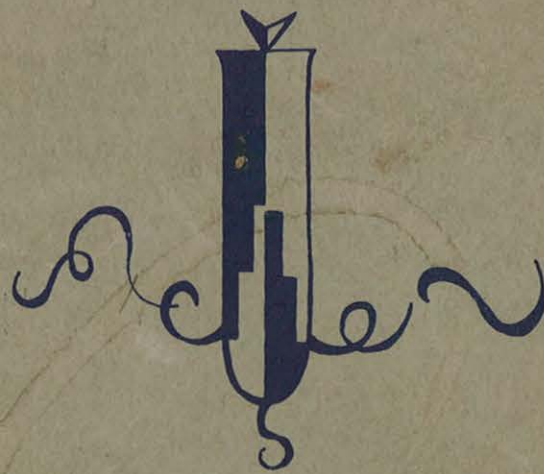

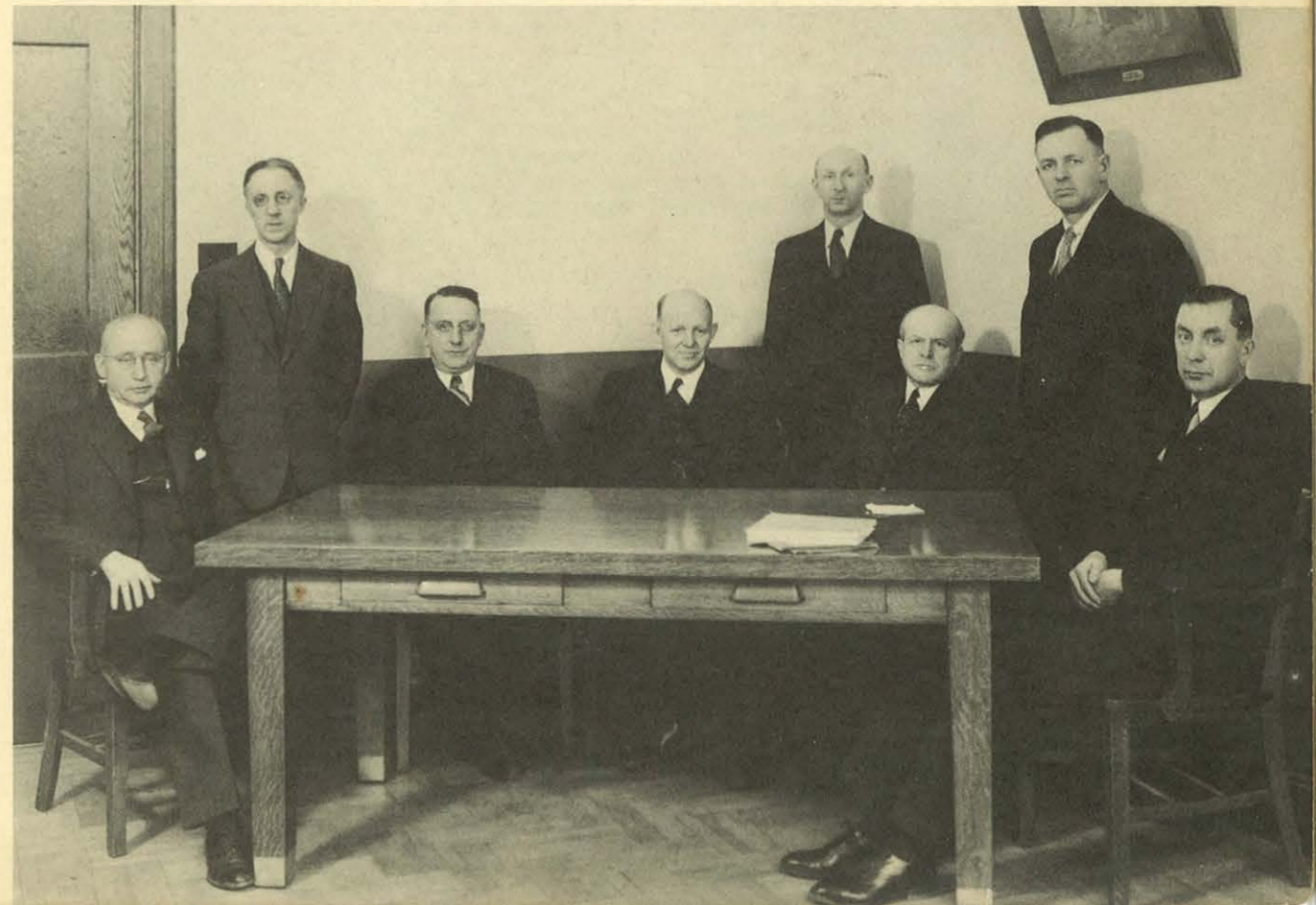

SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

In September 1933, there entered Broadalbin High School a class which was destined to become a credit to its Alma Mater. Not so in the opinion of the Class of '34. Silently, without complaint, we suffered at the hands of these unappreciative Seniors.

