SENIOR CLASS HISTORY

In September 1934 there evoked on the threshold of old B. H. S. one of the most outstanding classes ever to crack a book in that institution.

This class started on its brilliant career by choosing Misses Hager and Putman as their advisors along with President, Stuart Finch; Vice-President, Elsie Steele; Secretary, Julia Skapik; Treasurer, Wilma Skapik; Reporter, Audrey Pickering. The first real test was that of being exposed to the cruelty of the class of 1935 in an initiation program by which our class gained the distinction of being excellent sports. Neither Catherine Cornell nor Lionel Barrymore could compare with the acting performed in the Freshman Plays entitled "The Pampered Darling" and "The Silver Lining." These plays proved to be a great success in entertainment as well as finances. For diversions from our studies picnics and sleigh rides proved to be most efficient. Led very effectively through the second term with class officers consisting of President, Velma Crannell; Vice-President, Donald Smith; Secretary, Muriel Coloney; Treasurer, Kenneth Kenyon; Reporter, Emma Stahl; our class finished a very successful year.

The second year proved a little easier socially but the teachers began to apply the pressure scholastically. Class officers were first chosen and the following were assigned their respective duties: President, Marjorie Christofferson; Vice-President, Dorcas Shaw; Secretary, Rita Warren; Treasurer, Howard Brownell; Reporter, Charles Millington; and for the second term: President, Lewis Kenyon; Vice-President, Elsie Steele. That Secretary, Elfreda Geelan; Treasurer, Muriel Coloney; Reporter, Charles Millington; Council, Emma Stahl and Kenneth Kenyon. Although our number had become smaller our undaunted courage had to conquer new financial fields.

As Juniors we began to have more prestige in school affairs. At our first meeting the following officers were chosen: President, Stuart Finch; Vice-President, Kenneth Kenyon; Secretary, Rita Warren; Treasurer, Muriel Coloney; Reporter, Elsie Steele. That year we sponsored a very successful dance and a play that was highly praised by critics. The play was entitled "The Black Derby." We were then confronted with the problem of choosing a new adviser in place of Miss Putnam but our troubles were soon over as Miss Dexter very capably filled the role.

To climax our brilliant career, we really assumed a position in high school affairs of which we had thought we had long deserved. As usual we chose very efficient class officers consisting of Howard Brownell, Muriel Coloney, Arlene Anselment, and Elsie Steele. Again came the problem of choosing a new adviser due to the resignation of Miss Hager from the faculty. We claimed Miss Winne for this task, who has proven herself quite worthy of the honor. The senior play, "Enter the Hero," proved to be a great success and it again revealed a great deal of hidden talent to the local theatre enthusiasts. Due to our progressive nature our class made many steps forward such as introducing the use of caps and gowns, both sweaters and jackets, etc. The most important event of the year was, of course, the Washington trip which was a great success educationally as well as socially.

Now, at graduation time, as seniors we feel that we have not been the model class but in spite of the petty quarrels among ourselves we sincerely hate to leave our classmates and above all B. H. S.

