Opening the door to a polite knock, John found not the anticipated waiter with tray, but a tough trio of gunmen, replete with ropes and gags, who trussed John rather thoroughly and departed into the howling night with young Frank.

John, a graduate of the New England Conservatory of Music and a trumpeter with the Tommy Dorsey Band, led by Sam Donahue, had been appearing on the same bill with the 20 year old Sinatra at Harrah's Tahoe Casino, one of the best known of the resort's several nightspots, and had become a friend to the young singer.

The rest of the story made interesting, if bizarre, history. John, bound and gagged on the floor, after some struggle untangled himself and soon word of the spectacular kidnapping was flashed to the world. The long chase, with Keystone Kop overtures, ended happily several days later with Sinatra delivered to his parents from a car trunk, and the subsequent arrest, trial and conviction of the kidnappers. A sequel, as reported by Dorothy Kilgallen in March, is that John is no longer with the Tommy Dorsey troupe. To quote Dorothy: "His (John's) talent is unquestioned, so the jazz set wonders what went wrong."

# NEW RULES FOR THE OLDEST SPORT

More than 40 boys last fall received certificates and shoulder patches for successful completion of the National Rifle Association Hunter Safety Course.

One of MCI's unique features (and there are several) is that the school not only permits its boarding boys to enjoy the exceptional hunting found in Central Maine, but encourages them to try their luck in the woods and marshes. But perhaps such support might be expected in a school whose headmaster is a determined duck hunter; and where a good proportion of the faculty fret for the woods like Iroquois at the first touch of October frost. Do all boys hunt? The answer, certainly, is no.

But those interested may hunt after school and Saturdays (no Sunday hunting in Maine) by fulfilling two basic requirements: written permission must be obtained from parents; and each student with permission must pass the Hunter Safety Course of the National Rifle Association, administered by the School. Last September more than 40 boys, many from other states, passed the written examination, following 10 hours of competent instruction. All student firearms are placed in locked storage between hunts, are released only by housemasters or the student School Armorer.

Head of MCI's Hunter Safety Course is Wallace H. Cunningham, member of the faculty and a Registered Maine Guide of long standing. During five evenings of instruction, faculty outdoorsmen lecture and demonstrate their various specialties as rifle, shotgun and pistol; always with a primary emphasis on hunting safety. State Game Wardens discuss laws and regulations, as well as indicate the best hunting grounds for various types of game.

The safety record has been perfect; hunter success by students has embarrassed some local "experts" — including a few faculty!

All boys are not football players; nor do all enjoy golf, tennis or soccer. For the lad who loves hunting and the out-of-doors — and has demonstrated himself responsible — MCI provides a different fall program that many believe beats them all.

"In Italy large coins (100 Lire), the size of an American silver dollar, are worth only 16c — reason — they contain mostly aluminum and very little silver."

"It was interesting to see and hear so many crows in Singapore, Malaya. One day, having lunch in a city restaurant, a big old crow came in through the open window and perched himself on the dining table and sank his beak in a bread roll. He was so bold we had trouble shooing him away." "Australia and New Zealand are reported to be the world's leaders in sheep and wool raising. Strangely enough, yarn and wool products, including wearing apparel, cost two or three times more there than in England or America. Reason: The raw wool is sold to brokers and shipped to England half way around the world to be processed which includes washing, dyeing,

"All different countries have their own currency, however the American dollar is one of the few currencies that is still accepted in leading stores almost anywhere in the world."

# PROGRESS REPORT 1964 PARKS RECREATIONAL AREA, MCI

Not quite two years have passed since MCI experienced its largest single expansion of physical facilities through the gift by Johnson W. Parks of Waterville of the Parks Homestead on outer Hartland Avenue. And what, to date, has been done with this splendid grant of nearly 200 acres, plus the fine old home and outbuildings?

During the first year, while possible uses of the property were proper subjects for discussion by the MCI Board of Trustees, the buildings were utilized only for storage, the land remained idle. But in August 1963 the Trustees made a far-reaching decision to develop the Estate into a student recreational area, tentatively designated as the Parks Recreational Area or the School's "North Campus." Work began at once.

First, the house was renovated to accommodate a master and family, and only then were other projects attempted. A new ski jump was erected on the hill areas — across Hartland Avenue from the home and buildings — with proper approaches and run-off space provided (see photo) and portions of the barns and sheds were made appropriate for Ski Team and Outing Club activities.

