Parents and Students:

The Edison Middle School Summer Literacy Challenge offers students the opportunity to expand their learning through books and a variety of media platforms.

All students in Grades 6-8* are ***expected*** to read at least **TWO books of their choice**. There will be **NO** assignments or assessments. We want students to read solely for pleasure. When students return to school in September, they will share some of their favorite titles and takeaways with their peers. **(*Students in Grade 8 Accelerated have a different reading assignment- see below.)**

We know that students may want or need additional challenges over the summer. Therefore, we have provided several options to explore. However, no challenge goes unrewarded!

For every challenge students choose to tackle and master, they will **complete a form** in order to enter into their school's raffle. In September, we will pull winners from each school to receive prizes.

***Please note:** Students in **Grade 8 Accelerated** must read *The Outsiders* and complete a separate assignment from the one listed above (See [Slide 3](#)). However, they *may* also choose to complete the additional challenges.

You are required to read [The Outsiders \(S.E. Hinton\)](#), [“Nothing Gold Can Stay” \(Robert Frost\)](#), and [ONE nonfiction article as your summer reading requirement](#). In September, you and your class will examine specific language, literary techniques and devices, and quotations related to the thematic topics. You are expected to be familiar with the details of all the texts on the first day of instruction and to come prepared with your Double-Entry Journal for the novel and annotations from the poem and article.

Consider the following essential questions while you read *The Outsiders*, “Nothing Gold Can Stay,” and your chosen nonfiction article:

- What is social justice?
- How do we form our personal identities?
- What do we learn about ourselves through hardship?
- How do our choices impact us and those around us?

WHY READ 20 MINUTES AT HOME?

❖ Scores in the 90 th percentile on standardized tests.	❖ Scores in the 50 th percentile on standardized tests.	❖ Scores in the 10 th percentile on standardized tests.

If they start reading for 20 minutes per night in Kindergarten, by the end of 6th grade, Student A will have read for the equivalent of 60 school days, Student B will have read for 12 school days, and Student C will have read for 3.

Select and read TWO books--your choice!!


Consider...
