Wellness Policy - Executive Summary (2022-2023)

Schools across the district continue to work on implementing the Wellness policy. In the 2021-2022 school year, the district participated in a triennial review assessment, which included the School Site-Level Assessment Questionnaire ("SLAQ") and the Smarter Lunchrooms Scoreboard. These assessment tools provided information for the wellness committee to highlight areas of strength and opportunities for improvement, which guided the wellness committee to identify next steps.

The assessment identified areas of strength as:

- -A clear understanding of the wellness policy and meal programs on the school campuses
- -Promotion of health food and beverage choices for all students across the school campuses and sound encouragement for students' participation in the national school meal program.
- -Credentialled physical education teachers provide physical education opportunities to students that align to the California State PE standards.

The assessment identified areas of opportunities as:

- -Nutritional material has not been universally adopted by the district, therefore, limited instructional opportunities have been provided to credentialled teachers to teach nutrition education and health food choices.
- -Greater focus should be placed on engaging both parents and students in understanding and participating in the national school meal program (breakfast and lunch). Limited information is provided to parents, staff and students about the breakfast and lunch program, including but not limited to a monthly menu, nutritional information on menu items and highlight school breakfast and lunch programs.
- -There is not a school garden at each elementary site across the district, although the administration and staff have showed interest.

Based on the outcome of the review, the following next steps have been identified as priority:

- -Adopt an evidence-based curriculum for nutrition and education that is aligned with National Health Education standards for grades K-6.
- -A concerted effort will be placed on engaging parents and students in the breakfast and lunch program. Monthly information will be provided to parents about the school menu, through fun and engaging "nutrition nuggets."

- -A school garden will be developed at the school stie and managed by school personnel. Once a school garden is in place, students will be able to plant, tend and gather fruits and vegetables grown in the garden and try them out in both raw and cooked forms.
- -Continue to educate staff, students, and the community on the district wellness policy through all possible venues.

Outcomes to date:

- -The district's Curriculum Committee reviewed various health related curriculum and selected a curriculum that will be piloted in the 2023 summer program and implemented across K-6 in the 2023-2024 school year.
- -The food services department is now including fun and engaging "nutritional nuggets" on the monthly menu which is provided to parents both in paper form and on the district's website.
- -Individual school sites have discussed ways in which school breakfast and lunch menu items can be highlighted on the school campus such as using a sandwich board, informing students of the menu during morning announcements and/or providing students with opportunities to create art pieces to hang in the cafeteria to highlight healthy food choices.
- -Individual school sites administrators are exploring ideas with staff on the feasibility and management of developing school gardens. A few administrators have researched various grant opportunities for funding support for hydroponic and aquaponic growing systems for school gardens.
- -The wellness committee continues to partner with outside agencies to support the effort of educating staff, students and the community on the districts wellness policy and the importance of a healthy lifestyle.

PURPOSE: Regulation updated to clarify the limited exception when seclusion and/or

behavioral constraint may be used, and to reflect that it cannot be applied for

longer than necessary to contain the dangerous behavior.

Regulation 5131.41: Use Of Seclusion And Restraint

Original Adopted Date: Pending

District staff shall enforce standards of appropriate student conduct in order to provide a safe and secure environment for students and staff on campus but are prohibited from using seclusion and behavioral restraint to control student behavior except as authorized by law when the behavior poses a clear and present danger of serious physical harm to the student, other students, or others on campus, and that cannot be immediately prevented by a less restrictive response.

Definitions

Behavioral restraint includes mechanical restraint or physical restraint used as an intervention when a student presents an immediate danger to self or to others. Behavioral restraint does not include postural restraints or devices used to improve a student's mobility and independent functioning rather than to restrict movement. (Education Code 49005.1)

Mechanical restraint means the use of a device or equipment to restrict a student's freedom of movement. Mechanical restraint does not include the use of devices as prescribed by an appropriate medical or related services professional, including, but not limited to, adaptive devices or mechanical supports used to achieve proper body position, balance, or alignment; vehicle safety restraints during the transport of a student; restraints for medical immobilization; or orthopedically prescribed devices which permit a student to participate in activities without risk of harm. Mechanical restraint also does not include the use of devices by peace officers or security personnel for detention or for public safety purposes. (Education Code 49005.1)

