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

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MCI's Vision for Its Future: 2002 Strategic Planning

Maine Central Institute's faculty and staff are outstanding. The 2002 Strategic Planning will continue to stress the importance of endowment for salaries, also one of four major initiatives in the Campaign for MCI.

> This past March 8th and 9th, 39 members of the MCI community participated in strategic planning sessions with consultant John Bird. Four subgroups were developed that each included trustees, faculty, staff members and administrators as well as parents of students currently enrolled at our school. Group leaders were trustees Mike Gallagher, Carol Rogers Good, John LeMieux and Peter Williams.

> The entire group identified and discussed external issues that may impact our school which included technology, global dynamics, environmental concerns, diversity, standards based education, shifting of demographics and funding sources, world events and how these could impact philanthropic giving, concerns about violence in schools and preparation for a variety of careers, to name but a few. The school's mission, adopted in 1995, was reaffirmed:

> MCI pledges to provide a rigorous, comprehensive educational program to a multicultural student body with a wide range of abilities and interests. In a safe and caring atmosphere, students will acquire knowledge, self-esteem, social responsibility and the critical thinking and communication skills necessary for global citizenship and lifelong learning.

> Participants in the Strategic Planning went on to identify, by group consensus, the six core values of the school which should never change, the vision of the school fifteen years later in 2017 and the six critical priorities on which to focus over the next 3 to 5 years.

Core Values:

Comprehensiveness: MCI is a comprehensive school. As a school, we are open to those who choose to attend as long as they will not adversely impact the school community by way of safety or disruption of the day.

Diversity: The school deeply values the diverse makeup of the school community and encourages a continuing effort to bring individuals to the school from every possible way of life. It is through this student makeup that the school is truly able to celebrate the diversity of the world.

Community and Family: The sense of community and family, not only within the school itself, but also in the greater community, is a critical value of the school.

Standards of Excellence: A high level of rigor and excellence in all components of the school's operation is critical, whether that be the academic program, residential program, cocurricular activities or the overall support system at the school. Focus on the Individual: The people at MCI work diligently to focus on each student as an individual. It is through this approach that each person grows academically, socially and physically as well as becoming a global citizen.

Independence: The status of our school as independent is critical to the continued operation of the institution. We are extremely proud of our founding as a private Maine academy. This foundation upon which we have built for 136 years must never be sacrificed.

Vision: What Maine Central Institute will be like in the year 2017 can be categorized into four specific components.

Facilities: It is anticipated that in the year 2017, the construction of a fine arts center, dining commons/student union and a solid base of technology infrastructure will have been completed. The tremendous commitment to the maintenance of the school's total infrastructure will be obvious to any visitor stepping onto the MCI campus.

Programs: There will be significant growth in the number of boarding students attending MCI. There will be a much larger Maine student boarding population in addition to significant increases nationally and internationally in the residential program. MCI will be the school of choice in the area of fine arts within the State of Maine. Its academic

program will be greatly expanded in both offerings and activities provided to students. The school will also be

recognized for its technological excellence.

People: Compensation will have dramatically increased and faculty/student load will be improved to enhance the teaching and learning experience. The school will have developed a clear compensation philosophy, which will be followed as it relates to the compensation of all employees. There will be a significant increase in the number of both professional and paraprofessional staff. It will continue to be the expectation that all people at MCI will treat everyone with the utmost dignity and respect.

Funding: The school will experience a strong financial base by the year 2017. There will be significant growth in endowment as well as funding for faculty development. Increases in revenue beyond endowment will come from significant increases in tuition revenues and greater philanthropic support from friends of the school as well as increased

support from educational foundations.

Policy Priorities: To achieve this vision in 15 years, we must accomplish the following in the next 3-5 years:

Achieve financial stability: Through extensive expansion and refinement of the residential program and significant growth of the development effort, it is necessary to increase the financial resources of the institution. Such growth is integral to the successful implementation of the remaining four priorities. There will be growth in endowment as well as funding for faculty development. The school must also thoroughly examine its operating efficiency to ensure that every dollar is utilized to the greatest benefit for each student.

Establish a standards-based curriculum that is individually focused: Consistent with the schools core values of comprehensiveness, standards of excellence and focus on the individual, it is critical to establish a curriculum based on predetermined standards. Such standards will result in assessment tools developed for the purpose of assuring that each student meets the standards prior to successful graduation from Maine Central Institute.

