## Our ongoing approach to the COVID-19 pandemic



The Erlanger-Elsmere Schools will continue to require students, staff, and visitors to wear face coverings inside our facilities.

Universal masking while indoors is a key to ensuring that we can keep students and staff healthy and safe while maintaining in-person learning.

And, the Erlanger-Elsmere School District encourages all those that are eligible to receive a vaccine for COVID- 19 to do so. Continuing to increase the vaccinated population of our community and universal masking inside our schools are the two best

We have partnered with Newport-based Ethos Laboratories to implement a "Test to Stay" program.

This is a completely voluntary program supported by the State, so it is available at no cost to individuals or the school district. As we continue to prioritize the health and safety of our staff, students, and families and the continuation of in-person learning, this "Test to Stay" program will provide an opportunity for some staff and students to remain in classrooms instead of quarantining.

We will continue to monitor data from the Center for Disease Control and Prevention, the Kentucky Department of Health, and the Northern Kentucky Department of Health and make adjustments according to the latest recommendations. Summer sports camps were back in action, with basketball, volleyball, football, and soccer camps helping to prepare the next generation of Juggernauts!





### Addison Musk selected for Commonwealth Academy Program at Murray State

Congratulations to Addison Musk, a junior at Lloyd Memorial High School who participated in this summer's Commonwealth Academy Program at Murray State University over the summer. This is a newer program offered to Kentucky students and Addison is the first Lloyd Memorial student who has attended. The mission of the Commonwealth Honors Academy (CHA) is to challenge, educate, enlighten, and nurture the next generation of civic, academic, and business leaders of the region.

"Murray State is a school I had been looking at since my sophomore year as a nice, small school that still met my

academic and athletic needs," Addison said. "Early this year my student counselor, Mrs. Glass, sent out a message about the Commonwealth Academy and it instantly sparked my interest. After some thought, I applied and was accepted."

The CHA is a challenging three-week academic enrichment program for outstanding high school students who have completed their junior year and will return to high school as a senior in the fall following the Academy. Students take two honors-level college courses while at the Academy, which is offered at no cost.

Students are selected from the Commonwealth and surrounding states and receive six hours of honors-level university credit, have the opportunity to take six hours of tuition-free university courses at Murray State University during the subsequent academic year, and are awarded a four-year, renewable \$2,000 on-campus housing scholarship to attend Murray State University.

### Lindeman is Re-RAMPed

Lindeman Elementary was recognized at the American School Counselors Association's annual conference in Las Vegas for continuing to meet all the requirements to be a RAMP (Recognized ASCA Model Program) school. Lindeman is one of 13 Kentucky schools to receive this recognition.

The Recognized ASCA Model Program (RAMP) designation, awarded for aligning with the criteria in the ASCA National Model, recognizes schools that are committed to delivering a comprehensive, data-driven school counseling program and an exemplary educational environment.



It takes an entire school collaborating with an aligned counseling program to achieve RAMP. Counselors work to develop their programs to ensure they are evidencebased, research-based, and aligned with the process. Schools achieving this designation spend 80% of their time strategically and intentionally working proactively and interactively with students.

"Our school counselor, Ms. Kathy Koerner has worked hard to create a program that is focused on meeting student needs and ensuring their success," said Mrs. Angie Gabbard, Lindeman's principal.

Lindeman joins the district's other three elementary schools – Arnett, Howell, and Miles – and Tichenor Middle School in maintaining RAMP recognition of their exceptional service to our district's students.

## The Early Childhood Community Coalition

## *Drug Free* Healthy and strong from cradle to career

The Erlanger-Elsmere School District is proud to have received a Drug-Free Community Grant to prevent youth substance use and misuse. Under this new grant, our Early Childhood Community Coalition (E3C) has shifted its focus to include support of this initiative.