Physical restraint means a personal restriction that immobilizes or reduces the ability of a student to move the torso, arms, legs, or head freely. Physical restraint does not include a physical escort in which a staff member temporarily touches or holds the student's hand, wrist, arm, shoulder, or back for the purpose of inducing a student who is acting out to walk to a safe location. Physical restraint also does not include the use of force by peace officers or security personnel for detention or for public safety purposes. (Education Code 49005.1)

Prone restraint means the application of a behavioral restraint on a student in a facedown position. (Education Code 49005.1)

Seclusion means the involuntary confinement of a student alone in a room or an area from which the student is physically prevented from leaving. Seclusion does not include a timeout involving the monitored separation of the student in an unlocked setting, which is implemented for the purpose of calming the student. (Education Code 49005.1)

Prohibitions

Seclusion and behavioral restraint of students shall not be used in any form as a means of coercion, discipline, convenience, or retaliation. (Education Code 49005.8)

In addition, staff shall not take any of the following actions: (Education Code 49005.2, 49005.8)

- 1. Administer a drug that is not a standard treatment for a student's medical or psychiatric condition in order to control the student's behavior or restrict the student's freedom of movement
- 2. Use locked seclusion, unless it is in a facility otherwise licensed or permitted by state law to use as a locked
- 3. Use a physical restraint technique that obstructs a student's respiratory airway or impairs a student's breathing or respiratory capacity, including a technique in which a staff member places pressure on the student's back or places the staff member's body weight against the student's torso or back
- 4. Use a behavioral restraint technique that restricts breathing, including, but not limited to, the use of a pillow, blanket, carpet, mat, or other item to cover a student's face
- 5. Place a student in a facedown position with the student's hands held or restrained behind the student's back

6. Use a behavioral restraint for longer than is necessary to contain the behavior that poses a clear and present danger of serious physical harm to the student or others

Limited Use of Seclusion or Restraint

Staff shall avoid the use of seclusion and behavioral restraint of students whenever possible. Seclusion or behavioral restraint may be used only to control student behavior that poses a clear and present danger of serious physical harm to the student or others, which cannot be immediately prevented by a response that is less restrictive. (Education Code 49005.4, 49005.6, 49005.8)

When used, seclusion or restraint shall not be applied for longer than is necessary to contain the dangerous behavior. For any situation that requires a prolonged use of an emergency intervention, staff shall seek the assistance of the principal or law enforcement agency, as applicable to the situation. (Education Code 56521.1)

If a student is put in seclusion, the student shall be under constant, direct observation of a staff member. Such observation may be through a window or another barrier through which the staff member is able to make direct eye contact with the student, but shall not be made through indirect means such as a security camera or closed-circuit television. (Education Code 49005.8)

If a student is restrained, staff shall afford the student the least restrictive alternative and the maximum freedom of movement, and shall use the least number of restraint points, while ensuring the physical safety of the student and others. (Education Code 49005.8)

If a prone restraint technique is used on a student, a staff member shall observe the student for any signs of physical distress throughout the use of the restraint. Whenever possible, the staff member monitoring the student shall not be involved in restraining the student. (Education Code 49005.8)

Seclusion or restraint may only be applied to a student with disabilities in accordance with rules specified in AR 6159.4 Behavioral Interventions For Special Education Students. Staff may not apply seclusion or restraint to students with disabilities based on assumptions or stereotypes about disabilities or students with disabilities or for behavior that would not result in restraint or seclusion for students without disabilities.

The superintendent or designee shall provide training to staff in the safe and effective use of seclusion and restraint as appropriate.

Documentation of Seclusion and Restraint

Parents/guardians and, if appropriate, residential care providers shall be notified within one school day whenever an emergency intervention is used or serious property damage occurs. (Education Code 56521.1)

A behavior emergency report shall be completed and forwarded to the Superintendent or designee for review. This report shall include: (Education Code 56521.1)

- 1. The name and age of the student
- 2. The setting and location of the incident
- 3. The name of the staff or other persons involved
- 4. A description of the incident and the emergency intervention used
- 5. A statement of whether the student is currently engaged in a systematic behavior intervention plan
- 6. Details of any injuries sustained by the student or others, including staff, as a result of the incident

Reports

The Superintendent or designee shall annually collect data on the number of times that seclusion, mechanical

restraint, and physical restraint were used on students and the number of students subjected to such techniques. The data shall be disaggregated by race/ethnicity and gender, and reported for students with a Section 504 plan, students with an individualized education program, and all other students. This report shall be submitted to the California Department of Education no later than three months after the end of each school year, and shall be available as a public record pursuant to Government Code 6250-6270. (Education Code 49006)

Education from the Office of Civil Rights, which issued guidance to help districts support students with disabilities and avoid dscriminatory discipline practices.