Retain and attract quality faculty and staff: Retention of strong faculty and staff is critical as we strive toward our determined vision. The ability to attract new people is also critical. This entails all components of the above including compensation, workload, professional development and the instructional culture at the school.

Address current infrastructure needs, i.e. technology and physical plant: The current technology infrastructure is in need of great support and renewal, as is the physical plant. It is critical that both technology and the physical plant be a priority on an annual basis to ensure that high standards are maintained. As it relates to the physical plant, this point is not meant to refer to expansion, but to the maintenance and repair of the current physical plant. Every physical space on the campus must meet the same standards of excellence that

we expect of our curriculum, faculty and staff.

Develop a plan for a fine arts center: Over the last 5-9 years, the program in the fine arts has grown dramatically. The theater department now has 40-50 students involved in theater production on an annual basis. In the past fifteen years, the music program has grown from fewer than 20 students to more than 140 students. The visual arts at MCI has reached a point where the art shows display extraordinary levels of work by many members of the student body. The fine arts department includes two music instructors, one visual arts instructor and one part-time theater director. Despite this limited commitment to the fine arts, these people have developed extraordinary programs in all areas. Likewise, our partnership with the Bossov Ballet Theatre continues to grow despite less than ideal rehearsal areas in

Powers Hall and the Joseph R. Cianchette Hall. The spaces currently used for the fine arts include the Ruth Plummer Cook Music Building, formerly a Cianbro machine shop, two classrooms in Founders Hall committed to the visual arts, which lack necessary ventilation and offer no space for expansion of staff. The theater program, having no performance space to speak of, has been given the former earth science laboratory in the J.R. Cianchette Hall as well as a former science classroom and storage





area for set construction and costumes storage. None of these spaces comes close to meeting a minimal standard for space needed for the fine arts. The growth of these programs has been solely attributed to the expertise and leadership provided by the individuals who have committed endless time to their development. The addition of a fine arts center would allow us to expand the opportunities for all students in the arts

substantially.

Continue to integrate our diverse population: Continuing efforts need to be developed, implemented and monitored to integrate all of our student population into the total school, especially our residential students. The international population is minimally involved in co-curricular opportunities whether that be athletics or the fine arts. Students participating in the postgraduate basketball program are not integrated to a significant degree into other components of the school, nor are the community students integrated, to the degree necessary, into the residential culture of the school. Neither are the residential students truly integrated into the local community. Great advances have been made in the last seven years, but a great deal more work and energy needs to be devoted to this area.

The Strategic Planning, adopted by the Board of Trustees in late April, has resulted in the formation of six task forces that parallel the six priorities. Co-chairs, a trustee and an administrator, have been appointed for each of the task forces and potential participants identified and contacted. Meetings will be held throughout the coming year and are expected to culminate in an implementation proposal specific to each given priority that will be presented to the Board in June of 2003.

Maine Students Are Encouraged to Apply for Aspire Scholarships



elen Cianchette and her late husband Chuck had created the original Aspire Scholarship Fund several years ago, to Lenable Maine students to have the opportunity to attend the central Maine school with which they both had been so involved for over thirty years. Head of School Doug Cummings commented that Chuck and Helen, both members of the Class of 1948, have been two of the School's most enthusiastic and important benefactors and emphasized that the Cianchette's contributions have included every facet of the school. In recognition, MCI's new 24,000 square foot building has been named the Chuck and Helen Cianchette Math and Science Center. Chuck was an MCI trustee for many years and President of the Board. In the Cianbro Corporation memorial tribute to Chuck, who died in a plane accident in early 2000, the Cianchette's daughter Lynn is quoted as saying, "Dad may be the eagle, but Mom is the wind beneath his wings."

Helen Cianchette has recently made another very generous gift to the Aspire Scholarship Fund to continue to help Maine students 'soar' at the school she and Chuck have always loved. She commented that most often scholarships are awarded to students when they graduate from the school; she wants the Aspire Scholarships to make it possible for capable Maine students to enroll at Maine Central Institute and to benefit from all it offers.

The Aspire Scholarships will be awarded to qualified students from Maine who will benefit from the strong academic, residential, fine arts and extracurricular programs the school offers and who will make significant contributions to MCI but who are unable to enroll unless financial assistance is made available to them.

The Aspire Scholarships will be awarded, based on demonstrated financial need. The Aspire Scholarship Committee and the administration of MCI will renew the Aspire Scholarships for subsequent years, provided the students' academic achievement and citizenship records continue to be satisfactory and on-going financial need is demonstrated.

