### Message from the Mayor



Hello Medford!

Spring is in full swing in Medford and April was busy! We hosted our Citywide Clean Up, an Egg Hunt and Bunny Visit, celebrated Patriot's Day and Arab American Heritage Month, and so much more. We've also been honoring Earth Month by outlining our tree planting plan for 2023, pruning our trees at Wright's Pond and have once again been designated as a Tree City USA! On top of all that, we're looking forward to a busy construction season, with improvements to many of our parks, streets, sidewalks, and more tree stump removals!

Here are some of our April highlights:

- Over 400 people in 17 different locations around the city cleaned up nearly 10 tons of trash at our Citywide Clean Up! We smashed our goals for the year and our City looks great, thanks to you!
- We will be planting over 200 trees around Medford as part of our continual tree canopy strategy to make Medford even more green. This plan for 2023 builds upon the 180 trees that were planted last year.
- Secured \$80K to remove 160 tree stumps this year. We've already removed 50, and will have the remaining 110 done by June!
- The Big Sweep started on Monday, April 24 and continues into the first few weeks of May! Don't forget to check your zone so you know when to move your car off the street. More information on street sweeping and your zone can be found at <u>www.medfordma.org/street-sweeping</u>.

Spring "Big Sweep" to Begin on April 24



### City Seeks to Transform Dorothy T. Hegner Community Center into a Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness Site

The City of Medford has applied for over \$2 million in federal funding to transform the Dorothy T. Hegner Center into a Municipal Vulnerability Preparedness site serving the community in a variety of essential functions, Mayor Breanna Lungo-Koehn announced. The site will also host after-school programming and other community-oriented recreation activities when not being used during emergencies.

Medford's application centered on the current lack of a community space that staff hope to use to coordinate emergency response and serve as a resiliency hub for residents during climate emergencies. The administration seized on the opportunity to secure federal funding to help renovate and restore the center ensuring that an accessible, resilient and safe facility can be utilized for sheltering and informing the community without putting financial constraints on the public.

Medford Outlines Tree Planting and Maintenance Strategy for 2023 Season



The Medford DPW will conduct spring street sweeping over the course of several weeks, beginning on Monday, April 24. In the interest of public health and public safety, the DPW will proceed with the spring Big Sweep over several weeks to clear leaves and debris from streets and catch basins, allowing for proper drainage of water and making sure that our City's streets are clean and safe. The DPW conducts two Big Sweep events on all secondary roads twice each year, once in the spring and once in the fall.

Street sweeping will be conducted Monday through Friday, between the hours of 8 am and 6 pm Street sweeping is divided into 14 zones with one zone conducted each day. The full schedule and a list of all 14 zones, can be found at <u>www.medfordma.org/street-sweeping</u>. In the event of heavy rain or severe weather, sweeping may be cancelled on that day, and would be rescheduled for the end of the regular schedule. # City Taps New Human Resources Director

The City of Medford will be planting over 200 trees throughout the community during the 2023 season as part of its continual tree canopy strategy, Mayor Breanna Lungo-Koehn announced. The City will invest additional Community Preservation Act Funds as well as ARPA funding to build upon last year's total of 180 new trees planted.

Dozens of different tree species will be planted to ensure the health and sustainability of the City's tree inventory. The goal is to plant trees, in greater numbers of species and varieties, in locations where they can grow and thrive into maturity. Diversification of species and planting of trees in appropriate locations, especially under urban conditions, will ensure success of trees and provide benefits to the community for the foreseeable future.

# Fire Engine 3 Closed for Renovation

The Medford Fire Department has begun work on the floor slab replacement and front ramp at the Engine 3 Fire Station at 276 Salem Street. The work begins on Monday, March 27 and will take approximately four months to complete.

Engine 3 will be closed beginning on Sunday, March 26 at 8am and will remain closed until the project is complete. Ladder 2 will remain in Beginning on April 4, the City is now accepting applications for restaurants and eateries interested in offering outdoor dining options. Medford's outdoor dining season lasts from March 1 to October 31.

Through its partnership with Helpsy, a textile recycling company, the city has been able to help residents recycle 302 pounds of unwanted clothing in March.

As the largest clothing collector in the

service, running out of the Headquarters Station, and the rest of the Engine 3 apparatus will be stored at Engine 4. The station closure is necessary for the health and safety of the firefighters and to allow construction crews to complete this work as fast as possible.

### Medford Accepting Applications For Next Poet Laureate

The City, in partnership with the Medford Arts Council, is currently seeking applicants to fill the position of Poet Laureate, Mayor Breanna Lungo-Koehn announced. The Medford Poet Laureate will serve a two-year term from July 2023 to June 2025 and will receive a \$2,000 stipend each year.

The City of Medford Poet Laureate, acting as the official City poet, will highlight poets and poetry, and literature, particularly working with community members who may traditionally have less access to poetry. Working with the City Administration and the Medford Arts Council, the Poet Laureate will strive to increase access to senior citizens, youth, and non-English speakers across various platforms.

Northeast, Helpsy partners with municipalities and organizations across 11 states to collect unwanted clothing and other textiles in order to keep clothes out of landfills. In 2021, the company diverted nearly 30 million pounds of textiles from landfills through a combination of clothing drives, home pickups, thrift store partners and clothing receptacles.

As part of its environmental mission, Helpsy now requires a three bag minimum for pickups. The company is optimizing routes in order to use resources as wisely as possible and reduce environmental impact.