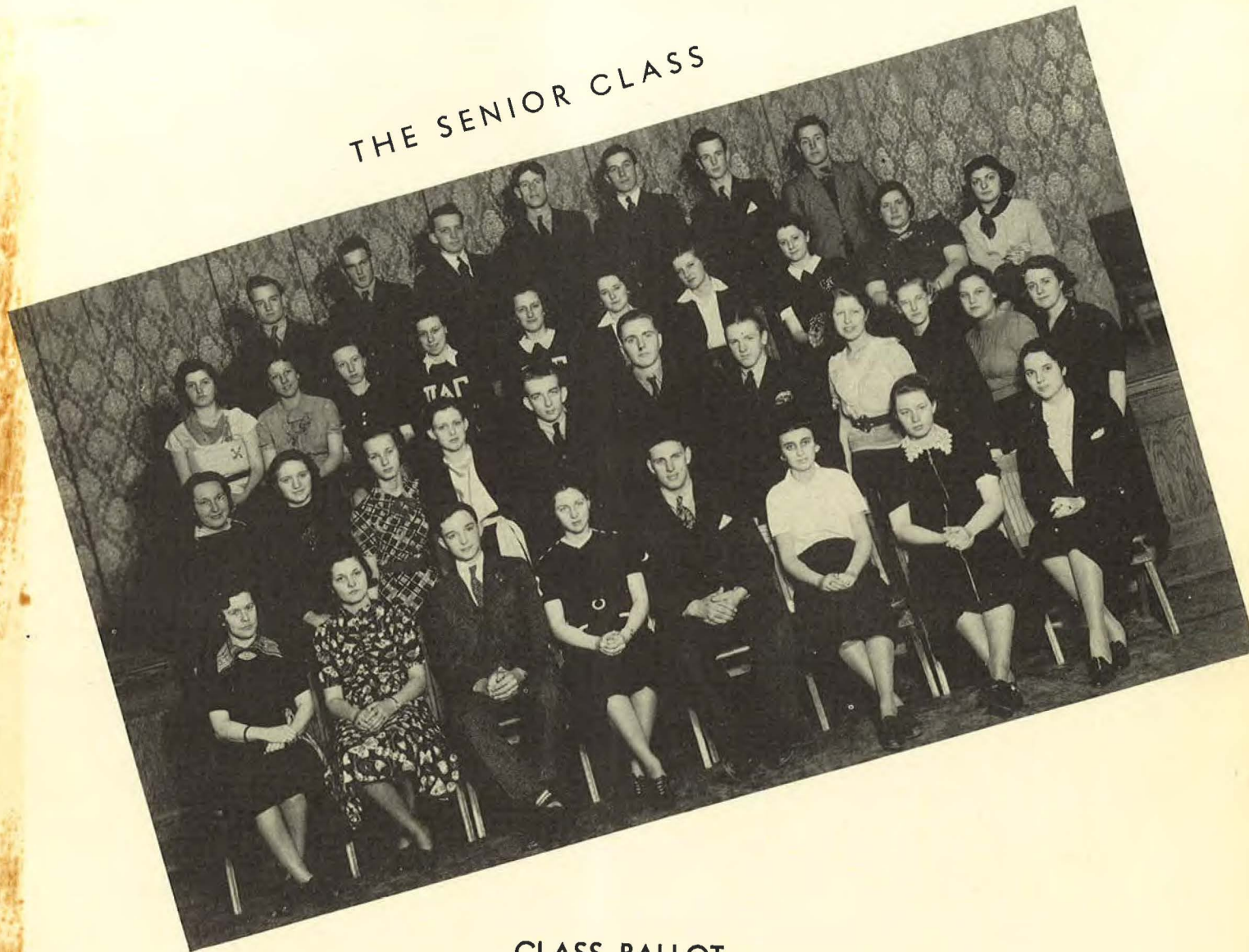

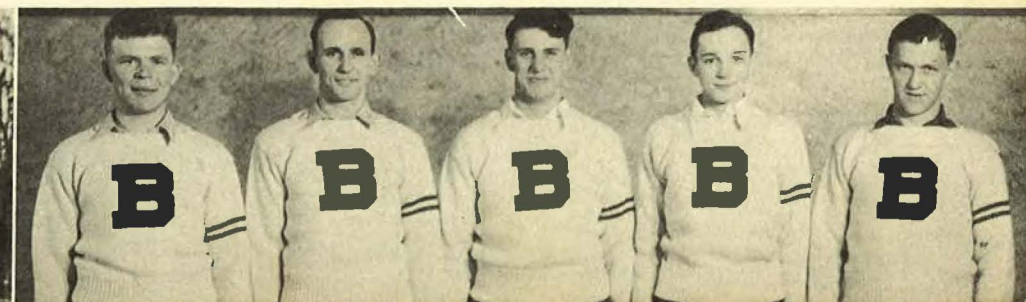


