



Ground is Broken MCI's Newest Building

The Chuck and Helen Cianchette Math & Science Center

n Tuesday morning, May 16, the entire Maine Central Institute community, Board of Trustee members, major donors and members of the Class of 1948 joined Helen Cianchette and members of the Cianchette family at the Groundbreaking Ceremony for MCI's new Math & Science building.

Named in honor of Chuck Cianchette, a former trustee of the school and his wife Helen, both members of the Class of '48, the edifice will stand on the site of the former Industrial Arts Building, which was razed the first week of May, and adjacent to Wright Gymnasium, overlooking MCI's athletic fields.

The new three-story, 23,000 square foot building will house a total of 14 instructional spaces for math and science classrooms, laboratories and computer facilities. Designed by Portland architect Stephen Blatt, the new Chuck and Helen Cianchette Math & Science Center, constructed of red brick, blends well aesthetically with the traditional architecture of the older nineteenth and early twentieth century buildings on the Pittsfield campus.

The ceremony began with a presentation of the construction time frame and recognition of the lead givers for whom the three floors of the building are named: Gregg Patterson, Class of '69, who is the benefactor of the third floor which will house the physics, chemistry, biology and general science classrooms, a small botany lab and several science storage and prep areas; Michael Savage, Class of '62, who funded the first floor which is designated for seven math classrooms; Carl Wright, Class of '43, who donated funds for


the second floor that features three life science classrooms, two computer classrooms, a conference room, the offices of the Associate Head of School and the building's main lobby, as well as several lab storage areas.

Another major donor, Robert Libby, Class of '48, was recognized for his gift of the chemistry lab, named in honor of his brother Blair, Class of '46. A number of other significant donors, for whom classrooms and building areas are to be named, were also applauded: Trustee President Michael Fendler, '70; Kenneth Cianchette, '42; the EE Ford, Davis Family and Libra Foundations; and a number of area businesses and philanthropic organizations.

The groundbreaking, on the site of the new building complete with commemorative shovels, was followed by a coffee reception on the school lawns for the more than 650 people who attended the ceremony. The Cianbro Corporation, based in Pittsfield, has most generously committed to construct MCI's magnificent and sorely needed new Chuck and Helen Cianchette Math & Science Center. Cianbro will serve as the general contractor at no cost to MCI. Cianbro's contribution will reduce the cost of the building to Maine Central Institute in excess of 30%, which represents a major gift-in-kind to the school's current Capital Campaign. The school currently has 515 students enrolled and is expected to grow significantly in the near future. Students from around the world are enrolled at MCI, which was established in 1866.

Chuck Cianchette was Chairman of the Board of the Cianbro Corporation at the time of his death this past January.

Chuck Cianchette is the granite foundation upon which we have relied for several decades; this is a fitting analogy for the man who has stood for integrity, honesty, dedication and diligence in the construction industry in the Northeast. He was, perhaps, the most critical member of the passionately committed

team of people who pulled MCI from the ashes during the 70's and 80's, giving of himself and his resources.

However, he never gave time, energy or financial support to this institution for the purpose of self-recognition. As a matter of fact he always opposed any recognition of his personal commitment to and tremendous support of the school. He took the 'hard stand' when it was necessary for the school to move forward and he felt there could never be anything more important than to preserve the best possible education for the students of Maine Central Institute. The ways in which he supported and nurtured MCI students are infinite.

Chuck was a visionary. Look at Cianbro! In just 50 years it moved from four brothers with tremendous energy, will power and an ungodly commitment to a company of nearly 2000 team members recognized as one of the most outstanding constructors in the United States.