Plans were carefully drawn for the construction of a 9-hole, 36-par golf course, and work began in the early fall. (Trustee Sanger M. Cook '17 (shown at right) did not cut the first tree but wanted awfully to.) One air picture, by flying school photographer Peter Bradshaw, shows the golfing area — both sides of railroad track — as it appeared in early February, with cutting and clearing still in progress; other photo shows ski area. The sketch (opposite page) plotted by drawing instructor-track coach, Norbert Young, Sr., gives an exciting preview of what may be expected in about one year from now.

No, we can't promise you golfing on the MCI course this summer. But wait another year ! By then, should all go as planned, there may be boating facilities on the river, skeet and trap ranges for the shotgun enthusiasts, a "Little Theatre," and a comfortable clubhouse for our weary golfers. We can't wait!

#### FORTY-NINE YEARS AGO -

1915 . . . A freshman entering MCI on September 8, 1914 could be togged in an Adler-Rochester suit in extreme young men's models in any and every pleasing pattern; total cost at Jenkins Clothing Company, Main St., Pittsfield - with a pair of socks thrown in -\$15.00. Not that many dressed up. The sophomores that year had an unparalleled reputation (built by themselves) for unbridled cruelty to neophytes . . . All was forgiven at the YMCA-YWCA reception for the Class of '18 on September 18. Welcomes were offered by William Watson, Helen Robinson, Leslie Black, Edna Rummill, with the program closing by all joining in the MCI Alma Mater . . . Freshmen were sternly advised to master their Class Yell: "Milkshake, Bellyache, Hot dogs and cigars; Freshmen, Freshmen, Rah! Rah! Rah!" Goodness! how crude! . . . A large turnout for football, enough for two teams. Captain Whitten, Fuller, Hackett, Monahan and Small had all seen service; Harvey Maxwell and Kendall were promising transfers from Westbrook Seminary and Gardiner High. Coach Shepard toiled very nearly in vain. Injuries, academic washouts and a murderous schedule were responsible for a season's-end total of 1 win, 2 ties, and 5 defeats, the last to the bonebreaking tune of 50-0 to Thornton Academy. Well, there's always basketball . . . Helen Copeland continued pasting clippings and comment for her scrapbook, started as a freshman (much later a mine of information for at least one MCI alumni researcher), in which appeared one gem, writ by hand: "If every girl were just like me, what kind of a dorm would this place be?" . . . Sorosis elected to office Marion Estes, Esther Copeland, Margaret Staples, Amy Ragan, Ervina Goodale and Helen Robinson . . . A sturdy, vocal group chosen for Prize Speaking included Bertha Wheeler, Dorothy Smith, Helen Hanson, Iva Farnham, Ursula Snow, Marcelline Menard, Sanger Cook, Magnus Ridlon, Gerald Glidden, Edwin Richardson, Harold Slipp and Horace Buxton . . . Old Grads visiting campus included Norris Friend '13, Errold Hilliker '14, Wesley Mills '14, Clarence Emerson '14, Louis Getchell '14, Alta Davis '14, Claire Linscott '14, Lizzie Tufts '14 and Cecil Thurston '14. Just couldn't seem to stay away from the old place . . . Big evening in January was the reception to Principal and Mrs. Oldham. Entertainment was offered by Dorothy Crawford, piano solo; Dorothy Smith, reading; Martha Tucker, vocal solo; Sanger Cook, violin solo; and a farce, "Their Wedding Anniversary," was played by Esther Copeland, Hazel Pushor, Morrill Burse and Van Stevens. The school paper obediently reported, "After several merry games were played the evening closed happily with the Alma Mater." ... Our basketball team, short on schedule and members, showed plenty of spunk in dunking the Natanis Club from Oakland in their first outing. Players were Captain White, Whittier, Harvey, Maxim, Chase, and one single solitary sub, McKechnie . . . The Girls' basketball team dropped a heartbreaker to Newport High School, 10-0, in what was broadly described by a Newport reporter as "The fastest, closest, most interesting game ever played in MCI contestants in the local hall." this history-maker were Jordan, Estes, Tracey, Copeland and Kennon . . . Editor-in-Chief Homer F. Ray of the MCI was assisted by Mary F. Drake, with a slew of associate editors: Hazel Copeland, Newton Thompson, Myrtle Pushor, Linwood Badger, Rena M. Shepard, Horace Maxim, Helen Libby and Walter Colby. Elmer Goodwin and Jesse Bates handled the many financial problems of this well-written publication. Joke from same: "A little yearning is a dangerous thing," or, if you don't like that one, "Half a loaf is better than no vacation." Well, it seemed funny then . . . The MCI Glee Club made a five-day concert tour that included the towns of Solon, North Anson, Clinton and Albion. Faculty members Haskell, Chorley and Miss Haskell accompanied the breathless musicians, including Moon, Watson, Whittier, Witham, Badger, Chorley, Emery, Robertson, Briggs, Burse, Bussell, Buxton, R. E. Moon, Stevens, Goodwin, Haskell, Maxfield, McKechnie, Parsons, and Rogers. Reads like half the school . . . Snow faded, commencement honors parts were announced in April: Valedictory, Dorothy M. Crawford; Salutatory, Helen J. Robinson; Essay, Jennie M. LaDame; Essay, Mildred I. Goodell; Essay, Mary F. Drake . . . Class Day parts

