

A LETTER FROM THE PRINCIPAL JOHN MCCARTHY

John Paul II Catholic School is celebrating its 10th anniversary year. It seems like only yesterday that 57 students entered the doors of the Okatee Baptist Church as the current school building was in the final stage of completion. Fast forward ten years later and over 330 students are now enrolled, occupying not only the original school building, but the athletic center finished in 2016 and six modular classrooms added in 2021 and 2022. With the smallest grade being the senior class at 37

students, we are projecting a total enrollment of over 400 students by the start of next school year.

Applications for 2022-23 are currently far exceeding the record-breaking totals of this past year, and we expect waiting lists to develop in several grades. This growth, particularly in the last two years, has made us one of the fastest growing private schools in South Carolina and one of the fastest growing Catholic schools in the nation.

From my perspective, as an educator of 38 years, this has been nothing short of amazing. But why?

I am often asked the question "What accounts for this phenomenal growth spurt?" There are many complex answers to this very simple question. The academic program, with 22 AP courses, is stellar. The sports program has continued to grow in size and success. The visual and performing arts are now at levels rivaling schools much larger in size. A dedicated admissions coordinator and increased marketing have allowed us to better tell our story. Over \$200,000 in scholarship aid from the Daughters of Charity, the St. Anthony Education Fund, and twelve Promise Scholarships have helped increase the diversity of our student population. The disruption of the pandemic and the growth of the Lowcountry have increased the size of the base of families looking for better choices.

While all of these are contributors to our growth, I believe the most important reason boils down to these three words: faith, family, and joy.

Our students are in the safety of a faith-based environment that allows them the opportunity to seek a fulfilling personal relationship with Jesus Christ. They are amongst a family of faculty, staff,

> and friends who help to form relationships based on kindness and understanding. All of this leads to students who are generally happy, and this joy is palpable in our school.

With growth comes challenge. We simply have outgrown our little school. A projected enrollment of 500+ by August 2025 will necessitate the construction of the Innovation Center to serve as the primary high school academic building.

This state-of-the-art, STEAM-focused facility will rival any high school around. The current building will serve as the middle school, thus creating two schools on one campus. No doubt John Paul II Catholic School will emerge from this period of growth stronger than ever, with a future built on the contributions of so many and poised to become the school Where Faith and Innovation Meet. We look forward to welcoming future Golden Warriors and a growing list of generous supporters to be part of this amazing story. In the words of our patron Saint John Paul II:

"Rise, let us be on our way! Let us go forth full of trust in Christ. He will accompany us as we journey toward the goal that He alone knows."

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Leadership Model Change at John Paul II Catholic School

On October 25, 2022 the Diocese of Charleston announced that two of its schools, Bishop England High School in Charleston and John Paul II Catholic School would be moving to a president-principal model. Considered the most common governance model for Catholic high schools across the nation, this new leadership format takes the varied and numerous responsibilities for managing a private, Catholic school and spreads them over two leadership positions. A key outcome of going to this model is

that it will allow JPII the capacity to enter into a capital campaign and construction project that will likely span the next three years. Once the campaign and project is concluded, and the school has reached its goal of 500 students, the new model will remain in effect due to the complexity of running a private school of this size. The president is essentially the CEO of the school, responsible for overall governance, advancement, and business operations, while the principal is the Chief Academic Officer, running the day-to-day operations of the school and its academic and extracurricular programs.

As of October 25, John McCarthy assumed the position of president of John Paul II Catholic School and Heather Rembold becomes the school's 5th principal. Mr. McCarthy has over 23 years of leadership experience, with 8 of those years as a public school district superintendent and 15 years of experience leading high schools, 9 of those years being in Catholic education. Mrs. Rembold has been in the position of assistant principal for 10 years since the inception of the school. Collectively they have over 60 years of experience in the field of education.

DECA moderator and JPII math teacher, Tracy Sklarin, believes the extensive areas available through DECA bring a sense of interest that lead to student success. The DECA mission is to prepare emerging leaders and entrepreneurs in marketing, finance, hospitality, and management in high schools and colleges around the globe.

