Broadalbin High School

The Broadalbin School was centralized in May, 1930. An appropriation for a new building was voted in December, 1931. The plans were finally approved in September, 1932, and in December, 1933, the project was undertaken by the P. W. A. The bonds amounted to \$140,000 and the outright allotment came to \$35,000. The project was actually begun in May, 1934, and completed on January 7, 1935.

The registration in the academic department in September, 1930, was 78, but in January, 1935, it was over 160.

Our new edifice is situated on a hill overlooking the village. It is thoroughly equipped with every advantage for the pupils. Both the pupils and public appreciate their new building.

There are located on the first floor the auditorium, cafeteria, office and the 6th, 7th and 8th grades. On the second floor is one of the finest libraries in this section. The library is also used as a study hall. Then there are the class rooms of the High School and a well equipped laboratory. Certainly with as fine a school as this the pupils ought to do their best to succeed in their work.



Broadalbin High School Library

The Broadalbin High School Library is situated on the second floor of the school and occupies half of the north corridor. It has a seating capacity of fifty-six. There are eight rectangular tables seating six each and two round tables seating four each. There is a U-shaped charging desk, a display case, a vertical file, a card catalog with fifteen trays, a dictionary stand, a magazine and newspaper unit, and a book truck. There are eighteen units of shelving, standard height, and five units of counter height providing 423 ft. of shelving which would accommodate about 3500 volumes. The furniture is of dark oak with a highly polished surface. The chairs are modernistic in design. The library was equipped by Gaylord Bros. of Syracuse. There are eight bulletin boards in the room affording room for much display.

At the left of the library is a conference room separated from the main library by glass partitions. The conference room seats thirty more pupils and is equipped with blackboards so that it may be used as a class room. The library has nine large windows and the conference room three more so that there is plenty of light. Both rooms have parquet floors and an electric clock and radio.

The books are classified according to the Dewey decimal system and each section and shelf is labeled. The magazines are arranged in transparent covers allowing a display of the picture cover. The vertical file is equipped with clippings and pictures and the book selection is cataloged.

The library is used as a study hall and reading room combined, and is in constant use. A teacher and student librarian are on duty each period and there are three regular library periods of which the librarian has charge.

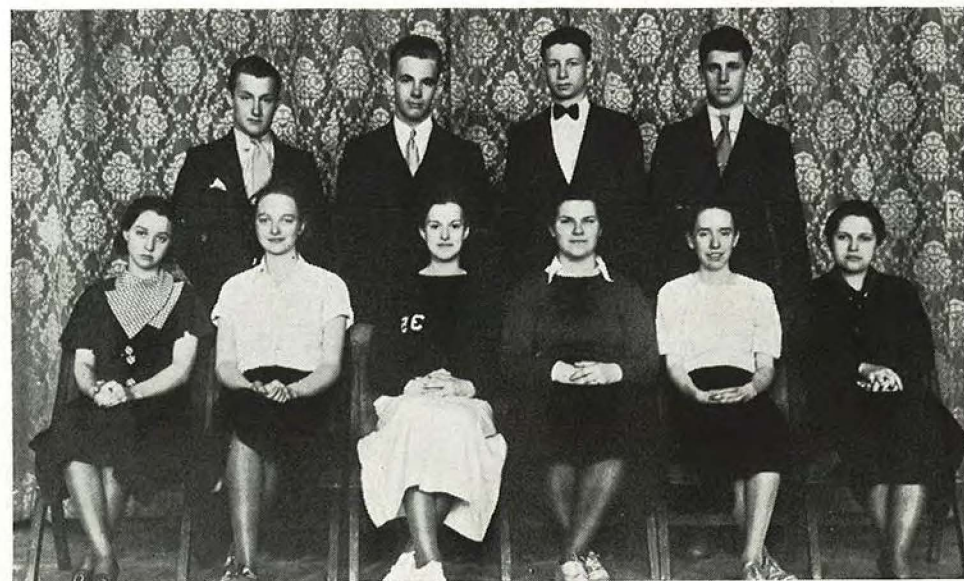

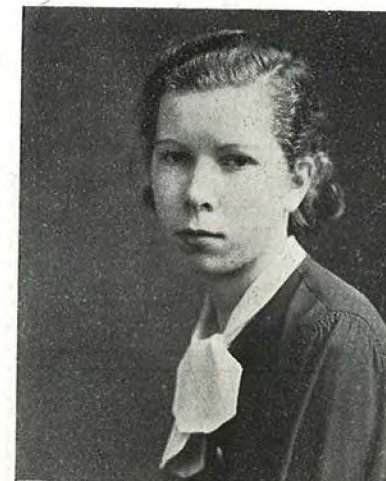
Student Council

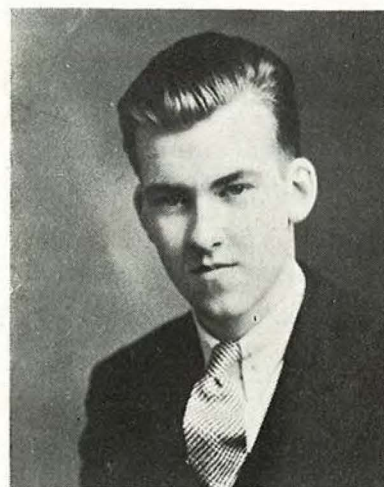

From the Senior point of view a freshman class is, "non bonum nisi mortum est". But as freshmen we did not believe that was true—we wondered how the school had succeeded without us.

