

From the Headmaster

n a whirlwind of activities, the students, faculty and staff of Maine Central Institute have completed another school year. The year has flown by, and now we find ourselves pausing to reflect on the efforts made by parents, teachers, and all who are involved in the educational experience of MCI's students.

Congratulations to the 143 members of the class of 1943, MCI's newest alumni. This year, all of the postgraduate class and 60% of the senior class will matriculate to college or technical schools: another 4% have enlisted in the military. A record amount of nearly \$18,000 in scholarships was given at the postgrad and senior commencements. MCI extends sincere appreciation to the many businesses and individuals who made these scholarships possible.

I'm pleased to announce that, through the efforts of faculty and administrators, the Partridge Scholarship for incoming students was established and has been awarded to Martinique McNichol of Hartland, Maine. Martinique's parents are Stephen '73 and Loretta Young McNichol '74. Of the four scholarship finalists, three will be attending MCI

in the fall. In addition to the recipient, Russell Seward of Monmouth, Maine, and Nathan Rolley of Brooks, Maine, have enrolled at our school.

So much has happened in the final days of the '92-'93 school year. At a school assembly, at Senior Chapel, and at undergraduate awards ceremonies, many students were recognized by faculty and peers for their outstanding achievements. Similarly, our student/ athletes have received honors at sports awards programs. Juniors Courtney Cianchette (daughter of Thomas '71 and Bonita Cianchette) and Caroline Wright (daughter of Kenton '61 and Eileen McMann Wright '66) earned first and second place respectively in the Manson Essay Contest.

This year, MCI has worked closely with the local business community and with Maine School Administrative District #53. We maintain a strong partnership with the directors and educators of the district. In the realm of business, local companies including Birch Grove Nursing Care Center, Cianbro Corporation, C.M. Almy and Son, Edwards Company, Maine X-Ray, S.A.S., and Sebasticook Valley Nursing Home have opened their doors and have given our students firsthand

opportunities to learn about career options. Such cooperation in the community serves to benefit our students in many ways.

Professional development continues to be a priority at MCI. The tremendous amount of time and effort faculty and staff have invested in professional development have infused MCI's academic programs with new skills, knowledge and insight. Expansion of the LIFE Skills program to include health education and a pilot program in biology.

Among our alumni and friends, the spirit of volunteerism continues. A beautiful new deck is in place at J.W. Parks Golf Course, thanks to the efforts of Michael McGowan '57, Willard Lehr '42, Michael Fendler '70, John Beal, Galen Hart, Bernard McGowan, Maynard Ross '81, Randy Ross '77. What's Happening On Campus?

The students have left and the faculty has begun a well-deserved break. As other offices gear down, the Alumni and Development Offices are running on all cylinders!

The Alumni and Development Offices are situated together, not by chance but by design. To a great degree, there would be no "Development" without "Alumni." My associate, Director of Alumni Affairs Maria Connors, and I agree that, although MCI has many wonderful friends, the foundation on which we both build is MCI's alumni. (As much as I would enjoy seeing my office listed first, it is only proper that "Alumni" receives the lead!) On some projects we collaborate and on others we do our own thing. However, we always function as a team.

This issue of the Alumnus details the current events of the Alumni Office and the Association. Here's what's happening on campus as it relates to Development. Several months ago, MCI was approached by the Cianchette Family Recognition Committee. Chaired by Pete Vigue '65, the Committee's mission is to honor the Cianchette brothers for their service to the state, community and MCI. The Committee's plan is to renovate and restore the Cianchette family home (known as the Bryant House) and give MCI's alumni and friends a permanent home, the Alumni and Development Center.While you're attending the Reunion, please

visit your new home, the Alumni and Development Center in the renovated Cianchette House.

The funds for this project are from friends and business associates of the Cianchette family. No MCI money has been used or pledged. MCI is the ultimate beneficiary of the Cianchette recognition. We're excited about the efforts of the Cianchette Family Recognition Committee and about moving the Alumni and Development Office into a permanent facility. We know you'll share this excitement and pride when you stop by for a visit.

How about a little physical conditioning? Parks Gym's weight room is in need of reconditioning, from flooring to equipment. To honor the memory of their friend and football teammate, Ed Cianchette '50, a group of Ed's

MCI and UMaine teammates and Kappa Sigma Fraternity brothers have established the Ed Cianchette Memorial Fund to renovate the weight room and purchase new equipment. A golf tournament known as the Jigg's Open. to be held July 20th at J.W. Parks Golf Course, will spearhead the fund raising. Upon successful completion of their efforts, this area will be dedicated as the Ed Cianchette Memorial Weight Room. These men, so assembled, have several goals in mind. The goals of this group are, first and foremost, to keep alive the memory of a great friend and great football player, Ed Cianchette; to assist MCI in the renovation of this area; and to help MCI recruit football players through the boarding program.