Chuck never forgot a face. He made everyone around him just feel good. If Chuck were part of any project you just knew it would be successful. This was true for many reasons, a couple of which really stand out for me. First, Chuck made everyone feel so good about what we were working to achieve, but beyond that everyone worked even harder to achieve the given success because Chuck was a part of it. He was working just as hard as everyone else and because of that everyone would stretch themselves just a little more than ever before. None of us

could ever let Chuck down! The thought of failure just never occurred to him. The Cianbro Corporation commemorative tribute to Chuck begins: "Chuck Cianchette's smile was infectious. When he walked into a place - be it a local restaurant, or a conference room or a construction-site trailer - he brought along the sunshine. If

you were having a bad day, by the time he left, it was behind you." Chuck knew how to interact with people!


A master at creating the true "WIN WIN" solution, Chuck was compassionate, kind, supportive and caring for the people he was associated with, above all else. He had the gift of resolving conflict in the most supportive manner of anyone I have ever known. He would identify the common goal, then work with groups of people who had conflicting opinions and identify great points of argument from each of the opposing segments. With consummate skill and finesse he would merge these divergent thoughts and facilitate a totally different solution from the respective groups that was far better than either of the conflicting solutions originally posed. He treated people with dignity and respect and they reacted in kind.

Chuck loved life. He loved building things. He took great pride in doing things well. He loved to watch others find their way and loved

seeing them grow and succeed. His daughter Lynn said, "He was a special, one-of-a-kind person. It is heartwarming to see so many others also recognize this. We did not realize how far he spread and how many people he touched. He gave us the tools and showed us how to use them. Now it is up to each of us what we choose to do with them."

One of his granddaughters, Teplyn, summed him up well. "Pop Pop was a life-loving, people person."

He was the greatest mentor...and a great role model for all of us at Maine Central Institute.



Iton E. "Chuck" Cianchette, prominent Maine businessman and former state senator, died Tuesday, January 18, 2000. An enthusiastic collector and pilot of antique airplanes, Chuck died of injuries sustained when his 1948 Cessna Model 195 single-engine plane crashed in Willard, Kentucky. He was 69.

Chairman of the Board of Cianbro Corporation, Chuck had been in Maine for his company's annual stockholders' meeting in Portland and was on his way back to his winter home in St. Petersburg, Florida, at the time of the accident.

Born in Pittsfield, May 18, 1930, Chuck was the youngest child of Ralph and Edna Steen Cianchette. Since 1986 he and his wife Helen Esty Cianchette had made their home in Palmyra where Helen continues to live.

Highly respected in Maine, Chuck was known to be a team builder and a skilled motivator. Governor Angus King dedicated his January 24, 2000, State of the State Address to his friend, Chuck, a four-term Maine State Senator, and told the citizens of Maine it was because "Chuck represented the best of Maine: positive and enthusiastic, creative and receptive to change and deeply caring about his family and neighbors throughout the state."

Cianbro President Peter Vigue commented, "Chuck, along with his brothers Carl, Bud and Ken, founded this company on a can-do spirit which, coupled with the Cianchette brothers' philosophy - treat people with dignity and respect, your word is your bond and give back from which you take - lives on in the company today." Cianbro Corporation has grown to one of the East Coast's largest and most successful construction companies with offices in Maine, Connecticut and Maryland. Chuck's favorite job, over the years, was the large Madison Paper Industries Number Three paper machine undertaken in 1980. Another was the construction of the Piscatagua River Bridge between Portsmouth and Kittery. Capable of accomplishing things others thought impossible, Chuck, in 1978, "led a charge of eight construction teams into Holyoke, Massachusetts and accomplished a 'two-year sewer job' in less than two weeks," states local writer Ann McGowan, biographer of the Cianbro Corporation's The First 50 Years.

A member of MCI's Class of 1948, Chuck went to work full time for his older brothers immediately after graduation and, except for a stint in Korea with the US Army, he never worked for any other firm. He was appointed President of Cianbro in 1979 and became Chairman of the Board in 1991.