JUNIOR CLASS

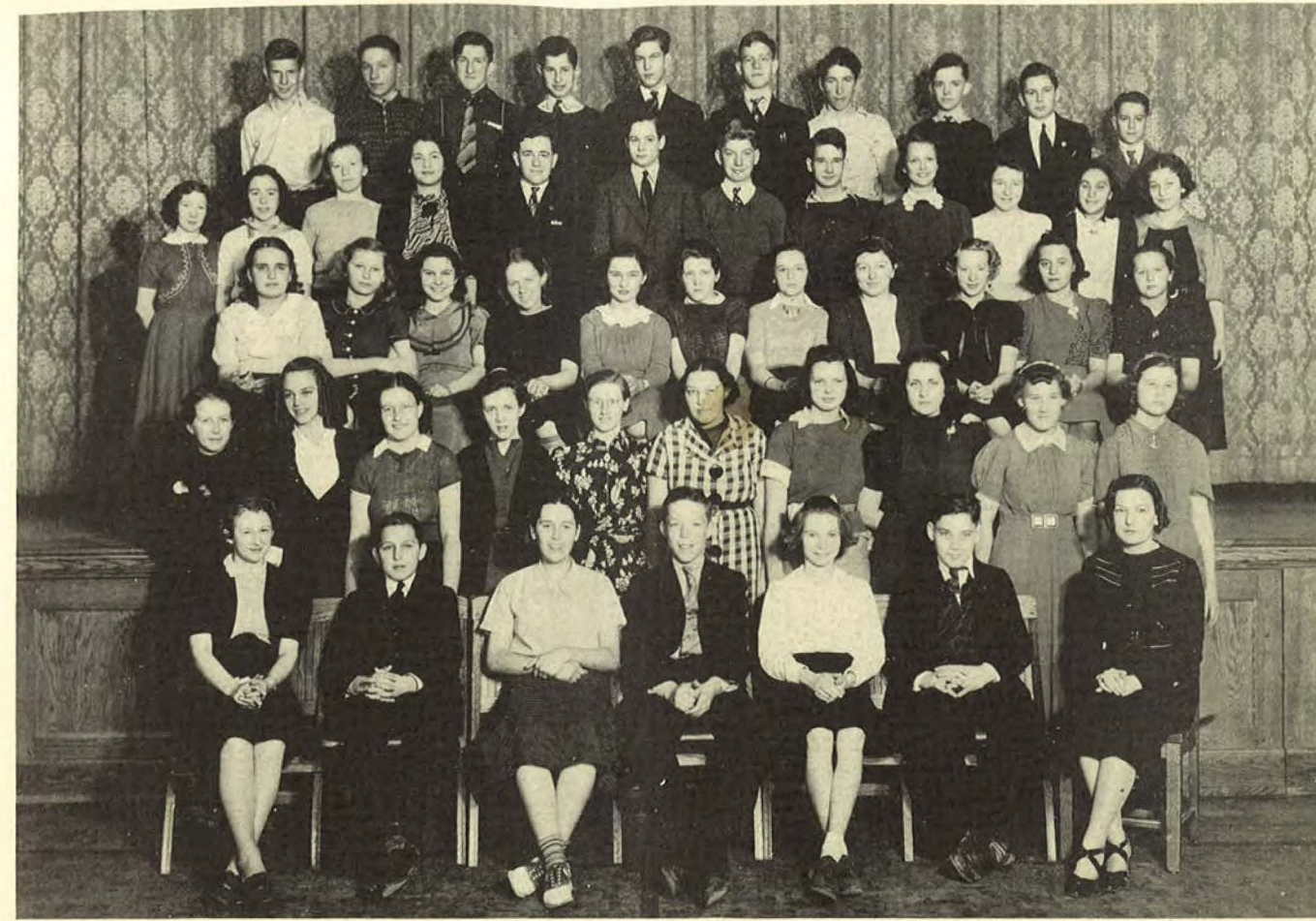