The MCI Football Boosters have decided to light up the night with the installation of lights on the football field. This fund raising effort has been in place several years and now the Boosters have decided to step up the offense and cross the goal line. Under the leadership of Rusty Haynes '74, Paul Bertrand '59, and Norm Mitchell '68, the Boosters have mailed more than 1,000 letters to MCI football alumni, seeking support for the project.

These and other ongoing initiatives motivate the Development Office. The Office provides counsel, resources and enthusiasm; serves as a clearing house for information; and facilitates the efforts of dedicated volunteers.

Impressions of Russia

Our trip, which crowded days into hours, offered a view of Russia's past as well as a glimpse of major history in the making.

On our first evening we went to Red Square, which was being closed due to communist demonstrations. As we toured, we eventually arrived at the communist demonstration of a hundred or so teenage and elderly demonstrators.

Our guide was a former "pioneer" who had worked to build a communist nation. Our hotels were designed for the young communists. Our guide wished the coup had been successful. He felt that Yeltsin was selling the country to the west, much as he stated erroneously that Katherine the Great had sold Alaska to the United States.

Similar reactions to Yeltsin's programs but for more practical reasons were voiced by the teachers that I spoke with. They were very proud of their school which was in need of repairs and in which they were conducting double sessions. These teachers said they could not have afforded to teach without subsidies from their husbands. Some good

teachers had been forced to leave the school. A teacher's salary, due to runaway inflation, was now equivalent to approximately \$27.00 per month. The "Upper middle class" (professors, doctors, engineers, and scientists) lived in substandard flats and made about \$37.50 a month. They and their children tended to support the programs of Yeltsin which they hoped would eventually improve their positions. At the flat we visited, the parents were having trouble paying bills; in one instance, they were assisted by their son's blackmarket taxi service. The inflation had wiped out the savings of many.


On the streets, one saw elderly women begging. These were the pensioners who received less than \$10 per month and whose savings had also been wiped out. Even granting that one could buy enough meat for a meal for \$1.25, socks for \$.30, and vodka for \$2.00, there was a great deal of hardship.

The young college students saw in all this great opportunity. They were going to become rich and have the choice of many items. This choice, although still affordable for only a few, seemed to be the greatest achievement of post communist Russia.

We visited a Russian camera factory which was clean and quiet but inefficient. The first person on the assembly line had a wide variety of functions to do. The cameras were counted by girls at the front with an abacus. Even the space research center, with its computer, was low tech.

On the other hand we saw the ornate structures of the tsars, the statues of war heroes and workers, the revered Lenin and the cultural delights of the Bolshoi Ballet, the Moscow Circus, the Puskin Museum, the Armory, the great art in the Hermitage, the remarkable subways — a kaleidoscope of beauty.

Russia appears as a study in contrasts: a third world superpower trying to reach the twentieth century with the abacus; trying to substitute materialism for an ideal; seeking democracy through repression of opposing ideas; and seeking a viable past from communist and precommunist history.



SUSAN SMITH NORRIS '73


For Susan Norris, Maine Central Institute represents more than "the high school years." In her words, "MCI is in my blood."

Indeed, education is in her blood; the exposure to schools came early. Sue's parents, Roderic and Persis Smith, lived and worked at MCI, Rod serving as Athletic Director and Coach, and Persis, as MCI's Assistant Librarian. Sue's parents and two sisters, Judy Smith Chapman '64, and Sally Smith Bryant '61, lived on campus and were very much a part of the fibre of MCI life for many years.

When one is surrounded by such an environment as a child, certain values take hold. For Sue, those values centered on a love of the classroom and eventually, a love of teaching. As an MCI student, Sue involved herself in academics and many extracurricular activities. Later, she

earned a teaching degree from the University of Maine at Farmington, and for fifteen years, has worked in School Administrative District #53 as a second

grade teacher.



According to Sue, her work on these committees has allowed her to become involved in some of the exciting changes taking place in education today. Led by the national "America 2000" plan and Maine's Coalition of Essential Schools, the process of educational restructuring has taken root and is flourishing at MCI and in the local district. Sue has been at the forefront of this effort. As a member of S.A.D. #53's Steering Committee, Sue has worked with the kindergarten through grade four element of this very active group.

In her classroom, Susan Norris has instructed many future MCI alumni. She spoke of the changes in teaching that have transpired over the years. As a result of recent restructuring efforts, a pilot program which will offer children educational options — multi-year, multi-grade, or self-contained formats — will be introduced at S.A.D. #53 in the 1993-1994 school year. In the self-contained format, Sue will team-teach with colleague Judy St. Pierre. According to Sue, a teacher who has taught a long while may know "what works" in the classroom yet seek different approaches to teaching. Team-teachers can "re-charge" each other with creativity and enthusiasm.

Throughout her career, Sue has never relinquished her dediction to MCI. All who are associated with MCI can appreciate the many contributions Sue has made on behalf of the young people in her community.