The number of international students and American boarding and private day students enables a rare degree of diversity in Maine that significantly enhances the learning experience at this school of 500 students. The rigorous academic curriculum and average class size of 14 well-prepares MCI students for acceptance by competitive colleges and universities. MCI has won the prestigious Future Problem Solvers State Championship for the past two years. Each senior is required to complete a senior project and exhibition; this independent study is a year-long planning process that requires in-

tense study the quarter just before graduation. Each student's senior project culminates in a formal written and oral presentation.

The Bossov Ballet Theatre Program, directed by noted Russian dancer Andrei Bossov, a featured soloist with the Kirov Ballet for 18 years, is an important part of the school's outstanding fine arts department. This year MCI's Vocal Jazz Ensemble was awarded the state championship for the fourth time in eight years; the other four years the group came in second in the state! MCI's drama group was again one of the top schools in its region, Division I, to go on to the State One-Act Play Festival. The studio arts program is also very strong and students' work is quite often selected for traveling exhibitions. Other outstanding extracurricular activities are the 133year-old Manson Prize Speaking competition, Fencing Club, math team and Masardis, the literary magazine. There are a total of 28 club activities at the school.

MCI offers 32 sports for undergraduates, 19 of which are at the varsity level, and an internationally recognized post graduate basketball program. Athletic offerings include: soccer, football, field hockey, cheerleading in the fall; basketball, rifle team, wrestling, skiing and cheerleading in winter; baseball, softball, track and tennis in spring. The rifle team has achieved state champion honors for the second consecutive year.

One of MCI's great strengths is that the school's

scheduling makes it possible for students to be involved in athletics as well as the fine arts each quarter if they wish.

The Cowan Bequest: Their Legacy for Our Future



On May 13, 2002, in recognition of the most generous bequest by Herman G. and Sara J. Cowan, the grateful administration and faculty of Maine Central Institute hosted a reception in their memory for family, classmates and friends of the Cowans in the Ella Powell Room of the Library. Headmaster Douglas Cummings delivered the following tribute:

In recognition of the very generous bequest made to Maine Central Institute by Herman Cowan and his sister Sara, it is appropriate that I say a few words about these thought-

ful and dedicated educators who so highly valued their experiences at Maine Central Institute.

To date, MCI has received over \$136,000 from their estates, a magnanimous sum which has enabled the Chuck & Helen Cianchette Math & Science Center component of the The Campaign for MCI to be completed and the goal of \$4.5 million to be achieved. In recognition of their extraordinary generosity, MCI has named two rooms in their memory.

Room 204 in the new Chuck & Helen Cianchette Math & Science Center has been designated the Herman G. Cowan Science Classroom. Room 15 on the third floor of Founders Hall, the beautifully renovated classroom of Ron Bessey, Humanities Department Chair, that overlooks the front campus of MCI, has been named in Sara's honor.

Herman and Sara were the children of Louville and Ellen Johonnett Cowan and they grew up in Pittsfield. Herman graduated from Maine Central Institute in 1935 and as a student here he was very much involved in music and drama. He played in the orchestra for four years, had a lead part in the Senior Play and the Musical Comedy and had also been in the Junior and Senior Plays as a junior.

He initially attended college in Boston, then entered the United States Army's 43rd Division which fought so gallantly in the South Pacific, seeing action in the Solomon Islands, New Guinea and the Phillipines from 1941 to 1945. Herman was also stationed in New Zealand.

After returning to the United States, Herman enrolled at Boston University, receiving a Bachelor of Science in Education and two years later, his Masters Degree in Education from the same institution. He was also a graduate of Columbia University Teacher's College.

He began as a math instructor at New York Military Academy in 1956 and nine years later was named the department chair, a position he held until his retirement in June 1981.

For many years he was in charge of the school's AV materials and equipment and then assisted with the integration of all media services into the Library. His close friend, Calvin Fenton, Librarian and Archivist at NYMA, wrote to say that he was a member of the evening library staff for several years in the 1960's. He was a voracious reader and a music lover; together he and Mr. Fenton made numerous trips to the Metropolitan Opera in New York City. He was an active member of the New York Theatre Organ Society for many years and volunteered with organ concerts at the Academy's Davis Chapel.

Always very formal with students, he never used first names but called them "Mr. Jones" or Mr. Smith", etc. "Without ever raising his voice," Mr. Fenton commented, "he was in complete control of his classes."