Site-Level Rules

Site-level rules shall be consistent with district state law and Board policies and administrative regulations. In developing site-level disciplinary rules, the principal or designee shall solicit the participation, views, and advice of one representative selected by each of the following groups: (Education Code 35291.5)

- 1. Parents/guardians
- 2. Teachers
- 3. School administrators
- 4. School security personnel, if any

5. For junior high schools, students enrolled in the school

Annually, site-level discipline rules shall be reviewed and, if necessary, updated to align with any changes in <u>state law</u>, district discipline policies <u>and regulations</u>, <u>and/or goals for school safety and climate as specified in the district's local control and accountability plan. A copy of the rules shall be filed with the Superintendent or designee for inclusion in the comprehensive safety plan.</u>

School rules shall be communicated to students clearly and in an age-appropriate manner.

It shall be the duty of each employee of the school to enforce the school rules on student discipline. (Education Code 35291.5)

Disciplinary Strategies

To the extent possible, staff shall use disciplinary strategies that keep students in school and participating in the instructional program. Except when a student's students' presence causes a danger to himself/herselfthemselves or others or he/she commits they commit a single act of a grave nature or an offense for which suspension or expulsion is required by law, suspension or expulsion shall be used only when other means of correction have failed to bring about proper conduct. Disciplinary strategies may include, but are not limited to:

Discussion or conference between school staff, the student, and the student and his/herstudent's
parents/guardians

2. Referral of the student to the school counselor or other school support service personnel for case management and counseling

4. When applicable, referral for a comprehensive psychosocial or psychoeducational assessment, including for purposes of creating an individualized education program or a Section 504 plan

- 5. Enrollment in a program for teaching prosocial behavior or anger management
- 6. Participation in a restorative justice program
- 7. A positive behavior support approach with tiered interventions that occur during the school day on campus
- 8. Participation in a social and emotional learning program that teaches students the ability to understand and manage emotions, develop caring and concern for others, make responsible decisions, establish positive relationships, and handle challenging situations capably
- 9. Participation in a program that is sensitive to the traumas experienced by students, focuses on students' behavioral health needs, and addresses those needs in a proactive manner
- After-school programs that address specific behavioral issues or expose students to positive
 activities and behaviors, including, but not limited to, those operated in collaboration with local
 parent and community groups

15. Reassignment to an alternative educational environment

16. Suspension and expulsion in accordance with law, Board policy, and administrative regulation

When, by law or district policy, other means of correction are required to be implemented before a student could be suspended or expelled, any other means of correction implemented shall be documented and retained in the student's records. (Education Code 48900.5)

A teacherStaff shall enforce disciplinary rules fairly, consistently, and in accordance with the district's nondiscrimination policies.

When disciplining a student who has been identified for special education and related services, the procedures specified in Administrative Regulation 5144.2 - Suspension And Expulsion/Due Process (Students With Disabilities) shall be applied. If a student has not been identified as a student with a disability and the district suspects the behavior that resulted in discipline may be based in an unidentified disability, the district shall conduct an evaluation to determine if the student has a disability which requires an IEP or 504 plan. (U.S.C. 1412(a)(3))

Recess Restriction

<u>Teachers</u> may restrict a student's recess time only when <u>he/she believesthey believe</u> that this action is the most effective way to bring about improved behavior. When recess restriction <u>may involveinvolves</u> the withholding of physical activity from a student, <u>the teacherteachers</u> shall try other disciplinary measures before imposing the restriction. Recess restriction shall be subject to the following conditions:

- 1. The student shall be given adequate time to use the restroom and get a drink or eat lunch, as appropriate.
- 2. The student shall remain under a certificated employee's supervision during the period of restriction.

Teachers

The student's teacher shall inform the principal of any recess restrictions they impose imposed.

Detention After School

Students may be detained for disciplinary reasons <u>for</u> up to one hour after the close of the maximum school day. (5 CCR 353)

If a student will miss his/her, or until the departure of the school bus on account of being detained after school, or to which they have been assigned if applicable. (5 CCR 307, 353)

the student is not transported by school bus, the principal or designee shall notify parents/guardians of the detention at least one day in advance so that alternative transportation arrangements may be made. The student shall not be detained unless the principal or designee notifies the parent/guardian.

