In politics, the Democrats have dented Pres. Reagan's last two years in office. At this writing, it certainly appears that his last two years will be that of the Lame Duck. We'll see. Right On! It was a proud moment for all Americans. To the crew; you have Chuck Yeager's "The Right Stuff."

Though it occurred in early 1987, we pay tribute to Dennis Connor and the Stars and Stripes. Millions of Americans stayed up into early morning

hours watching he and his crew defeat the New Zealand's Kiwi Magic and the the Aussie 12 Meter, Kokaburra III. Mr. Connors lost the Cup in 1983 to the Australian off the coast of New Port. He had been in the hands of the New York Yacht Club for well over a 100 years. He and his crew spent almost 4 years preparing for their challenge. The Cup will now reside with the San Diego Yacht Club. Where the next Cup Series will be held four years from now has not yet been determined, but will be in the next few months.

As we examine the economy of the U.S. for 1986 and early 1987, the story of the year has to be the stock market. The Bulls were at work and the market went over 2000. In fact, the market is currently over 2250. Where this market tumbles and takes the uneventful plunge cannot be predicted by the experts. There are so many ominous signs that point toward a Bear market that one wonders just how far it can be pushed. There were well over 100 bank failures, the farmers in the farm belt continue to lose their farms, manufacturing jobs continue to increase, and the National debt continues to go by the Two Trillion mark. We were over \$150 Billion in the red in our trade. Even though the U.S. dollar continues to lose against the Japanese Yen and German Mark, it hasn't really helped to sell our commodities in those countries. How do we compete against labor costs in Mexico, Hong Kong, Korea, Taiwan, Sri Lanks, Turkey, Brazil and others?? We now have the Yugo and Hyundai. What will be next? Will the Federal Reserve in 1987 keep interests rates down to spur the economy? Will Americans keep those plastic cards in their wallets and save more money? Americans are spenders, not savers! Because OPEC can't get its act together for myriad reasons in the Mid-East and around the world, the current oil glut continues. For how long? Do we conserve and prevent a 1973 Oil Crisis?? This is no time to let up on conservation measures and new methods of energy. Also, as we continue into 1987, what happens to the Japanese economy. Will they experience the painful American experience of unemployment??

Locally, there will be more layoffs at G.E. in 1987. However, it has also been announced that G.E. is here to stay and that they expect the employment level to be approximately 12,000. That is 15,000 less than what it was 15 years ago. The Ford Motor Company will continue to phase out its

radiator operation in Green Island. Some of the workers have and will have employment available in Michigan.

The leather industry continues to suffer its woes predominantly caused by cheap labor in the orient and South America. They even find it difficult to compete for skins here in the U.S. Also, they must continue to deal with ever increasing pressure from both the State and Federal Government to clean up the toxic wastes from the processing of these skins. Now that the Cabbage Patch craze has passed, what Coleco will emphasize in its local operation remains to be seen. More and more of its work is going to Taiwan and Korea. A good deal of their work here is packaging. As is the case in so many of the areas around the country, this geographic area needs a boost. Saratoga County continues to grow at tremendous rates.

As this is being written, the Broadalbin and Perth School Districts are in the processing of attempting to amalgamate the two districts. Two years ago a merger missed by only a hand full of votes. This time, Broadalbin is attempting an annexation. If successful, the Perth School District will cease to exist. The name of the new district will be Broadalbin-Perth. Each community would have a grammar school. However, the high school would be in Broadalbin and Perth would have a junior high consisting of grades 6, 7, and 8. An enlarged school district would be advantageous to both students and taxpayers. The state offers tremendous tax incentives for a merger. Obviously, there could be a much more efficient use of the teaching staffs and eventually, a greater number of courses offered to students. If the petition drive is successful, by the middle of March, the Commissioner of Education will call for a special election in the two districts. If both districts vote affirmatively, the two will then become a single district. Right now, there are many mixed emotions on both sides, but in particular, on the part of the Perth students. From their perspective, they do not want to lose what they feel is rightfully theirs; their own school. If the annexation does occur, the district would then consist of approximately 1600 students.
