8. **CareerSpark:** This can be used from k-5 and is a great way to learn about careers while having fun:
 - a. www.lehighton.org and click for students
 - b. Click the parent/student portal link for PowerSchool
 - c. On the top blue bar at the top, click the applications button (looks like a box with an arrow coming out of it)
 - d. In the drop-down menu, click sign into career cruising and have FUN.
9. Some **other activities** to keep your computer skills fresh:
 - a. Create using the shapes in Microsoft Word (second grade created robots, what can you do?) BE CREATIVE and have FUN

- b. Create a PowerPoint
 - i. 3rd grade- pick an animal
 - ii. 4th grade- create on all about you
 - iii. 5th grade- pick a person
- c. Use your keyboard skills to write a story.

10. What if I don't have technology at home to use?

- a. If you have an old keyboard, you can still use that to practice. Put your fingers on homerow and move them around. Call out the letters as you type them to help your muscle memory.
- b. Create your own keyboard and see if you can fill the letters in without looking at an actual keyboard. We can have a challenge once we are back in school to see who can call out the rows the quickest!
- c. **1st grade-**we are working on the "What I Want to Be" project, so draw me a picture of what you want to be when you grow up and explain why.
- d. **2nd grade-** we used shapes in Microsoft Word to create a robot. Using only shapes, DRAW me something and be creative. Just think, these can actually be in color, unlike the ones we print. 😊
- e. **3rd grade-** we are creating our superheroes using a list in Microsoft word. DRAW me your superhero and write your list all about your superhero.
- f. **4th grade-** we are creating our digital citizens to keep people safe online. Write down online safety tips (don't forget phones and video game systems) and draw me your digital citizen that keeps people safe online.
- g. **5th grade-** Write down tips to keep people safe online. Create a story of a 5th grade student that gets in trouble because he/she didn't follow online safety rules. What lesson did the character learn and how can he/she help others not make the same mistake?