In cases where the school bus departs more than one hour after the end of the school day, students may be detained until the bus departs. (5 CCR 307, 353)

Students shall remain under the supervision of a certificated employee during the period of detention.

Students may be offered the choice of serving their detention on Saturday rather than after school. (cf. 6176 - Weekend/Saturday Classes)

Community Service

As part of or instead of disciplinary action, the Board of Trustees, Superintendent, principal, or principal's designee may, at his/her discretion, require a student to perform community service during nonschool hours on school grounds or, with written permission of the student's parent/guardian, off school grounds. Such service may include, but is not limited to, community or school outdoor beautification, community or campus betterment, and teacher, peer, or youth assistance programs. (Education Code 48900.6)

This community service option is not available for a student who has been suspended, pending expulsion, pursuant to Education Code 48915. However, if the recommended expulsion is not implemented or the expulsion itself is suspended, then the student may be required to perform community service for the resulting suspension. (Education Code 48900.6)

Notice to Parents/Guardians and Students

At the beginning of the school year, the Superintendent or designee shall notify parents/guardians, in writing, about the availability of district rules related to discipline. (Education Code 35291, 48980)

The Superintendent or designee shall also provide written notice of disciplinary rules to transfer students at the time of their enrollment in the district.

ITEM: Review recommended updates for Board Policy 5141.33 - Head Lice

PURPOSE:

This policy update recommended by CSBA recognizes that head lice infestations among students requires treatment, but it does not pose a risk of transmitting disease. The district will still encourage early detection and treatment in a manner that minimizes disruption to the educational program of students and reduces student absences. Significant changes to the district current policy allows students to remain in school if found with active, adult head lice for the remainder of the school day. The parent will be provided information about treatment and encouraged to begin treatment of the student immediately. The parent/guardian will also be informed that the student shall be checked upon return to school the next day and allowed to remain in school if no active head lice are detected. If a student is found to consistently infested with head lice, the student will be referred to a multidisciplinary team, which may consist of the school nurse, representatives from the local health department and social workers, to determine the best approach for identifying and resolving the problems contributing to the student's head lice infestation. The ultimate goal of this policy change is to ensure students are properly treated for head lice, parents are educated, and students remain in school.

Policy 5141.33: Head Lice

Original Adopted Date: 05/16/2001

To prevent the spread of head lice infestations, school The Board of Trustees recognizes that head lice infestations among students require treatment but do not pose a risk of transmitting disease. The Superintendent or designee shall encourage early detection and treatment in a manner that minimizes disruption to the educational program and reduces student absences.

The Superintendent or designee may distribute information to parents/guardians of preschool and elementary students regarding routine screening, symptoms, accurate diagnosis, and proper treatment of head lice infestations. The Superintendent or designee also may provide related information to school staff.

School employees shall report all suspected cases of head lice to the school nurse or designee as soon as possible. The nurse or designee shall examine the student and any siblings of affected students or members of the same household. If nits or lice are found, the student shall be excluded from attendance and parents/guardians informed about recommended treatment procedures and sources of further information.

(cf. 5141.3 - Health Examinations)

The Superintendent or designee shall send home the notification required by law for excluded students. (Education Code 48213)

(cf. 5112.2 Exclusions from Attendance)

(cf. 5145.6 - Parental Notifications)

If there are twolf a student is found with active, adult head lice, he/she shall be allowed to stay in school until the end of the school day. The parent/guardian of any such student shall be given information about the treatment of head lice and encouraged to begin treatment of the student immediately and to check all members of the family. The parent/guardian also shall be informed that the student shall be checked upon return to school the next day and allowed to remain in school if no active head lice are detected.

Upon the student's return to school, the school nurse or designee shall check the student for active head lice. If it is determined that the student remains infected with head lice, the school nurse or designee shall contact the student's parent/guardian to discuss treatment. As needed, he/she may provide additional resources and/or referral to the local health department, health care providers, or other agencies.

If a student is found consistently infested with head lice, he/she may be referred to a multidisciplinary team, which may consist of the school nurse, representatives from the local health department and social services, and other appropriate individuals, to determine the best approach for identifying and resolving problems contributing to the student's head lice infestations.

When it is determined that one or more students affected in anya class, all students in the class shall be examined, and information about head lice shall be sent home to all or school are infested with head lice, the principal or designee may, at his/her discretion, notify parents/guardians of those students in that class or school and provide them with information about the detection and treatment of head lice.