Though our first attempts to distinguish ourselves were greatly discouraged, we soon emerged to recognition by presenting two one-act plays. Our dramatic ability was recognized and our players condescended to act in the chorus entertainment and the grade operetta.

Our athletic, executive and scholarship ability also became apparent when many of our members were appointed to positions formerly restricted to upperclassmen.

The executives appointed to direct our first year were as follows: President, Bettina Breen, Joyce Frank; Vice-President, Carolyn Haff, Lewis Baldwin; Secretary, Kenneth Weiss, Helen Shivka; Treasurer, Harold Ferguson, Rogers Finch.

Although we were deprived of the annual eighth grade trip to our state capitol, as Freshment we enjoyed the tour of Albany's state buildings. This trip also revealed the first evidence of our class's romantic nature in addition to her many other accomplishments.

Our Sophomore year was not marked with as many particularly outstanding events except our first dance. However, it was in this year that we entered the new high school building. Mrs. Stillman (then Dorothy Brown) became a member of the high school faculty and subsequently joined Miss Suits in the difficult task of successfully piloting our class over the financial waves.

The Sophomore Class was governed by the following officers: President, Rogers Finch, William Hrinishin; Vice-President, Richard Fraker, Madeline Kenyon; Secretary, Doris Benedict, Harrison Jeffords; Treasurer, Bettina Breen, Evelyn Van Nostrand.

We were upperclassmen at last. Now we could give orders to the lowerclassmen, a long-dreamed-of privilege. This year we presented a three-act play, "The Alley Daffodil." This brought forth much hitherto hidden talent. In the Spring we presented a Spring Dance, which though it was not financially beneficent to the class, was proclaimed a social success.

Officers for this year were as follows: President, Lewis Baldwin, Bettina Breen; Vice-President, John Yatsenik, William Hrinishin; Secretary, Joyce Frank, Doris Benedict; Treasurer, Carolyn Haff, William Davidoff.

In the short expanse of three months we had been transformed from meek Juniors to haughty Seniors. Once again it was our privilege to take part in a Freshman initiation but as perpetrators rather than as immature victims.

Our first activity of the year was our Senior Play, "You're the Doctor." Without any exception (or undue boasting) this was one of the finest plays ever presented by a class in Broadalbin High School. We also presented a dance in the Fall, but due to the deficiency of Astaires in our class, the dance was not pronounced a success.

To guide and direct our class over the rough Senior road Bettina Breen was appointed President; Lewis Baldwin, Vice-President; Doris Benedict, Secretary-Treasurer.

The days preceding March 26 were much too long but when that day arrived, the Seniors were prepared for the long-awaited trip to Washington. This trip will long be remembered by the members of the Class of '37 as the most outstanding event of their four years in high school. Luckily for us, our sweaters and rings arrived before the trip and created quite a sensation on the sidewalks of New York.

Before us lies the long road to graduation. We all are confident of graduating (despite our teachers' misgivings) though it will require much concentration and sacrifice of social activities if we wish to receive the honors which are our ultimate goal.

It is our desire not to terminate our history on this short page but merely herein to inscribe the first chapter. From graduation our history will continue, not as a class, but as individuals. May the lives of each of our classmates be as successful and eventful in the future as that of our class has been in the past.

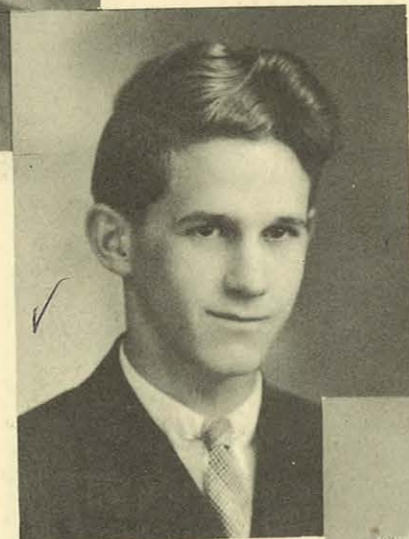
