

Sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, stemming from financial issues or economic hardship (doubled or tripled up)












Student Support Network (SSN)






- HLUPSD holds monthly SARB Meetings

Youth Court Restorative Justice Program A New Way of Thinking

Traditional	Restorative		
School and rules violated	People and relationships		
Justice focuses on establishing guilt	Justice Identifies needs and obligations		
Accountability= punishment	Accountability = understanding impact, repairing harm		
Justice directed at offender, victim ignored	Offender, victim and school all have direct roles in justice practice		
Focus is on punishment when rules are broken/harm has occurred	Offender is responsible for harmful behavior, repairing harm, and working toward positive outcomes		
No opportunity for remorse or amends	Opportunity given for amends and expression of remorse





State Indicator Suspension Trend: 2011-2015





Vape Education

Important to be aware that teen vaping is on the rise.
 In 2017 11.7% of teens reported using a vaping product, 20.8% in 2018 & about 28% in 2019
 1 type of Vaping Cartridge, Juul, is equal to 20 cigarettes
 There are over 7,500 Vape Oils on the market. *Many target teens

- Manufacturers & Users are creating vape devices that look like pens, watches, markers, USB/flash drives, etc.
- O Unexplained Sweet smells—Many vape oils have candy or fruit based flavors


