






Ten Blocks to the Big Wok

By Ying-Hwa Yu (Ages: 4 - 6)



(Ages: 4 - 8)



By Kelly Yang (Ages: 6 - 9)



By Kao Kalia Yang (Ages: 6 - 9)



By Christina Soontornvat (Ages: 8 - 12)



By Wendy Wan-Long Shang (Ages: 8 - 12)


After moving across the country,

By Jon Cho (Ages: 8 - 12)



By Elizabeth Partridge and Lauren Tamaki (Ages: 10 - 14)






America?: Voices of Japanese American Incarceration during World War II

By Susan H. Kamei (Ages: 14 - 17)


An oral history about Japanese internment during World War II, after the bombing of Pearl Harbor, from the perspective of children and young people affected. Includes bibliographical references and an index.

By Laura Gao (Ages: 14 - 17)