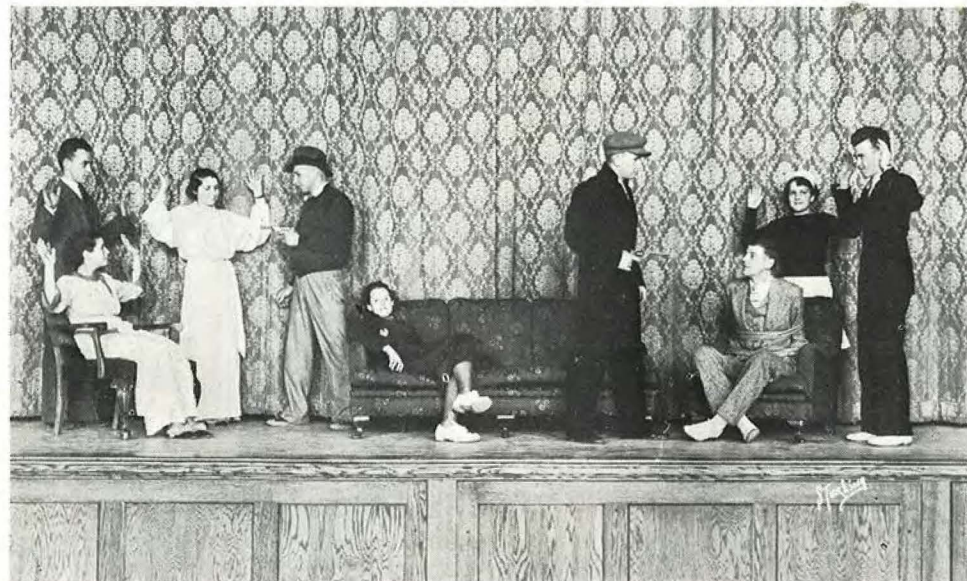

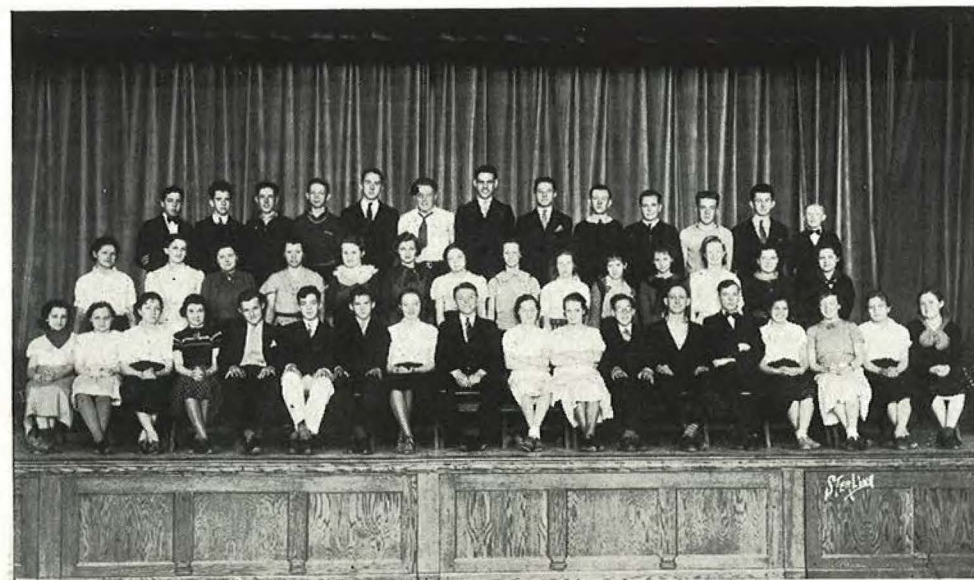

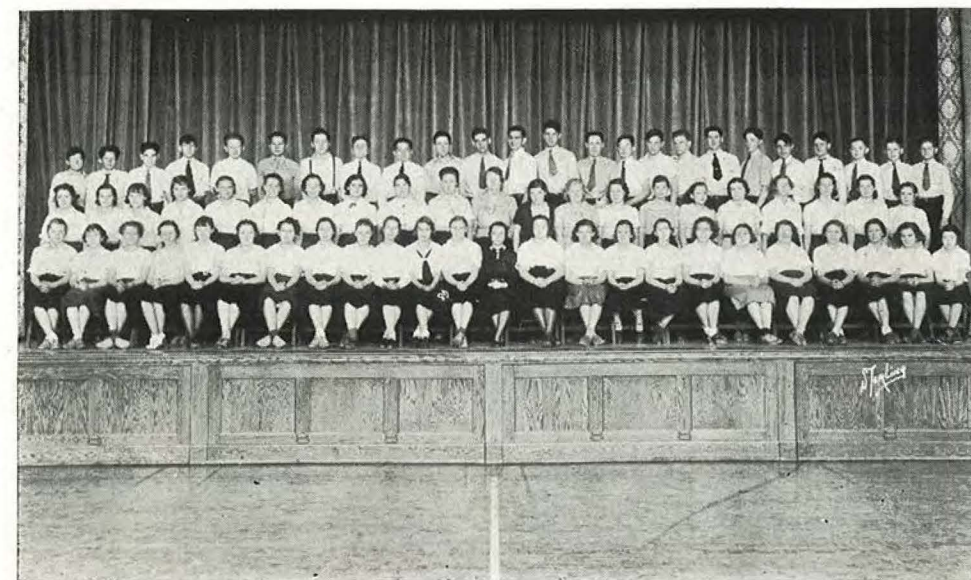
