#### INSTRUCTION AND STUDENT PROGRAMS - Dr. Amory

#### Curriculum and Instruction

We were approached by Jason James with Milford City Council with regard to consideration of offering an Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) program given the growing need in our community. We have explored the idea, interests, and costs and have agreed to partner with the State of Delaware Fire School, Milford City Council, and Carlisle Fire Company to bring this program to our high school next year. We anticipate having a formal flyer to promote the program soon. We would like to thank Patricia Fox,

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Brennan Fountain, Jason James, and Sean Hinton for their collaboration. We are excited about this opportunity for not only our students but also our Greater Milford Community.

While we intend to provide the Board with a more thorough update regarding our plans for summer programming this summer, we did want to inform you that we are well on our way with planning. We have been able to secure staffing for our required special education programming, credit recovery program, HOLA program, Beginning Buccaneers and limited programming for academically at-risk elementary students. We will additionally be offering Summer Backpacks to elementary and early childhood aged students to support learning at home throughout the summer.

The Delaware Department of Education has offered us a partnership position to provide a Dual Language Immersion Program Support position next year. This position will be fully funded by the Delaware Department of Education and shared with a neighboring school district. The intent of the position is to provide additional support to our immersion program in the form of instructional coaching and to serve as a liaison between immersion programs and the districts.

We have hosted our final Strategic Planning Steering Committee meeting and are excited to bring you our final strategic plan at our May School Board Meeting. We are incredibly appreciative of our Steering Committee members and have a printed draft for you to preview before final edits and content are brought forth in May.




SECOND FLOOR TOTAL SF = 45,423 SF



### MILFORD'S STRUGGLE FOR EDUCATIONAL EQUALITY

On May 17, 1954, the U.S. Supreme Court ruled in the case of Brown v. Board of Education, declaring racially segregated published schools inconstitutional. In August 1954, a petition was submitted to the Milford Board of Education requesting integration. A play for gradual desegregation was adopted, and on September 8, elever African-American 10th grade students were admitted to the district's High School at this location. On September 1 approximately 1500 persons met to discuss the situation. Main signed a petition opposing the action. This was the first overpublic resistance to integration since the Brown ruling. The school was closed the following Monday so that a public meeting could be

held. A large crowd gathered to express their opposite closure of the schools was extended. Failing to reof the State Board of Education, members of the State Board of September 26, several thou fallies organized by segregationist Bryand boycott of the schools. Less than one thir when the schools reopened. - **Current Expense:** This tax rate provides revenue to cover operating costs, such as teaching materials, textbooks, technology, insurance, athletic and academic programs, and local salary expenditures, etc. (Current Expense Referendum set rate on October 6, 2015)
- **Debt Service:** This tax rate provides revenue to pay principal and interest payments associated with bonds sold for major capital improvements, such as new construction, additions and renovations. The rate fluctuates annually depending on bond payment schedule.
- **Match:** Minor Capital Improvement only Matches State Bond Bill funding for building and grounds repairs and maintenance. (Other match taxes available but not assessed include: Reading Specialist, Math Specialist, Technology, Extra Time)
- **Tuition:** Costs of Milford School District students with special needs who require specialized services within the district or who must attend special schools within and outside of the State of Delaware.
- Capitation: Do not assess.

# **CONSTABLE MARKET ANALYSIS**

To maintain a fiscally responsible constable compensation scale that is competitive with select districts in Kent and Sussex Counties, the district will evaluate the constable pay structure annually.

The Chief Financial Officer shall establish a market value for the constable position by averaging salary data from select comparable and/or neighboring districts in Kent and Sussex Counties where applicable. The market-range shall be evaluated and adjusted accordingly. If upon evaluation for adjustment, the market value decreases for the position, no adjustment shall be made.

#### **POLICY 4205**

#### SCHOOL CLOSING OR DELAY DUE TO INCLEMENT WEATHER OR EMERGENCY

#### I. INCLEMENT WEATHER, EMERGENCY CONDITIONS, AND LEVELS:

A. Inclement Weather is defined as any weather condition that affects or impacts the established instructional/work calendar and/or schedule. It is defined but not limited to snow, ice, flooding, hurricanes, cold and wind chill which pose a threat to life, and fog.

- B. Emergency Conditions are defined as any condition not expected or planned requiring immediate and critical response in order to protect life and assets.
- C. Essential Employees: All maintenance employees, building systems managers, custodial staff, the maintenance supervisor, and Child nutrition staff. Essential employees must report as directed by the superintendent or designee.
- D. Administrative Employees: All other 12-month staff (including administrators, secretarial, and technology staff members). Administrative employees must report unless directed to the contrary by the superintendent or designee and are expected to report for duty within the scheduled delay, but no later than the scheduled delay. Administrative employees are encouraged to report for duty before the scheduled delay when conditions permit safe travel and school parking is available.
- E. Instructional Employees: All instructional 10-month staff (teachers and paraprofessional staff members). Instructional employees must report unless directed to the contrary by the superintendent or designee and are expected to report for duty within the scheduled delay, but no later than the scheduled delay. Instructional employees are encouraged to report for duty before the scheduled delay when conditions permit safe travel and school parking is available.
- F. School Delays: School delays shall be as directed by the superintendent or designee. For two or more hour delays, staff may not report more than one hour earlier than the official start time of the assigned school.
- G. Employee Not Reporting: An employee not reporting to work as directed, reasonable travel delays notwithstanding, will have time not worked charged against accrued vacation, or as otherwise provided in a Collective Bargaining Agreement. In the event the employee's vacation leave balance is insufficient, time not worked will be charged in the following order: 1) sick leave/personal days, or 2) leave without pay. H. Right to Transport: During inclement weather or emergency, the district reserves right to transport to and from work essential and administrative employees who are not otherwise able to get to work.
- H. Road and Development Access: Bus transportation may not be provided on roads determined to be unsafe. The district transportation staff and bus contractors will review the district's roads as required until all roads are safe. When excessive snow and ice on some of the district's roadways make them

dangerous and not accessible for district buses, the district will implement an inclement weather bus pickup procedure. Children will be picked up in designated areas when the roadways are safe for bus traffic. In inaccessible areas, parents may be requested to bring their children to school and pick up their children from school or the district will understand if they choose to keep their children home until after their road is cleared.

I. Delaware Code: Delaware Code will be applied as applicable to the condition including state of emergency and other contingencies.

#### II. PUBLIC AND EMPLOYEE NOTIFICATION:

District email, website, phone trees and/or the district's automated phone calling system will be utilized to notify affected employees when to report for duty during inclement weather or emergency conditions. The superintendent or designee is authorized and responsible to communicate delay and closing information to the media. Employees who cannot report for duty as required are responsible to communicate tardiness or absence to their immediate supervisor prior to the scheduled report time.