In the mid-1970's Chuck served two terms in the Maine State Legislature and proved to be a highly effective state legislator who was motivated to return for two more terms in the early 1990's, after watching a tumultuous era in state government. Chuck was credited with helping to stabilize the Legislature by leading a consensus process in the State House. "A Democrat, he worked with both Democrats and Republicans. He was very kind, sincere and very positive," noted Secretary of State Dan Gwadosky, who pointed out that the results achieved were longlasting. "Cianchette has a gift of bringing people together."

During his lifetime, he worked countless hours for causes dear to his heart. He gave and also raised a great deal of money for his alma mater, Maine Central Institute, and he was a former president of the school's Board of Trustees.







In a statement written just after Chuck's death, MCI Head of School Doug Cummings said that the school's new math and science center would be named in honor of Chuck and Helen Cianchette, both members of the Class of 1948, and two of the School's most enthusiastic and important benefactors. He emphasized that the Cianchettes' contributions included every facet of the School. "The greatest contribution they made is the manner by which they have served as role models for all of us and the youngsters we serve." Doug Cummings added that while Chuck was the more visible, his wife Helen stood firmly behind him in his commitment to the school. In the Cianbro memorial tribute to Chuck, his daughter Lynn is quoted, "Dad may be the eagle, but Mom is the wind beneath his wings."

Chuck's philanthropic and civic efforts were many; he served as President of the Pine Tree Council, which honored him in 1990 with its Distinguished Citizen Award. He formerly was president of the New England Council and the Northeast Region of Boy Scouts and had been a member of the Executive Board and of the National Advisory Board of the Boy Scouts of America. He was a trustee of the Susan L. Curtis Foundation, which sponsors a camp for underprivileged children; in 1981 the Foundation chose him as its Distinguished Maine Citizen. In 1993 Chuck was the recipient of the Spurwink Foundation's Humanitarian Award and in 1990 he was co-recipient, with his brother Bud, of the Business Leaders of Maine Award. Chuck was a former

president of the Maine Good Roads Association and a former director of both Key Bankshares of Maine, Inc. and Maine Hydro Electric Company. He served as Chairman of the Environmental and Economic Council of Maine and was a former member of the executive board of The Maine Alliance. His hobbies involved antique aircraft and automobiles and for forty years his passion was collecting and restoring old cars. With his brother Ken he had recently completed a three-year project, building a high-performance aircraft. In 1976 Chuck served as charter president of the Maine Pilots Association and was the recipient of the Association's Gaddis Cup Award in 1981. A trustee of the Staggerwing Museum Foundation in Tullahoma, Tennessee, he was also on the President's Council of The Experimental Aircraft Association of Oshkosh, Wisconsin. A great supporter of the Allagash Wilderness Waterway, Chuck loved the Maine outdoors, especially the camp at Daggett Pond where he and his family fished and boated.

Chuck Cianchette is survived by his wife Helen, three daughters and one son, nine grandchildren and three brothers.



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Then and Now at MCI

Fifty-five years ago at Maine

Central Institute, at the end of World War II, a general science course, two sections of biology and two levels of physics were offered, although there was no Physics Lab in Founder's Hall, then known as the Institute Building. Science at MCI in the late forties was largely lecturebased with few opportunities for hands-on experiences because of the restrictions posed by a dramatically overcrowded and overutilized facility. Biology students could not conduct experiments until 1955 when a biology demonstration table was finally purchased for classroom use.

In 1950, before the construction of the Cianchette Hall science building now on the campus, just over one-third of the students who attended Maine Central Institute took science classes.

In his article, Science - The Abstract World, in the June 1970 MCI Alumnus, Paul W. Legge,

Science Faculty Chairman, began by saying," Science is a vital part of modern culture and as such is a very necessary element in the education of all children....it is not just a collection of facts which can be learned; it is a highly intellectual structure of concepts that give a meaningful and integrated picture or model of world in which man lives." Mr. Legge went on to comment that the complexity of science was, in his opinion, the heart of the problem in which science educators in the late 1960's found themselves. The Russians had launched Sputnik in October of 1957, putting that country well-ahead of the USA in the race into space, although America later triumphed with the first man to walk upon the moon in August 1969.

