FROM THE HEADMASTER

As we enter a new decade, it's great to be able to report that the atmosphere at MCI is upbeat, as the school becomes more pro-active, and is moving toward many important longrange goals. I am optimistic that our school will continue to provide the most effective educational program possible for the young people and the communities which we serve.

In academics, we have experienced a very productive year. Much of this success is a result of the commitment of our faculty, support staff and my fellow administrators. They have dedicated themselves totally to the education of all students enrolled at MCI. The School Report Card published by the Department of Education indicates many strong points, of which we are very proud. Our Maine Educational Assessment scores have continued to soar above state averages and through the hard work of everyone involved, our dropout rate is now at a low of approximately 3%.

MCI's positive relationship with SAD #53 Directors and our new Superintendent of Schools, Terrance McCannell, has also proven to be a key factor in the recent growth of our school.

Under the capable leadership of President Dean Bither, Vice President Tom Wright '62, and Treasurer Paul Bertrand '59, the MCI Parents Association, currently in its infancy, is already providing a strong helping hand to our academic and extracurricular programs.

Our administrative team is now actively involved in a team-building program to further enhance their productivity as leaders of our institution.

Our professional staff is working diligently in the classroom. Their high level of professionalism and strong sense of pride have fostered even greater growth.

New programs initiated by our faculty have provided greater opportunities for students. A writing lab is now in place and working well. The development of a simulated office space in our business education department is also underway. Our faculty has just completed a thorough review of the academic curriculum. This written document addresses every course taught at Maine Central Institute. This school year, the New England Association of Schools and Colleges Self-Study has required a tremendous effort on the part of our entire professional staff. We will be well prepared for the visiting team from NEASC in September of

The Long-Range Planning Committee, under the capable leadership of Kester Heaton, has developed a series of educational goals for our school. These goals form the backbone of our long-range plan.

Along with our continued commitment to academics, we must never ignore the need to teach strong values at our school. Funding from Edwards Company and Seltzer & Rydholm provided sportsmanship t-shirts for every student attending our school.

Our Annual Giving Fund campaign this year has also been successful. We hope to generate nearly \$90,000 from alumni and friends; to reach our goal will require a great deal of energy between now and June. We are fortunate to have had outstanding support thus far. This year alone, over \$130,000 from the Annual Giving Fund and endowment income will be committed to our operating budget; all will be used for the betterment of educational programs offered to our students. This is just one small example of the tremendous value that our alumni and friends are to our school. Everyone's contribution, regardless of its size,

plays a vital part in providing strong educational opportunities to all students at Maine Central Institute.


The admissions process is well underway for the coming year. We are pleased to report that our inquiries are up significantly over last year; however, we are moving forward in a cautiously optimistic manner. We know that the New England boarding school market is slow and the slump in our economy will assuredly be a factor as we approach the coming year.

Senator Mitchell Visits MCI

On February 12, Senator George J. Mitchell was the guest speaker at an assembly of MCI students and faculty.

Headmaster Cummings greeted the group at the Monday morning assembly. Student Council President Rob Beattie '90 then introduced Senator Mitchell, the Democrat from Maine who holds the important position of Majority Leader of the United States Senate.

Senator Mitchell spoke briefly, and then opened up a question-and-answer session. The students were hesitant at first, but soon were firing specific questions on a variety of political and social issues.

The first question asked was about the Senator's plans to run for President ("... not in '92, but thank you for asking!"), followed by the abortion controversy, the end of the Soviet Union's single-party political system, U.S. support (economic and otherwise) for the Eastern Bloc countries, Nelson Mandela's

release from prison and its effect on U.S. economic sanctions against South Africa, and General Manuel Noriega's chances for a fair trial in this country.

In a synopsis of his views on recent political upheavals throughout the world, Senator Mitchell stated that "... while the Cold War appears to have ended, the trade war is heating up. The events in Eastern Europe and South Africa demonstrate the universal desire for economic and political freedom. We [the citizens of the United States] are losing our economic sovereignty." He proposed a "re-ordering of priorities" to "re-invest in health, education, research and development, and the repair of the infrastructure ... all the basics of a modern economy."

The assembly was Senator Mitchell's second visit to MCI in less than two years. The senator, along with Maine's Republican Senator William Cohen, was on campus on May 21, 1988 for the dedication of Wright Gymnasium.