"This program fits in well with the mission of JPII, particularly in the areas of leadership and innovation," noted JPII President John McCarthy. "Each year DECA sponsors competitions open to participating high schools and colleges. Although our program is still in its relative infancy compared to other schools, we fared extremely well at the regional competition this week."

The Golden Warriors are looking forward to the State Competition in February.

Prado Receives National Hispanic Award

JPII junior, Nathaniel Prado, has received the National Hispanic Recognition Award.

According to the College Board website, the National Hispanic Recognition Program (NHRP) was initiated in 1983 to identify "outstanding Hispanic high school students and to share information about these academically well-prepared students with subscribing colleges and

universities."

To be eligible, students must be at least one-quarter Hispanic. Each year the NHRP identifies approximately 7,000 of the highest-scoring



students from a nationwide total of 250,000 high school juniors who took the PSAT/NMSQT and designated themselves as Hispanic, as well as approximately 200 of the top-scoring students from Puerto Rico.

CURIOUS ABOUT SCIENCE

Principles of Biomedical Science Students Get a Clue!

The students in the Project Lead the Way (PLTW) Principles of Biomedical Science class, taught by JPII science teachers, Mrs. Andi Shaw and Mrs. Alice Wood, opened the school year investigating a possible crime scene.

"When they entered the lab," according to Mrs. Wood, "they discovered the body of a college student who had been found dead a few hours earlier. It was great to see their reactions and conversations when they first walked in!" The students were tasked with documenting the crime scene as a first step to solving the mystery of the student's death.

"In addition to documenting the crime scene, students evaluated evidence including fingerprints and hair samples found near the body, as in this instance, and DNA from blood samples of the victim and potential suspects," explained Mrs. Wood. Some JPII students submitted to lie detector tests, while other students studied heart and respiration data to evaluate these results.

The Principles of Biomedical Science class investigates a variety of career opportunities in the medical arena. Early lessons focus on medical investigations as students play the roles of forensic scientists.







6th Graders Take a Trip to the Maritime Center

The 6th grade class took a field trip to the Maritime Center to learn the importance of oysters in the water ecosystem and how restocking the shells in the water is good for the environment. "They also discovered the importance of reusing and recycling for our environment and what can and can't be recycled," according to Mrs. Sonia Merrick. "The students bagged oyster shells so they could be tossed back in the river for more oysters to grow on."

The trip was part of an interdisciplinary collaboration within the middle school. In science class the students learned about organisms and microorganisms and in religion class they incorporated the project to realize the importance of recycling so items don't end up in a landfill.

THEOLOGY REVELATION

Principle of Double Effect

The Principle of Double Effect states that certain actions that have both good and bad effects (results) can be morally permissible if certain conditions are met and that the good effect cannot be obtained without allowing or tolerating the bad to happen as well.

And that is what the JPII theology morality class, taught by Deacon Brent Heathcott, recently debated and discussed. "The Principal of Double Effect helps students understand that their actions have good and bad effects and sometimes both can occur," he explained. "If that is the case, when is it permissible to do the act knowing bad



could happen? They are basically learning about the consequences of actions."

As you might have imagined the JPII students enjoyed the lively discussion, according to Deacon Heathcott. "They loved the exercise! They debated a few scenarios I presented in class and then used certain criteria we discussed to decide if the actions were morally permissible even though good and bad things happened."

Students in Mrs. Sonia Merrick's 6th grade theology class worked together creating structures with their partners — all while NOT being able to speak to each other during the build! According to Mrs. Merrick, the concept of the assignment was to enforce the concept of trust in God like Abraham and Sarah did.

Middle Schoolers Keep Reading

Summer reading book reports are not what they used to be! Mrs. Sonia Merrick, JPII middle school language arts teacher, had her middle school students participate in a Socratic seminar for their summer reading assignment. A few months later, she challenged her students to a 30-day reading challenge.

The Socratic seminar is a formal discussion, based on a text, in which the leader asks open-ended questions. Within the context of the discussion, students listen closely to the comments of others, thinking critically for themselves, and articulate their own thoughts and their responses to the thoughts of others. The students' theme was "How is Your Character a Warrior?"