assigned: Prophecy, Edna Rummill, Amy Ragan, Neil Briggs, Henry Kingsbury; Historian, Hazel Copeland; Address to Undergraduates, Luther Kenniston; Class Will, Horace Maxim; Class Ode, Mr. Dunbar . . . J. Gardner Witham wrote a blazing article in the MCI, title "Germany Vindicated," urging that Americans better understand the Central Powers. An indication that there was still room for argument on the Kraut question as World War I drew closer for the United States . . . Baseball became the most important topic on campus, and with good reason. The lads won 16 games in an 18 game schedule, both losses to Coburn Classical Institute, doubtless loaded with ringers. Shepard coached, White and Harvey pitched, Austin, Whitten and Maxwell were outstanding defensively. For example, in the last two games: MCI 19 - Bangor 0; MCI 13 - Gardiner 0. The school produced some track whizzes to gladden Captain Wakefield and manager Raymond Blaisdell. At the Maine Meet Clarence Emery won the shotput, "Topsy" Wakefield placed second in the two mile, Carroll Ames placed 3rd in the half mile . . . Cogan, Roy U. Sinclair, Myrtle V. Main, Marion L. Lord, Clara F. Parnell, Gladys A. Cunningham, Jessie Wheeler, Estelle Bauman and Ruth Plummer Cook, to give heft and balance to the opposition. Almost makes one shudder . . . Routine established itself; a freshman learned that English 1A, Mr. Cook, was held first period in Room 2, except Wednesdays; and that Freshman Bible B, Mrs. Folsom, convened in Room 6 Wednesdays, last period . . . Read and weep ye harried scholars of a more recent generation; classes were out for the day at 2:50 P.M. . . . Those not on detention could watch coach Roy Sinclair and his lads working toward a most frustrating fall of football. Rain and an interminable series of ties and losses made it a long, long season and a wet one. Scores read: MCI-0, Notre Dame (Waterville)-0; MCI-6, Coburn-6; Kents Hill-15, MCI-0; MCI-6, HCI-6; MCI-12, Colby Frosh-12, and so on. Injuries vexed. Stars Modzeleski, Meader, Gulazian, Morrison, Haley, Balser and Barbour became enshrouded in bandages, hobbled by crutches. Crowning blow came with academic restrictions laid on further participation by uninjured but scho-

lastically lackadaisical Messrs. Webb, Meader, Hackett and Boston, and on the eve of the Colby fray! One good result: coaching up-coming girls' basketball looked progressively more agreeable to glum Roy Sinclair. Now if those darned girls can only stay eligible . . . Field Hockey girls, coached and captained by Edith Spaulding, had an informal schedule, played, from what we can gather, whenever it stopped raining. Mudhens included Doris Gilchrest, Ruth Webber, Marion Louder, Alice Harding, Marion Lagorio, Louise Lagorio, Phyllis Wood, Marguerite Tozer, Winifred Lee, Eleanore Toothaker, Carmelita Provencher, Audrey Thorndike, Frances Wyman, Margaret Humphrey . . . Formal opening of new Alumni Hall took place Friday afternoon and evening, October 19. Dedicatory evening services were at Powers Hall. Featured speakers included Harry W. Rowe, President of the Board of Trustees of MCI and Assistant to the President of Bates College; John Pendleton, Executive Secretary of the United Baptist Convention of Maine; Dr. Augustus O. Thomas, State Commissioner of Education. Greetings were offered by Mary Walker Spear and by Mrs. Betsy Milliken ... Leap year 1928 nearly over, Dean of Girls Miss Bearce, becoming desperate (says our student reporter), hastily organized a Leap Year Dance, a Masquerade Ball, date: December

