
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

## A Message from the Headmaster

Dear Alumni:

I am most grateful for the opportunity to share my thoughts with you as we prepare for MCI's 107th year. That we have, unlike some of our less fortunate sister schools, survived the critical period of the last several years is, in itself, testimony to the underlying strength of MCI. That this school has not only endured during these years of national decline in boarding school enrollments, but has continued to maintain academic standards of excellence is in large measure the result of continued support from its loyal alumni and friends. I can pledge that each of us involved in the operation of the school will continue to make every effort to be worthy of that support.

My eager response to the opportunity to return to Pittsfield last summer, after an absence of two years, and my equally enthusiastic acceptance of the offer to succeed Edward R. Stanley as Headmaster, were prompted by an intimate awareness of this school's strengths. Foremost among these—and, perhaps, Mr. Stanley's greatest legacy—is an experienced and remarkably competent faculty of men and women whose effectiveness extends beyond the classroom to encompass the wide spectrum of interests to which our students are attracted. Similarly, we can continue to boast of facilities which are unusual for a school of this size. With

no major improvements or additions needed, MCI's classrooms, laboratories, playing fields and all the additional accoutrements of a modern secondary school continue to be a justifiable source of pride.

Faculty and plant, of course, however impressive, can become useless adornments in the absence of a meaningful interaction with a vital, receptive student body. Let me assure you—particularly those of you who are not able to maintain close contact with school—that the students we shall welcome in September comprise a group of the highest calibre. On the basis of personal interviews with most of the returning upperclassmen and all incoming freshmen and sophomores, I can attest to the fact that we shall have a well-prepared, extraordinarily capable and well-rounded undergraduate group. Mr. Chambliss' efforts in his capacity as admissions officer have been rewarded by the prospects of assembling a post-graduate class numbering twenty-five or more. These young men can be expected to bring with them, as have generations of P.G.'s, a commitment to make the most of their opportunity and will surely, as in years past, add considerable enrichment to MCI's program.

I would be remiss in this effort to present an accurate assessment of MCI's overall situation if I failed to alert alumni to follow the sports pages during the coming year. While this past year was a successful one for most teams, it was also one in which most teams were built around freshmen, sophomores and juniors. The football squad, having lost only three

seniors to graduation, will have nineteen lettermen returning in August, and we anticipate one of the best seasons in the recent history of MCI. Basketball has lost but one letterman and we expect to be in the thick of the scramble for a state tournament berth. In baseball, too, MCI will field a veteran team which included only three seniors this past spring. MCI's Rifle Team, defending New England champions, will have lost two of its members, but competent replacements are waiting in the wings. While the lacrosse, ski, track, cross country, tennis, and soccer teams have been somewhat harder hit by graduation, each has a nucleus of returning lettermen around which could be built winning teams. In girls' sports too, the outlook is bright as ten girls prepare to head to New York with Coach Russell for intensive instruction at field hockey camp. The positive effects of success in athletics, of being represented by winning teams, cannot, I think, be overemphasized. The spillover in terms of student morale, of pride in one's school, and even in a more conscientious approach to classwork is a very real phenomenon.

We expect the victory bell to toll often in the coming year.

Joan and I, along with Douglas, Andrew and David expect to be comfortably settled in the Manson House by Alumni Weekend. We look forward to meeting those whose paths we did not cross and to renewing friendships with others, particularly those among you who, for several years, so tolerantly co-existed with the Murray children in the dormitory.

# FAREWELL TO A HEADMASTER

On the evening of Saturday, June 10 at Pittsfield's new and elaborate Carraige Inn, 128 relatives, old friends and associates gathered to honor Edward R. Stanley retiring from 33 years of service to MCI, 16 of those years as Headmaster. It was quite a party. A social hour started at 6 and was reluctantly concluded about 7:15 when dinner was served.

Iva Cianchette Cregnole led-off a small parade of speakers, and proved a tough act to follow. Willard W. Lehr, Jr. '42, Harry W. Rowe '06, Frank Haseltine '40, Roy Sinclair, Herbert A. Leonard '35, all contributed to the good natured banter that enlivens such farewells.

Headmaster Stanley was presented during the ceremonies with a Browning Superposed shotgun in 20 gauge, and a sum of money. He appeared properly pleased. His own address was brief and, as usual, excellent.

Clayton G. Chambliss, administrative assistant to Mr. Stanley, was charged by the Trustees to put together a good party. He did. Assisting in arrangements were Frank Haseltine, George H. Newhouse '54, Alma Ellingwood Dow '40, and Alice Sinclair, formerly of the faculty.

Dear Alumni and Friends of MCI:

# THE NEW HEADMASTER

The appointment of Alfred I. Murray, director of studies at Maine Central Institute, to be the school's fifteenth headmaster was announced in June by Prof. Herbert A. Leonard of Orono, president of MCI's Board of Trustees. The appointment took effect on July 1 following the retirement of Headmaster Edward R. Stanley, who was appointed in 1956.