The graduating students of New York Military Academy's Class of 1975 dedicated their yearbook to Herman with this

inscription: "I have Cowan."... these words have been said one time or another by most of the members of our graduating class. Mr. Herman Cowan is a true head of the math department. He can teach calculus, analytic geometry, but also pre-algebra, business math and all those courses in between. He came to New York Military Academy in 1956, has been recognized for his services by the Regiment of Graduates, who, after he had been here ten years, made him an honorary member. It is with deep appreciation that we,

the graduating Class of 1975, dedicate the Shrapnel to Herman G. Cowan, master mathematician."

NYMA became coeducational in September 1975 two years before the US Military Academy at West Point began admitting girls; Herman as a department chair had a significant voice in the decision to enroll young women.

After retiring in 1981 Herman returned to Portland to live

with his sister Sara, also a life-long educator.

Sara was Valedictorian of the Class of 1933, Secretary and/or Treasurer of her class for three years, a member of National Honor Society and involved in Manson Prize Speaking and Alumni Prize Speaking, Senior Play, MCI Board and The Trumpet. A fine athlete, she played basketball and field hockey for three years and was a member of M Club.

After she graduated she enrolled at Colby College where she received her Bachelor of Arts degree. She also earned a Master of Arts Degree from Columbia University and took additional graduate work at St. Joseph's College and the University of Maine.

In 1937 Sara began teaching at New Gloucester High School and then transferred, in 1939, to Deering High School where she taught Latin for the next 36 years until her retirement in 1975.

Past President of the Maine Teachers Association and a member of the local and country teachers associations, Sara was also active in the Classical Association of New England, was a member of and trustee of Clark Memorial Church and president of the WSCS there. A member of the Portland College Club and Western Maine Colby Alumni, Sara was a vice chairman of the Maine Council of Young Republican Clubs and active with the city and county Republican Committees. She assisted with the writing of "The Maine Origins of the Republican Party"; her hobbies included history and politics. She loved to travel and went on tours of Italy and the Roman roads, all the way to Great Britain. She even worked on an archeological dig in Europe.

Several people have commented on one of Sara's charming and endearing habits: as a teacher she rose to her toes whenever she wished to emphasize a point in her teaching ...and as a driver she alternately pressed the accelerator and the brake...which resulted in a motion similar to her rising and settling back on her heels in her classroom.

Sara seldom missed an MCI reunion and thus she maintained close ties with old friends and acquaintances and with



Michael Heath '87, A Most Supportive Alumnus

Michael Heath has been an incredibly supportive alumnus the past two years - he has bought more of the Annual Auction's silent auction items than anyone else - by far. Collector of MCI "art" of all kinds, he has paid top dollar for two David Silsby '48 watercolors. Both adorn the mantle of the home on Falmouth Foreside that he is so painstakingly restoring. And between the two nostalgic paintings is the MCI pendulum clock. And sitting on either side of hearth are the rocking chair and the Bradco cherry chair that each bear engraved MCI logos. He said he loves beautiful things and that he wanted to "give back to MCI because I am so grateful for the education I got there."

A very soft-spoken, mannerly and genuinely nice young man, Michael is also an incredible dare-devil! Few would dare to climb a swaying tower 160 feet higher than the Empire State Building....in the dark...with only a hat-mounted lamp like miners wear...in the wind of an ice storm. But that's what Michael does for a living.

Vice President of Eastern Communications in which he is a partner, Michael regularly climbs 1600 feet into the air as he builds towers, like the one in Raymond, as far as away as Hilton Head and Charleston, South Carolina. Actually, now that he's an executive, Michael doesn't climb nearly enough to suit him. He commented, "I love being in the air. It's another world up there with the birds flying along below where you are. I climb the tower structure itself or go up in a creaky elevator the size of a coffin. Actually, sometimes I ride on top of the little elevator, just holding on to the cable. When I first started in this business I was free climbing more than a thousand feet in the air. Sure, I've had some heart-stopping slips and near falls but now the safety equipment is really sophisticated. It slows you down as you climb, clipping and reclipping but you are really safe."

To realize how very far in the air he climbs, Michael described the large transmitter building of the Raymond tower as appearing about half an inch long and the very large white ser-

vice truck looks like a dot the size of a pinhead when he is at the top. These towers weigh about 530,000 pounds and some take up more than 100 acres because of the span of the guy wires than hold them relatively steady in the 115 MPH winds sometimes experienced up that high. When asked if he enjoys rock climbing he quickly answered, "You'd have to be crazy to climb so high with just little pins in the rocks to hold you up!"

