About Our School: N.B.E.S. is a rural school that serves a student 350 Preschool through Fifth population of approximately Grade students in a modern and attractive new building. Preschool classes offer both enriching and specially-designed instruction for gualifying three and four-year-old children. The Younger Primary's five classes provide a foundation of developmentally appropriate experiences for Kindergarten and First Grade age students. The five classes in the Older Primary unit collaborate to meet students' needs as they continue building vital reading, writing, mathematics and content-area instruction. Six Intermediate classes are partially departmentalized. Teacher specialists provide instruction in music, art. physical education, library, special education, speech and guidance.

How We Ensure Educational Equity: In order to provide an equitable education for all students, North Butler Elementary offers a school-wide Title 1 program, Extended School Services, Special Education, Speech, Preschool and Family Resource Center services. The school designs activities that will expand quality educational opportunities for every child. The administration seeks to ensure that all students will achieve at high levels regardless of race, gender, socioeconomic status or disability.

State Assistance (Non-Title I)

Senate Bill I, signed into law in March 2009, requires state accountability for Non-Title I schools. If a non-Title I school does not make AYP in the same content area for two consecutive years, the school will be eligible for state assistance. The description "Eligible for State Assistance" will appear in the Consequences, School Status column, followed by the number "1" or "2" indicating the number of years eligible.

How We Are Doing

Kentucky's Interim School Testing and Accountability System has three parts: the Kentucky Core Content Tests (KCCT); readiness tests by grade level; and other measures of a school's performance, including attendance, retention and dropout rates. This interim system will be replaced in the 2011-12 school year by a new testing and accountability system structured as required by statute. The goal is that, by 2014, nearly all students will score proficient or distinguished in every subject area tested.

Procedures in Place In Our School for Drug and Weapons Detection:

Student backpacks are required to be clear or mesh so that the contents are visible to school personnel. All exterior doors are locked. Office personnel identify visitors before unlocking the front door for their entry. All persons entering the school must walk through the office before gaining access to any student-occupied areas. Security cameras record activity both inside the school and on the exterior campus. A hand-held metal detector can be used as needed.