7; place, Powers Hall. Nedra Bridgham and Arthur Haley won prizes for costumes; Freddie Folsom and Pauline Ramsey won the Spot Dance; Edwin McLellan and Marion Louder took Prize Waltz honors. Weirdly garbed and masked revelers instantly recognized possibilities of piratical behavior, modified, particularly if several pirates were in the whirling throng. Postintermission program had the faculty on the stage (a mistake), "to see them-selves as others see them." Jolly! Perhaps it was only coincidence that the Girls' Dorm was campused the following day . . . First coon-skin coat showed up following Christmas vacation . . . General exodus to neighborhood barns for a quick smoke after meals must cease, explained Principal Purinton . . . 1929 Trumpet was staffed by Charlotte Reed, Jessie Spaulding, Judson Flanagan, Grace Quarrington, Phyllis Nelson, Olin Mc-Carthy, Rita Cowan, Daisy DeMeyer, Harold Gates, Clementina Johnston, Frederick Folsom, David Hawes, with Miss Clara Parnell as anxious advisor. . . . Coach Cogan's basketball crew lived up to pre-season billing as they started a very satisfying season. The boys knew they were good when they trimmed an Alumni team early in the schedule, 53-38. The highly regarded Alumni all-stars included Sol Johnson, Tom and Jim Flatley, Parker McClay, Paiement, Brewer, Lancaster, Ferguson and Newhouse, each a formidable name. During a mid-season invasion of Aroostook County MCI took Millinocket High, Houlton and Ricker Classical Institute, all in three days. Good work in anyone's league! . . . And the band played on; or, rather, the orchestra, at Chapel each week on Thursdays. Got pretty good, too. Directed by Mrs. Cook, the group became favorites at school entertainments and local churches. Members included Lois Folsom, Helen Bottomly, Nina Humphrey, Kenneth Hardy, Elizabeth Kimball, Frederick Folsom, Dayton Vail, Frances Wyman, Frances Cole, Greta Maloon, Arden Havey, Harold Gates, Olin McCarthy, Carmelita Provencher, Evelyn Farnham, Grace Quarrington, a fine smattering of talent . . . Jokes from 1929: "A pedestrian is an uncertain body, entirely surrounded by automobiles." Want more? A Girl in a Dormitory -"Help me catch the Dean - I've been robbed." Second Girl --- "All right - which way did she go?" Much

better . . . The basketball girls staved eligible, bringing great joy to Coach Sinclair. They rewarded him with a brilliant 9 win, 1 tie, 1 loss, record. Claimed the State Championship, and who was to refute them? Thumped powerful Gardiner H. S. 51-6 at one notable outing. Captained by veteran Delma Steen, the group included Marion Louder, Edith Spaulding, Phyllis Nelson, Margaret Humphrey, Mary Lagorio, Madeline Coolidge, Nina Crossman, Louise Lagorio, Elizabeth Kimball and Lois Folsom . . . Commencement Honors were announced in April: Grace Quarrington, Valedictory; Olive Murch, Salutatory; Mabel Prince, Essay; Charlotte Reed, Essay; Clementina Johnston, Essay. A clean sweep for the girls . . . Named for Class Day parts were Frederick Folsom, Chaplain; Harold Gates, Phyllis Nelson, Class Prophecy; Madeline Coolidge, Olin McCarthy, Class Gifts; Jessie Spaulding, Class Oration; Wilbur Austin, Address to Undergraduates; David Hawes, Class Will; Rita Cowan, Class History; Herschal Fowler, Arnold Peabody, Class Marshals . . . Track coach Sanger Cook and his lads headed into another fine season, helped plenty by Raymond McLaughlin, Lutrell, McCarthy and the McMichael twins . . . 45 baseball

candidates reported to Coach Cogan, soon were trimmed to a handier 25. The season was good, not outstanding. "Lefty" Moors and Collette provided mound strength; Larry Ingraham and Jim Peabody made dangerous stickmen. Fine, dry spring weather permitted a 10-game schedule, ending June 5th, the eve of Commencement Weekend . . . June 1929: A splendid time to graduate; booming prosperity, unlimited job prospects, a spiraling stock market, fortunes to be made, and yet . . . Gold winds doeth October bring . . .