The E3C Drug Free serves the cities of Erlanger and Elsmere – communities that, together, account for over 27,000 residents – by joining community stakeholders to take action, promote, and support our youth and families to be healthy and strong from cradle to career. The goals of the coalition are to

establish and strengthen community collaboration and prevent youth from using alcohol and e-cigarette/tobacco products.

Under the leadership of Mrs. Amy Cooley, who coordinates the grant, the coalition plans to lay the groundwork and move the needle during its first year. Their goals include:

- Increasing infrastructures.
- Ensuring participation from 100% of 12 community sectors.
- Increasing the number of youth receiving prevention services from 2,305 K-12 to 2,513 youth ages 0-18.
- Reducing 30-day alcohol and e-cigarette use among students in Grade 10 by 2%.

Using evidence-based curriculums, youth-designed communication campaigns, family engagement, and community advocacy, E3C is engaging youth as leaders, families and school staff as partners, and community members as advocates for substance prevention. The Drug Free Communities (DFC) support program was established under the Drug-Free Communities Act of 1997, P.L. 105.20. The purpose of DFC funding is to address two major goals:

Establish and strengthen collaboration among communities, public and private non-profit agencies, and federal, state and local governments to support the efforts of community coalitions

2 Reduce substance use among youth and overtime among adults (specifically, underage drinking, tobacco/e-cigarettes/vaping)

## **A CLOSER LOOK AT THE SPECIFICS**

#### **Target Population**

Primarily children birth through age 5, and school-age students in grades K-12. The Erlanger-Elsmere School District has high diversity ratio for the Northern Kentucky area, with about 30% minorities.

#### **Primary Goals**

We plan to complete the current gap in the spectrum of substance prevention by including our youngest learners 0-5 years and expanding existing prevention efforts for school-aged youth.

#### Activities

Training staff and implementing evidence-based programs for preschool through grade 12 is our primary goal for year one. In addition, we plan to engage more members of our community with our schools through programs, therapy, training, messaging campaigns, community events, and services to address social emotional and substance prevention needs.

#### Accomplishments

The E3C Coalition was established in 2015 with 16 members from the early childhood arena and has grown to include 50 members from all over Northern Kentucky. This foundation of collaboration and knowledge of community partners will support this project, E3C Drug Free, as we build collaborative systems and change norms to prevent substance abuse.

#### The grant in action

Beginning in Spring 2021, the Coalition was able to connect with families on a deeper level as in-person activities and events resumed.

At the "Amazing Race to Kindergarten," representatives set up a substance prevention banner that highlighted the E3C coalition and Erlanger-Elsmere Schools as a backdrop for family pictures as incoming kindergartners and their caregivers entered the buildings.

The Coalition has been supporting The Dinner Table Project, which includes takehome boxes that include fun and important conversation topics for families to share around the dinner table.

Currently, the E3C Drug Free Coalition is partnering with Erlanger Baptist Church to host a "fan zone" before all of Lloyd's home football games as a way to foster safe and positive fun and camaraderie for our community's students and families. Poverty and substance abuse are significant challenges to successful life for our youth. Underage drinking and e-cigarette use include insufficient knowledge and coping skills and unaddressed social and mental health issues. These substance use problems erupt early, even before schoolage, in high-need environments.



## Edgar Arnett Elementary School

## Serving the children of Erlanger and Elsmere since 1967



In response to an influx of newly built homes and new families that moved into Erlanger and Elsmere during the middle of the twentieth century, the Erlanger-Elsmere School District welcomed a brand-new elementary school during the 1967-1968 school year – Edgar Arnett Elementary School.

Arnett Elementary, located at 3552 Kimberly Drive, has the distinction of sitting in two Kenton County cities, as the building was placed over a city boundary. Most of the school sits in Elsmere, while part of the school sits in Erlanger. The school was built on former farmland property, which at one time was owned by two area pioneer families: the Timberlakes and the Stevensons. Major William Thornton Timberlake, a veteran of the war of 1812, built his home in 1826 near the corner of present-day Alice Street and Stevenson Road. By 1856, Timberlake's son-in-law, Dr. John B. Stevenson had acquired the property. Marked by a Kentucky Historical Society marker, the original Timberlake home still stands near the corner of Alice Street and Stevenson Road in Erlanger.