Staff shall maintain the privacy of students identified as having head lice-and excluded from attendance. (cf. 4119.23/4219.23/4319.23 - Unauthorized Release of Confidential/Privileged Information)

Excluded students may return to school when (1) they bring a note from the parent/guardian verifying treatment, and (2) reexamination by the nurse or designee shows that all nits and lice have been removed.

Regulation 5141.33: Head Lice

| Last Revised Date: 07/30/2002

When a suspected case of head lice (pediculosis) is reported at a school or class operated by the district, the following guidelines shall be adhered to by concerned school personnel:

- 1. The student shall be examined.
- 2. If nits or lice are found, the student shall be excluded from school and referred for treatment.
- 3. All siblings/members of the same household of the affected student in the school shall be examined for lice.
- 4. Privacy must be insured in the pediculosis identification and referral process (Education Code # 49450). Individual students shall be examined in private. Whole class head checks will be done in the classroom with results confidentially maintained. Removal of an infested student from the classroom and school shall be in a manner that protects his/her privacy.
- 5. The classroom teacher shall be informed of the problem and requested to observe and refer any other suspected cases to the office.
- 6. If other referred students in the classroom of an infested student are found to have lice, the entire class shall be checked. The administrator shall decide upon the method of screening to be used in the classroom.
- 7. Parents/guardians should be notified in writing at the discretion of the administrator of:
- a. Recent lice infestation in their child's classroom.
- b. How to check hair:
- c. Recommended treatment procedures;
- d. Where to obtain further information.
- 8. The student who is excluded from school because of lice infestation may return to school after treatment with an effective pediculocide and removal of all visible nits. Students absent from school for head lice/nits will be excused for up to three calendar days. Absences occurring on the fourth calendar day will be deemed unexcused.
- 9. After treatment of infected student shall be examined by the principal or designee to determine that the student has been successfully treated, including removal of all visible nits, before being allowed to return to the classroom.

If the student is again found to have nits, the child will be sent home and a home call may be initiated to explain to parents, treatment, follow through (i.e., cleaning of the home environment, washing of clothing, bagging of non-washable items, etc.) and potential hazards of improper treatment discussed.

- 10. In schools or classrooms with recurrent infestations with head lice, it may be necessary to alter certain school activities (i.e. hang coats on chairs, put hats in coat sleeves, eliminate group activities for two weeks, eliminate dress up activities, etc.) or custodial procedures.
- 11. A school nurse may conduct upon request an educational program regarding the identification, prevention and treatment of head lice which shall be directed to parents/guardians, staff and students. Some examples include:
- a. Informational letter given to parents/guardians at the beginning of each school year.
- b. Presentations to parent groups conducted by the school nurses.
- c. Video tapes on head lice prevention are made available for use at the schools.
- d. Nurses can provide classroom presentations on the spread and treatment of head lice.



Policy also updated to reference NEW GUIDANCE from the California Department of Education which clarifies that districts are prohibited from

charging fees for summer school.

Policy 6177: Summer Learning Programs

Last Revised Date: 09/09/2015

The Governing Board recognizes that an extended break from the instructional program may result in significant learning loss, especially among disadvantaged and low-achieving students, and desires to provide opportunities during the summer for students to practice essential skills, make academic progress, and develop social, emotional, and physical needs and interests through hands-on engaging learning experiences.

Summer programs offered by the district shall be aligned with the district's local control and accountability plan (LCAP), other applicable district and school plans, and the educational program provided during the school year. When feasible, summer programs shall blend high-quality academic instruction in core curricular and/or elective subjects with recreation, nutrition programs, social and emotional development, and support services that encourage attendance, student engagement in learning, and student wellness.

Summer School

The Superintendent or designee, with Board approval, may establish summer school day and/or evening classes.

The district's summer school program may be used to provide supplemental instruction to students needing remediation and/or enrichment in core academic subjects.

Priority for enrollment in summer school programs shall be given to district students who are in grades transitional kindergarten (TK)-6 and are required to be offered or provided access to Expanded Learning Opportunities Programs pursuant to Education Code 46120 and BP/AR 5184.2 - Before/After School Programs.

As appropriate, priority for enrollment in summer school programs may also be given to district students who:

- 1. Have been retained or are at risk of being retained at their grade level
- 2. Demonstrate academic deficiencies in core curriculum areas
- 3. Are in targeted student groups identified in the district's LCAP as needing increased or improved services to succeed in the educational progra

Remaining openings may be offered to other district students on a first-come first-served basis or on a lottery basis.

