



MCI Energy Project Results Show Vast Savings

As the end of the 1980-81 year approaches, we are also in a position to report on the Energy Campaign which was initiated in January 1980. I think that all alumni would be interested in knowing the results of our efforts to date and can take pride in the leadership of the Board of Trustees in this very important area. Special thanks go to Elmer Leonard, who spent hours doing energy audits of our major buildings and setting priorities for our improvements. Also, to Cliff Wright, who was primarily responsible for raising money from the trustees to get the capital for the improvements and who also has, this year as Chairman of Buildings and Grounds, spent much time helping us secure the best prices possible for the work done. Harvey Wilson, Head of Maintenance at MCI, should also be singled out for special recognition for his expert management of our very complicated physical plant. To these people, as well as many others, MCI owes a great debt as the following statistics will show.

The accompanying charts show that in the past 18 months we have reduced consumption of #2 fuel oil from the base year figure of 117,717 gallons in 1978-79 to the 1980-81 figure of 66,957 gallons. The total reduction in gallons the last two heating seasons represents 80,780 gallons against a capital expenditure of \$38,307. If we represent oil at an average of \$1.00 per gallon our pay back period was 1.1 year and we have already realized a savings of \$42,473 after expenditures. Every year from now on

will represent additional savings.

Our goal for 1982-83 is a consumption of 54,000 gallons, which we believe represents in an average year the absolute

minimum for the number of buildings which we maintain.

A goodly portion of the savings in oil consumption is also the result of an extremely conscientious faculty and staff and student body who are constantly checking thermostats and making certain that windows are closed and doors shut. Conservation is the work of everyone at MCI.

Dean Harry Rowe

Maine Central Institute was saddened to learn of the passing of Harry Willison Rowe '06 on December 23, 1980, at the age of 93. Mr. Rowe's life was devoted to education, and he played a major part in the history of MCI.


Mr. Rowe was President of the Board of Trustees of MCI from 1924 until 1969. During his tenure as President of the Board, the school grew from three to eighteen buildings, and the faculty increased from 9 to 41. Today, one of the campus dormitories bears his name as a token of the many services which he performed on behalf of MCI.

Mr. Rowe was College Historian and Dean of the Faculty at Bates College in Lewiston, Maine and had been active in college affairs since his retirement. A memorial service was held Sunday, December 28 at the Bates College Chapel. A delegation from the MCI family including Headmaster Richard C. Walker, former Headmaster and current Trustee Edward R. Stanley, Trustee James Randall and retired English Department Chairman Norval Lewis attended the services.

Dean Rowe's thoughts were often with MCI. In his last communication with the school, a letter dated April 18, 1980 to Headmaster Walker, he shared these memories:

My connection with the School dates back to the year 1900 when I came to Pittsfield to become a chore-boy in a family which ran a boarding-house for M.C.I. students in a building located on the site of Alumni Hall. I have never been able to pay the debt which I owe the School and its teachers who became my second parents and not to be forgotten guides. I congratulate you upon the opportunity which you have to perform a similar service for the students of your day.

Chipman '53 Named Model Teacher

The MCI community was impressed by the fitness of the tribute when in October (1980) Sarah Chipman '53 was named Maine Teacher of the Year. The announcement was made by Commissioner of the Maine Department of Educational and Cultural Services Harold Raynolds, Jr. at an assembly of the Dexter Regional High School, where she has since 1971 taught English and is Chairman of the English Department. The place of the announcement was especially fitting, as it was her fellow teachers who had nominated her.

"Chip," as she has been known at least since her MCI days, was chosen for the honor among some 13,500 Maine teachers by a panel representing professional and state education organizations.

Just as she has been a strong influence on her students, she credits three MCI teachers as having been profound influences on her development and on her choice of teaching as a career. She named Mrs. Hazel Earle, Nellie Mac-Dougal, and Maurice Earle, who had taught her Latin, English and history but who had, even more importantly, firmed up her decision to become a teacher. Their influence on her was the same kind of influence that all great teachers have on their students: not only their clear mastery of their subject but most of all their clear desire to help youngsters develop and the consequent respect that these teachers engendered.

In comments made at the Dexter High School assembly, perhaps the most telling description of her was as "Truly a model teacher and a loved and respected friend." We are most proud indeed of Sarah Chipman, Alumna since 1953 and Trustee since 1976.

MCI Salutes...