#### SEVENTEEN YEARS AGO -

1947 . . . Doors opened at MCI for the 80th year in September 1946 to admit what was by far the largest enrollment in the school's history. More than 350 heads were counted in the attendant confusion, with something like 63 boarding boys, 25 of them veterans of W. W. II and, probably, 25 girls registered in the Girls Dorm. It must have been a hectic week of registration; the figures are fuzzy even now; newspaper report at the time gives "between 50 and 60 veterans," counting, we presume, the non-boarders. One thing was crystal-clear: for

the first time in several years boys outnumbered girls, great news to some . . . Braced to meet the onslaught was Principal Howard Niblock, backed by a conglomeration of teaching venerables and cadets, with a slight smattering of journeyman dominies. Listed as instructors were Frances M. Bartlett, Maurice Earle, Barbara A. Blackstone, Lucile de Reynolds, Alice Coolidge, Edward R. Stanley, Paul Legge, Norbert Young, Hazel M. Earle, Roderic L. Smith, Virginia Muzroll, Laurence Muzroll, Dorothy Garland, Dorothy Dingwall . . . Coach Paul Legge was tempted onto a limb by a turnout of more than 50 for football, including 6 lettermen and a gaggle of heavily bearded veterans. Paul, according to the Pittsfield Advertiser of Sept. 12, predicted that this team would be better than last year's Prep School Champs. Perhaps they were . . . It was a rough, tough fall of football, with Legge's shocktroops winning 2, dropping 4, in a murderous schedule that included three college JV squads laden with old hands from the beaches of Anzio, Normandy, Iwo and Okinawa. Listed as survivors at season's end were London, Dahlgren, Henderson, Wright, H. Daley, Logan, G. Fitts, Leggett, Paradis, L. Fitts, Staples, MacDonald, Franchetti, Folsom, Roy, Brown, Thompson, Hood, Friend, Sevigny, Frazier, Shorey, Rosasco, with managers Pinkham and Bertrand . . . Undergrad JV footballers showed promise under coach Muzroll, winning 4, plus one tie. Key men Lendall Dahlgren, Gene Henderson and Bud Wright graduated to the Varsity through this apprenticeship . . . In four days of campus balloting Leon Fish was named president of the Senior Class, with Eugene Henderson, vice president; Irene Bunker, secretary; Edwin Pinkham, treasurer . . . The Juniors named Arey Bryant to their top post . . . Coach of debate Edward Stanley gathered him a glib group to represent MCI in the Prep School League come spring. Tedious preparation theoretically commenced for Zelda Osiason, Ralph Mills, William Shumway, Philip Coburn, Leon Fish, Donald Duncan, David Macken, George Morse, Dorothy Tarbox, Leroy Pinkham, Roberta Brown, Betty Stanchfield, Kathleen Mitchell, Joyce Dow, Emmaleen Stickney, Nancy Tarbox, Gene Brackett, Kenneth Robinson, Basil Tasker, Gerald Cole,

George Peat, Barry Bailey and Nancy Wright . . . The cross country hoofers concluded a so-so fall (five wins, five losses) by soundly trouncing the Farmington State Teachers in their final outing. Top runners all season were Captain Pete Connolly, Bob Libby and Marden Brooks . . . The girls returned to inter-school field hockey, after several years' lapse, with kind of a dull thud. Lost to Cony 4-1 and Kents Hill 1-0, their complete schedule. Wish we could say they learned lots of hockey and rapidly improved, but the truth is that they won not a single game until October, 1949, three years away . . . Anyway, the cheerleaders were unbeatable, no matter how you looked at them. Varsity rabble-rousers were Margaret Webb, Alice Wright, Theresa Sirois, Bernice Wright, Harriet Riley and Jackie Beebe, with understudy JV's, early equally vocal, Margaret Coolbroth, Kathleen Mitchell, Loretta White, Sally Friend and Joan Mills. Jokes of the day (printable) had improved only slightly since school publications of the 1870's, as: Tom Staples --- "Did you ever take chloroform?" Roy Zallen - "No, who teaches it?"; or, Visitor - "You say you like it at MCI, but I can't see what you find to keep busy." Bruce Coates — "Neither can I; that's why I like it." Oh, well . . . For the first time in school history basketball candidates were divided into two varsity squads: Preppers and Undergrads. Fifty basketball hopefuls made this move not only possible, but imperative. Coach Legge drilled the Preppers; Laurence Muzroll worked the Undergrads. Preppers galloped through an 18 game schedule with 11 wins, 7 defeats. Outstanding contributors included Captain Jack Leet, John Luke, Roy Peasley, Tony Machaj, Gerald Fitts, Jim Logan, Bill Frazier, Ralph Clark, and Jim McGaffin . . . Basketball girls worked hard and pleased; didn't win every game, shall we say? Their lineup featured L. Catlin, L. White, M. Webb, M. Gallison, B. Kennedy, E. Soule, S. Bradbury, A. Wright, B. Gordon, J. Ames, M.