In November, Mrs. Merrick had her students take part in a 30-day November Reading Challenge which culminated in a tasty ice cream party. One of the main activities of the challenge for these JPII Warriors was also presenting how their protagonist was a warrior!

JPII SHIELD Robotics Tournament

The JPII SHIELD Robotics VEX IQ teams hosted a tournament in the JPII gym on Saturday, October 22.

Each of the three JPII teams of $6^{th} - 8^{th}$ graders competed in ten matches along with 16 other teams from SC and NC. After 95 qualifying matches, team 61317M finished in 8th place with 61317X finishing just behind them in 9th place, and 61317S came in 17th.

"The top 10 teams then advanced to the final five matches of the day," said Mrs. Rooney. "Team 61317M started the finals scoring one of the highest scores of the day, 56 points! They remained in 1st place through the next three matches, until in the very last match, their opponent scored the day's top score of 72 points. Even though they did not win the Teamwork Championship, they did earn the Innovate Award!"

The Innovate Award recognizes a team with an effective and well-documented design process. This award is evaluated by the judges based on the team's engineering notebook, interview, ability to explain their robot with effective communication skills, professionalism, and student-centered ethos.

JPII SHIELD Robotics team 61317M has been invited to both the SC VEX IQ

State Championship in Greenville AND the 2023 U.S. Open Robotics Championship in Council Bluffs, Iowa. "This is an amazing accomplishment for our very impressive Girl Power team. With just a few more tournaments left in the season, I hope to see our other teams qualify as well."

"Teams built and tested a prototype while documenting the steps of the design process."

SCHOLARSHIP

Promise Scholarship Program

Keeping JPII affordable for all families of the Lowcountry has been both a challenge and a commitment for us. Due to our relatively small size and the expansive program we offer, the per-student cost of a JPII education is over \$16,000 per year. At full cost, a JPII education would be out of the realm of possibility for many if it were not for the generous donors to our Warrior Fund and the support of our parishes and the Diocese of Charleston. Over \$600,000 in tuition assistance and scholarship is provided annually to ensure the school remains affordable to all. While we believe every family should pay a minimum amount toward their child's education, sometimes this minimum is still too much. Therefore, JPII has created the Promise Scholarship, a full-tuition scholarship for students of high financial need who show tremendous promise.

As of August 2022, the school offered 12 students the opportunity of a lifetime through the Promise Scholarship Program. This has been made possible through the generosity of several donors. The way it works is simple. A donor "promises" to support a student with a gift of 50% of full tuition plus 50% of bus transportation if needed. The school then matches the donation from its tuition assistance fund. The commitment of the donor is for the student's entire JPII career. As the school grows in size, and the cost of education increases, the need for more Promise Scholarships becomes even more critical. College Fair



FUTURE CAMPUS

Because of unprecedented growth, John Paul II Catholic School is about to embark on a major capital campaign and construction project.

The *Where Faith and Innovation Meet* Campaign will reimagine the current campus to incorporate a new 42,000 square foot Innovation Center that will provide our high school students with a forward-thinking teaching and learning environment to rival any educational facility in our region, while increasing enrollment to over 500 students.

A black box theater for the performing arts will anchor one end of the new building and will serve the entire school population. Besides the performing arts, this multipurpose space will support a wide variety of school activities such as robotics, esports, wrestling, cheerleading, dance, class and House meeting space, etc. An open space commons, similar to a college student center replete with a collaboration cafe, will anchor the other end.

The building's first floor will be designed to facilitate interdisciplinary, project-based STEAM teaching. Improvements to parking, traffic flow, and campus security are also planned. Depending on the success of the campaign, the master plan calls for the expansion of playing fields, including a synthetic turf multisport field, lighting for all fields, tennis courts, restrooms and concessions, and an addition to the athletic center for storage, locker rooms, and a fitness center. Future plans call for the construction of a chapel large enough to hold our entire school population and to serve as the cornerstone of our Catholic identity.

As John Paul II Catholic School celebrates its 10th anniversary in the 2022-23 school year, we look forward to the physical growth of our campus to match our enrollment growth. What seemed impossible only a few years ago, the dream has now become a reality for all those who believed in the possibility. In the coming months expect to hear more about how you can help us build this dream together.
