

• **Community Literacy Mentorship**background checked volunteers from the community come for daily 30-minute sessions to work with struggling second graders on fluency, comprehension and sight word memorization. Childcare for the mentors' children is available.

- Community School Council-Representatives from the staff and community partnerships meet twice a month to discuss ways to help meet our students' and community's needs using the Community School Framework.
- **Family Strand-** This is an optional K-5 continuum in which the students stay with the same classmates their entire school career. The students get to know their future teachers during activities and community-building events. There are currently two family strands. The rest of the school changes classmates every year in a traditional manner.

• **Food Backpack Program**- Students that are in need of assistance are sent home additional food weekly in discreet backpacks to help them make it through the weekend. • **Helping Hands**- parent organization with representatives from each classroom that help coordinate class events, special community events, and organize other parent volunteers.

• Homework Diner- on Mondays from 5:30-7:00 pm, families, teachers, K-Kids peer tutors, and community members come together in the gym to do homework and eat a homemade meal. There are books, games, PBS I-pads, and activities for younger siblings and students who finish homework early

 K-Kids Student Council- is a group of 4th and 5th graders partnered with the Kiwanis International Volunteer
 Organization. They do service projects and fundraisers in the school and community. They deliver "Positive
 Messages of the Day" in the daily schoolwide announcements to encourage their
 fellow students to make good decisions and show good character. They act as
 peer tutors during Homework Diner.

• **Preschool Parent Co-op-** This is a bilingual preschool program for Spanish speaking children taught by their parents. The parents have Early Childhood Certificates from Central NM Community College and they prepare these students to transition into kindergarten at MMES.

• **Target Teaching**- Teachers and staff identify needed student learning goals based on assessments. The students are then placed in groups and retaught the missing skills or given extra challenge work during a bonus school-wide 30 minute math session every Wednesday morning.

- Wrinkle Writing- partnership with local Blackout Theatre Company- An actress from Blackout comes for an hour every two weeks to teach theater and play writing. Then the class works together to write and perform their play on an actual stage.
- Sandia Science Club- Volunteer scientists from Sandia National Laboratory come to teach an afterschool club once a week.

• Walking School Bus- is a group of children walking to school under the supervision of background checked adults. It is a planned walk that either picks students up at home or at a designated meeting spot to make sure that everyone gets to school on time.

• Watch D.O.G.S. (Dads of Great Students)- national organization that promotes male role models volunteering in schools. Watch D.O.G.S assist in classrooms, patrol the school, help with crosswalk duty, and interact with students on the playground.