Shorey, J. Dobson, A. Cox, K. Mitchell, J. Beebe, M. Jipson, J. Jackson and manager T. Sirois. Top whips of a newly created Public Speaking Club were Joan Mills, William Hatch, Theresa Sirois, with Maurice Earle as faculty advisor . . . The winter Carnival Weekend was postponed by sloppy, mushy weather, but no matter, Irene Bunker was popular choice as Carnival Queen, regally attended by Alice Wright, Phyllis Hamilton and Margaret Webb. Outing Club president James Murtha blushingly made presentations as flash bulbs popped . . . Margaret Chase Smith, member of Congress from the Second Maine District, was among more than 600 music lovers attending the annual Pop Concert. Outstanding program, directed by Ruth Plummer Cook, with Dorothy Dingwall running a multitudinous chorus through their vocal paces . . . Commencement Honor parts listed Eunice Soule, Valedictorian; Marie Tasker, Salutatorian; Eugene Hamilton, Irene Bunker, and Winfield Tilton, Essayists . . . Big spring news was appointment of C. "Nels" Corey as head football coach for 1947-48 . . . 44 candidates showed up for spring track; 51 applicants clamored for two-dozen baseball uniforms; frustrating sorting jobs for coaches Maurice Earle and Rod Smith . . . Paul Legge was appointed mentor of newly-organized girls' softball, complete with 45 candidates and an 8-game schedule . . . MCI completed a good track season by travelling 20 members to the Bates Relays for the spring finals; they had previously taken meets from Lawrence H. S., Kents Hill, Hartland Academy and Monson. Fitts, Roy, Rosasco and Daley gathered big points at Bates . . . Baseball players won 9, lost 2 . . . Shirley Dunham and William Hatch earned \$25 each for their Manson Essay efforts; Shirley's essay, "The Early Life of George Washington"; Bill's topic was "Harold Stassen" . . . Sunday, June 10, and bells tolled the commencement of new hope for 120 seniors, the largest graduating class in School history . . .

# MCI IN SPORTS

PREPPER FOOTBALL . . . 1963 marked the end of postgraduate "Prepper" football at MCI. Football for PG's only, began in 1946 when hordes of muscular super-charged veterans of World War II precluded scheduling other than college freshmen and JV's, or top-flight prep school opposition. More recently, with increasingly larger numbers of postgraduate students more interested in matters academic than football, Prepper teams have not only been thin numerically but have found themselves pitted against college freshman powerhouses ready, willing and able, in many cases, to chew up their own varsity at the tweet of a whistle. The difficult decision to discontinue Prepper football was made in September, altho not announced until late November. The season of 1963 should indicate why the step was required. Coach Al Card with a squad that numbered 21, before injuries, looked forward in September to a jolly fall bumping heads, in too rapid succession, with Phillips Exeter Academy, Maine Frosh, Colby Frosh, U. of Mass. Frosh, Maine Frosh (again!), Bowdoin Frosh, and Bridgton Academy. Too little vs. The Preppers won too, too much. none, gallantly appeared for each game. All were brave, but named as outstanding members of the Last Preppers were Bruce Cushing, Frank Mirabito, Bob Love, Paul Landry and Jay Viles.

UNDERGRAD HUSKIES FOOT-BALL . . . The undergraduate Huskies, directed by coach Bob Boulrisse and assistant F. William "Bill" White, this year entered the spanking new Class B Pine Tree Conference and did right well for themselves by winning 2, dropping 5, in much tougher competition than Huskies in past years have had to face. Injuries hampered throughout the season, and by the final game with powerhouse Madison (State Class B. Champs) coach Boulrisse had dug well into his bag of reserves. Named winners of the undergrad Coaches' Trophy were lineman Pete Susi and halfback Bruce Stafford, both juniors with considerable ability. Our weary hoofers placed a decent third in the State Cross Country Meet; are loaded with talent for another year. The Maurice L. Earle Trophy was awarded to top runner Bob Ballard.