W. HOWARD NIBLOCK 1913-1990

aine Central Institute and the Alumni Association note with sadness the passing of former Headmaster, longtime trusted advisor and friend W. Howard Niblock, on January 1, 1990, following a long illness.

Headmaster Niblock was born in Dorchester, Massachusetts, on May 4, 1913. He graduated from Bowdoin College in 1935, and obtained degrees in advanced studies from Nasson College, Harvard Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, and the Harvard School of Education. As an undergraduate, he served as president of Zeta Psi fraternity, president of the Student Council, senior class president, and captain of the track team. While at Bowdoin, he set regional and national records in track and field.

Interest in a career in education led him to teaching and guidance positions at Mount Hermon School, Beaver Country Day School, the University of Maine, Tufts University, and Boston University. From 1946 to 1956, he served MCI as Headmaster. From there, Headmaster Niblock went to Winchester High School in Massachusetts where he was principal from 1956 to 1970. From 1970 until his retirement in 1977, he worked as director of pupil services.

During his long career, Headmaster Niblock served as overseer of Bowdoin College, president of the Massachusetts Council for the Humanities, U.S. State Department delegate to schools in Eastern Europe and the Soviet Union, and president of the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. Headmaster Niblock was a member of the First Church of Newbury. He is survived by his wife, Marion (Gould) Niblock; two sons, William H. Niblock, Jr. and the Rev. Thomas R. Niblock; and several grandchildren. Another son, Edward, died in 1972.

The alumni and friends of Maine Central Institute have joined Headmaster Niblock's family and friends' tribute to his memory, by establishing the W. Howard Niblock Scholarship Fund for graduating seniors of Maine Central Institute.

MCI's Long-Range Plan

n the fall of 1988, a Long-Range Planning Committee was initiated by the Executive Committee of the Board of Trustees, and was given the responsibility of evaluating the present status and projected needs of MCI's educational process.

Members of the Committee are trustees, faculty, a student, and representatives of the local community. They include: Board President Alton Cianchette '48; Finance Committee head, Michael Fendler '70; Building and Grounds Committee head, Peter Vigue '65; Education Committee head, Louise Dow (a former trustee); Development Committee head, Gary Fitts '69; Admissions Committee head, Ted Susi '70; faculty members, Ron Bessey '62 and Tanya Kingsbury; Aaron Shorey '89; SAD #53 head, Thomas Wright '62; Kester Heaton (Committee head) and Bonnie Ross. Liaison members are Headmaster Douglas Cummings; Assistant Headmaster, Edward Hackett; and SAD #53 Superintendent, Terrance McCannell.

At its early meetings during 1989, the Committee concentrated on preparing a list of specific areas to be studied. The group then began an in-depth analysis of MCI's entire educational program, and devised a long-range educational plan to meet the school's needs. The plan includes specific goals, action plans, and time lines, as well as several philosophic goals. Some of the Committee's specific goals are:

- to develop a written academic curriculum for all MCI courses by 1990 (completed February 1, 1990);
- to evaluate the postgraduate curriculum in order to ensure its productivity and efficacy;
- to plan, update, and supply necessary equipment in the science department;
- · to move the music program to a more centralized facility on campus;
- · to teach study skills to all students early in their high school experience;
- to provide effective guidance services to all students and to hire an additional one-half time counselor for postgraduate placement;
- to provide the necessary computer capabilities in the areas of science, industrial arts, business, home economics, computer lab;
- · to provide appropriate class composition;
- to raise the salaries of the professional staff to be competitive with other schools (the Board of Trustees has committed to a five-year program to address this issue).

The Building and Grounds Committee has begun a long-range study of MCI's physical plant. Projected major construction projects are: renovation of Cianchette Hall of Science, construction of a new vocational education building, and restoration/renovation of Founders Hall. Other areas of emphasis include: conformity to health and safety codes, energy efficiency, handicap accessibility, and specific schedules for overall campus upkeep. The group has also committed to a removal plan for "asbestos containing building materials" (ACBM), underground fuel tanks, and hazardous chemicals.

The Finance Committee has addressed the areas of endowment management, plant and operations budget coordination, and improved financial planning.

The Development Committee is in the process of determining its goals. Specific long-range development goals will evolve from the final analyses of the Building and Grounds Committee. Discussions to date have centered on alumni and development office staffing, annual giving, planned giving, endowment, and the potential for a major capital campaign to fund building projects.