In 1970 Mr. Legge wrote that he felt that "the problems of the science educator have been magnified by the impatience of some educational reformers and by the complexity of science itself." It must be noted that MCI students first began using a biology demonstration table just two years before the first Russian spacecraft soared through the October night sky.

Mr. Legge notes, in his article, that for the scienceminded and college-bound student there were the following classes: Intro to Advanced Science I and II, Biology, Chemistry, Physics II. He went on to say, "our excellent lab facilities enable our programs to be strongly laboratory

oriented...the student has the experience of learning for himself....is motivated toward greater interest in science."

Despite the limitations of space and equipment and

therefore program through the war years and the early fifties, a number of MCI graduates went on to distinguished careers in the sciences, which speaks eloquently to the quality of instruction during those years.

Through an intensive strategic planning process and implementation plan, MCI has dramatically improved in many ways in the past several years. In 1995, MCI faculty members completed a masterful Strategic Plan For Mathematics and Science with a stated goal that MCI would develop a world class program in math and science for all students. "It is simple to design a program for the elite for the few academically gifted. It is much more challenging to design an elite program for all the students. Educationally, it matches the mission of the school...and morally, it is the

right thing to do. All MCI students need to acquire the important additional skills and knowledge that are an integral part of a dramatically new approach to teaching math and science."

MCI recognizes the important role that math and science plan in contemporary society and the need to provide students with strong math and

science skills. Consequently, the math and science curricula have been improved with a new emphasis on problem-solving and critical thinking coupled with the use of technology as it relates to math and science. The national standards of curriculum and assessment in math and science have become the standard subscribed to by the MCI faculty.

Today, in 2000, virtually every MCI student, male and female, is required to take four years of science and four years of math; that is very significant, for many other very good New England independent schools require only three years' study of each of these subjects. This requirement, however, has made expansion of the current facilities critically important and the completion of the new Chuck and Helen Cianchette Math & Science Center an urgent necessity for MCI students. MCI's enrollment has grown 27% in the past five years. The current number of classrooms do not adequately support the current and future needs of the academic programs.

Freshmen at MCI this academic year studied Integrated Science I, an overview and preparation for all of the more sophisticated courses to follow; the sophomore level, Integrated Science II, is biology-based.

Upper classmen may elect courses like Oceanography, Anatomy and Physiology, Botany, Astronomy, Geology, Environmental Science, Forensic Problem Solving, Chemistry and College Preparatory or Advanced Placement Physics.

The mathematics curriculum includes regular and college preparatory study at each level through Trigonometry and a statistics course. The highest level math course is Advanced Math/Calculus.


Technology courses available today at MCI are equally impressive: Computer Animation; Auto CAD (Computer Assisted Design) 2000, Architectural Drawing, Electronic Publishing and Mechanical Drawing. This coming summer the school will be building a new AutoCAD lab, furnished with 15 new high-end student-accessed PC's with the newest version of the whole AutoCAD Suite. Other science software includes: The Sky Meteorology program, Pindar, Virtualab, Interactive Physics, Charged Particles and Discovering the Universe.


To support courses such as these and to enable students to easily access the Internet, MCI will dramatically increase its number of computers and computer labs in the next 15 months. Currently there are 54 computers available to the 515 students on campus. Upon completion of The Chuck and Helen Cianchette Math & Science Genter, the ratios of students to computers will improve from the present 9.6:1


to 4.3:1. The school will be leasing additional student computers for Fall 2000; the student/computer ratio in September will be 7.5:1.

Paul Legge had a vision for Maine Central Institute's Science Department when he joined MCI in 1944 and his vision was realized with the construction of the current science building in the late 1950's. His successors have continued to dream and to envision a math/science facility that will continue to meet the needs of students of this, the Twenty-First Century. When he visits the Chuck and Helen Cianchette Math& Science Center upon its completion, we at MCI know he will approve!


