College and Career Pathways – Parent Information Guide

The **State College/Career Indicator** contains both college and career measures that recognize which students have pursued various options prior to high school graduation in order to be best prepared for their post-secondary options.

The three levels that measure post-secondary preparedness in the College/Career Indicator (CCI) are:

- Prepared
- Approaching Prepared
- Not Prepared

What does this mean for my student?

- The indicators **do not** affect a student’s graduation - students’ ratings directly affect the school site/district.
- Graduating in the **prepared** category does not necessarily mean a student is ready for UC (A-G) level instruction.
- The most important thing is to graduate – all the other items (A-G, CTE Pathways, Dual Enrollment, AP exams) are the items that expand **opportunities** for students.
- The more students complete **now** (in high school), the more opportunities for **post-secondary** (after high school) career paths.

As the following chart shows, students have many opportunities to graduate high school in the “Prepared” category.

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CTE Pathways are one component students may use to graduate high school in the “Prepared” category.

Here is a summary of the CCI-Approved Pathways at Orangewood High School:

- ★ CTE Pathways are taught by either RUSD-CTE Teachers or ROP-CTE Teachers

<u>Orangewood High School</u>
1. Food Services and Hospitality
2. Engineering Technology
3. Design, Visual, and Media Arts

When requesting registration for CTE Pathways, please consider the following information:

- Courses should be taken in the **order** as they are listed in the pathway sequences
- Students must complete two years of coursework, including the Capstone/Completer course, in order to **complete** a pathway.

What does it mean if a course is articulated?

- It means there is an existing agreement between the high school where the course is taught and the college(s) that allows students to receive **transferable college credit** while taking high school courses.
- To earn the FREE college credit, students need to earn a **B- or higher** in the high school course.
- Some RUSD courses articulate for **multiple courses**.
- Individual course instructors will have more information about their course articulation process.