Sites for summer school programs may be rotated in an effort to make summer school programs more accessible to all students, regardless of residence or regular attendance area, and to accommodate the maintenance needs of district schools.

The Superintendent or designee shall annually report to the Board on summer school enrollment in

the current year for the program as a whole and disaggregated by grade level, school that the students attend during the regular school year, and student population. In addition, the Superintendent or designee may report on the extent to which students successfully achieved the outcomes established for the program.

Additional Summer Learning Opportunities

The Superintendent or designee may collaborate with parents/guardians, city and county agencies, community organizations, child care providers, and/or other interested persons to develop, implement, and build awareness of organized activities that support summer learning.

Strategies to support summer learning may include, but are not limited to:

- 1. Providing information to students and parents/guardians about summer reading programs scheduled to be conducted by public libraries or community organizations
- Collaborating with the local parks and recreation agency and/or community organizations to provide day camps, sports programs, or other opportunities for physical education and activity
- 3. Collaborating with workforce development agencies, businesses, and community organizations to provide summer job training opportunities that include an academic component
- 4. Encouraging reading in the home, such as providing lists of recommended reading to students and parents/guardians, establishing a target number of books or pages, and providing prizes for achievement of reading goals
- 5. Assigning summer vacation homework in core curricular subject(s) for extra credit
- 6. Conducting occasional, interactive "fun days" during the summer to provide activities related to art, music, science, technology, mathematics, environmental science, multicultural education, debate, or other subject
- 7. Arranging opportunities for community service

Regulation 6186 Dual Language Immersion Education: Foreign Language Institute

Kindergarten Recruitment

The Dual Immersion Program begins in kindergarten where all-day sessions (307 minutes of instruction) will be offered. Two-thirds of each class shall be English only speakers and one-third of each class shall be native Spanish speakers.

Initial Enrollment Procedures:

For the purpose of this Regulation, initial enrollment is from Kindergarten Round Up to May 30th.

- 1. Parents/guardians of new kindergarten students will sign a letter of commitment to have their children participate in the program.
- 2. Any new resident kindergarten student who has siblings at the site gets first choice.
- 3. New resident kindergarten students without siblings at the site are selected next for the program.
- 4. Remaining spaces will be filled by non-resident students through lottery, maintaining an English only and Spanish speaking balance of two-thirds and one-third.
- 5. Kindergarten students whose parents do not opt for the program participation at the site will be placed in the regular kindergarten classroom(s).
- 6. Should the regular kindergarten classroom at the site reach maximum enrollment, the parents of the kindergarten student may request School of Choice.


Procedures for Recruitment/Placement

After initial enrollment in kindergarten the following procedures shall be followed to ensure enrollment and language balance:

- 1. Late entering kindergarten English only and Spanish speakers may enter the kindergarten program through December. After December, only late-entry Spanish Speakers may enroll in the program on a space available basis.
- 2. Late enrolling students in grade one may enroll in the program if they were in a previous bilingual program, and if space is available.
- 3. Students newly enrolling in grades 2-6 need to be able to read in both Spanish and English and will be interviewed by the Dual Immersion Resource Teacher prior to placement.
- 4. A letter of commitment is required of each new enrollee K-6.

Enrollment Procedures for First to Sixth Grade students who do not wish to participate in the program:

As the Dual Immersion Program progresses from kindergarten to first to second and finally to sixth grade, parents of students in grades one to six may request School of Choice.

District Wide

English language arts and mathematics are basic skills and student growth is of interest to staff, parents/guardians, the community in general, the State Board of Education and the Board of Trustees. The school district must set content and performance standards for student achievement.

Therefore, the Board adopted the consultation draft of the English Language Arts and Mathematics Content standards in 1997. These rigorous standards reflect what all students in kindergarten through eighth grade are expected to know, understand, and be able to do. The Board intends that improved pupil performance shall be continuous and that extended learning opportunities shall be provided for students who are having difficulty meeting grade level standards. In addition, the Board intends that certificated staff shall receive continuous, enriching professional development that will strengthen their breadth and depth of knowledge and then be able to translate that knowledge into improved instruction to students.

The Board has determined that by the year 2006, 90 percent of all students will meet or exceed grade level standards in Language Arts and Mathematics. Utilizing 1997-98 results as base year, standards for growth shall be established each year thereafter to define the substantial progress, district wide, necessary for the district to make regular progress.

The Superintendent or designee shall present as a public hearing to the Board, no later than the second Board meeting in October of each year that results of the prior years' multiple measure assessments. Results shall be reported in the areas on English language arts and mathematics.