Originally named "Stephenson Road Elementary," by the time of its dedication in the fall of 1967, the Erlanger-Elsmere Board of Education had renamed the school, "Edgar Arnett Elementary," in honor of their longest serving superintendent.

Mr. Arnett, born in 1895, was originally from Magoffin County, Kentucky. A World War I veteran, he attended Eastern State Normal School (now Eastern Kentucky University) where he was president of his class. He later completed his bachelor's degree at the University of Kentucky and received a master's degree from Columbia University in New York. Before coming to Elsmere in 1924, he was a principal of schools in Jenkins, Hendricks, and Gullett, Kentucky. Prior to the merger of the independent Elsmere and Erlanger school districts in 1928, Mr. Arnett had served as a teacher, principal, and superintendent in the independent Elsmere school district from 1924-1928. He became the first principal of Lloyd Memorial High School in the newly formed Erlanger-Elsmere



School District in 1928, and he became superintendent of the district in 1929.

Mr. Arnett, superintendent of the Erlanger-Elsmere School District from 1929 to 1965, also served as a member of the Erlanger-Elsmere Board of Education from 1968 to 1980. He dedicated nearly 60 years of his life to the boys and girls of the Erlanger and Elsmere communities. Present at the dedication of the Edgar Arnett Elementary school building in the fall of 1967, his oil portrait still proudly hangs in the school lobby in his honor.




Mr. Arnett's wife, Martha Dean Arnett (1912-1993) was also a familiar face in our school community. She owned and operated the Arnett Montessori School in Erlanger for many decades. Mr. Arnett passed away in 1989, and Mrs. Arnett in 1993. Mr. and Mrs. Arnett are buried in Forest Lawn Memorial Park in Erlanger.

At the time the building was constructed, the surrounding community was growing so quickly that major additions to the building were soon made — first in 1969 and again in 1972. More recent additions have included a three-story elevator in 2000, kitchen and cafeteria expansion in 2004, the addition of 2 modular classrooms in 2008, and a new office complex in 2019.

Now in its sixth decade of service to the Erlanger and Elsmere communities, Arnett Elementary has been fortunate to have had longevity in service of principals as the school has had only six principals at the administrative helm since its inception in 1967: Mr. Raymond Weaver (1967-1972); Mr. Oliver Bryant (1972-1994); Mr. David R. Palmore (1994-2009); Mr. Matt Engel (2009-2015); and Ms. Amanda New (2015-2021). Dr. Susan

Short, who begins her tenure this year, is the school's sixth principal.

## Chris Johnson, '01 At home in Scheben

Chris has been a fixture at Scheben since he was a student at Lloyd. He tried out for basketball his freshman year of high school, but didn't make the team. Instead, he became team manager and he's been an integral part of many of Lloyd's athletic teams ever since.

He ran track his sophomore and junior years, but couldn't stop there... he also served as a team manager. His junior year, he helped manage football, too.

After graduating from Lloyd in 2001, he just couldn't stay away. Chris stayed on to help out, running the clock and scoreboard, setting up for games, and cleaning up after while he attended Gateway Community and Technical College for an associate's degree in Applied Science. That involvement eventually led to a job, and he joined the district team in 2010 as a custodian at Miles Elementary. He had been in that role for a couple of years when the same position opened up for Scheben... Chris was a natural fit.

The role has allowed him to continue to support the sports teams in the ways he's always enjoyed, while growing and evolving the role.

When his sister, Janie, got into school musicals, Chris and his family helped build sets and learned about the various aspects of theater production.

"It's changes in the job and the technical aspects – scoreboards, lighting, soundboard, stuff like that – that makes the job rewarding and a lot of fun," Chris said. "That, along with getting to talk to people and watch the teams play."

