In our last and most exciting year, George Petoﬀ was elected president; Shirley Canary, vice-president; Geneva Kenyon, treasurer; and James Underwood, secretary; with Miss Winne and Miss Iles as advisors. To raise money for a New York trip, we sold candy, Christmas cards, held a puppet show and put on a Senior Play, "Miss Ginger," which was a highlight of our year and brought out many hidden talents among our Seniors.

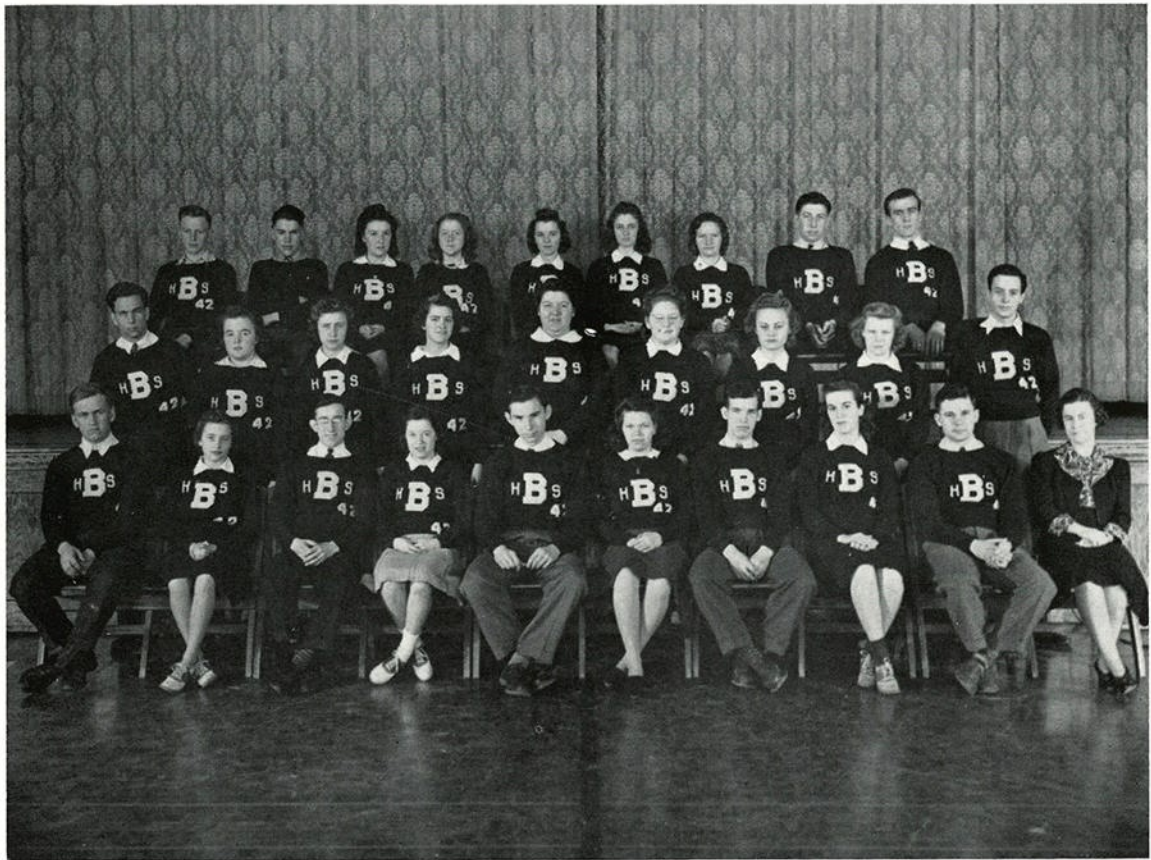

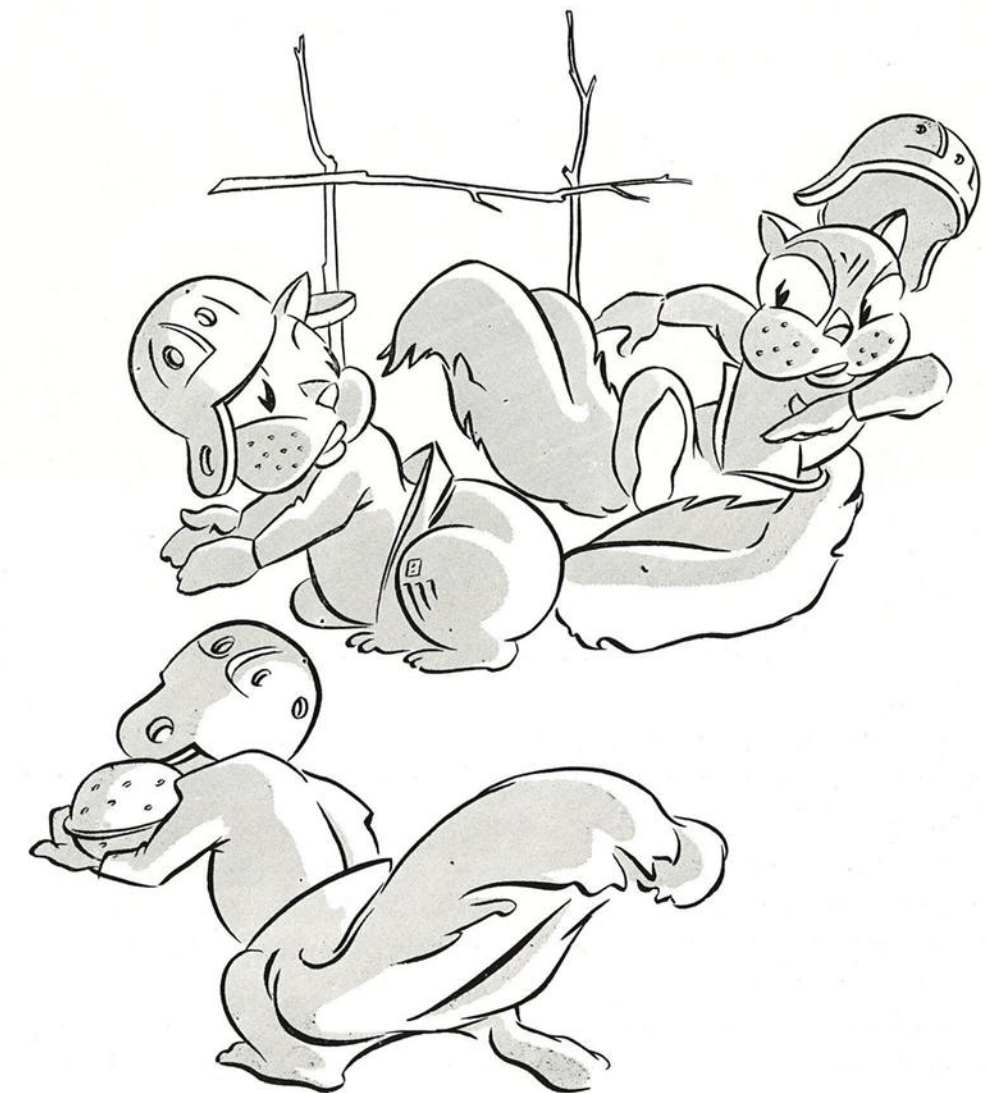
