MCI pledges to provide a rigorous, comprehensive educational program to a multicultural student body with a wide range of abilities and interests. In a safe and caring atmosphere, students will acquire knowledge, self-esteem, social responsibility and the critical thinking and communication skills necessary for global citizenship and lifelong learning.

From the Head of School

As always, it is a pleasure to bring greetings to our 7,000-plus alumni all over the world from everyone here at Maine Central Institute. The school is a dear place to so many of us and it is very exciting to share the successes of students today with those who may have had a common experience during their time at MCI.

The graduating class of 1999 is the last class of the millennium. It is a special group which has experienced special success through their years at Maine Central Institute. The class is very diverse in nature and consistent with our mission to enroll a multicultural student body. Demographically, they number 119; 56 percent male, 44 percent female; 31 residential students and 88 day students. There are 10 countries represented in this year's graduating class: Bermuda, Canada, Hong Kong, Germany, Japan, Korea, Norway, Russia, Spain and the United States. From the United States there are students from 13 states. This creates a wonderful opportunity for a great group of students.

During the four years these young people have attended Maine Central Institute, some wonderful things have happened. Our percentage of students going on to colleges and universities has increased 10-plus percent over the past four years. In 1999, nearly 80 percent of the graduating class will go onto college compared to 61 percent state wide and only 47 percent in Somerset County. During the past four years, the school drop out rate has gone down to less than one percent. In the state of Maine, the average drop out rate exceeds 3 percent.

From the standpoint of fine arts, during the last four years, the music program has grown to exceed more than 100 students. The vocal jazz group has won the state championship two of the four years the current graduating class has been at MCI. A member of the class, Mat Zarolinski, was named the State of Maine male vocalist of the year for two consecutive years. The instrumental jazz group has gained every year, finishing fourth this year in the State of Maine with the highest rating possible.

In the area of theater, over 60 students have participated. As a result of our great success in competing in the oneact play Division II, we were forced to compete this year in Division I. We upset several large school powers to win the regional and go on to the state competition. We were named an alternate to the New England One-Act Play Festival. Enthusiasm and participation continue to grow.

In the area of athletics for the past two years, the boys' soccer team has won the Eastern Maine Championship and the golf team has finished first or second in the state each of the last three years. Postgraduate basketball has won the New England Prep School Tournament for the last two years. In 1999, nearly 80 percent of the graduating class will go onto college compared to 61 percent state wide and only 47 percent in Somerset County.

In schools across the country, there are many, many outstanding students. Some schools have outstanding academicians, others outstanding athletes, thespians, artists or musicians. At Maine Central Institute in the class of 1999, in addition to possessing many talented people, three individuals have been recognized nationally for their extraordinary performance.

Academically, Evan Sposato was recognized as a recipient of a National Merit Scholarship. Evan is the class valedictorian and will be attending Harvard in the fall.

In the area of fine arts, Mat Zarolinski, already mentioned for his vocal talents, will be joining "Up With People" an international tour group which selects the finest young musicians from the across the country. He will return the following year to study music in his college life.

DerMarr Johnson, a student at MCI who will be attending the University of Cincinnati in the fall, was named the Parade Magazine basketball player of the year.

It is rare enough for a single graduating class to have one student at this high level. We have three people recognized nationally for their outstanding performance in athletics, fine arts and academics this year.

Even more important than the achievement of these three people is the achievement of the 119 students who have completed their high school careers at Maine Central Institute. All of them possess extraordinary personal attributes. All are highly valued and important members of our student body. We are very proud of their achievements and wish them the best of luck.

In August, we will be celebrating our 133rd annual reunion as an institution. Anniversary classes this year are those ending in "4" and "9".

The Seven Habits of Highly Effective Schools

by Douglas C. Cummings, Head of School

In recent years, Stephen Covey's book, *The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People*, has created a great deal of dialogue concerning personal and professional growth. Having read the 7 Habits as well as a number of other Covey works, I find a very close parallel between the "7 habits of highly effective people" and effective schools. Covey defines a habit as "the intersection of knowledge, skill and desire. Knowledge is understanding what to do and why to do it, skill is knowing how to do it and desire is the motivation of wanting to do it." Covey also speaks in his writing of the "abundance mentality," meaning that you find reasons to succeed, not reasons to fail. A school with the knowledge, skills and desire that create an



abundance mentality will realize amazing growth and progress. Another critical concept found in Covey's writing is the "maturity continuum." He contends that as we all begin our lives as very dependent beings. Obviously, as infants we are very dependent creatures. The second stage is independence which seems to hit during the adolescent years. We come to believe that we do not need any assistance to be effective. The most mature level in the continuum is the point of understanding that we are all interdependent on one another. Effective schools recognize that to reach their maximum effectiveness the faculty, students, parents.

administrators, trustees, support staff and community must all work interdependently. The irony is that MCI is defined as an independent school. That could not be further from the truth. Any good school, whether it is governed publicly or privately, needs to clearly understand the interdependence of its constituencies. MCI is making gains on this maturity continuum and has actually grown significantly in recent years. Perhaps we should call ourselves an interdependent school reflecting what we truly want to be.