Murray, who received his A.B. degree from Bowdoin in 1957 and who has pursued post-graduate studies at the University of Maine, first joined the MCI staff in 1963. He served MCI as instructor in history, coach of baseball, assistant coach of football, and housemaster in the period 1963-

69. From 1969 to 1971 he was Assistant Dean and instructor in history at Fryeburg Academy. During this period he also served as Director of Adult Education for School Administrative District No. 72. He returned to MCI as Director of Studies last September.

Prior to his teaching career, Murray, a native of Watertown, Mass., served a tour of duty in the United States Army from 1957 to 1959 and from 1959 to 1963 was engaged in the insurance business.

Headmaster Murray is married to the former Joan Sumner of Searsport, Me. The couple have three sons, Douglas, Andrew, and David.

and Business Law. A new course will be offered during the academic year 1972-73—Record Keeping, which will involve primarily the keeping of personal records and finances.

Bookkeeping, as taught at MCI, involves ownership, partnership, and corporation bookkeeping, plus, in the second year, an intensive study of income tax preparation. After the two years of typing at MCI, the student is qualified to do any sort of office typing. Personal typing is also offered, on a half-year basis. Office Practice involved filing, data processing, letter writing and the use of office machinery. The Gregg system is taught in the Steno courses on a college level during the second year. It has, indeed, pleased MCI students during their periodic visits to area business schools, to find the college students less advanced than themselves. Business Law at MCI is structured mostly for seniors and postgraduates. Covered are types of contracts, proper drawing and interpretation of contracts and law terminology. Another new course for next year will be Marketing, Sales Promotion and Advertising.


During the past two years, under Andy's leadership, the classes have made many field trips to observe the function of the "business world." And a most important innovation has been a Work-Study Program for seniors. Interested senior business students spend 6 weeks in various Pittsfield area businesses to put into practice that which they may have learned in the classroom. Involved businesses during the past year have been Northeast Shoe Co., Staples Oil Co., Pittsfield Chair Factory, Lehr Insurance Agency, Kenneth Hughes Insurance Co., Somerset Auto Parts, Maine Aire Credit Union, Sebasticook Valley Hospital, the Edwards Co., and Bud's Red & White. Success of this program may be indicated by the fact that this year five MCI students received permanent offices upon graduating with the participating companies, in a year in which jobs are difficult to obtain.

Yes, the Business Education Department plays an important, if sometimes overlooked part in the school's total program for superior secondary education.

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## MCI's Business Education Dept.

*Andrew R. Sanborn, Chairman of MCI's Commercial Faculty has assisted in preparation of this report. A graduate of MCI in the Class of '61, Andy is a graduate of Husson College, Bangor, with a B.S.B.E. degree and joined the MCI faculty in 1968. He became Commercial Faculty Chairman in 1970. He is a business man in his own right; he owns and operates the extensive Sanborn's Riding Stables, Pittsfield.*



It may not be generally appreciated by many MCI alumni, but the school's Business Education Department instructs nearly one-fourth of the students attending. There are two full-time instructors in Commercial subjects, Sanborn and Thomas Nale, and one part-time instructor, Mrs. Zanie Hikel, who instructs four classes daily.

The main objective of Business Education at MCI, according to Sanborn, is to prepare the student for a

successful career in the business world. Students completing three years in his department, Sanborn feels, are competent in office practice of all kinds.

Offered at MCI are Bookkeeping 1 and 2, Typing 1 and 2, Business Math, Office Practice, Steno 1 and 2,



# MCI SPORTS


Even the return to coaching duties of veteran Rod Smith could not help the soccer booters to more than 2 wins over a ten-game stretch. The boys nailed Oak Grove-Coburn 3-2 early in the season, following a defeat to that same club, and won most satisfactorily from Hebron in mid-season 3-2. But that was it. A whole string of goose eggs on the MCI side of the score book indicates, to put it mildly, a lack of punch. Defensively they weren't that bad; only modest scores against them, but enough. Two of Rod's youngsters were named to the Maine Independent School League All-Stars, Thao Wong, the Celestial Comet, and Keith Brooks, who later wound up with the MCI Masters' Cup. Also singled for distinction by their coach were Dave Stretton and Mike Gibbons, half-backs, and Phil Steele on a wing.