Michael didn't go on to college; he got strong math skills at MCI that have enabled him to be very successful in his career. "MCI was like college for me, and that's why I am so willing to give back as much as I can." He intends to keep on bidding for every Silsby painting of the MCI campus offered at the Annual Auctions. Thank you, Michael.

The Tradition of the Cups

aine Central Institute's Masters Cup was first presented in 1941 by the faculty's masters who voted to honor the boy who best represented the ideals of the school in athletic ability, character, leadership, loyalty to MCI and school spirit. The Masters Cup is considered the highest award given to any male graduate, by virtue of the sterling qualities of the first recipient Frank J. Koris '41, who was later killed in a World War II battle in Italy.

Thirty-three years later, in 1974, the faculty established a new award, to be given to a female graduate. Voted upon by

the entire MCI faculty, The MCI Faculty Cup is awarded to that girl who has demonstrated the highest qualities of character, leadership and involvement in school activities.

The 2002 recipients of these most prestigious of Commencement honors are both highly respected by faculty and students for their modesty and genuine sincerity, their extraordinary dedication to their school and repeatedly demonstrated leadership. Both are true scholar-athletes.

The 61st Masters Cup was presented to Andrew St. Clair, son of John and Wendy

St. Clair of Pittsfield. Elected to National Honor Society his sophomore year, Andrew has achieved Honors or Highest Honors every quarter but one since ninth grade. In tenth grade he was the recipient of the Oceanography Academic Award. He has a GPA of over 90 and feels math is his strongest subject. He credits much of his academic success to the truly great teachers he had at MCI and said he always found the time and had the drive to do well in both academics and athletics. "MCI is an experience you just can't get elsewhere." He was determined to make the most of that experience.



The 28th Faculty Cup was presented to Jennifer Cummings, daughter of Doug and Lori Cummings of Pittsfield. A three-year member of National Honor Society, Jennifer was President of Student Council and Vice President of the Class of 2002 her senior year. Jenn was class secretary her sophomore year and Student Council Secretary as a junior. She received the Maine Principal's Award this spring and attended Girls State last summer. Commencement Address 2002



A Very Special Dollar

elcome to this, the 133rd commencement at MCI. You are a wonderfully diverse group of graduates, representing twelve countries: Bermuda, Ecuador, Egypt, Germany, Japan, Korea, Norway, Russia, Saudi Arabia, Spain, Taiwan and the United States. Two states other than Maine are represented, New York and Pennsylvania, and eight Maine communities, Pittsfield, Burham, Detroit, Hartland, Palmyra, St Albans, Augusta, and Lewiston. Congratulations to all of you and thank you for all that each of you has brought to our school.

As I have pondered what to say today, there have been two thoughts in my mind. One, how can I say what ever it is to be said so that you will remember it, and second, what can I say that will be meaningful to you as you go about your journey?

Parents, I'll bet there are certain questions that your son and /or daughter ask you on a regular basis. Having now had three children make their way to the Boutelle Savage Lawn, I have a pretty good sense of what Lori's and my children would ask when they have a question. The first thing any of the three might ask is, "Can I have some money?" All of the other questions fall a distant second to that one question.

Now it just happens that on Thursday, my wife Lori won the Track Team Raffle. The prize was \$100.00, almost the same amount as there are people in the class of 2002. Thanks to her good luck, Lori has agreed to give each member of the class of 2002 one dollar to help me make the points I want to make in this address. Goal number one was to make this address memorable. This should give it a good start.

You all have now, in your hands, the material component of my message, a crisp one-dollar bill. This gift is not about the

value of the dollar but the meaning of it as we go from here. As we walk to the end of the lawn today, graduates, and you throw your hats in the air, a new time in your lives will have begun.

The dollar you now have in your hand is called paper money but it really is not. It is, in fact, cotton and linen with red and blue silk fibers running through it. Special ink is used. It is overprinted with symbols and then starched to make it water resistant and pressed to give it that nice crisp look.

You too, are a special blend of fibers, thanks to your parents both biologically as well as the manner by which you have been reared. You are resilient. I've seen each and every one of you on days when it looked like you just came out of the washing machine – the same way a washed dollar looks. And I've seen you at other times when you look as nice as that crisp one-dollar bill. Your crisp, sharp days will assuredly out weigh the days when you feel like you just came through the permanent press cycle.