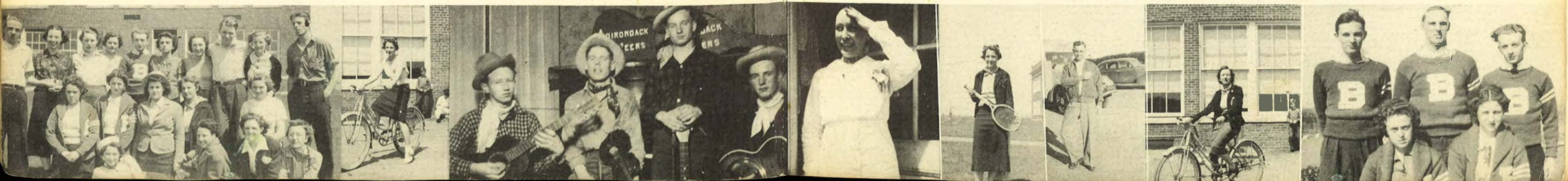
FRESHMAN CLASS

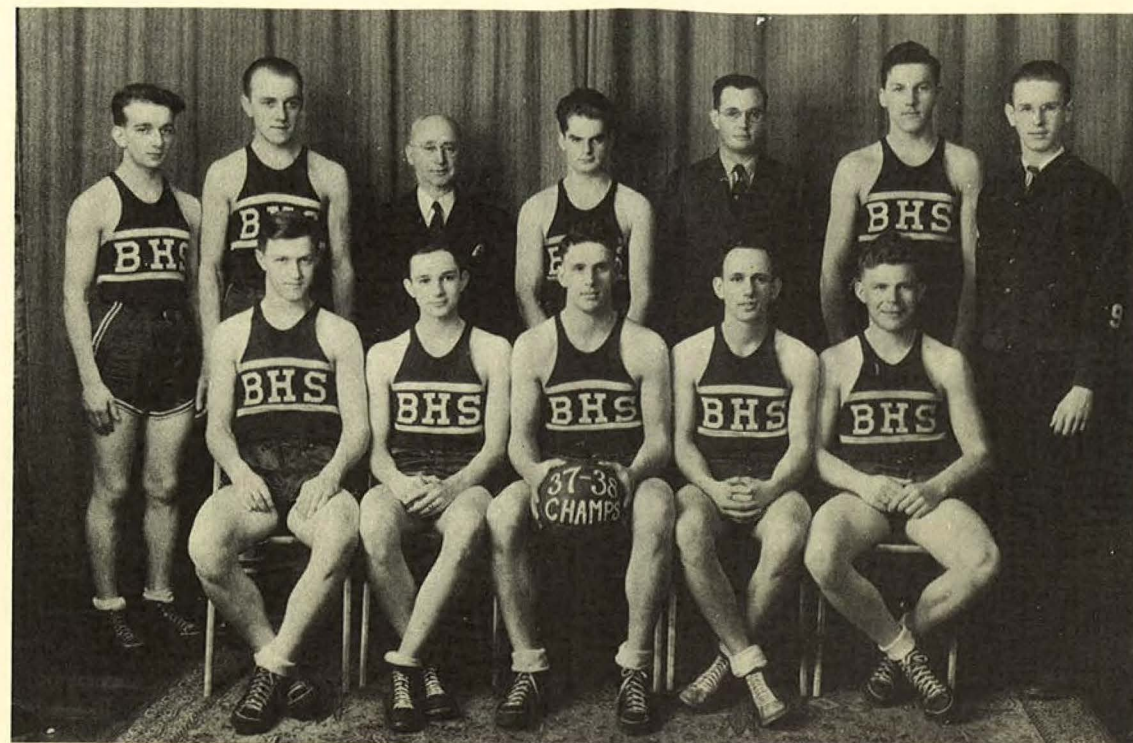


