


Kronicle Selects Mythological Motif


Olympian Idea Receives Recognition





English and History Departments Offer New Courses

The events of our nation and our world are thoroughly explored through the various courses in World and American History. Students gain a basic comprehension of historical motivation plus a keen insight into the social and economic structure of our society. Stimulating classroom discussions produce an avid interest in world affairs. This interest is evidenced by this year's senior theme, a survey of public opinion on affairs touching the local, state, and national levels. A further course in economics and the problems of democracy will be offered next year.

The English department covers the basic fundamentals of our language and literature at the junior high level. The English program is aimed at familiarizing the students with all phases of literature. English literature is covered from Beowulf to T. S. Eliot, and American literature is emphasized in the junior year. This year the English department has offered an elective course that covers the reading and analysis of many of literature's classics.

Math and Science Departments Expand





A strong science department helps the students with their academic studies. General science is offered by Mr. Towne and Mr. Mee in grades seven and eight. Earth science is covered by Mr. Laures. Biology, Chemistry, and Physics, taught by Mr. Milunski, can then be taken if desired. These courses are enriched with several principles of the new syllabus in addition to the required Regents' curricula.

Arts and Languages Broaden Cultural Understanding





Under the supervision of Mrs. Koehler, pupils develop depth in their capabilities in design and perspective in the art field. Seventh and eighth graders are given instruction in the rudiments of design, and create entertaining projects for the holidays. Further study of art provides the student with an understanding of the great artists and the history of art. Works of the pupils are entered in local art displays and the Spring Festival of the Arts. Bulletin boards in the halls exhibit the art classes' creations throughout the year.

The romantic languages of Latin and French are offered to students in the senior high school. French, taught by Mrs. Maxson, gives students fluency in one of the world's most important languages. Background and fundamentals are learned in the first year of instruction, and further use of these basics is carried through the second and third years of study. Mrs. Machold instructs students in Latin, which serves as a firm basis for English and other languages. Grammar is the format of the first year, and the works of Julius Caesar and Roman background are part of the second year's course. Third year Latin involves the works of Cicero, Ovid and Livy. Next year an additional course in Latin dealing with the reading of poetry will be offered.







Administrators Offer Leadership and Guidance




Mr. James Murray came to B.H.S. in 1963 as Supervising Principal. He is well qualified to act as a principal for he has experienced the problems of both teaching and administrating. He began his career in 1939 after graduating from St. Lawrence University with both a Bachelor of Science degree and a Master of Science degree in Education. After receiving his Masters, he taught Social Studies at North Lawrence High School. At this time, he was also basketball and baseball coach.

Mr. Murray taught Celestial Navigation during World War II. In the postwar years, until 1952, he served as Vice Principal of Westmoreland Central School. From 1952 to 1963 Mr. Murray served as Supervising Principal at Copenhagen Central School. At the present time, he is working for his Doctorate in Education at Syracuse University. We are grateful to Mr. Murray for all the help and guidance that he has given us, and for the many improvements that he has made in our school.







Mr. Michael Chouse, the Secondary Supervisor, has an extensive educational background to his credit. He became Vice Principal of Broadalbin in 1953 and soon received a Master of Science degree in Elementary School Administration; he then became Secondary Superintendent. 