On the front of the dollar you will see the United States Treasury Seal. On the top you will see a set of scales symbolizing the need for a balanced budget. You need to find balance in your lives. Assess what you want as a human being. Decide what your core values are and put in place a plan to get there. We all want many things. Find the right balance among all of those desires.

In the center of the seal is a carpenter's square, a tool carpenters use to insure an even, straight cut. When you attack any task, go about it right, just like the carpenter making a straight cut. Use the tools given you. And remember, if you haven't got time to do something right the first time, how will you ever have time to do it over?

Let's now look at the back of the dollar. You will see two circles. Both together comprise the great seal of the United States. Ben Franklin and a group of people took four years to create this seal. On the left side you see a pyramid. The country was just beginning when the seal was developed, just like you people today are beginning your adult lives. There was, and is, so much left to be discovered. The pyramid is uncapped, signifying that it is unfinished. But, like you, a great deal of the pyramid has been built. You are not just starting to build your pyramids either. You have learned a lot in the last 13 years of schooling. Take that knowledge and run with it.

Inside the capstone is the All Seeing Eye, an ancient symbol of divinity. It was Franklin's belief that one man could not do it alone, but a group of men with the help of God, could do anything. My point is the same. No one of you should see


yourself as alone but as a part of a society that is interdependent. As we all go about our work or play remember that great things can happen through collaboration and cooperation with our fellow friends from all around the globe. I mentioned earlier where we are all from. Granted we are from all around the globe but above all else we are people. We are not Japanese or American or Bermudan or Egyptian, we are people. As a group together we'll do well.

The Latin above the pyramid, ANNIUT COEP-TIS, means, "God has favored our undertaking". The Latin below the pyra-

mid, NOVUS ORDO SECLORUM, means a new order has begun. Class of 2002, you are the new order and you are ready to begin. The symbol on the right is the seal of the president of the United States.

The bald eagle was selected for two reasons: first, he is not afraid of a storm; he is strong, and he is smart enough to soar above it. Secondly, he wears no crown. We had just broken away from the King of England. The country could now stand alone.

Class of 2002, there will be storms. Early in my time here at MCI we came upon some difficulty. The president of our board



of trustees at the time was Chuck Cianchette. I went to him for advice and reassurance. I will never forget his remark, "You cannot tell a good sailor in calm seas". Stay the course. Like that advice that was given to me and like the symbolism of the bald eagle, all of you will be tested many times. Like the eagle, don't be afraid of the storm and stay strong. Soar above adversity and always take the high road.

Notice that the eagle holds, in his talons, an olive branch and arrows. This country wants peace, but we will never be afraid to fight to preserve peace. The eagle always wants to face the olive branch that depicts peace, but in time of war, his gaze turns toward the arrows. I urge of you to focus on the olive branch too. We must commit ourselves to world peace. To be specific to our daily lives we must work toward the mindset of interdependence with our friends, family and colleagues, but

like the eagle, we can never sacrifice our core beliefs. There will be times in our lives when we must stand up for those beliefs. There will be hard times, but you are ready for them.

We think of the number thirteen as being unlucky, but on the dollar there are 13 stars on the seal, there were 13 colonies. 13 steps on the pyramid, 13 letters in the Latin "E PLURIBUS UNIM, 13 leaves on the olive tree and thirteen arrows. Ironically the 13th amendment to the US Constitution abolished slavery in this country. And one last little 13. You folks will complete your 13th year of school today.

I ask a special favor. Tuck this dollar bill into your purse or wallet and carry it with you always. Consider it a reminder of your years at MCI. In times of stormy weather, when you feel all alone, when you find your gaze moving from the olive branch to the arrows, or if you feel like that dollar bill that just went through the washing machine, know that you can always call on us here at MCI for help. And please make every effort to stay in touch with those sitting around you today who thus far have been an important part of your journey.

As to the rest of your journey, good luck and God speed.

