Hello Leyden Community,

The Illinois legislature is back in session.
This is the time of the year when bills related to education are proposed.
As educators, we often find ourselves speaking out regarding those bills we "are against."

Two years ago educators in Illinois decided to enhance this effort. A group of superintendents from across the state developed a list of educational reforms we "are for." The reforms became known as Vision 2020, a concept that includes establishing a goal of seeing clearly and working toward making the reforms a reality by the year 2020.

The Vision 2020 agenda encompasses four pillars: Highly Effective Educators, 21st Century Learning, Shared Accountability, and Equitable and Adequate Funding. This year legislators have proposed bills from the Vision 2020 project, and we are hopeful to see these initiatives move through the legislature to improve public education for students in Illinois.

Vision 2020 is a collaborative effort of Illinois school boards, superintendents, principals, business officials, and regional offices of Education. Recently, the efforts were joined by the thousands of members of the Illinois Parent Teacher Association.

Innovative School Safety Program

Leyden makes it a priority to ensure our campuses and students remain safe and drug free. To this end, the District has put into effect a positive, innovative school safety program. This is being implemented in partnership with Interquest Detection Canines® of Chicagoland.


The program uses trained school safety dogs to conduct random, unannounced inspections of our campuses. These dogs are friendly, non-aggressive breeds such as Golden and Labrador Retrievers. The intent of this program is to prevent prohibited items from coming into our schools. The dogs are trained to detect the presence of prohibited items that pose a threat including illicit drugs and narcotics, gunpowder-based items,

alcoholic beverages, and commonly abused prescription and over-the-counter medications.

Campus common areas, lockers, and grounds are randomly inspected for prohibited items. If an item is found, the District will take the appropriate disciplinary action in accordance with existing school policies and procedures.

The dog's first visit to school grounds doesn't include a search of the buildings. Instead it gives students and the dog a chance to meet.

Administrators believe that the new safety program will play a key role in achieving Leyden's goal of taking every reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of our students.

Chinese Students Visit Leyden

The distance between Leyden High Schools and the Shando Experimental High School in Jinan, China, is halfway around the world. But when it comes to forging friendships, exchanging cultural information, and sharing family stories, Jinan doesn't seem far from Franklin Park and Northlake.

Hosted by Leyden families for a week in February, twelve students and two chaperones had a week's worth of school and family life in America. Yaunzhe Ying, 16, says he especially enjoyed dinnertime with his host family. "It was a time for the family to communicate, explore, and discuss daily life," Ying says, noting that the Hispanic family that hosted him "have a very strong sense of family. In China we also have a very strong sense of family."

Visitors also experienced Leyden-style education in classes such as English, science, and math. As for instructors, the Chinese students indicated their teachers are a tad conservative, whereas American teachers are more energetic.

The students and their chaperones also visited Chicago attractions, including the Shedd Aquarium, Hancock Building, Magnificent Mile, and Millennium Park.

A day before they were to return to China, six Chinese students and more than 300 Leyden students packed the Nardini Library for a handson experience involving Tai Chi, calligraphy, Chinese rope games, and Chinese Red Paper Art.

"Our students were amazed by the Chinese students' ability to write their (Leyden students) names in Chinese calligraphy," says Vic Pilolla, theater productions manager and one of the event organizers. "Our students would say their name in English and a Chinese student would translate it into Chinese characters. Our students were amazed. They loved having their name written in Chinese calligraphy."

The Jinan students visited Leyden under the auspices of the Sinio-American Youth Ambassador Program. The exchange was successful, and the

hope is that Leyden will host another group of Chinese students in the future.

"The Chinese cultural exchange was an opportunity for our students to experience culture from another country," says Leyden social studies teacher Sandie Leonard. "Our students benefit from interacting and learning from other students their age. Little things, like jump rope games and calligraphy, even sharing a laugh, help students see that people are not so different no matter how far away they live."

2015 Annual Triton College High School Art Competition

Leyden art students, as well as students from eight other area high schools, submitted 176 pieces of art to the 2015 Annual Triton College High School Art Competition. Sixty-nine of the 176 entries were created by District 212 student artists.

Works of art are submitted in eight different categories that include drawing, painting, photography, computer art, mixed media, design, sculpture, and ceramics. Leyden students won several awards including one Best of Show, six Best of Category awards, ten first place blue ribbons, 24 second place red ribbons, and 36 third place yellow ribbons.

The Illinois Student Assistance Commission has announced the names of the 2015-2016 Illinois State Scholars. In Illinois, more than 19,300 students from high schools across the state have been recognized as Illinois State Scholars. Congratulations to Leyden's 51 students who qualified as Illinois State Scholars.

"You are among the best and brightest of Illinois high school seniors in the Class of 2015," says ISAC Executive Director Eric Zarnikow in a letter to the honorees. "The combination of your exemplary college entrance scores and record of high school achievements indicates you have a high potential for success in college."

Illinois' top students elect to have test scores and high school class rank sent to ISAC for consideration in the popular program. Seniors who rank in the top ten percent of the state's high schools are designated as Illinois State Scholars and receive a Certificate of Achievement for their outstanding academic performance. Selection is based on SAT, ACT and/or Prairie State Achievement Exam test scores, and/or class rank at the end of junior year.
