
Our School Growth Chart: This

Dear Parents/Guardians: This report

card for the 2007-2008 school year contains important information about our school, including the details about our academic performance, teacher qualifications, learning environment, and more.

About Our School: N.B.E.S. is a rural

school which serves a student population of approximately 370 Preschool through fifth grade students in a modern and attractive new building. Preschool classes offer both enriching and specially-designed instruction for qualifying three and four-year-old children. The Younger Primary's five classes provide a foundation of developmentally-appropriate experiences for Kindergarten and first grade age students. The six classes in the Older Primary unit collaborate to meet students' needs as they continue building vital reading, writing, mathematics and content-area instruction. Six Intermediate classes are partially departmentalized. Teacher specialists provide instruction in music, art, physical education, library, special education and speech.

How Our School Ensures Educational Equity: North Butler

Elementary offers a school-wide Title 1 program, Extended School Services, Special Education, Speech, Preschool and Family Resource Center services in order to provide an equitable education for all students. The school designs activities which will expand quality educational opportunities for every child. The administration seeks to ensure that all students will achieve at high levels regardless of race, gender, socio-economic status or disability.

How We Are Doing

Kentucky uses the Commonwealth Accountability Testing System(CATS) to hold schools accountable for student progress. CATS has three parts: the Kentucky Core Content Tests, readiness tests by grade level, and other measures of the school's performance, including attendance, retention and dropout rates. Together these three elements make up a school's CATS Performance Score for every two-year period. The goal is that by 2014 nearly all students will score proficient or distinguished.

Kentucky Core Content Tests:

Kentucky's tests rate student performance as either Novice, Apprentice, Proficient, or Distinguished. These categories translate into a scale of 0-140, with 100 being considered proficient. This chart compares our school's performance with the schools in our district and throughout Kentucky. Procedures in Place In Our School for Drug and Weapons Detection:

Student backpacks are required to be clear or mesh so that the contents are visible to school personnel. All exterior doors except the front door are locked. Because of building design, all persons entering the school must walk through the office before gaining access to any student-occupied areas. Security cameras record activity both inside the school and on the exterior campus. A hand-held metal detector can be used to detect weapon possession. School safety surveys of staff, students and parents report no drug or weapon possession problem. Students and staff are encouraged to report any potentially unsafe situation.

How We Use Technology to Teach: Every classroom at N.B.E.S. is equipped with a Dell Interwrite board and document camera. Wireless Internet access is available throughout the building. Students may use the Internet for research and instruction under the restrictions of filtering software and adult supervision. Classes use United Streaming and other information on demand programs. A closed circuit television system simplifies instructional use of K.E.T. and Direct TV and also makes live camera feed possible from room to room. Intermediate students participate in the Student Technology Leadership Program.

What We Are Doing To Improve: New instructional technology programs were purchased and implemented in the Fall of 2008 in order to provide more skill concept practice and immediate feedback to students.