The report shall be in writing and shall include the following:

- 1. The number and percent of students districtwide and by school who score in the:
- a. Advanced Range (above grade level)
- b. Proficient Range (at grade level) and
- c. Basic Range (below grade level)
- 2. An interpretation of the results, including but not limited to:
- a. Trends and tendencies revealed by the results,
- b. Implications for future curricular planning, professional development and potential financial impact on the district.

It is generally recognized that norm referenced tests have limited value in analyzing the achievements of individual students. For this reason, the district shall use multiple measure of assessment that shall include the State adopted norm referenced test, evaluation of student portfolios, on demand tests and end of year Reference Exams at every grade level in language arts and mathematics. The district shall annually report individual student, school, and districtwide performance, to determine whether students are making progress.

Learning Support

The Superintendent or designee shall ensure that the school environment is a clean, safe, secure and healthy environment and one in which teachers can teach and students can learn.

The school sites shall develop strong family and community support systems that will enhance student learning with a focus on a student learning plan.

Staff, parents/guardians, and students shall have frequent opportunities to share in the decisions relating to student achievement. Teachers shall have frequent opportunities to: align curriculum and instruction to standards, utilize assessments to improve instruction as well as design and implement instructional opportunities required for all students to meet standards.

Policy 6142.2: AIDS Prevention Instruction

Original Adopted Date: Pending

The Board of Trustees recognizes that Human Immunodeficiency Virus (HIV) infection and Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome (AIDS) pose a public health crisis and that education is a necessary component for helping to slow the spread of this disease.

(cf. 5141.22 - Infectious Diseases)

(cf. 5141.23 - Infectious Disease Prevention)

The district shall offer a comprehensive, age-appropriate HIV/AIDS prevention curriculum in grades seven and eight.

The district's HIV/AIDS prevention curriculum shall be part of a comprehensive health education program that teaches acceptance of personal responsibility and emphasizes decisions that promote health.

(cf. 6142.8 - Comprehensive Health Education)

HIV/AIDS prevention instruction shall be focused on giving students the knowledge, skills and motivation to avoid or reduce high-risk behavior that may lead to HIV infection.

Staff members or others who present HIV/AIDS prevention instruction shall be adequately trained and have periodic inservice opportunities to remain knowledgeable of new prevention education techniques and new developments in the scientific understanding of HIV/AIDS.

The Superintendent or designee shall provide the parent/guardian of each student with written notice, pursuant to law and administrative regulation, explaining the purpose of the AIDS prevention instruction. (Education Code 48980, 51201.5)

This notice shall specify that a parent/guardian consent is required prior to his/her child receiving AIDS prevention instruction

(cf. 5145.6 - Parental Notifications)

The Superintendent or designee shall inform parents/guardians of their right to inspect all instructional materials related to HIV/AIDS instruction, and shall provide opportunities for inspection of materials before they are presented to students. (Education Code 51550)

(cf. 1312.2 - Complaints Concerning Instructional Materials)

A student shall not be subject to disciplinary action, academic penalty, or other sanction if the student's parent/guardian declines to permit the student to receive AIDS prevention instruction, and the student does not receive the instruction. (Education Code 51201.5, 51554, 51555)

An alternative educational activity shall be made available to students whose parents/guardians have requested that they not receive AIDS prevention instruction. The alternative educational activity shall occur while the AIDS prevention instruction is being delivered. (Education Code 51201.5, 51554, 51555)

Status: DRAFT

Regulation 6142.2: AIDS Prevention Instruction

Original Adopted Date: Pending

In accordance with law, HIV/AIDS prevention instruction shall be offered at least once in junior high or middle school and once in high school. Instruction shall be provided by trained instructors in appropriate courses and shall include: (Education Code 51201.5)

- 1. Information on the nature of AIDS and its effects on the human body.
- 2. Information on how the human immunodeficiency virus is and is not transmitted, including information on activities that present the highest risk of HIV infection.
- 3. Discussion of methods to reduce the risk of HIV infection, including:
- a. Emphasis that sexual abstinence, monogamy, and abstinence from intravenous drug use are the most effective means for AIDS prevention.
- b. Statistics based upon the latest medical information citing the failure and success rates of condoms and other contraceptives in preventing sexually transmitted HIV infection.
- c. Information on other methods that may reduce the risk of HIV transmission from intravenous drug use.
- 4. Discussion of the public health issues associated with AIDS.
- 5. Information on local resources for HIV testing and medical care.
- 6. Development of refusal skills to assist students to overcome peer pressure and use effective decision making skills to avoid high-risk activities.
- 7. Discussion about societal views on AIDS, including stereotypes and myths regarding persons with AIDS. This instruction shall emphasize compassion for persons suffering from debilitating handicaps and terminal diseases, like AIDS.

