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

# **GEOLOGY COLLECTION**



The school's Homfray-Davies geology collection, located on the first floor of the teaching block, has undergone a facelift, thanks to Science Technician, Rose Richards, and the School Archivist, Roger Parsons. The collection, donated to the school by the late Derek Homfray-Davies, a former member of staff, will display different exhibits under the titles of Petrology, Palaeontology and Mineralogy, on a termly basis. However, one special exhibit, the cast of a trilobite from the Pleistocene era, will be on view permanently, since this creature's geological name, Asaphus-homfrayi, honours Derek's great-great uncle, David Homfray, who was the very first person to discover the fossil of one, in North Wales in the 19th century.




SCIENCE


Year 7 have been learning about acids and alkalis and have made these beautiful copper sulphate crystals, an example of a neutralisation reaction. They are moving on to learn about photosynthesis and have taken this beautiful shot of the bottom of a leaf through the microscope showing some specialised cells that let gases in and out.

Year 8 are learning about respiration – this is the process that releases energy, in all our cells, all of the time! They have been investigating the impact of exercise on their heart and breathing rate, as well as investigating how other organisms respire. The yeast in these flasks produces carbon dioxide, which can blow up a balloon! Classes are also dissecting a pig heart and looking at the different blood vessels and the flow of the blood. Here are some excellent revision posters some of them have made, as we also focus on some learning skills in preparation for our assessments after half term.

Eco Club have some painted lady caterpillars, we have learnt about their life cycle before they become butterflies and are now waiting for them to turn into chrysalis before releasing them at the vegetable plot. Our peas have all been eaten, but the broad beans, garlic and berries are growing well!
















#### **SUMMER CONCERT PREPARATION!**

# **RS-CORONATION SCHOOL SERVICE**

On Friday 5 May we had a whole school assembly to celebrate the upcoming Coronation of HRH King Charles III. The Heads of School began the special assembly with an opening address and the Chapel Club led prayers for His Majesty the King, Queen and members of the Royal Family. Reverend Kitto lent her experience of being anointed, and anointing others, to help explain what would be happening throughout the Coronation Service. Mr Thornburn reflected on the special historical significance of the Coronation, and we do hope that all pupils felt part, in some small way of the wider celebrations happening here and across the world.



# **HISTORY TRIP - CHEPSTOW CASTLE**

On the 9 May, the History Department provided all of Year 7 with the opportunity to visit Chepstow Castle as part of their historical study of Medieval Castles. Pupils learnt about the fascinating history of the castle led by our three experts at different locations in the grounds of Chepstow. Mr Sweet spoke about the early life of the castle from 1067 when William FitzOsbern was granted the land and went on to build the first stone keep. Pupils asked some excellent questions in the Great Tower before they moved on to the next location. In the Lower Bailey, Mr Guthrie provided pupils with a grand tour of the Great Hall and the Round Tower to inform pupils about the luxury lifestyle of the later owners of Chepstow Castle before the Civil War. Finally, Mr Close examined the outer walls and the defensive features and how best to overwhelm an impenetrable castle!

Fortunately, we managed to avoid the rain so we were able to sit outside in the grounds of castle in the lovely sunshine and enjoy lunch. This trip has been deliberately planned at the mid-point of their Development of Castles unit and directly informs their projects. Pupils were able to complete their Castle workbooks as they moved from location to location, which has been a new addition to our 2023 trip. Chepstow Castle effectively became an open-air classroom for the day and we once again received some lovely feedback from members of the public who were visiting Chepstow at the same time as we were.

At the end of the trip, Mr Sweet and Mr Close staged a historical debate which is now becoming a firm fixture. Mr Sweet assumed the role of William, Duke of Normandy whilst Mr Close stepped into the shoes of William Marshal, the Greatest Knight and owner of Chepstow Castle in the reign of King John. We hope we were able to illustrate to Year 7 who had the largest influence over the castle. Mr Close was unanimously voted the victor and carried the debate after unleashing a highly persuasive (the Duke of Normandy might even call it 'underhanded') and brilliant argument upon Mr Sweet!

















# SHAPWICK NATURE RESERVE

This week at the nature reserve, a group of Year 8 boys were asked to take part in a freshwater mollusc survey. The pupils were given a clear set of instructions by one of the volunteers who is an expert in this area. They had to dig into the ground alongside the drainage ditches, to see what evidence of mollusc shells they could find that had been dumped on the banks due to dredging. The boys learnt a lot about freshwater molluscs and there was much excitement when a toad made an appearance!