State Champion Future Problem Solving Team

The Future Problem Solving Team, under the leadership of faculty members Anne Miller and Deb Rozeboom, competed against three other very strong teams in late April; only four teams from any state may compete for state championship honors in the FPS program. Team members Megan Becker, Chris Cochrane and Karlyn Moyer, all juniors, and sophomores Alex Cunningham and Lok-Wah Li worked cooperatively to meet the state competition's challenge. Teams were expected to project forward in time to 2022 and to devise strategies that would convince North American communities and corporations to develop 'brown fields', formerly polluted and toxic sites that had been cleaned up. Further elements of the challenge required teams to hypothesize and then generate, in writing, 16 potential problems that might evolve as a result of the site development strategies. MCI's team generated potential solutions and developed an action plan that won the state title. Mrs. Rozeboom commented, "MCI students generally excel in written skills, thanks to the school's rigorous humanities programs. Our FPS team rose to this year's challenges quite readily with their precise and articulate written position statements." Mrs. Miller went on to say, "Only the top 1% of American Future Problem Solving Teams qualify for the National Competition, which this year will be the Internationals, since teams from several other countries will be competing."

State Champion Rifle Team

For the second year in a row, Maine Central Institute's Rifle Team won the Maine Junior Four Position State Championship this past March. Eric Saucier '02, A. J. Knowles '03, Cam Bryce '02 and Heather McLaggan '02 competed against nine other teams and scored 1496 out of 1600 possible points, 71 points higher than the next highest scoring team. Against 66 other competitors, Eric's hard-earned 388 out of a possible 400 won him the Individual State Championship; he shot ten perfect 'bulls eyes' on his prone target. A. J.'s 376 points placed him second. Co-coaches Allen Knowles '89 and Tam Cianchette Bryce '71 are proud of all twelve rifle team members for their dedication and persistence this year; MCI had the winning team and first place individual marksman at every small bore rifle match all season. At the USA Shooting State Junior Olympic Rifle Championship, MCI's team of Eric, Cam, Heather and Stuart Allen '04 placed first of eleven teams and Junior Olympic medals were won by Cam who received Gold, Eric who was awarded Silver and Heather who received the Women's Silver. At the NRA National Junior Indoor 4-Position Sectional Championship, MCI was the winning team against three others.

MCI students had the incredible good fortune to win not one, but three state championships this year that reflected each of the school's three main elements: academic, artistic and athletic.

State Champion Vocal Jazz Ensemble

MCI's 20-member Vocal Jazz Ensemble won the State Vocal Jazz Championship at a competition in Ellsworth in early April. Competing in Division II with other schools of similar size, the Vocal Jazz Ensemble, under the direction of Dean Neal, performed three numbers during the afternoon preliminary competition and again in the final competition that evening. MCI's jazzy singers won first place for the fourth time in eight years with their renditions of *Danny Boy*, *There Will Never Be Another You* and *Walkin'*. (The other four years they placed second in the state!) In late February the jazz vocalists performed at Disney World to rave reviews and at the prestigious Berklee College of Music Festival in Boston this winter, the group placed third in competition with more than 2,500 students.

MCI Future Problem Solvers Attend International Conference

The incoming message flashed across Aluui's terminal. An untaxed deposit of 25,000 digital monetary units had just been transmitted into her global-commerce account by Virtua Tech Enterprises. 'They accepted my software for Intent-10,' she thought. As the message slowly faded from her screen, Aluui began work on her next project. She hoped it, too, would be accepted by Virtua Tech – the corporation was quickly becoming one of her favorite virtual work centers."

Thus began the *Future Scene* on the topic of "Virtual Corporations" at the Future Problem Solving Program International Conference, held at the University of Connecticut campus in Storrs June 6-9, 2002. Some 2000 elementary, middle, and high school students and their coaches from all 50 states, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand gathered to compete for top honors at the prestigious FPSP conference on the beautiful U. Conn. campus. Among those teams gathered were five MCI students: tenth-graders Alex Cunningham and Lok-Wah Li, and eleventh-graders Megan Becker, Chris Cochrane and Karlyn Moyer, the Maine State Champions who competed in the Team Problem Solving component.

Under the guidance of a teacher/coach, teams of four students use the FPSP six-step model to explore challenges and propose action plans to complex societal problems, such as alternative energy, educational options, organ donation, environmental law, and virtual corporations. Teams complete two practice problems and one qualifying problem throughout the school year. Trained evaluators score student work and return it with feedback including suggestions for improvement. The top scoring teams on the qualifying problem are invited to Affiliate Future Problem Solving Bowls held each spring. The winners of each respective Affiliate FPS Bowl advance to the FPSP International Conference in Leasure (Conference in Leasure (Conference

Coaches Anne Miller and Deborah Rozeboom were thrilled for the students and extremely proud of their hard work and year-long dedication to learning the complex FPS process.

