Ifter retiring I found I had a lot of extra time on my hands. In 2012, I started to look at ways to use the Publisher skills I had acquired on my job. Creating catalogs and flyers was something I enjoyed. I looked at what was needed in the Spencer community, and I heard from friends and neighbors that they would like to have more local news and events. I started to create a newsletter rather than a newspaper. The idea was to get upcoming events to readers in a timely manner. I presented the idea to the Spencer Chamber as I was looking for local businesses to help with the cost of printing. Thankfully, the idea of a monthly newsletter was well received.

The first year I did a bulk mailing to all the residents in Spencer. By placing the printed version into the readers' hands, it helped cement the value of the newsletter. This would never have happened without the generosity of the chamber members. As you can imagine, this was a labor of love rather than a large profit business. Eventually the majority of readership became electronic and sent out to an email list. We continued to have printed copies available but at a much-reduced rate from the thousands of copies initially printed. I was able to reduce the cost of ads to my wonderful and loyal clients and everyone was happy.

For 5 ½ years, I continued to be the editor and creator of the Village Voice of Spencer. When I decided to move to New Mexico for continued art education, I was happy to turn the newsletter over to Steve Pilz. I am thrilled that it continues today.

From the Editor As my title indicates, this newsletter just had its eleventh birthday. In two more years it could be a bratty teenager; (groan) let's hope not.

It was sometime in September of 2017 that Harley Meyer approached me about taking over Judy's newsletter. I had retired from teaching thirteen years earlier and, like Judy, had a lot of extra time on my hands. Harley said it was mostly editing a newsletter. "You can do it", he said. He said that a lot that night.

I mulled it over some. I'd edited writing most of my life. I read enough 7th and 8th grader essays to ensure my place in heaven. I gave Judy a call. Suddenly I was back in school again.

If Judy was the creator, brains and the artistic side of the Village Voice then perhaps I could be it's historian. As we got to know one another in my kitchen she mentioned getting ready to sell her house. I inquired as to where that was. Second house up from Wisconsin Str., on La Salle, across from the ARC Park. That was Lorraine Cooks when I was a kid. ARC Park was a junk yard. A mention of Nutz; used to be Picus IGA, and so on and so on. Judy seemed impressed. It was just home to me. After being away for 25 years or so with college and career I still knew the folks and the places but not many knew me.

Judy signed off in August of 2017 with no replacement in sight so there was no Village Voice that September. But when Judy mentioned she'd done it for 5 1/2 years I made a mental note and shot for the same. Last month marked 67 newsletters or about $5\,1/2$ years.

I've tried to stay true to Judy's vision, making a change or two only; one being the color change over to Rocket-red.in May of 2018. When in Rome, I figure.

I was proud to read that Judy was thrilled that the newsletter continues today. Thanks Judy! You made it happen.

Village of Spencer Safe Room

Tn the event of a Tornado Warning issued for the Village of Spencer and the surrounding areas, The Village RNADO of Spencer Safe Room is available for SHELTER anyone needing shelter.



The Safe Shelter is located at: 300 N. School Str. Spencer WI - Door #12.

Village of Spencer residents are encouraged to purchase a NOAA All Hazard Radio, install a weather alert smartphone app, and/or sign-up for Marathon, Clark or Wood County Code Red Emergency Notification system. When a tornado warning is issued, Door #12 and the interior door to the fitness center will be unlocked. Any individual needing shelter and feel they can safely make it to the facility are welcome to utilize it. The Spencer Fire department will be onsite to serve as the room supervisor and will be able to issue first aid or any other support deemed necessary.

The safe room was designed for a two-hour maximum occupancy duration during a severe weather event; it is not intended and was not designed for long-term sheltering. The onsite supervisor will determine when conditions are good and an all clear will be communicated.

Outdoor Pickleball Courts an Inspiration to Realization

In Mid-August of 2022 several members of the Area Recreational Club (ARC) kicked around the idea of outdoor pickleball courts in Spencer. Meetings were held with the Spencer Park Committee and the Village Board Members; the best location for the Village was decided upon. The ARC officers each took on various roles drawing plans, researching designs, seeking bids, developing budgets for different phases, writing grants, contacting local businesses for support and setting up public fund raising. By mid-November of 2022 a ground breaking was held at the Village ARC Park and the foundation for the complex was installed. This support and progress was almost hard to believe!

Now we are in mid-April and we are 90 percent funded for Phase 1 having raised \$53,000 of our budget of 59,400. We have just been awarded a \$15,000 grant from the Community Foundation of North Central Wisconsin which put our grant funding revenue at 42 percent for the project. The service-in-kind revenue at 26 percent, public donations at 20 percent, memorial funds at 8 percent and area businesses at 4 percent. We have another 10 percent to raise to complete Phase 1, which is \$6,400.

Helping support the project this month was Choice Recycling with a material donation of the rebar needed for the 14 equipment foundations and the rebar for a $6' \times 33'$ concrete entry slab/walk. This concrete slab will also house $3' \times 20'$ structure, 8' being a locked storage area and 12' open dugout concept with bench seating.





We have a signed contract with American Asphalt for the black topping for \$38,750. Our current hands-on-revenue is \$34,452. As soon as Mother Nature brings us a little taste of summer, American Asphalt will be do the final shaping, We will then do the equipment foundation installation

This past month pickleball players put down their paddle and picked up hammers, tape measures and speed squares as we assembled and constructed our in-ground sleeves, built rebar cages for sonotube /concrete equipment foundation and framed the forms for setting the sonotubes.

Your help is still needed to meet the final goal of Phase I and to start funding Phase 2. All donations are tax deductible and can be made payable to the Village of Spencer, memo-pickleball courts. On April 11th Spencer librarian Audrey Kohlbeck hosted a program called "What's Happening in Spencer" featuring Chief of Police Shawn Bauer and Village Administrator Paul Hensch. 23 citizens attended.

Chief Bauer began by stating his staff now included four full-time officers and two that worked part time. The department responded to 2,625 calls in the past year. There were 912 traffic stops, 158 medical emergency calls, 94 follow-up investigations, 78 criminal calls, 72 (911) Hang-up calls and 60 animal complaints.

Starting in the fall of 2023 there will be a part time officer at the Spencer Schools. The officer will work with students and staff with programs such as "Stranger-Danger".

Administrator Hensch fielded numerous questions about the streets in the village. He said eight tons of cold patch had been used this year and commented on future projects for Willow Drive and Park Str.

He spoke about new businesses, new homes and an apartment complex in the new sub-division, the conditions of the old city wells and the drilling of a new one, the new pickleball courts, etc. Hensch also stated that Jason Foth retired as Fire Chief, to be replaced by Troy Shull. Thanks Audrey, etc.
