An Event to Remember

For most of the past decade, the Wright family and many other alumni closely involved with MCI have worked to build a new gymnasium. This project, dear to the late Clifford Wright ('38), was the longest and largest capital campaign in the 122-year history of MCI. With his brothers, the late Neil Wright ('48) and Carl Wright ('43), Cliff led the campaign to build what is today one of the finest secondary school athletic facilities in the state.

To say "thank you" to all who took part in this effort, MCI designated May 21st as the date for the official opening and dedication of the Wright Gymnasium. Weeks of planning and preparation resulted in a dedication ceremony that reflected feelings of pride and loyalty toward MCI.

The day's schedule of events included an Open House on campus with students serving as tour guides, the unveiling of a portrait of the Wright family, the 11 a.m. ribbon-cutting ceremony conducted by Headmaster Cummings and Board of Trustees President Alton Cianchette, a buffet luncheon, and an early evening social hour and banquet.

More than 300 alumni and friends gathered in the gym for a sit-down dinner catered by Richard McCorkill and his Food Service staff. Trees adorned with twinkling white lights, floral centerpieces and an orchestra lent a festive air to the occasion.

Guest speakers at the banquet were Maine's senators William S. Cohen and George J. Mitchell, who exchanged some friendly bantering and expressed fond reminiscences. Senator Cohen spoke of his basketball career in high school and

college, citing the value of the sport to develop discipline and character. Senator Mitchell told of a personal commitment to excel, spurred on by his older brother's prowess on the basketball court. Both senators congratulated MCI and the Wright family for the outstanding addition to the campus.

A chair bearing the MCI seal was given to Steve Seekins ('66), construction manager for the gym, in recognition of his cost-efficient management of the project. Steve in turn praised area contractors and suppliers who worked cooperatively to provide in-kind donations and discounted prices on building materials.

Carl Wright entertained MCI's guests with humorous anecdotes about his early basketball days. He highlighted the program with the presentation of the first annual Wright Service Award to an anonymous recipient.

At Carl's suggestion, President "Chuck" Cianchette led the audience in singing "God Bless America," a song befitting the mood of the evening. Guests left the banquet with optimistic views of MCI and the great educational opportunity the school affords its students.

Wright Service Award

The first annual Wright Service Award was presented by Carl Wright on May 21, 1988, at the conclusion of dedication ceremonies for the Wright Gymnasium.

Named in honor of the Perley A. Wright family, the award was established to honor those individuals who, through personal achievement and service to Maine Central Institute, exemplify the goals of an MCI education. The qualities of loyalty, commitment and good citizenship are those which MCI fosters in its education of young men and women.

The first recipient of the Wright Service Award has chosen to remain anonymous. Each year, a new recipient will be selected; presentation of the award will take place at a special ceremony in the spring.

Postgraduate Commencement

Graduation exercises for MCI's 1988 postgraduate students were held on April 15 in the Wright Gymnasium.

Dr. Kevin White, Athletic Director of the University of Maine, was guest speaker. White quoted the late Vince Lombardi, saying that "Winning is a habit," and urged the graduates to strive to win in every endeavor.

Valedictorian Daniel Murphy, salutatorian Douglas Newbert and honor essayist Richard Sherry each addressed the audience. Roxanne Burchell gave the opening prayer and benediction.

Headmaster Douglas Cummings presented awards; winner of the 1988 Challenge Cup was Richard Sherry. Diplomas were presented to the students by Board of Trustees Treasurer Michael Fendler.

The MCI Concert Band provided music for the ceremony.

The tremendous success of the banquet can be attributed to Richie's careful planning and organizational skill.

Despite their hectic work schedules.

the McCorkills find time to pursue a common interest. As owner-managers of Tamarack Kennels, they train English Setters and Labrador Retreivers as hunting dogs. Richie, an eight-year veteran of the local police force, is an avid bird and game hunter.

What makes MCI special for the McCorkills? "The kids!" Richie commented. Having the opportunity to help student employees learn the ethics and discipline of the workplace adds to their education, and is a rewarding experience for Richie and June. MCI is indeed fortunate to have these dedicated professionals as members of its staff.

Grant to Preserve Founders Hall

Headmaster Cummings recently announced that MCI will receive a \$26,000 matching grant from the Maine Historic Preservation Commission. The grant will allow MCI to begin an architectural analysis and plan to modernize and restore Founders Hall. Familiar to older alumni as the "Institute" building, Founders Hall was at one time the only classroom facility on campus, housing historic Powers Auditorium, classrooms and administrative offices. Founders Hall is the oldest building on the MCI campus

and the most prominent of several historic buildings in the Pittsfield area.

Preliminary work on the Founders Hall project began this summer; the target date for completion of architects' plans is late fall, 1988.

