About Our School: N.B.E.S. is a rural school which serves a student population of approximately 375 Preschool through fifth grade students in a modern and attractive new building. Preschool classes offer both enriching and specially-designed instruction for qualifying three and four-old children. The Younger Primary unit's six classes provide a foundation of developmentally-appropriate experiences for Kindergarten and first grade age students. The six classes in the Older Primary unit collaborate to meet students' needs as they continue building vital reading, writing, mathematics, and content-area skills. Two fourth grade and three fifth grade Intermediate classes are departmentalized for content-area instruction. Teacher specialists provide instruction in music, art, physical education, library, special education and speech.

How Our School Ensures Educational

Equity: North Butler Elementary offers a school-wide Title 1 program, Extended School Services, Special Education, Speech, Preschool and Family Resource Center services in order to provide an equitable education for all students. The school designs activities which will expand quality educational opportunities for every child. The administration seeks to ensure that all students will achieve at high levels regardless of race, gender, socio-economic status or disability.


State Contest Results: North Butler Elementary School's Academic Team of fourth and fifth graders participated in the Kentucky Association for Academic Competition during the 2005-2006 school year. As a result of successful competition, N.B.E.S. is the district 2006 Governor's Cup Quick Recall Champion and over-all points District Governor's Cup Champion.

Extracurricular Activities: Governor's Cup Academic Team; Jr. Pro. basketball and football; gymnastics; softball and baseball; Community Education classes; P.T.O. sponsored festivals and dances; daily Boys and Girls Club on-site after school.

Awards & Recognitions: A "Meets Goal" school as measured by 2006 KCCT.

What We are Doing to Improve: The local community recently created school vision and mission statements. The SBDM Council analyzed KCCT and GRADE test data, survey results, attendance rates, student grades and discipline referrals. The school's Comprehensive Plan incorporates this data into an action plan for continued improvement. Both daytime and after-school Extended School Services provide additional teaching and tutoring to students as needed.

Our School Growth Chart: This chart starts with our school's baseline CATS score from 2000. It shows a goal line from that starting point to our goal of 100 in 2014. Every two years a new point will be marked on the chart to show whether we are on track meet our goal.

How We Are D

Kentucky uses the Commonwealth Accountability Testing System(CATS) to hold schools accountable for student progress. CATS has three parts: the Kentucky Core Content Tests, the national Comprehensive Test of Basic Skills (CBTS/5), and other measures of the school's performance,

including attendance, retention and dropout rates. Together these three elements make up a school's CATS performance score for every two-year period. The goal is that by 2014 nearly all students will score proficient or distinguished

Kentucky Core Content Tests:

Kentucky's tests rate student performance using four categories: Novice, Apprentice, Proficient, and Distinguished. These categories translate into a scale of 0-140, with 100 being considered proficient. (The state goal for all schools is 100 by the year 2014.) This chart compares our school's performance with all the schools in our district and all the schools in Kentucky.

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National Norm Referenced Test: The national norm referenced test used in Kentucky, the CTBS/5, measures the basic skills of our students while allowing us to compare their performance with national benchmarks established in 1996. These scores are reported in percentiles. A percentile shows the percentage of students who fell below a particular score on the test. For example, a percentile of 60 would show that the average student in our school scored equal to or better than 60 percent of all students who took the test.

How We Use Technology to Teach: Wireless Internet access is available throughout the building. Students may use the Internet for research and instruction under the restrictions of filtering software and adult supervision. Classes use United Streaming and other information on demand programs. A closed circuit television system simplifies instructional use of Kentucky Educational Television and Direct TV and makes live camera feed possible from room to room. Two classrooms are equipped with ActivBoards which offer the most current use of interactive instructional technology.