In addition to the thrill of victory, the MCI group had a great time meeting students from other teams, staying in the dorms and touring the U. Conn. campus, and enjoying the many

activities offered to conference attendees.



In the written explanation he carefully posted beneath the drawing each time it was exhibited, Won Joon wondered how the course of history might have been changed if someone has assassinated Adolph Eichmann before the beginning of the atrocities of World War II. The cuff link of the assassin's shirt bears the image of the Star of David.

Danny Shumpert's rendering of the Twin Towers reflected in the chrome of a hubcap was selected for the back cover of Awarded Best in Show at The Spring Art Exhibit was What If?, the disturbing and stunningly realistic painting by Won Joon Lee. Receiving firsts in various categories were: Danny Schumpert's Back Pain, a drawing; Sarah Alexander's New Moon, a copy of a master's painting; Hsin-Yi Lin's calligraphy; Ashley Herr's clothing model; Amanda Quint's portrait entitled 10 Days; a coil pottery piece by Sarah Berryman, a piece of furniture and a book by Amanda Palumbo; and Time, a sculpture by Ryan Strategic Planning. The exhibit, in the lobby

of Pittsfield's Merrill Merchants Bank, was simply wonderful.



The Drama Competition Team, directed by Deb Susi, won the Division I Regional Competition and qualified for the Maine State Drama Festival in March. Elegantly staged and beautifully costumed, *Cyrano*, a oneact play by Jo Roets, was a stunning production. For his portrayal of Cyrano, Luke Zarolinski was named to the All State Festival Cast.

Wearing historically accurate costumes and hair styles, the large cast of 19 thespians performed against the backdrop of the exceptionally intricate and multi-sided stage set, designed by Amanda Quint and constructed by Tyler Richardson and Mike Adams, that won the Festival Awards for Set Design and for Set Construction. As the set revolved from hotel to bakery to house façade to battlefield encampment to garden, the sad tale of the long-nosed lover was told. Meredith Susi researched historical makeup and hair design. Haley Ingraham and Megan Ladd, who designed the patterns for the authentic stage dress, received the Festival Award for Costume Reproduction and Design.

Cyrano was enhanced by the on-stage orchestra whose instruments included a dulcimer played by Kate Zarolinksi and whose members were costumed to create the mood of long-ago France. The musicians were given a Special Festival Commendation for Music. Sixteen students provided the backstage work necessary to stage such an ambitious production. One of the judges commented, "The costumes, hairstyles, music and sets were all exquisitely authentic. The versatility of the set was remarkable – just beautiful. It was stunning to look at and the musical concert provided

lovely background."

In 1998, MCI's Drama Competition Team won first place in the State Drama Festival that moved the school to Division I level competition. MCI's actors have won first place in the regional drama festivals four of the past six years. The drama department at MCI is truly superb.

The Spring Concert featured the 70-member Concert Choir, conducted by Linda Snow, and the 73-member Concert Band, led by Dean Neal. Both groups performed wonderful classical as well as more contemporary selections that demonstrated technical excellence far beyond that of the usual high school musical groups.

The choir performed J. S. Bach's Jesu, Joy of Man's Desiring, with all the beautiful nuances of tone and volume the piece demands. Their Patriotic Salute and Sing to the Lord a Marvelous Song were also particularly impressive. For their final number the graduating seniors sang Like An Eagle.

For their first number, From Sea to Shining Sea, the band was joined by Warsaw Middle School's terrific eighth grade instrumentalists; MCI's music program will be much enhanced by the fine young musicians who will enter ninth grade in the fall. The Concert Band's next three numbers quite astonished the crowd. Manuel De Falla's Ritual Fire Dance was indeed fiery, emotional and perfectly played.

Higgins' *Habitat – Visions of a Fragile Planet*, a modern, atonal selection, was played with an impressive symphonic quality and very rich timbre. *The Darkness is Always Soft* featured gorgeous flutes, clarinets and oboes; the clarity and velvety smoothness of these winds were marvelous.

The Music Department at Maine Central Institute is truly outstanding; other musical groups include Jazz Band, Instrumental Jazz Ensemble, Jazz Combo and the Vocal Jazz Ensemble. Four students, Luke Zarolinski, Lindsay DiPasquale, Kate Zarolinski and Tyler Richardson, qualified for All State Vocal Jazz. David Chale, Ellen Dickinson, Karlyn Moyer and Danya Glabau all qualified for All State Band and Orchestra; Ellen and Danya both also qualified for the Mid Maine Youth Orchestra.




