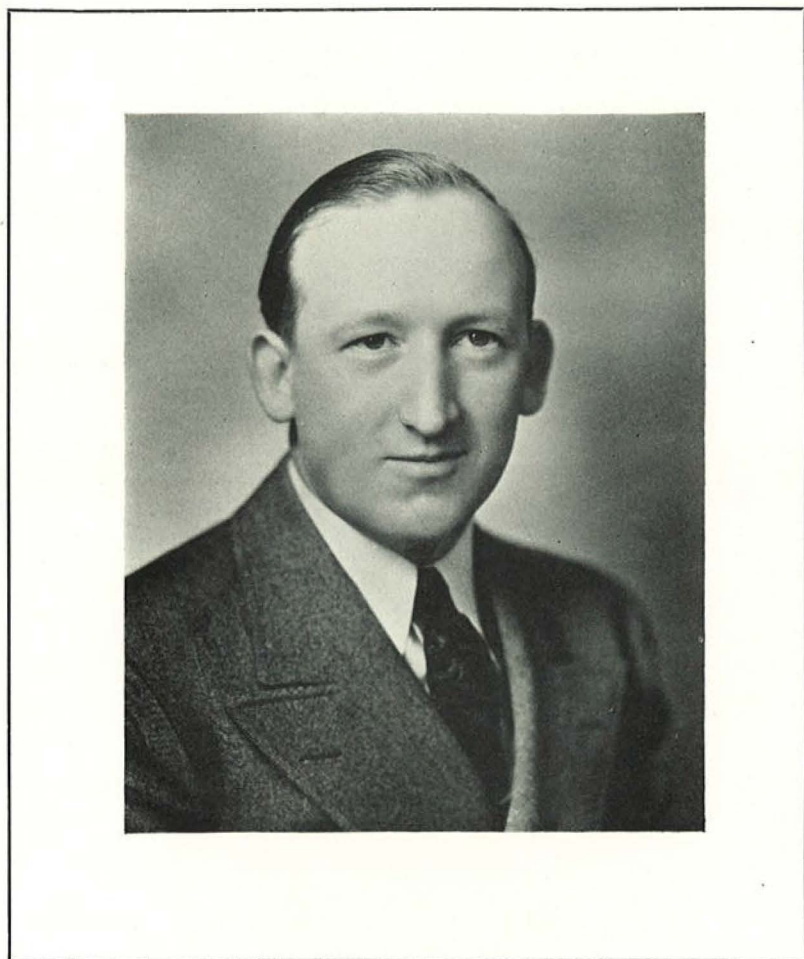

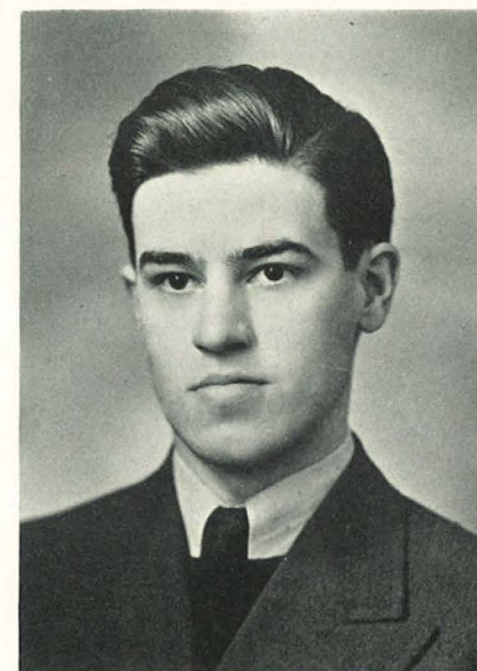

In the latter part of May our New York trip was realized. The thrill of seeing the World's Fair and New York for the first time (and perhaps the last) will never be forgotten.

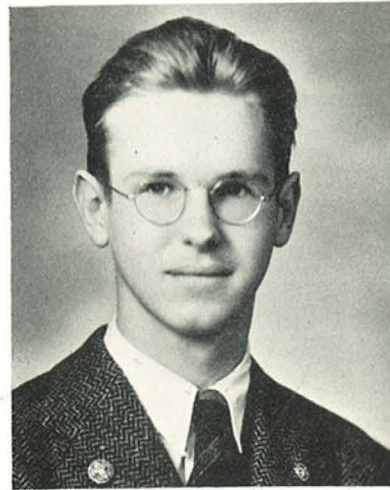

THE STORY

The great Broadalbin varsity basketball team brought a sensational season to a brilliant finish with a smashing triumph over Cairo to capture the Class D sectional championship March 16th.

Prior to this victory, Coach William Stillman's colorful quintet had won eighteen out of nineteen starts and their one-point loss to Fultonville was under protest at Tri-County League headquarters.

Under the skillful guidance of Coach Stillman the first five—Co-captains Johnny Hrinishin and Peter Klymkow, Hugh Jennings, Harmie Jeffords and Johnny Syzmanski—aided by Dick Trevett and diminutive Midge Holt, dominated the Tri County League race. The only threat to their power came from Fultonville. If the Mohawk River school's victory is substantiated by official decision there will be a first place tie for the second consecutive year. Broadalbin gained the right to represent the league in the playoffs with a 4-21 victory over Fultonville in a rubber contest.

The Blue and White Wave swept through the opening rounds of the state-sponsored tournament with handy wins over Chestertown and Stillwater. Saturday night, March 16, the invincible Broadalbin squad crushed Cairo 38 to 21 to definitely establish themselves as the Class D champions of Eastern New York State basketball.