"I like the feel of Erlanger," Chris said. "It's not a big city, but not a small town. Everyone pretty much knows each other. It's a good place to call home." When Chris isn't busy supporting events at Scheben or cleaning up the football field after a game, he enjoys going to the zoo with his family, taking his sister fishing, or catching a hockey game with his brother. But he always returns back to Erlanger, which he's happy to call home.

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The Johnsons: A huge extended family

Chris Johnson is not the only member of his family who is dedicated to the Erlanger-Elsmere Schools... and specifically, Scheben Gymnasium.

The entire family rolls up their sleeves to support the facility and its activities. It's progressed with the family as the Johnson children have moved through the district.

Back when Chris and his older brother, James, were in elementary school, their mother Barb started out as a room mom. She did what she could to help out at her kids' schools, but stayed largely in the background until Chris was a junior. That year, Chris was the manager for boys basketball under Mr. Bryant Gillis, the team's coach. Mrs. Johnson volunteered to film the home games so Chris could be on the court with the team.

Fast forward, and Mrs. Johnson was filming all the basketball games Chris' senior year. And she continued to do so until 2020, when she was sidelined due to the pandemic.

As if that wasn't enough, Barb volunteered at Miles Elementary when her youngest child, daughter Janie, was in school. And when Janie went to Tichenor, she moved on to help out there. She is now in her eighth year volunteering at Tichenor, helping out however she can. She assists in the office, and makes copies for teachers. She laminates and runs things here and there. She delivers things to the Board office and picks up mail.

"You name it, I do it," Mrs. Johnson said.

When Janie became involved in the school musicals, the Johnson family spent six years filming the productions, sewing costumes, building sets, and applying hair and makeup. The entire family – Barb and her husband Jim, James, Chris, and Janie, have regularly served as chaperones on Lloyd's annual field trips to Cedar Point.

For the Johnsons, it all seems just feels like the right thing to do.

"We enjoy doing it," Barb said. "I enjoy helping in the office and, I know they can use the help. I'm there every day. I see everything they have going on, so anything I can do, I do it."

"There are so many people around here who have known me since I was a baby," Janie added. "So Erlanger is our huge extended family of sorts."

## Expanding, upgrading Woodside Park

The City of Elsmere is in the process of planning for the future expansion and upgrade of Woodside Park. In 2018, Elsmere purchased the former Grants Mobile Home Park at the intersection of Bedinger Street and Lytle Avenue. In 2021, Elsmere took complete possession of this land and began the process of trailer removal, site excavation and significant clean-up of the property. As outlined in the Elsmere Strategic Plan, many of the goals were to remove blight, increase recreation space, and identify





opportunities to engage the community. The expansion of

Woodside Park and this overall project accomplishes many of those goals. Through the feedback received from the community the rendering shows what The City of Elsmere hopes to provide to our residents for the future of Woodside Park.

## Park dedicated to Billy Bradford

The City of Elsmere recently dedicated a city park to former mayor and councilman Bill "Billy" Bradford, a racial pioneer who was the first African American to serve as mayor in Northern Kentucky.

The park - at the corner of Garvey Avenue and Ash Street - sits across from the city hall where he served and from the firehouse of the Elsmere Fire District that he helped form. The existing park features a gazebo, walking paths, benches, landscaping and three flag poles.

"Billy Bradford served the people Elsmere for decades, truly dedicated and devoted to the community he loved," said Elsmere Mayor Marty Lenhof. "Billy Bradford Park will forever stand in tribute to a respected and admired leader who trampled racial barriers while serving the public with dignity, respect, and selflessness."

Born in Covington and raised on a Boone County tobacco farm, Mr. Bradford, 86, continues to live in the city he served. As a member of Elsmere City Council he was



known as a humble, easy-going yet focused leader who knew how to get things done.

"I work with good people who make my job a lot easier," Mr. Bradford once told The Erlanger Recorder. "I'm certainly honored to be recognized, but this is a team effort here, and everyone deserves some credit."