Ingenuity, Expertise, and Ambition - an unbeatable combination of ingredients which, when put together, add up to Success, or so it seems in the case of one Paul S. Pennisi, MCI class of 1968. Recently your Alumni Director enjoyed a visit with Paul at his place of business on Forest Avenue in Portland - appropriately named "Canine-Kitty Coiffures." There one finds Paul, owner, manager, instructor, capably wearing all three of the abovementioned hats. On one table a black poodle is being trimmed with a fancy coiffure, "The Royal Dutch Cut," on another table an already-clipped white poodle is being "blown and fluffed" to the desired point of doneness, and nearby a full-grown basset hound stands patiently in a bathtub and bestows a mournful look upon the young lady who scrubs him. In the next room, in cages nervously awaiting their turns to be groomed, are assorted dogs and cats; in addition, there are some canine and feline boarders who are spending their owners' vacations at Paul's shop. Very much at ease and in control of this operation, Paul dashes from place to place assisting with a coiffure, soothing an apprehensive pet, giving a word of encouragement to one of his workers, or dealing with a customer. When asked, "How did you, from MCI class of 1968, arrive at this point?" Paul very graciously took time to tell me his story.

Paul Pennisi spent his postgraduate year at MCI as a resident of Weymouth Hall. His memories of MCI are highly positive - "I loved MCI - the only year in my life when I can say I loved school," he says. The tales of life in Weymouth were entertaining to the point of hilarity. For example - in the fall of 1967 there was no official postgraduate football team. However, an unofficial team was formed for the express purpose of scrimmaging, and thus strengthening, a discouraged varsity. This team, known as the "Dirty Dozen" and led by co-captains Pennisi and Scott Maurer, worked out daily with the Huskies. They had the blessings of Coach Normand Trottier, who wanted the Dozen to "make it tough" for the varsity. The reward for all this effort came on the glorious day when

MCI broke its losing streak by defeating Hyde School 13-12. Pennisi's memories of that day include frantic cheering on the sidelines as the Huskies held Hyde on MCI's third-yard line through four touchdown attempts, a long scoring run by Alex Luria '69, and a victory hug by a jubilant Pat Patterson '68 which resulted in a chipped tooth for Paul! It is told that the bell atop Founders Hall rang for over two hours that day! Paul was known as "Eight Ball" (another great story) in those days and was famous for being able to eat horrendous portions of food - especially if there were bets being wagered as to his amazing capacity.

In the fall following graduation from MCI, an academically fit Paul Pennisi entered St. Anselm's College in New Hampshire. When he finished there, Paul returned to his hometown of Portland to work for a finance company. He did not relish this job and relates that he always had his eye out for an idea that would work. It came to him after awhile that there was no place where pet lovers could take their dogs and cats to be groomed in a situation exclusive of veterinary services. He had then discovered THE idea. In a matter of weeks afrer that, Paul had located a doggrooming school in New York City and enrolled in it. Upon completion of the course of study there, Paul returned to Portland ready and able to establish a business which has grown and is still growing.

The story does not end here. In addition to the services offered at the shop, Paul also runs his own grooming school there, training his students in all phases of his business and requiring 300 hours of internship before they leave the school. Moreover, he operates a boarding kennel on the premises at the same time. Because Paul sees a great need for the kind of services that he offers, he is not content to provide only grooming and boarding facilities and training for his future competition but he recently even designed and begun to manufacture a Portable Dog Grooming Shop to allow owners to be able to perform a fairly professional job of caring for their own animals. Paul draws the line at veterinary services at Canine-Kitty Coiffures: a prominent sign in the

waiting room avows that all pets must have had the required shots in order to be admitted. It is truly a business that is off and running — it is obvious that here a service is being performed that is greatly appreciated by the patrons of the shop.

Paul is now married and is a very proud family man. His wife attends the University of Maine. His eleven-year old son is deeply involved in hockey and is considered to be the top goalie in the area. His daughter, a fine young pianist, is her brother's most avid fan. In fact, the entire Pennisi family supports ice hockey to the utmost and spends many enjoyable hours following the Youth Hockey program in Maine and elsewhere.

It is evident that Paul Pennisi has found his niche and loves it — his enthusiasm for his work, for MCI, for life in general — is truly contagious. MCI salutes this ingenious young man!





Did You Know That?

The first basketball game played in the "new" gymnasium - now the Parks Memorial Gymnasium - was a contest between MCI and Higgins Classical Institute on February 28, 1936. An account in the TRUMPET spoke of the spirit and enthusiasm of the student body in attendance, despite the Higgins victory, 62 to 26.