Effective people and organizations need a clear purpose ased on universal principles as well as personal values. The MCI mission statement speaks of a rigorous academic program. We say we are a caring and supportive place as well as a place where students become good problem-solvers, critical thinkers, global citizens and carry with them a social conscience. This is pretty universal to most schools. These are principles in the realm of education. MCI also has within our mission a number of values that are important to us but not

necessarily important to other schools. We feel strongly about being multicultural in nature. It is a value we cherish, but not necessarily a belief that all schools share, yet it is one we believe in strongly. We also believe in a comprehensive curriculum and that the mix between our large day population and residential population brings great advantages to MCI. According to Covey, these values are "self-chosen beliefs and ideals. They are internal in nature. They are subjective and they are based clearly on the world as we see it."

I find a very close parallel between the "7 habits of highly effective people" and effective schools.

Stephen Covey's seven habits build upon these points. He labels these habits of highly effective people as being proactive, beginning with the end in mind, putting first things first, thinking win-win, seeking first to understand then be understood, synergizing, and sharpening the saw. Being proactive is easier said than done! Within a school, there is an infinite number of human mood swings daily. There is great emotion; there are infinite circumstances resulting in situations viewed in different ways by different people all at the same time. In effective schools, the response to these situations must reflect the values and principles outlined in the mission and operating principles of the school. This provides the opportunity to be proactive in terms of how schools go about the process of decision-making and educating young people within the school setting.

The people associated with Maine Central Institute work very hard to do this. In all situations, they try to reflect upon and separate themselves from the moods, feelings and circumstances as they go about making decisions. Covey's second habit suggests always beginning with the end in mind. It is important that effective schools have a clear vision of what they want to be. Beginning with the end in mind always reverts to our school's mission, the bedrock from which all future visions evolve. At Maine Central Institute we have worked hard to be good strategic planners. By continually self-assessing as well as being proactive and wellgrounded in our beliefs we certainly can move forward as an educational institution. Covey's third habit, "putting first things first" flows very naturally from beginning with the end in mind. It simply means setting your priorities. These are

decisions that need to be made interdependently by all of the constituencies of the institution. It is important to understand the difference between issues which are urgent and issues which are important. Highly effective schools work hard to make decisions which are important but not urgent. But, as a parent, my children's issues are very important and very urgent. This is a difficult habit for schools to practice simply due to the nature of working with parents' most loved possession, their children.

Covey's fourth habit is "win-win." This is a complex concept but once understood and practiced, it pays great dividends for schools. Win-win simply put, means that when two different parties have different solutions to a common problem, they mutually discover a third solution which is better than either of the original solutions. It is a fact that two people or groups of people effectively working together can create solutions to problems that are better solutions than any one person can develop. In schools, this is essential. The perspective of solutions to problems is very different pending the vantage point from which you are working. Solutions for parents, students, teachers and administrators may all take on a very different look. Again, strong belief in the interdependency of all constituencies of the school is critical. By working together great solutions can be developed consistent with the school's mission. This is the ultimate key to creating a winwin decision. At MCI, we have also worked diligently to promote Covey's fifth habit, "seek first to understand and then be understood." We believe there can be tremendous growth on everyone's part at an educational institution when all parties first seek to understand others. Various parent groups, teacher and administrative teams as well as student groups have been developed to understand others thoughts and perceptions.

Habit six "to synergize" is defined by Covey as "the whole is greater than the sum of the parts." My best example of synergy at MCI involves our work in recent years in regard to athletics and the performing arts. Sports, drama and music have existed for a long time at MCI. They functioned almost independent of one another and at times were in conflict. Each group experienced minimal success and support. Today coaches, advisors and directors work in unison to allow as many students as possible to participate in as many activities as possible. There is tremendous overlap and participation. This year, the vocal jazz ensemble placed second in the state of Maine, the boys' soccer team won the Eastern Maine tournament, the one-act play cast won the regional title, the golf team placed second in the state and the postgraduate basketball team again won the New England championship--truly the whole was greater than the sum of the parts!

Covey's seventh habit is labeled, "sharpening the saw." In his book he refers to the woodsman at work. An observer notices that the woodsman is sawing frantically but making little progress. The observer said, "you know if you would stop and sharpen your saw, you would get more done." The woodsman responded, "I do not have time to stop and sharpen my saw. I have too much wood to cut." Sharpening the saw can be as simple as vacation, but at another level means time for the professional growth of the faculty. It means supporting the concept of school celebrations and campuswide coffees. Reflection and the ability to recharge are critical for effective schools. Being associated with Maine Central Institute means embracing the seven habits. We need to practice them and consciously think of them daily as we go about the very important work of helping all of our students learn to their maximum potential.

18th Annual Alumni and Friends Scramble