SOCCER . . . A large lack of soccer players, for the first time in several years, made it impossible for coach Rod Smith to field both varsity and JV squads. Big, strapping lads that Rod had earlier somewhat coveted to bolster his lean teams were found of fall afternoons in interdorm touch football,

True, the Varsity won 2, lost 3 and tied 1, for an average-type record, and the JV's did only slightly less in winning 1, losing 2, and tying 1. But the schedule was a frustrating thing, caused in major part by the School's policy of playing fall games on Wednesday afternoons and Saturdays only. Yes, you guessed it; most area schools plan hockey for Tuesdays and Thursdays. MCI girls played Hinckley twice, Kents Hill twice and Cony twice, good opponents, probably too good, but certainly lacking in variety. Our Kamikaze Kids thumped Hinckley handily on each occasion, lost twice to ancient rivals Kents Hill, split with Cony. Enough of excuses! UNDERGRAD HUSKIES BASKET-BALL . . . Huskies, under the seasoned direction of John M. Shields and Mort Remick, narrowly missed the Eastern Maine Tournament, played an exciting brand of basketball always. They knit themselves a sound 9-7 record and, significantly, all of their losses were to tournament-bound teams. A good defensive club, the highest scored against them was 81 points on one disastrous occasion, by potent Madison. Average scores against the Huskies were about 55 points, with, of course, a few lamentable exceptions. The nucleus of the squad will return for 1964-65, good news for MCI coaches, rather saddening to the rest of the conference. The JV's showed considerable promise (as we invariably say) in winning 4 and dropping 11. There will be plenty of replacements from the talented JV's and JV Manager Kathy Sweet was coming along nicely late in the season. Sue Slate, a junior, was awarded the Girls' Basketball Trophy, presented for outstanding sportsmanship.

SKI TEAM . . . The 1963-64 ski season included no meetings other than the Class B Regional meets and the Class A finals. All else was curtailed for lack of skiable snow. Doesn't sound like the Pittsfield we knew. There was a mild dusting in December, just enough to stir a bit of excitement; a two-week thaw in January which left the ground as bare as Boon Island; no snow whatsoever in February; and then late in March when it was too darned late, 5 or 6 inches. Western Maine did a bit better. The Class B Regionals were conducted there, with MCI taking all the marbles for the Eastern Maine Class B crown. At the Class A meet, somewhat later and also in Western Maine, coach Bob Boulrisse's sno-birds finished 8th in a field of 10. No chance to practice near Pittsfield. The 13 skiers representing MCI had little chance to display their talents, but the performance of John Reifschneider, a junior, in the Class B's earned him the skimeister award.

Your alumni magazine, as in the past, is designed with you in mind, and from its beginning in 1947 has been the outgrowth of your expressed desire for more news about the School, its present students, its Alumni, and what is commonly described as its "growth."

As Alumni we well might ask: Has MCI achieved "growth" over the years in the best meanings of the word? Has it developed academically as well as in physical plant (which all can see) during the years since we graduated?

Alumni, and particularly Alumni of an older vintage, must wonder if the Old School is as sound as when they attended. Changes they see do not always conform with the older patterns, in teaching or, occasionally, even behavior.

But in the final analysis a school may be adjudged only by its products. What are our students doing after leaving MCI? Where are they going? Have they been prepared?

Happily, the records show that in spite of vastly stiffened college entrance requirements, that each year more graduates not only apply to education beyond MCI, but that a truly impressive percentage are admitted. Last June, for a most recent example, 191 students from the regular 4-year and postgraduate groups were graduated, all of whom but 29 had undertaken college preparatory courses. Of the college oriented students 131 were admitted to one or more schools of higher learning, and 10 from the noncollege group were successful in gaining admission to schooling beyond the secondary level.

A notable job, and indicative that MCI continues worthy of our loyal support. The School's reputation, reaching far beyond Maine, was never better.

I am looking forward to seeing as many of you as possible at the annual Mid-Summer Alumni Homecoming. Each year we have a larger crowd and a better time ! Plan to be with us.