**THE FOOTBALLERS** won 4, lost 4, and played a great brand of ball. A young team, most will be back next year.

Coach Norm Trottier started his football practices, late, as usual, with about 38 candidates and wound up the season with 34. Not a bad attrition rate. The Huskies matched their 970 record of 4 wins, 4 losses, but were against tougher competition and played better ball. The backs were sturdy but certainly not fleet; the line was rangy and tough-minded, with several operatives required to go both ways because of inexperience in the subs. Things started on a bright note when they thumped Mt. Abrams 22-0, but coach Norm was not ecstatic; he knew well that this was Mt. Abrams', a new school, first whack at football. His forebodings were founded; next outing was dropped to Mt. Blue, with plenty of experience, 0-21. At Greenville the following week the Huskies really put it together, running roughshod 36-0. It could have been more; Bob Morrison was awarded the game ball. Following a horrendous loss to Fryeburg, 7-42, the Huskies played their best game of the season at Gould Academy, a cliff-hanger, 21-20. Big hero was placekicker Cliff Bent, who gathered the 3 extra points. There

was no question as to who deserved the game ball. The lads dropped a close one to Hebron, 6-12, and a not-so-close one to Hyde School 8-20, before finishing with a highly satisfactory trouncing of Kents Hill, 25-6. Rod Blake, injury prone all year, really found his feet in this one as he hoofed, personally, across 150 yards of Kents Hill turf during the first half. Game ball? you bet. Named outstanding senior lineman was Bob Morrison; outstanding senior back, Rod Blake; outstanding defensive player, Scott Files, who was handed the game ball at Mt. Abrams; outstanding offensive player, Jere Dana, who packed 190 pounds on a 5' 9" frame, a real cannon ball, and outgained any other MCI back by a 2 to 1 margin. Tri-captains for '72 will be Jere Dana, Earle Cianchette and Spencer Ouellette. Look for a good year. JV football coach Lyford Beverage worked frantically with his raw youngsters to salvage 2 wins, 1 tie and 3 losses over a tough schedule. The tie was with populous and tough Bangor High, the wins were from Hebron and Hyde School JV's.



Other wearys included Steve Woodhead, Roscoe Sanborn, Kim Hunt, Owen Cooper, Steve Amsden and Dick Sprague, manager.

*Basketball* coach Lyonel Tracy is still a bit frustrated; his team won 8, lost 9, for an average enough season, but 7 of those wins were over the last 10 games. The team finally reached its potential, but too late. Even so, the Huskies came within a whisker of getting to the tournament, the dream of any coach, with only a close loss to Madison, late in the season, to prevent. Wins were from Oak Grove-Coburn (2), Hyde School, Kents Hill, Valley High (2), Hinckley, and Mt. View. Duane Chase was outstanding all the way, leading in scoring, rebounding and hustle, and was rewarded for his work by being named to the Independent Schools' First Team as center. 



were Brian Bickford and Jere Dana, no question, with Greg Hannigan only slightly behind. All are juniors; rough news, indeed, to those who must compete against them next year.

Coach Dave Mosher had a truly young *baseball team*, 3 seniors, 3 juniors, and 9 sophomores. In a memorable rout of Kents Hill (23-1) all nine of them (the sophomores) were on the field at once. This bodes well for the future, but it didn't help much this year. The team won 6, lost 9, with many of the losses due to errors by inexperienced hands. The opening of school, September 13, 1971, found 357 students filing through the halls of the Institute Building and thence to the Parks Memorial Gym for the first meeting of the year, an assembly, and then to classes which would become familiar and to teachers who would become liked, disliked, and tolerated. It has ever been thus. Most of the 357 made it; there were the usual casualties and the usual additions. It was a good year, particularly for those who made it, and there were no real shocks or disturbances, except the December retirement announcement of Headmaster Edward R. Stanley, to become effective in July, the relaxation of the "Dress Rule" in torrid May, and the pilfering of the bell clapper the last week of class sessions. By that time no one, including the faculty, really cared whether the bell rang or not. Sports were done, and the chime had rung plenty. Boys' hair was just as long, except, for some reason, toward May; girls' dresses were just as short, with the exception of the odd "Granny's," beastly things. And during the 37 weeks of classes, students studied, sulked, won praise, censure and the rest. The instructors did exactly the same. You, aging graybeards from 1950 on back to '04, would find things not that much changed. Let's take a look:

**PUBLICATIONS:** *Masardis*, school literary voice, was perhaps less filled with youth complaint and distress than previously, and therefore somewhat reduced in page volume. The contents are excellent; thoughtful writing, little obsession with death, old age, drugs, and the degeneracy of society. Edited by David Austin for the fourth year, the publication reflects an awareness by its youthful writers of things as they perhaps should be, not as they seem to be. Hard-working, double duty editor Dave Austin (editor of *Masardis*, previously described) made life comparatively pleasant for Norby by actually doing some of the work. Dave, incidentally, was Class of '72 Valedictorian, which may explain some of advisors Young's and Richardson's respect for the chap. Dave's assistants were brighties Martha Kleinschmidt

and Kathy Bryant, athletic editors Pamela Terrio and Tom Stevenson, business manager Patricia Inman (a real jewel this year in Norby's balding crown), plus assistants to Pat, Cecilia Lary and Karen Magnus. A workmanlike group, spangled with some exceptional intelligence.

Other brave vocalists were Sharon Brown, Dorothy Wilkins, Syrena Thompson and Patrick McGowan, all sophomores, a fact that distressed instructor of the freshman English class (14 of them) Dana W. Sweet no



## FORMER FACULTY



# COMMENCEMENT 1972




Achievement awards were made by Headmaster Stanley at both Senior Chapel and Commencement.
