sports

team. "We're constantly evaluating our performance from the year before, and we discuss ways to improve and measure our performance," he said. "I'm kind of an individual, but I enjoy the team aspect of this business."

In addition to his duties at Polar, Crowley is active in his community as well. He served as the Sports Commissioner for the Town of Southborough, Mass. for 18

years, and has been on the Board of Directors at the local YMCA for six. A project very close to his heart these days is helping an employee and his brother build a school for disadvantaged youth in Kenya.

Crowley has many fond memories of his years at MCI and still stays in touch with at least one of the friends he made during that time. He credits MCI with teaching him the value of education, something he's passed on to his daughters, he's sure. In fact, his family did not own a television set until this year, and his daughters have all grown to be serious students and high achievers. "MCI taught me the importance of academics," said Crowley. "Everyone that left there was impacted in a positive way."

Scholarship Established For Andrew Cline, James Lovely

McDonald's Restaurant in Newport has established a memorial scholarship in the names of Andrew Cline and James Lovely, who were killed in a 2006 accident. Both boys were employed at the restaurant.

Fundraisers were held to raise more than \$2,200 to establish The Andrew B. Cline & James M. Lovely Memorial Scholarship Fund. One deserving student will receive a \$100 scholarship each year, with the fund being managed by MCI. The student chosen for the scholarship must be a graduating senior from MCI (or enrolled at MCI and attending the regional vocational school) with a 3.0 or better GPA, who is involved in a school activity or club through MCI and is in need of the scholarship.

According to Richard T. Davis of McDonald's, "Their (Andrew and James') deaths have had a major impact to our community. As we mourn their deaths, a group of young friends and co-workers came together to help each other deal with the loss," he said. "We decided to start a scholarship fund and raise enough for the scholarship to be self-sustaining for a substantial period."

Individual awards at the championships went to: Joshua Knowles, gold medal; Seth Fitts, third J2 Class; Seth Carron, fifth place J1 Class; Faxon McLaughlin, sixth place J1

Class; Leslie Knowles, fourth place J2 Class; Lewis Fitts, 12th place.

The MCI Huskies Varsity 4 Position Team took third place at the Capitol City 4-Position & Prone Rifle Match, comprised of Josh Knowles, Olivia Haynes '07, Seth Fitts and Seth Carron. The MCI Huskies Prone Only Team took first place, comprised of Breanna McLaughlin, Cody Southard, Ridge Lawn, and Josh Lombard - all first-year shooters. Individual results in that match for MCI were: Olivia Haynes, 4th place junior division; Josh Knowles, 5th place junior division; Faxon McLaughlin, 7th place junior division; Seth Carron, 4th place intermediate junior division; Seth Fitts, 7th place intermediate junior division; Jonathan Englehardt, 10th place intermediate junior division; and Lewis Fitts, 16th place intermediate junior division. Individual results for the prone-only shooters were: Ridge Lawn, 1st place intermediate junior division; Josh Lombard, 2nd place intermediate junior division; Breanna McLaughlin, 5th place intermediate junior division; and Cody Southard, 6th place intermediate junior division.

The MCI Rifle Team has been in existence since at least 1957. In recent years, the team has won three overall team State Championships (2001, 02 and 06), three team Scholastic Division State Championships (2003, 04 and 05), have won the Postal League Championship three times (2001, 02 and 06), and have had two men's individual state champions (setting a new scoring record as well). The MCI team has had a two-time women's champion and three total women's titles, and have had two indivuals qualify to travel to Colorado to compete for the Junior Olympic championship. In 2003, the team traveled to Ohio for the national championships, and in 2002 and 2003, our team was ranked in the top 10 in the country.

Boys, Girls Hoops Teams Wrap Up Season

The Boys Basketball team ended this season 15-6. The team won the Maine Principals Association Sportsmanship Award for the Eastern Maine B tournament, and Troy Murray was named to the Bangor Daily News All-Tourney Team. Ensuring MCI's Future

Board of Trustees Approve Capital Campaign

The Campaign will fund a new Dining Commons and Student Center, campus technology upgrades, and the school's endowment.

The Maine Central Institute Board of Trustees approved at their February meeting to proceed with the public phase of a \$2.5 million capital campaign themed, "Ensuring MCI's Future". The Campaign has been in the quiet phase since the Fall of 2006, and has already raised more than \$1.4 million. Initiatives to be supported by the Campaign include a 12,000 square foot expansion and renovation of the Rowe Hall Dining Room, which will add 100 seats and house a student lounge, recreation room and a 40-seat conference room. At present, our dining room is severely overcrowded and students do not have a place to congregate where all students, day and resident, can share together in the MCI experience. When not in use by MCI, the facility will also be available for use by the general public - MCI's way of giving back to our community. Completion of the facility is projected for November.

Other necessities the Campaign will address incude a much-needed campus technology upgrade, and increasing the school's endowment to Ensure MCI's Future.

Now that the Campaign is public, we turn to you, our valued alumni/ae and friends, to help us successfully reach our goal of \$2.5 million by the end of 2007. Campaign flyers for giving will be mailed to you soon, and the MCI web site will have a page for secure electronic giving.

The groundbreaking is scheduled for Thursday, May 24, at 11 a.m. Peter Vigue '65, president of Cianbro Corporation, will be our keynote speaker. Details of MCI's Capital Campaign to support this project and other important priorities will be announced in the near future.