The Long-Range Planning Committee will continue to work throughout this school year, and will present a final report to the full Board of Trustees at its annual business meeting in June.



hanks to the generosity of the MCI Alumni Association, Cianbro Corporation, Edwards Company, and the Lehr Insurance Agency, a computerized writing lab is now in operation.

The writing lab consists of four personal computers equipped with word processing programs. A work area in Powell Memorial Library was made available to house the writing lab, and all students can use the facility on a first-come, first-served basis.

According to English Department head, Rosalie Williams, students identified as those who might benefit the most from using the new computers are given two lab assignments per week. Their assignments are the same as those given to other English students. By helping students to better organize their thoughts, the computer lab aids greatly in improving writing skills. English instructor Anne Kaan, who works closely with many of the students, has noted a distinct improvement in students who have little past success with writing assignments.



One day this winter, Patarasak Penparkkul '90 enthralled kindergarten students at Burnham School with stories about his native Thailand. "Pat" came to MCI last year as a junior, placed through the Royal Thai Embassy. His parents, who are restaurant-owners in Thailand, have sent Pat to the United States to learn fluent English, to become familiar with American culture and customs, and to learn self-sufficiency. He plans to attend college in the Boston area and hopes to visit MCI, his American bome, again in the future.

Alumni and friends of MCI, feel proud! The hundreds of individuals who have given their support to the 1989-1990 Annual Giving Fund deserve sincere thanks for the effort they've made on behalf of MCI. 

Jean Hammond Watts '68





ith a husband, four children, a full time teaching career, and graduate work toward a masters' degree in education, is there any time at all left in Jean Hammond Watts' life?

Amazingly, this very busy woman is also a cartoonist, whose first book, *In Search of Perspective*, released in November, 1989, is gaining national recognition.

Jean's book, published by Ohio Psychology Press, uses cartoons to comment on the subject of gifted and talented students. Aimed at teachers and parents who are interested in this area of education, *In Search of Perspective* presents subtle commentary on the trials and tribulations of the gifted child's world. The cartoons are humorous and honest in their approach to children, parenting, and teaching.

After graduation from MCI, Jean completed her degree in psychology and worked for a short time in counseling. Becoming a mother motivated Jean to pursue a career in education.

Jean "confessed" to starting her cartooning career while at MCI, by drawing in her notebooks. Many years later, Jean used cartooning during educational workshops to simplify the information presented. It was at a gifted/talented educational seminar at Bowdoin College that Jean's professor saw her cartoons and suggested that she compile them into a published form. With that, *In Search of Perspective* was born, and Jean now has another book in the works.

The popularity of Jean's first book among professionals in the gifted/ talented field has led her to the lecture circuit. Jean is now traveling nationwide, speaking at conferences and seminars. She was a recent guest speaker in Cincinnati at a major conference for the National Association for Gifted Children.

Her success as a cartoonist has opened doors for Jean. She is still somewhat overwhelmed by the new career. Even with a hectic schedule at home, the development of her teaching experience, and her exciting new role as a published cartoonist, Jean fondly remembers MCI, and hopes in the future to devote time once again to being a class agent. We admire Jean's accomplishments, and wish her continued success.

The MCI Rifle Team: A Proud Past

n 1957, MCI's fledgling rifle team was chartered by the National Rifle Association. Separate boys' and girls' squads were coached by Norval "Bud" Lewis, and, in 1958, by the late Frank Haseltine and Mort Remick. Also in 1957, young Blake Bartlett, in his second year of teaching, joined Mr. Haseltine and other faculty advisors to assist in coaching the young men and women who would set standards of excellence for MCI's future teams.

After 33 years of national recognition, today the MCI rifle team is thriving, despite the changes in society's attitudes toward the sport of riflery and the ownership of guns. Inspired by the dedication of the multi-talented Frank Haseltine, who for many years was the sustaining element in the team's success, Blake has continued to coach and guide young people to develop their skills, and "practice, practice, practice" the technical, disciplined sport of target shooting. In

addition to his work with the rifle team, Blake's association with MCI has been as a long-time faculty member, husband of alumna Sonia Call Bartlett '55 and father of Shanna '83, Aaron '86, and Jason '90. Blake is presently a member of the MCI Board of Trustees.