HIV/AIDS prevention instruction shall accurately reflect the latest information and recommendations from the U.S. Surgeon General, federal Centers for Disease Control, and the National Academy of Sciences. (Education Code 51201.5)

HIV/AIDS instruction may not be conducted in a manner that advocates drug use, a particular sexual practice, or sexual activities. AIDS prevention instruction shall be consistent with Education Code 51553. (Education Code 51201.5)

(cf. 6142.1 - Family Life/Sex Education)

The Superintendent/Principal or designee shall ensure that instructional materials related to HIV infection and AIDS prevention are available and appropriate for use with students of various ages and learning abilities, and that these materials may be used effectively with students who have special needs and those from a variety of ethnic, cultural and linguistic backgrounds. (Education Code 51201.5)

At the beginning of the school year, parents/guardians of students in grades 7 and 8 shall be notified in writing about the purposes of the AIDS prevention instruction and information stating that the parent/guardian has a right to request a copy of Education Code 51201.5 and 51553 relating to AIDS instruction. (Education Code 48980, 51201.5)

(cf. 5145.6 - Parental Notifications)

If a student enrolls in school after the beginning of the year, the parent/guardian shall receive the notice described above upon the student's enrollment. (Education Code 51201.5)

This notification shall inform parents/guardians that they may request in writing that their child not attend the class. (Education Code 51201.5)

No student shall attend AIDS prevention instruction if a written request that he/she not attend has been received by the school. (Education Code 48980, 51201.5, 51550, 51555)

The Superintendent/Principal or designee shall keep on file Education Code 51201.5 and 51553. (Education Code 51201.5)

At the beginning of the school year, or at the time of a student's enrollment, the Superintendent/Principal or designee shall notify parents/ guardians of any outside organization or guest speaker brought into the district to provide instruction in family life, human sexuality, AIDS or sexually transmitted diseases. This notification shall include the date of the instruction, the name of the organization or affiliation of each guest speaker and information regarding the parent/guardian's right to request a copy of Education Code 51201.5 and 51553. (Education Code 51554)

If arrangements for this instruction are made after the beginning of the school year, the parents/guardians shall be notified no fewer than 10, and no more than 15, days before the instruction is delivered. (Education Code 51554)

This notification is required whether the guest speakers are brought in by the district to lecture, distribute information, show a videotape, act out, conduct an activity involving student participation or provide audio material in either a classroom or assembly. (Education Code 51554)

OPTION 1: Open Campus

In order to give students an opportunity to demonstrate responsibility, independent judgment, and positive citizenship, the Governing Board establishes an open campus at all district high schools in which students shall have the privilege of leaving campus during lunch.

The principal or designee shall ensure that students granted this privilege meet any eligibility requirements established by the district.

The district shall send written notification to parents/guardians about the open campus policy at the beginning of the school year along with the parental notification required by Education Code 48980. Such notification shall include the language prescribed by Education Code 44808.5.

Students shall not leave school grounds at any other time during the school day without express permission of school authorities. Students who leave school without authorization shall be considered to have an unexcused absence and be subject to disciplinary action.

The principal or designee may revoke the open campus privilege for individual students for disciplinary reasons.

OPTION 1 ENDS HERE

OPTION 2: Closed Campus

In order to keep students in a supervised, safe, and orderly environment, the Governing Board establishes a closed campus at all district schools.

Students shall not leave school grounds at any time during the school day without express permission of school authorities. Students who leave school without authorization shall be considered to have an unexcused absence and be subject to disciplinary action.

Student handbooks shall fully explain all rules and disciplinary procedures involved in the maintenance of the closed campus.

OPTION 2 ENDS HERE

In order to keep students in a supervised, safe and orderly environment, the Board of Trustees establishes a closed campus at all district schools.

Students shall not leave the school grounds at any time during the school day without written permission of their parents/guardians and school authorities. Students who leave school without authorization shall be classified truant and subject to disciplinary action.

(cf. 5113 - Absences and Excuses)

At the beginning of the school year, students and parents/guardians shall be notified about the closed campus policy through the parent handbook.
