On May 21, Maine Central Institute will formally dedicate the Wright Gymnasium. The building opened for use on November 23, 1987, for the start of MCI's 1987–88 boys' postgraduate basketball season. Cosmetic touches and work on the building's ventilation system were finished in early April. With completion of construction, MCI has ended the longest and largest capital campaign in its history, and has begun an exciting new era of athletic educational opportunity.



MCI Offers Advanced Placement

MCI students are currently enrolled in Advanced Placement (AP) courses in Biology, Calculus, Physics, American History, and English. Students who score well in Advanced Placement tests given at the end of a yearlong course are exempt from or credited for one or more college courses; thus they are able to move on to advanced level courses as college freshmen. A student graduating from MCI could enter college having earned fifteen college credits.

Last year, twenty-two of eightyeight students in the senior class were enrolled in AP English. With "five" being the maximum grade, these students achieved an average of "three." In schools where the enrollment is 200 or more, fifteen is considered to be a "good" enrollment in AP English and "three" an acceptable average in the test scores. MCI's enrollment is 25% of the senior class. The class average of "three" in the testing is a tribute to those students involved. Amy Smith ('87) achieved a score of "four," receiving six credits at the University of Maine at Orono. Barbara Pomeroy ('87) achieved the maximum test score, a "five," receiving six credits at Colby. MCI paid more than \$1,000 for the students' exam fees to get the AP program started. The 1986–1987 pilot program served as a guide for establishing other AP curricula. Currently, there are sixteen English students enrolled in this year's program.

Twelve students are presently enrolled in the Advanced Placement Biology program. Instructor Joseph Veilleux commented that this first year is one of trial and assessment, as he attempts to design a comprehensive course of study.

The AP Calculus course is an

intensive review of pre-calculus mathematics, followed by studies of differential and integral calculus.

The AP Physics course delves into both the philosophy and the history of scientific thought. The course covers the major topics of physics: mechanics, heat, electrical and magnetic phenomena, wave motion and optics.


The initiation of an Honors Program in Spanish will result in a group of students taking an AP test in Spanish in 1991. The four-year sequence begins with a year of Latin and is followed by three years of intensive instruction in oral and written Spanish.

In regard to our current offering of AP courses, Assistant Headmaster John Slagle notes: "AP courses demand collegiate level teachers; our AP offerings are evidence of the level of preparation and classroom teaching at MCI."

"I sometimes feel as though I've never left MCI," said Steve Seekins as he looked from his trailer office window to the snow-laden Wright Gymnasium.

Since his graduation in 1966, Steve has indeed kept strong ties to MCI. His two-year assignment as manager of the Wright Gym building project caps a long professional and personal association with MCI.

After graduation, Steve attended Beal College, then went to work as office manager of a loan company, a position he held for five years. For six years after that he was self-employed as a residential housing builder; he then began employment as a carpenter with Cianbro Corporation.

On-the-job training and a talent for finding cost-efficient construction methods helped Steve to advance to a supervisory position. He managed several major building projects, including construction of the Cianbro headquarters in Pittsfield. In 1983 he came back to the MCI campus to supervise the two-year renovation of Weymouth Hall.


Steve was then given the job of project

manager for the Wright Gym building project, "on loan" from Cianbro. Steve's work was completed this spring, and he looks back on the job with considerable pride and satisfaction. Through MCI's acting as its own general contractor, Steve's careful management and selection of bidders, and the generosity of inkind donors, the school saved approximately \$270,000 on construction costs. The facility today exceeds original specifications in the quality of its construction.

Several "work parties" organized by Steve over the last two years have resulted in thousands of dollars saved, and have brought together alumni and friends in shows of support for MCI. Steve's hard work and the donations of money, labor, and resources from alumni and others have paid off; MCI now has a superior facility for athletic training.

Steve's work on the building of Wright Gym has been personally rewarding; MCI has played an important role in the lives of his wife, Brenda Thompson Seekins ('67), daughter Stephanie Floyd

Faculty Profile

ROSALIE WILLIAMS

The head of the English Department is a lady with a sense of professionalism in her manner and a gentle kindness in her smile. Rosalie Williams is a mother who feels toward her students as a mother would feel. She speaks highly of MCI: "... a parent wants the best for a child. MCI has met the needs of my two very different children. A faculty with concern for the personal and intellectual growth of the student makes MCI outstanding."

Rosalie came to MCI ten years ago with extensive experience in the field of education. A Maine native and graduate of Bates College, Rosalie began her teaching career in Massachusetts. While her husband Peter attended Northern Michigan University, Rosalie taught at the Gwinn School in upper Michigan. From 1963 to 1965, Rosalie and Peter served in the Peace Corps, teaching English, science and math at a secondary boys' school in Sierra Leone, West Africa. Upon completion of their service abroad, the couple trained Peace Corps volunteers at Roosevelt University in Chicago. Despite the demands of a busy schedule, Rosalie has found time over the years to devote attention to her special interest, helping students to develop their writing skills. Sports MCI PREP CHAMPS

AGAIN!

The MCI postgraduate basketball team, coached by Paul Pellicani, won the 1988 New England Class A Prep Basketball Championship with a 105-92 victory over St. Thomas More of Connecticut. MCI advanced to the championship game by defeating New Hampton Academy (New Hampshire) 92-83 in the semi-final on February 27. This is the postgraduate team's third New England Basketball Championship since 1980.

Karlton Hines ('89) from Bronx, New York, was named MVP, amassing 62 points, 21 rebounds, and 17 assists during the semi-final and championship rounds.

In other basketball news, two MCI alumni were featured in the February 15, 1988 issue of Eastern Basketball Magazine. The cover story on the top guard tandems in the east ranked Jamie Benton ('84) third along with his Boston College teammate Dana Barros. The pair was ranked ahead of such guards as Kenny Wilson of Villanova, Sherman Douglas of Syracuse, and Jeff Lebo of North Carolina. Jeff Timberlake ('85) and Dredrike Irving of ECAC North Conference leader Boston University was ranked as the tenth best guard pair. Timberlake was second in the conference, with 7.5 assists per game.

Two MCI players will be in All-American Games this spring: Tony Lucas ('88) and David Johnson ('88) will both play in Louisville in the Kentucky Derby Classic. Dave will also play in the Dapper Dan Games in Pittsbrugh.

Nominations for McDonald's All-American Team this year include Tony Lucas ('88), Kendrick Hamilton ('88) and David Johnson ('88). Last year, four MCI players were nominated to this national list, with Perry Carter ('87) being selected to the First Team McDonald's All-American game. The game was televised nationally, live on ABC-TV.