Governed by stringent NRA requirements and subject to the regulations of the Division of Civilian Marksmanship of the U.S. Army Department of Defense, MCI today has one of the best equipped rifle teams in the state. Each freshman is assigned a rifle and is responsible for its care and maintenance. The team has two coed squads: the four-position rifle team, and the prone team. In February, the four-position team stood undefeated at 8-0 in a 10-meet season in the Pine Tree State Postal League, Division I, and at 3-0 in a 4-meet season in the Central Maine Rifle League. The school regularly competes with Class A schools throughout New England, as a team and one-on-one with other shooters.

The rifle team is a varsity sport. Abiding by winter sports rules, its season is a long one, beginning in early November and ending in mid-March. In this sport, stars are not born; they are made through a combination of talent, discipline, practice, and coaching. Team members practice every day after school. Since its start 33 years ago, the rifle team has had strong participation from both young men and women.

Success on the rifle team is hard earned, for target shooting requires skill and persistence. Shooters compete against themselves. There isn't a great amount of recognition or glory, yet these young men and women make tremendous achievements. For some, commitment to the rifle team has kept them in school. Blake credits the late Coach Frank Haseltine with giving many youngsters the courage and confidence to persevere, to set goals, to work toward them, and to succeed.

FALL SPORTS

The Fall athletic teams had strong showings during 1989. Undergraduate teams were led by Girls Soccer, which sported a 11-3 regular season record and won the Eastern Maine Championship by defeating Orono and Houlton. The team was defeated 2-1 by Fryeburg Academy in a hard fought contest for the State Class B Championship. Sue Petela '90 received the Waterville Sentinel's Outstanding Player Award for her performance during the year. Carl Jones was voted Class B "Coach of the Year" by the Sentinel.

Field Hockey and Boys Soccer both had solid seasons. Field Hockey, coached by Sally Burry, made the Eastern Maine Tournament in the number eight position. They lost the first round contest to top seeded Orono. Boys Soccer, coached by Chris Dionne '85. also made the Eastern Maine Tournament and lost to Camden/Rockport in the first round.

Undergraduate Football had an improved year under new coach Doug Ferguson. They went 3 and 5, defeating Boothbay, Oak Hill, and John Bapst. They lost to Madison, Dirigo, Jay, Dexter and Mattanawcook Academy. Prospects for the future look good with a strong nucleus of underclassmen returning.

Cross Country and Golf both fielded complete teams for the first time in several seasons. Both groups had rosters made up primarily of underclassmen, and should show improvement in 1990.

The Fall Cheering Squad also had an excellent season under coach Tanya Kingsbury.

Postgraduate Football, coached by Lee Sibley, had an exceptional season. The team finished its all-college JV schedule 6-3. Included in the six wins were convincing victories over Division 1-AA Rhode Island and Division II Springfield. Division III teams beaten by MCI were Mass. Maritime, Colby, Plymouth State, and Norwich.

WINTER SPORTS

The Winter season saw bigger and better things for Husky athletics. As the *Alumnus* goes to press, there's one undefeated team at MCI. The Postgraduate I basketball team, coached by Max Good '61, ended a fantastic 24-0 season by claiming the 1990 New England Class A Prep School basketball championship, in a win over Brewster Academy on March 3. The Girls Varsity basketball team, coached by Julie Treadwell, entered the Eastern Maine Tournament at 18-0, won the quarter-final against Ellsworth, then lost the semi-final round to Hermon.

The Ski team won the Penquis League Championship and at press time was competing in the State Class B Championships at Saddleback.

Wrestling finished as a runner-up to Dirigo in the State Class C match at Mattanawcook. Roland Richardson '90, Eric Kennedy '91 and Matt Landry '91 were state champions.

The Postgraduate II Basketball team under Carl Jones has only one loss at this point in its season. Victory in the MCI Invitational Tournament concluded their successful season.

The Boys' Undergrad Basketball team finished with two wins, the final one over top-ranked Mattanawcook. Both JV and Freshmen had exceptional records. The JV's were 16-2 and the Freshmen were 15-3. The Frosh under Chris Dionne reached the semi-finals of the Eastern Maine Freshman League Tournament before being eliminated.

The Rifle team members are just starting their competition and have two wins over Bangor and one win over Brewer in the Central Maine Rifle League. In the Postal League, they are currently undefeated. Coach Blake Bartlett expects to have another strong team in 1990.

Finally, the Varsity and JV Winter Cheerleading Squad has done a fine job supporting all undergraduate basketball squads. They joined the Girls team at the Eastern Maine Tournament.


