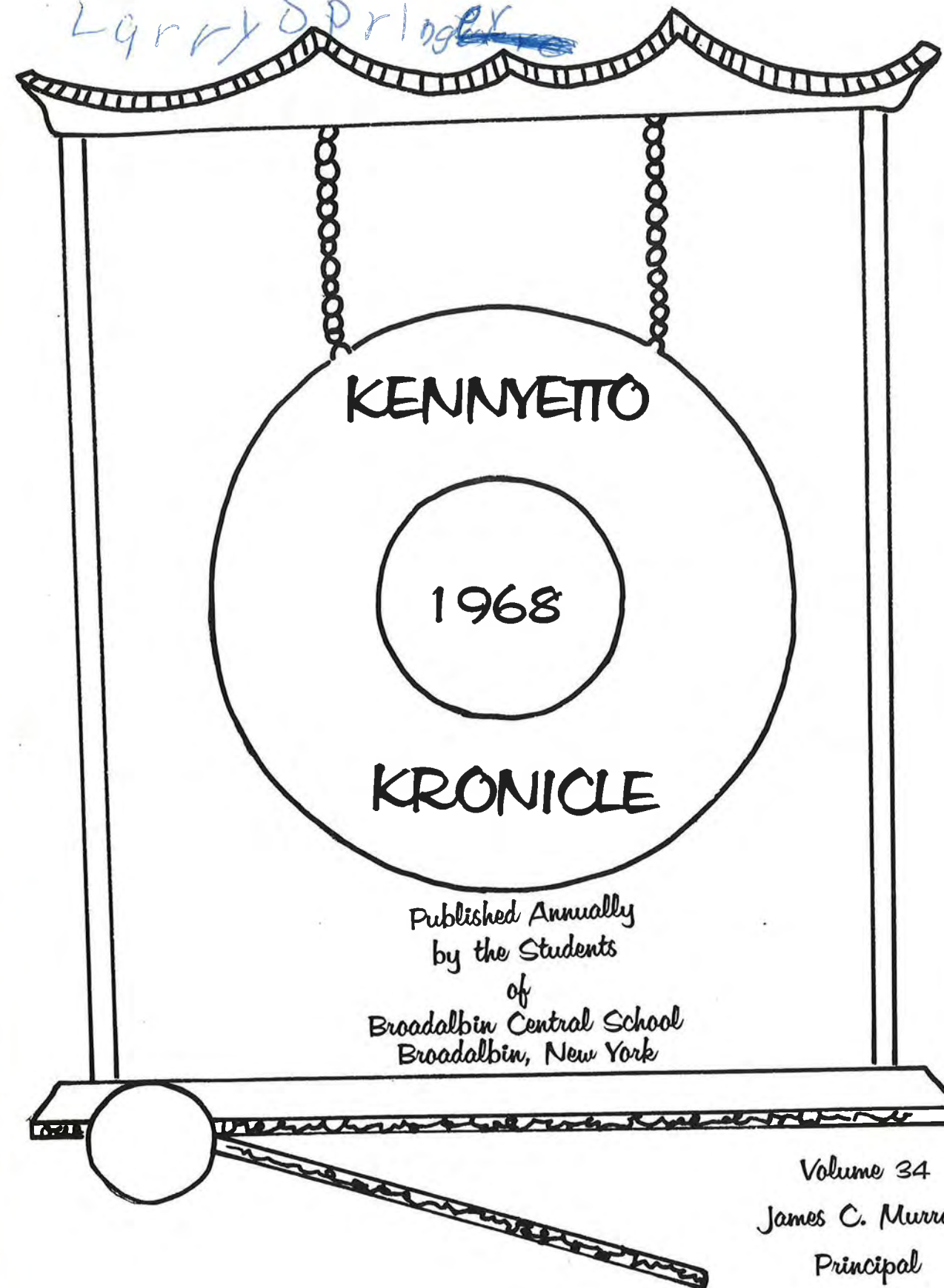

Born in 551 B.C. and buried in 479 B.C., Confucius is still remembered and lauded as one of the greatest teachers of all time. Why is this Chinese philosopher and leader still continually taught and quoted and, more importantly, what relevance does he have to us? Let us examine one of his many quotations.

"I do not instruct the uninterested; I do not help those who fail to try. If I mention one corner of a subject and the pupil does not deduce therefrom the other three, I drop him."

Before we relate this quotation to our school lives, let us examine its meaning. Confucius is warning students that it is they who must try if they are to expect further encouragement and help from him, the teacher. He says that those students who show no interest will eventually lose his interest. There is also another message written between the lines which says, "and it is those students who lose his interest who in turn lose out themselves." How true this is in every phase of school life. It is only if the student is interested and eager to try that the teacher can succeed. We have chosen Confucius as our theme because he made these demands of his students.

Throughout our yearbook we stress individual efforts, individual goals, and individual attainments. It is those people who try on their own, after they have been given the initial stimulus, who become the leaders and the attainers.

Teachers, coaches and instructors are here to encourage, to stimulate and to initiate interest in all fields of learning; scholastic or social. It is up to the individual student, as Confucius indicated, to develop his individual abilities. Mr. James Murray has been our Supervising Principal since 1963. Having had experience as both a teacher and an administrator, he is admirably qualified to act as the principal of Broadalbin Central. In 1939, after graduating from St. Lawrence University with both a Bachelor of Science Degree and a Master of Science Degree in Education, he began his career. His first position was teaching social studies and coaching the basketball and baseball teams at North Lawrence High School. During the Second World War, Mr. Murray taught celestial navigation and afterwards he served as Vice-principal of Westmorland Central School until 1952. Mr. Murray then served as Supervising Principal at Copenhagen Central school until 1963. Presently, he is working for his Doctorate in Education at Syracuse University.



Mr. Michael Chouse, our Secondary Supervisor, has accumulated educational experience to a noteworthy degree. After graduating from Alfred University with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Ceramic Engineering, he taught mathematics and science at Rockland Junior College. He later returned to Alfred University and earned his Bachelor of Science Degree in Education. In broadening his realm of knowledge, he then worked toward a Bachelor of Science Degree in Industrial Arts at the State University of Oswego while teaching mathematics and science at Fonda Central School.

In 1941, Mr. Chouse came to Broadalbin Central and began teaching industrial arts, science, and mathematics. During this time, he also received his Master of Science Degree in Secondary School Administration from the State University at Albany. In 1953, he became Vice-Principal of Broadalbin and after receiving his Master of Science Degree in Elementary School Administration, he became the Secondary Superintendent.