Graduation

87 members of the Class of 1988 received diplomas at a ceremony on the front campus Sunday, June 5th.

Senior Chapel was held Friday, June 3rd in the Wright Gym, with the traditional Senior Banquet held that evening in Rowe Dining Hall. The Prom took place on Saturday evening at J.W. Parks Golf

Course, and Baccalaureate on Sunday morning on the front campus. Assistant Headmaster John Slagle was the guest speaker.

Honor parts for the Class of 1988 were: Alan Shorey, valedictorian; Heather Inman, salutatorian; Donna Deckert, first honor essayist; Jennifer Dahlgren, second honor essayist; and Paul Pietranico, third honor essayist.

Headmaster Cummings addressed the students, their families and friends, and presented awards and scholarships. Board of Trustees President Alton Cianchette presented diplomas to the happy, proud group of young graduates.

University; first honor essayist Donna Decker, University of Hartford; second honor essayist Jennifer Dahlgren, University of Maine at Farmington; third honor essayist Paul Pietranco, Stanford University. Thirty-four seniors have been accepted to schools in Maine; more than 50% of the senior class will enroll in post-secondary schools.

Special thanks to to senior class advisors Karen ('74) and Douglas Carville, and Dora Miles ('68) for the planning and set-up of graduation ceremonies, and to Daryl Shafer for her help in organizing Project Graduation.

Our postgraduate commencement in April was the first graduation held in Wright Gym. There was a large attendance of parents, faculty, trustees, students and townspeople. Kevin White, University of Maine Athletic Director, was guest speaker; valedictorian Daniel Murphy and salutatorian Douglas Newbert made presentations. Most of the 46 graduates have been accepted to colleges.

The second annual Awards Assembly for Underclassmen was held on June 2nd. Students were recognized for excellence in scholastic achievement, service and leadership. The program was coordinated by English Department head Rosalie Williams.

With the award of a \$26,000 grant to MCI from the Maine Historic Preservation Commission, we're off and running on the Founders Hall restoration project. John Weinrich of Moore-Weinrich & Woodward Architects anticipates completion of plans by late Fall. I'd like to acknowledge Timothy Wilson and Maria Connors for their help in preparing the grant application.

Alumni Profile

Dom LaChance

A biography of J. Dominique LaChance ('31) was published in the November, 1983 issue of the Alumnus magazine. When he was approached this past spring to be the subject of an Alumni Profile, he at first refused. After a bit of persuasion, he consented to sit for a photo and talk about his alma mater.

In the five years since we last read about Dom, this active alumnus has logged many more miles in quest of student recruits for MCI. Despite a stroke and heart problems during the past year, Dom has kept the promise he made 57 years ago to Roy Sinclair; he has "filled his bed" with students every year. That's quite an accomplishment, one that makes Dom unique among MCI's alumni. There have been few alumni in the school's history who have been as loyal or as genuinely committed to MCI as this friendly, kindhearted gentleman.

Dom lives in Bangor, in the house which he and his beloved Ruthie (the late Ruth Webber LaChance '32) called home for many years. From there he travels to Pittsfield and the MCI campus frequently; as a member of the Alumni Association Executive Committee, he regularly attends its monthly meetings. Dom's interest in MCI is strong; having seen the school through good and bad times, he

remains confident that MCI's future will be bright and prosperous.

Dom's latest project is overseeing the creation of a permanent plaque honoring MCI's Hall of Fame charter members and inductees. Established in 1983, the Hall of Fame honors those individuals who have provided exemplary service to MCI. For his untiring efforts on behalf of the school, Dom was named as the first charter member of the Hall of Fame. Michael Fendler ('70) is working with Dom to finish the plaque in time for the August Alumni Reunion. The Hall of Fame plaque will be placed permanently at the school, with the names of two new inductees added each year at Reunion.

Dom's love for Ruth, family and home, the diligence he's shown in his 20-year career in the Maine State Police, and that deep commitment to MCI all serve as an inspiration to young people. Dom's own words best describe his feelings toward MCI:

"I owe everything I have in this world to MCI. It was here that I met my Ruthie and finally located her in Bangor. We dated for about a year, were married, and dated for 45 years more before I lost her. We have six nice young ones, all married and gone. They brought us ten wonderful grandchildren; I'm expecting another



one in August.

Of the faculty here when Ruth and I attended MCI, only two members remain: Myrtle Main Sherman and Alice Sinclair. I've kept in touch with them through the years.

I still get around, recruiting boys for MCI. For the coming year, I have two candidates from Bangor, one from Brewer, and possibly some from Massachusetts. If the Good Lord is willing, and if my health holds out, I'll continue to keep my promise."


