WORLD NEWS OF 1984

Socially in 1984 there was a revival of family values. Divorce rates have finally leveled off after 20 years of painful rises that reshaped the American family. Also a new wave of patriotism is now taking hold of young people. ROTC and U.S. Central Intelligence Agency recruiters are back on U.S. campuses. Students also have a renewed emphasis on education. National reports on U.S. schools sparked a wave of reform. SAT scores showed a slight rise, reversing nearly 20 years of steady decline.



In the government, there was an extreme interest in abortion. U.S. Supreme Court ruling has prevented states from outlawing abortion during the first six months of pregnancy. Many people all across the political spectrum are opposed to abortion. But Conservatives have made the subject a major public issue, mobilizing voters and turning up the political heat in people who defend the choice of an abortion as a woman's right.

Economically in 1984, steel industries were on a decline. Since 1974, more than 400 steel facilities have closed in the U.S. This and other factors have led to the problem of unemployment. Reagan, however, sparked the growth in the nation's output of goods and services (GNP) and helped unemployment drop to 7.4%. But joblessness still exists, especially among teenagers, farmers, and construction workers. The service sector of our economy has also helped. It is responsible for creating almost 6 million new jobs. There is also a shift in the nation's employment structure toward low-wage jobs.

SPORTS OF 1984



Many athletes were in the news in 1984. In football, Doug Flutie of Boston College received the Heisman trophy for his excellent abilities in football. Dan Marino of the Miami Dolphins passed 48 touchdown passes to erase George Blanda's and Y. A. Teta's old record of 36. L.A. Rams runner Eric Dickerson raised O. J. Simpson's 2,003 yds. to 2,105 yds. In golf, Fuzzy Zoeller won the U.S. Open and in baseball, Detroit Tigers won the World Series. Willie Hernandez received the MVP award.

The most spectacular sport event was the XXIII Summer Olympic Games in Los Angeles. From the opening ceremony to the closing ceremony, many radiant moments were made. The moments of athletic achievement were extraordinary. Carl Lewis soared to win 4 gold medals to match Jesse Owens' mark. Greg Louganis raised new heights by his excellent diving and followed by Steve Lundquist's record breaking in the 100 meter breaststroke. Steve Hegg powered his "funny bike" to a golden finish while Connie Carpenter and Rebecca Twigg rode their way to gold and silver medals. Edwin Moses hurdled all obstacles with great ease. Spunky Joan Benoit, less than four months after arthroscopic knee surgery, breezed to victory in the first women's marathon. Julianne McNamora flew off the vault with the form that renewed the thrill of gymnastics. Mary Lou Retton added to this thrill with her two 10's in her last events, and hailed them both to win. Her final dismount was an enduring image of the Games.


All of the athletes had great enthusiasm for their event. Their hard work led for the U.S. to win 174 medals: 83 Gold, 61 Silver, 30 Bronze.

ENTERTAINMENT

In 1984, entertainment was lively. In music, Prince and Lionel Richie took the top music nominations along with Cyndi Lauper and Madonna. Daryl Hall and John Oates and Huey Lewis and the News received the nominations for the favorite duo. The favorite single nominations were "Dancing in the Dark" by Bruce Springsteen, "What's love got to do with it" by Tina Turner, and "When Doves Cry" by Prince. "Can't slow down" by Lionel Richie, "Purple Rain" by Prince, and "Thriller" by Michael Jackson received the favorite album nomination. The favorite video artists were Laura Branigan, Cyndi Lauper, Prince, Lionel Richie, and Bruce Springsteen.


Movies were also full of great interest in 1984. Among the best T.V. movies were *The Burning Bed*, based by Rose Leiman Goldemberg on Faith McNulty's book and directed by Robert Greenwald, probing the anatomy of a murder by a battered wife, brilliantly portrayed by Farrah Fawcett as the mother of three who, after some 13 years of abuse, set fire to her drunken ex-husband as he slept. *Silence of the Heart*, written by Phil Penningroth and directed by Richard Michaels, deals with the current problem of teenage suicides in powerfully unsensational terms. Its focus is primarily on the aftermath of such a tragedy on family and friends; its understatement brings an unusual honesty to the social-issue genre so that human drama supersedes the melodrama. *Fatal Vision*, adapted by John Gay from Joe McGinniss' best seller and directed by David Greene, details the real-life story of the doctor, an all-American type convicted of the murder of his pregnant wife and two small daughters through the persistence of his father-in-law and, most fascinatingly, the forensic evidence, giving us a stronger-than-fiction thriller and a consideration of whether justice did indeed triumph. *The Sun Also Rises*, adapted from Ernest Hemingway's 1926 novel by Robert L. Joseph and directed by James Goldstone, takes liberties with the source if not the spirit of the story of that "lost generation" of post-World War I expatriates in Paris and does so to striking and engrossing effect creating a rich tapestry of the young in their disillusionment, the walking wounded of peacetime.

Theater movies also had their share of interest. The movies most seen in 1984 are *Gremlins*, *Beverly Hills Cop*, *Purple Rain*, *Flashdance* and *A Soldier's Story*.




LOCAL NEWS

A big issue in 1984 was the proposed merger of Broadalbin and Perth schools. The vote was held December 11th and was defeated with the vote of 372-411 in Broadalbin, although victorious in Perth with a vote of 399-126. The defeat of this merger will surely have a serious effect on the classes of upcoming years for the Regents Action Plan implemented by New York State is one which will require all Regents students to have a minimum of 21½ graduate credits for 1989. There will be an increased emphasis on languages, sciences, math, social studies. No doubt there will be a tremendous move in computer usage. Once more there will be much better testing in the grammar school level to insure that the students have a command of the basics before they reach Junior High. The merger could make it easier for both schools to enforce the Regents Action Plan. Also the possibilities of more aid and textbooks would be sure with a merger. If the merger was passed the elementary schools would be in their respected districts, the Junior High would be in Broadalbin, and the Senior High would be in Perth. But because of this defeat both schools will have to struggle to educate the students.
