Many of you are already familiar with Washington Central's ongoing planning for the use of Federal pandemic recovery dollars. There have been several rounds of grant funds deployed to schools for managing through and emerging from the COVID19 pandemic. ARP ESSER funds will need to be fully budgeted by November 1, 2022. In order to prepare for that deadline, we would like to update our community about how we have spent our funds to date, and provide a revised plan for the remaining funds. A Message from our Humanity & Justice Coalition

The role of the Coalition is advisory. This year, our plan is to focus on four major areas:

1. Hosting affinity groups for parents and caregivers of color and of students of color.

The affinity groups are offered to support students and families and serve as a mechanism to provide feedback to our school district so that we can be more responsive to our students and families of color.

- 2. Committing to professional learning regarding equity, humanity, and justice.

 Educators in Washington Central are participating in book groups throughout the year to
 - engage us in deepening our collective knowledge and apply our new learning in our respective roles.
- 3. Reviewing and critiquing our policies, procedures, curricula, and instructional practices so they reflect and align with our Humanity and Justice Vision Statement.

This is a continuation of the Humanity and Justice Coalition's work that began in these areas last year.

4. Advocating and participating in statewide practices that are aligned with our Humanity and Justice Vision Statement.

Through statewide professional organizations we will actively engage in work related to the revision of the Education Quality Standards, the implementation of Act One (Vermont's act relating to ethnic and social equity standards for public schools) and diversifying the educator workforce.
